Burk Resident Drowns In Tank

L. Dee Reynolds, 43 year old Burk Burnett resident, drowned Tuesday afternoon in a stock tank seven miles southwest of here.

Justice of the Peace F. E. Cruce returned a verdict of death by accidental drowning.

The Burk Burnett Police Department said Reynolds and two other Burk Burnett men, Art Williams and J. L. Johnson, were hunting frogs at the tank when the accident happened.

Reynolds had shot a frog and waded into the tank to get it when he apparently suffered a cramp in his legs and drowned in water about nine feet deep at 2:30 p. m.

Police and volunteer firemen recovered the body about 45 minutes later.

Reynolds, who resided at 510 Sheppard Drive in Burk Burnett was born Sept. 21, 1917, in Plainview and had been a resident of Burk Burnett for the past 24 years.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon, 2:30 p. m. at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Leroy Meyer, pastor, officiating. Interment will be in the Burk Burnett Cemetery with Owens and Brumley Funeral Home in charge.

Survivors include the widow; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Reynolds of Knox City; four daughters, Shirley, Dorothy, Rita and Nita, all of the home address; six brothers, Preston Reynolds of Knox City; Lawton Reynolds of Houston; W. S. Reynolds of Odessa; Vonceil Reynolds of Fort Knox, Ky.; and Boyd Reynolds of Abilene; two sisters Mrs. Vonita Hallmark of DeLeon and Miss Jean Reynolds of Plainview.

Eugene Gilmore New Church of Christ Minister



The Apostle Paul's divine charge to Timothy as a gospel preacher was accepted by Eugene Gilmore, the new minister for the Burk Burnett Church of Christ, as a solemn charge to be fulfilled to the best of his ability.

Gilmore, in what he classified as a "get acquainted" sermon Sunday, Sept. 3rd, used 2 Tim. 4: 1-2 as the basis for his first sermon to the Burk Burnett Church. "I charge thee in the sight of God, and of Christ Jesus, preach the word; be urgent in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort, with all long suffering and teaching," Gilmore stated that just as it is the responsibility of every person wearing the name of Christ to imitate the life of Christ to the best of ones ability, it is also the preachers responsibility to live up to the Apostle Paul's admonition to gospel preachers to the best of his ability.

The new minister began full time work with the church of Christ here Sunday, Sept. 3rd. He replaces Tommy Swearingen who has accepted the work with the Dalworth Church of Christ in Grand Prairie. Swearingen served the church here as its minister for approximately two years.

Gilmore and his family will reside at 208 First Street. His wife's name is Wilma. They have four children, Jeanine, age 13; Joyce, 10; David, 5; and Lois, age 2. Their former home was in Topeka Kans., where he served as a minister.

He has been preaching since 1943, however, has only served in full time ministry since 1955. He received his Bachelor's Degree from George Pepperdine College in California, and his Master's Degree from Oklahoma University. He taught school for a number of years before entering full time ministry. His first full time work in the ministry was with the East Side Church of Christ in Tulsa, Okla.

His work also has included a part in establishing the church in Juneau, Alaska, as well as several other mission points.

Gilmore stated that he was attracted to Burk Burnett because of its being a growing community with a growing church. He is particularly impressed with the number of churches of Christ in this area, as well as with the plans for future work that the church elders here have. The friendliness and cordiality of the people of Burk Burnett has been wonderful, Gilmore stated.

Violence At Home

Violence and threats of more violence the world over should not blind us to the gravity of our own, purely domestic violence problem.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reports that serious crime reached a new all time high last year, with an astounding 98 percent increase over 1950. The population increase was only 18 percent during the decade.

Throughout 1960 there was a murder every 58 minutes, a forcible rape every 34 minutes and an aggravated assault every 4 minutes. Crimes against property too, occurred much more frequently.

The juvenile crime problem continues to get worse. Arrests of juveniles have more than doubled since 1950, while the population of youths aged 10 to 17 increased by less than one half.

Even as we must be ready to protect ourselves from enemies abroad, we must do a much more effective job of dealing with society's enemies at home.

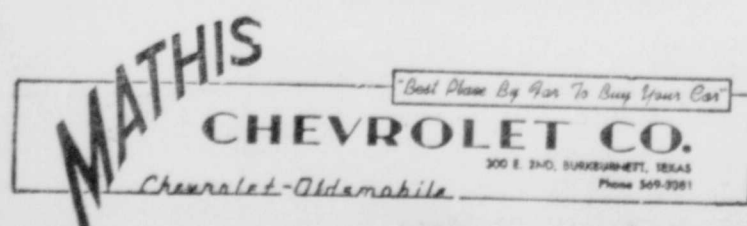

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

"It is about time we recognize that we have a genuine crisis in our country and to follow policies which go beyond the realm of being a generous free world leader which will ultimately weaken the strength of the free world."



This statement, made by Rep. John Ashbrook of Ohio, was part of his remarks on his observations so far as a member of the House Special Com- C. W. Harder

He reports that the State Dept. gets too many people to listen to them when it is brought out that restricting imports of residual oil will help employment in the coal mines of America. State Dept. says this will create a crisis in Venezuela. But crisis that exists in American coal communities is not, presumably, supposed to be recognized.

Rep. Ashbrook points out that we allow Canada to ship gas and oil into the U. S. duty free, but if we ship coal to Canada, the Canadians charge 50 cents per ton duty.

He also takes a broad swipe at the bureaucratic news releases that say the balance of world trade is in favor of the U. S. If that were true, he points out, we would not be continually losing gold reserves.

As a matter of fact, Rep. Ashbrook says, in 1960 our give away items, counted as part of world trade, not only knocked out \$5 billion dollar

balance favoring U. S., but left deficit of \$3.8 billion.

In addition, the U. S. under the farm programs is selling cotton abroad for 30 to 40% of the world price, last year shipped 600 million bushels of wheat with a subsidy of 66 cents per bushel. Without the half billion dollar subsidy on these two products alone, there would not have been \$2 billion worth exported. Thus, figures on American import-export trade are fallacious.

Rep. Ashbrook also points out that Russia reneged on paying into the United Nations its share of the costs that have so far been incurred in keeping things quiet in the Congo. The United States picked up the Russian share of this tab totalling \$15 million. Where did the money come from?

Here is Rep. Ashbrook's answer "Congress would never appropriate this sum for such folly so that takes \$5 million from the President's contingent fund and \$10 million from the foreign aid fund and literally gives it away to aid our enemy. Congress has already appropriated these amounts so we have no check on them. A logical question, however, is just who is obligating us to help pay the communist's share. Again we see a sign of our national weakness. We should insist that the Reds pay up or get out but instead the communists make mockery of the U. N. and we blithely make our own beleaguered taxpayers the fall guys once more. In effect, this means we are financing both sides of the Congo operation."

This all seems to add up to one thing. America's future appears to depend on an aroused Congress.

"Back To Stay In School" Campaign Initiated by U. S. Office Of Education

A "Back to Stay in School" campaign directed at high school and college students has been initiated by the U. S. Office of Education under the leadership of Dr. Sterling M. McMurrin, Commissioner of Education, it was announced today by J. H. Bond, Regional Director, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Region VII. The campaign will be a year round effort, though special emphasis will be directed towards reducing the number of dropouts before school re-opens next month. George D. Hann, recently appointed office of Education Regional Representative in Dallas, will head the campaign in DHEW, Region VII. Bond stated.

Over 900,000 students dropped out of the Nation's schools last year, although 70 percent had the ability to finish high school and probably go on to college. Since the drop out rate will vary from one community to the next, the problem must be approached from that level.

Dropping out of school has a number of implications for the student and the community. The student is restricting earning power substantially by dropping out of school. Opportunities for advancement are limited and in many instances available jobs for the untrained person are few or non-existent. The community suffers when a student drops out of school because this reduces the supply of trained manpower available

President of the Texas Farm Bureau said Gov. Price's deletion of \$15 million from the second year of the Collier farm-to-market road program was a "major objection of the Texas Farm Bureau."

West of Bishop said, "The Texas Farm Bureau will work in every way to get the Governor's proposal to restrict those funds to projects with adequate provision for maintenance of farm-to-market roads from other sources."

He stated that the entire program construction program would have been jeopardized if Farm Bureau and other groups had not been able to prevail upon the Governor to leave the \$15 million in the first year of the biennium appropriation.

"This the Governor did agree upon and approve," the farm leader said. Farm Bureau leaders and others met with the Governor at his request on the day before the veto statement last week. The appropriation for the coming fiscal year was left untouched as agreed upon at the meeting, West added.

The Farm Bureau state president said Governor Daniel has agreed to re-submit the general fund appropriation at a special session of the Legislature to work out the problem of

maintenance of farm-to-market roads.

"The Governor was very anxious to solve the maintenance problem during his present tenure of office," West said. "Farm Bureau officials also realize the importance of working out this problem at the earliest possible time."

The farm leader said he has invited Governor Daniel to attend the Texas Farm Bureau annual convention Nov. 12-15 in Galveston to explain his proposal by which the second year appropriation would be restored together with provisions for future maintenance of farm-to-market roads.

News From The County Agent

Treat small grain seed for higher yields and greater profits. That's the advice of E. T. Haws, county agent, who reminds farmers that the time for treating is now, even though small grain seed time is still a few weeks away.

By treating now, the farmer can avoid the seasonal rush and be sure the crop is protected against disease, Haws points out.

When treating wheat, oats, barley or rye, be sure to use a mercury treatment. By applying a mercury treatment early, the farmer gains the additional benefits of vapor action. Vapor action assures that all disease organisms on the seed surface and inside cracks and crevices are killed.

As the seed is treated, small amounts of the chemical are deposited on each seed. Within a few hours, organic mercury on the seed vaporizes, and the vapors surround the kernels and penetrates into the cracks. The vapors later condense and become permanently and uni-

formly attached to the seed. They will not dust off or deteriorate while the seed is in storage or in the drill.

Even after the treated seeds are planted, the treatment continues to protect the seed from disease organism in the soil, says Haws.

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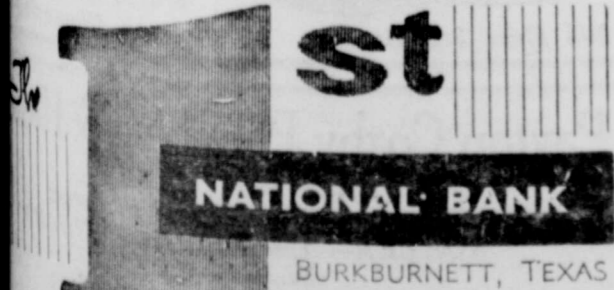

Principal dangers are careless handling of rakes, hoes and careless use of the power lawnmower. Turn hoes, rakes etc. downward when momentarily laid aside and store properly when not in use. Observe these safety rules when operating the power mower:

1. Avoid using an electric mower when the ground is wet. You may cause a short circuit or slip on the damp grass and fall against the blades.

2. Before using, clear lawn of stones, wires and other articles that the mower may catch and throw into the air. If an object discharged by a mower strikes you or a bystander, it may cause serious injury.

3. Be sure that children and pets are a safe distance when you are using the mower.

4. Be sure of your footing and balance when you are operating the mower on an incline. Downhill is especially dangerous.

5. To push the mower over obstructions, tip it by manipulating the handle rather than by reaching under the mower.

6. Stop the engine before removing objects from reel or rotary blades.

7. Disconnect plug wires when you are working on the underside of the mower.

8. Store fuel in a closed metal container and keep it out of the reach of small children.

9. Shut off mower before leaving the mower unattended.

10. Keep flame away from the mower while refueling.

Many Dangers Lurk In Yard

The amateur gardener is exposed to many hazards and must exercise constant care when using yard tools and equipment. Lone Star Gas Company Manager Bill Donnell cautioned today.

Lone Star and Burkburnett are co-sponsors of the 1961 Home Safety Program in Burkburnett.

Almost 12 percent of all home fatalities occur in the yard, according to a survey reported by the Kansas Board of Health and the Nassau County, N. Y. Health Department.

Of the total deaths, 5.6 percent were caused by falls; 1.6 percent by exposure to fire; 1.3 percent by suffocation; and 3.1 percent by miscellaneous causes.

Most of the annual four million deaths and injuries caused by home accidents can be prevented if we observe four rules:

1. Learn to recognize and understand the hazards in the home.

2. Develop a sense of responsibility to safeguarding ourselves and others against possibility of home accidents.

3. Acquire the skills required to perform household tasks safely.
