## Makes Statement In Race



Don Yarborough, candidate for Governor of Texas, was in Burkburnett Wednesday in behalf of his campaign.

Yarborough has clearly made tremendous headway in the last two weeks of the campaign and a growing number of observers feel he now will lead the ticket on May 5.

Referring to his record of support for the Kennedy administration, Yarborough said: "All the others—even including the ex-secretary of the Navy who served under Kennedy—have turned their back on the President in order to seek campaign contributions from the big Eastern monopolies."

Yarborough, running as the people's candidate, has sustained his campaign with small contributions from individual voters across the state.

## TWO GREAT STEPS

President Kennedy's transportation message to Congress is based on the sound premise that the public interest is best served when government policy favors none.

In the President's words, his program "means equality of opportunity for all forms of transportation and their users and undue preference to none. It means a greater reliance on the forces of competition and less reliance on the restraints of regulation. And it means that, to the extent possible, the users of transportation services should bear the full costs of the services they use, whether those services are provided privately or publicly."

One important effect of the program would be to free the railroads from a set of long obsolete regulations which have brought this basic industry into deep and dark financial waters. Specifically, certain railroad traffic—including bulk commodities and passengers—would be relieved of minimum rate regulations. This would allow them a freedom urgently needed to compete for the business with waterway and highway carriers.

Mr. Kennedy also urges repeal of the 10 percent tax on passenger fares—a tax that, ironically, was imposed as a temporary measure during World War II, but has been on the books ever since. A tax of 5 percent on domestic air services would be levied. But this is not a transportation tax. It is a user tax, designed to help pay for the public facilities that the airlines employ in their operations.

This message to Congress came hard on the heels of the report of the distinguished Presidential Commission which spent more than a year on the railroad work rules, or "feather-bedding," problem. That commission recom-

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

A few years ago there was a great deal of publicity about a bi-partisan foreign policy. It would appear that now in the minds of many Congressmen the nation has bi-partisan foreign confusion.

Rep. Richard Roudebush just recently brought to attention one of the most startling statements ever declared from the banks of the Potomac.



The statement quoted by the Congressman was made by one of those ubiquitous personages in Washington who seem to have the knack of turning up into some kind of a prominent job no matter what party is in power. This particular statement was uttered by Chester Bowles, who came into government a few years ago via Madison Avenue.

Mr. Bowles said, "Foreign aid will be with us all our lives and it can be expected that countries with Communist leanings will receive such aid. The U.S. must not adopt a policy of shaking a finger at countries which receive foreign aid but disagree with U.S. policies."

This is an astounding statement. Russian propaganda no doubt by this time has made an even more astounding use of it.

A little over a year ago there was a great debate on whether or not the U.S. is losing the cold war. That question is perhaps still unanswered. But it does not seem that a cold war can be won by huge amounts of hot air.

As Congressman Roudebush states, there is publicity being given that aid may be taken away from Spain, because Spain is ruled by a dictator. This is perhaps true but he is an anti-communist dictator. On the other hand millions are handed out, even including jet warplanes, to another dictator, Tito. The big difference here is that Tito is a Communist dictator.

Sukarno, a South Pacific "Johnny-come-lately" to the ranks of dictators, gets millions in foreign give away hand outs even though he is doing his best to start shooting up America's allies, the Dutch.

Napoleon is reputed to have once said he feared his allies more than his enemies.

It is possible that this today is the world attitude toward the United States.

The Bowles statement only gives voice to the suspicion that the way for any nation to enrich itself at the expense of the American taxpayer is to use a little blackmail. Just step up and say something like "well now, this communism doesn't look too bad to us at this point. However, for a certain number of millions in U.S. dollars, we might consider communism bad; in fact, for a few millions more, we might even consider it evil."

What Bowles and his crowd seem to overlook that there has always been a great question as to the value of allies secured by money, when the chips are down. It can perhaps be a subject of musing to wonder after the surrender at Yorktown what George the Third's feeling were regarding the effectiveness of Hessian mercenaries.

Q. The original owners of our home laid asphalt tile over the wooden floors in the kitchen, and we plan to resurface the floor with rubber tile to conform with a remodeling theme. Is it possible to lay rubber tile right over the asphalt?

A. You can put the new tile directly over the asphalt, but probably would find it a lot simpler if you removed the present floor covering. Since tile adheres by suction rather than cement, uprooting the asphalt is no difficult task.

Clearing the floor to the wood is recommended for these reasons: The added height of the floor often appears awkward where the new tile meets the doorway to another room, and, too, doors which presently swing over



When re-tiling a floor, it may simplify the job to first remove the old floor covering.

the asphalt tile may not move freely with the floor raised.

If neither of these factors enters into the picture, two preparatory steps must be taken before laying the rubber tile over the present floor: (1) Remove all wax from the asphalt tile and (2) "rough up" the asphalt tile with open-face production paper because the adhesive will not adhere to a smooth surface.

Q. Could you tell me when, and how, pin rivets are used as wall fasteners?

A. These hammer-driven fasteners are for use on masonry or concrete walls. Holes to receive pin rivets should be bored with your electric drill the same diameter as the shank of the rivet and about 1/8 deeper. The rivet is pushed through the roughing or work piece into the hole, then expanded and secured in the wall by hitting the rivet head with a hammer. In that the expansion is only slight, nail shields or machine bolt anchors should be used if heavy loads must be supported by the wall fasteners.

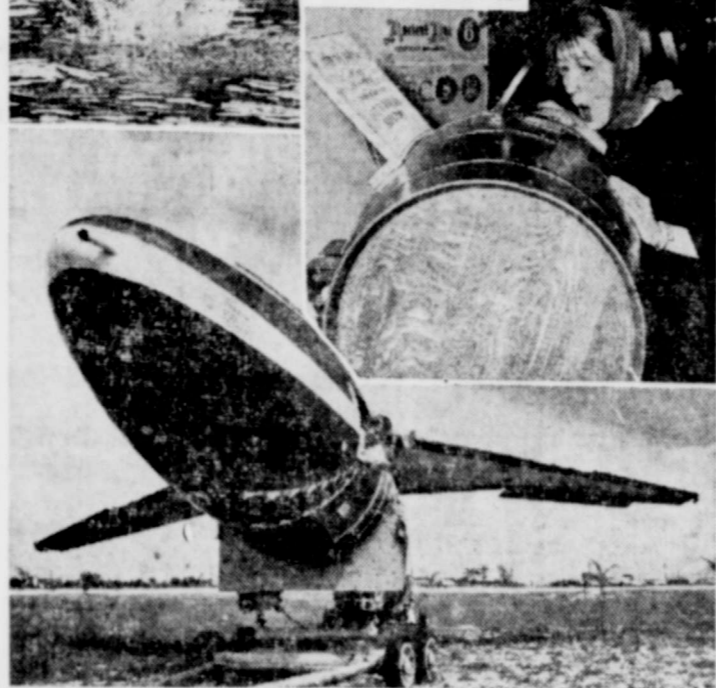

#### without a seller. Even Bankers Are Sometime Duped

I once knew a Massachusetts bank director who founded a successful machinery company which is now listed on the New York Stock Exchange. He was a very generous man and provided a four-acre Golf Club in New Hampshire for his friends and summer residents. Many fine homes were built there and are now occupied in the summer by very prominent people. In Boston financial circles this man's opinion on investments was given serious consideration.

When this well-known man died, he left two sealed trunks in his attic. One contained Russian rubles and the other German marks. He left a note stating that he had paid nearly \$2,000,000 for this foreign money. As he had always been very kind to his neighbors they took up a collection to pay his debts; his young wife (a second wife) went to work.

**How to Lose \$45,000,000**  
A man known world wide in utility circles had a winter home at Mountain Lake, Florida near where I am writing my column this week. He had a

chair and desk which the present owners of his late home gave to Webber College. This famous man was written up in the magazines during the 1920's as "America's Richest Man." Well, he told me shortly before he died: "I made \$50,000,000 sitting in that chair in 1926-28; then I lost \$45,000,000 in 1929-30, sitting in the same chair." He did his business by telephone; never wrote a letter.

I give the above illustrations not to criticize anyone. During my fifty years of active life I have never met any man (or woman, except Hetty Green) who would claim never to have lost money speculating. The lesson, however, which I want to drive home to readers is the **importance of knowing when to stop.** The time to retire from the stock market is when things look good and your friends are all bullish, and you are "walking on air." That is the time to stop. What this stock market will do before 1962 is over no one knows; but I do earnestly advise that you sell enough and take profits enough to pay up all you owe.

#### Corporation Officials Take Notice

This is an era when corporations are making foolish "splits." After you receive a stock dividend your original stock, plus the new stock, is worth no more than before. Yet the price goes up even on the rumor that such a stock dividend will be paid. Since the Securities & Exchange Commission has been organized, many men with money have refused to be directors of corporations. The officers are given "options" and other incentives to compensate for the risks they are taking.

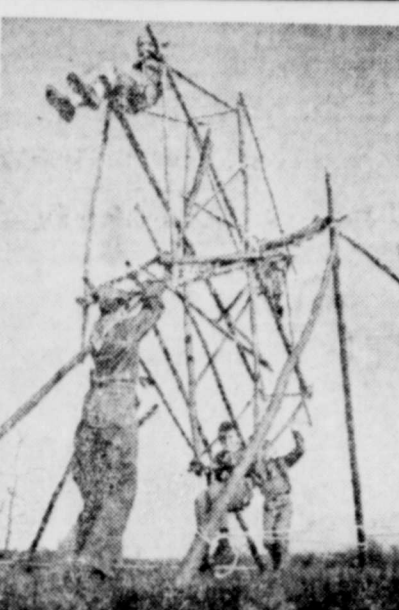
Surely nothing could have prevented the two men described above from losing their money. Furthermore, I could give many other similar illustrations. These men had economic education, robust health, honest intentions, and were as good men as any reader of this column.

#### Securities & Exchange Regulations

I fully approve all the steps being taken to make stocks and bonds safer for investors to buy. I advise my clients to cooperate with the SEC. But no laws can eliminate speculation.

I believe in the Regulation Statements which the SEC requires to be prepared, printed, and distributed to prospective stock buyers; but there is no way of compelling these prospects to read them. Moreover, they are quite a burden to young and growing companies, as the cost of lawyers and accountants fees, plus printing, amounts to from \$25,000 to \$50,000. It is even more important that small investors read the annual reports and proxy statements which every stockholder receives free—once a year.

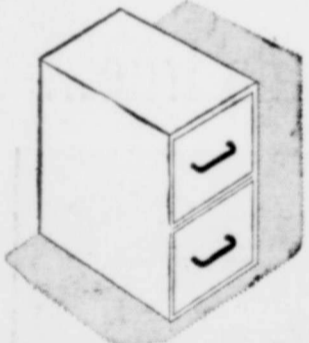

A reader who is building an office within his workshop to serve as farm "headquarters" has requested plans for a two-drawer file cabinet.

The plans for just such a cabinet are included in the Research Center's model office arrangement, which also includes a desk, typing table and small book case.

The file cabinet is 15 inches wide, 28 inches long and 30 inches deep, utilizing common 1x2's in the framework and 3/4-inch plywood in outer construction. The entire assembly can be completed over a weekend with the aid of such standby portable tools as

the electric saw, drill and sander. (Free illustrated instructions for this cabinet may be obtained by writing to the Thor Research Center, 175 N. State St., Aurora, Ill., and asking for Plan FC202.)

From the mailbox:  
Q. Should I use sandpaper or steel wool to smooth woodwork and doors when preparing them for water-look?

A. Do not use steel wool too freely, because it invariably leaves steel particles on the surface and thus tends to harm a good finishing job no matter how carefully the wood is cleaned after using the abrasive.

You will be playing it safe by successively using coarse, medium and fine abrasives—advancing no more than two grit sizes (from 40 to 60, for instance) when going from coarse to medium. Complete the sanding with about 120 grit.

The only time most advanced handymen use steel wool is when they're finishing curved or unusually shaped areas.

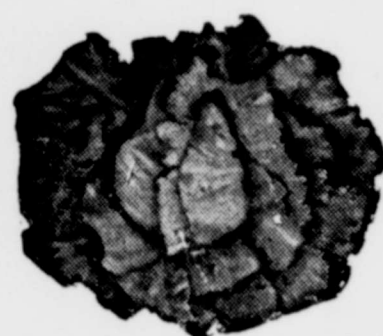

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## GARDENING DR BEAUTY AND PLEASURE

**MRS. ROY MAGERS**  
A series of articles on "Gardening for Beauty and Pleasure" by Mrs. Roy Magers, will be featured in the Burkburnett Star. Mrs. Magers, whose home address is on Shantel Road, is chairman for the Shantel Garden Club. Mrs. Magers is one of three credited flower show judges in Burkburnett. She has been active in Burkburnett and Shantel Falls in various club activities for several years. She has devoted a considerable amount of time and effort to Burkburnett Garden clubs. Her articles "Gardening for Beauty and Pleasure" are of an informative nature, backed by experience and knowledge of the work.

The height of bloom comes in our spring gardens. Adequate moisture is the essential item in every garden this month and with meager supplies of winter moisture many

garden plants may be suffering. Follow a rigid program of water management through soaking at regular intervals.

After the blooms fade on daffodils, tulips, crocus and the like, groom the foliage, feed and provide water. As long as the foliage is green it is manufacturing food and sending it back to the bulb for another year's growth. The foliage should be removed only after it has yellowed and withered away.

May is the last call for pruning spring flowering shrubs. Buds for another year will soon begin to form. Lilacs need special methods. Be careful to remove only the old bloom stalk which is relatively soft wood. Next year's flowers will come from the first two buds directly below this structure.

Peonies usually need some type of support to keep them from falling over and have their blooms spoiled. Keep peony plants free of aphids as the buds develop. Aphids can cause the bulbs to blast and fall off quickly. Malathion is a good control for these. Many virus plant diseases are carried and spread by aphids.

Order for new irises should be placed now for planting in July.

The later part of May is usually the time for the second application of fertilizer to the lawn. Approximately 4 pounds of a high nitrogen fertilizer per one hundred square feet should be sufficient. This should be watered in to prevent burning. Establish a regular schedule of mowing and watering.

Divide and replant violets, shasta daisies, chrysanthemums and other herbaceous perennials.

Annuals for summer bloom should be in the ground this month. Where the bulbs have been, overplant with quick growing annuals—zinnias, marigolds, nasturtiums.

Better start hardening the plants you have started indoors, in the hot bed or greenhouse. Set them in where they will get full sun and a little wind. Make the period short the first day and gradually increase the length of exposure.

Shade the newly transplanted plant for the first few days. Place a shingle or piece of cardboard on the southwest side of the plant to shade it during the hottest part of the day. Some gardeners cut the bottoms out of No. two and one-half size cans and set them over the plant, others use half of a milk carton. Also give the plant am-

ple water. Roots of the plant need to have the soil firmed about them. Water them well. Try to visualize the effect you want and plant accordingly. Use masses rather than mixture of color for maximum effect.

Petunias—really the queen of the spring garden—offer many varieties. "Paleface" still remains far ahead for white mass. For red, try "Red Satin." "Tango" and "Fire Dance" are a little more unusual but not quite

as hardy. Space petunias on 16-inch centers and they will fill in. Pinch back late in July for a complete new fall bloom. If these new hybrids set seed, they will not come true for seed the second year.

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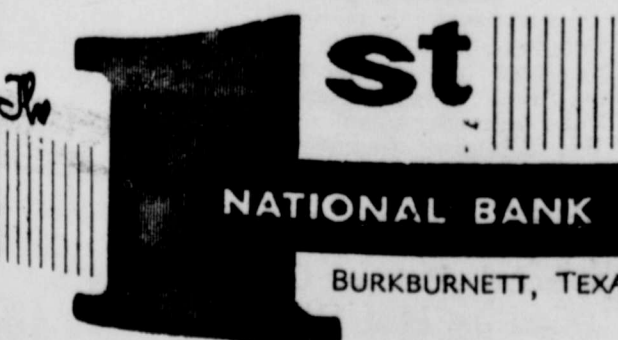
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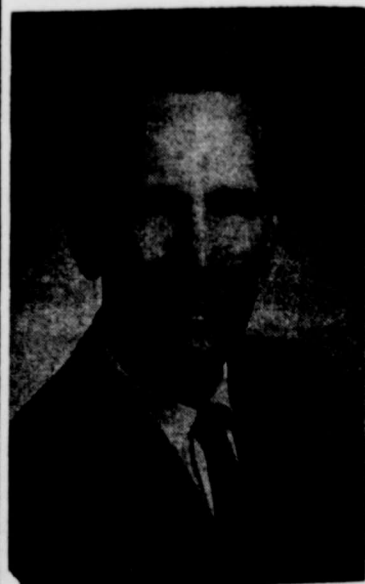
