## Control Of The Purse Strings

The proposed law which would give the President the authority to raise or lower the basic income tax rate, on his decision alone, is destined to encounter mighty tough sledding in Congress. And it should.

The arguments against this idea have nothing whatever to do with the name or party or programs of the man who happens to hold the office at any given time. Presidential power is enormous. It has been vastly extended in recent times, primarily because of war and threat of war. But there is one curb on this power which stands solidly in the way of possible excesses. It lies in Congress' control of the purse strings, which is, beyond doubt, one of the most important of Congress' Constitutional rights, duties and obligations.

It is argued, in favor of the proposal, that it would make possible immediate action (so would a dictatorship) when a change in tax rates was considered advisable in order to meet a condition of inflation or deflation. But speed is not always virtue, and often it is a vice. No individual is the possessor of all wisdom. If a President—any President, of any party, and with any philosophy—considers an increase or decrease in the income tax desirable, let him go to Congress with his plan. There its merits and demerits can be thrashed out, and a decision reached—not by one man but by hundreds. The time spent will be spent well and soundly—and a fundamental provision of the Constitution will be preserved.

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

One of the selling points being used to seek complete destruction of the U.S. protective tariff laws is to reduce the U.S. loss of gold.

The seriousness of this problem was recently pointed up by Congressman Clarence Brown who reports the U.S. has only \$16.8 billion in gold left, of which \$11.5 billion is required to support U.S. currency, leaving only \$5.3 billion to meet foreign obligations.

Emphasizing that he was appearing as a professional economist of many years' standing and not on behalf of Dow, Dr. Lloyd said that the U.S. tariff cutting policies have already created unemployment, further cutting will spread it.

He pointed out that in 1900 foreign commerce made up 12% of the U.S. national product, 75 years later it was down to 6%, is now down to 3%. But it was perhaps most interesting when Dr. Lloyd challenged the theory that if the U.S. could sell more abroad, and this is a big thing in his mind, this would result in saving gold.

In the temperate, academic language of a scholar, he said in effect, the chicken hatched for many years by the internationalists, the do-gooders and all the rest of the starry-eyed ilk that dissipated American wealth in foreign give away schemes has made achieving a balance of trade impossible.

He said "A primary factor in our negative balance of trade payments in recent years has been our foreign aid. The data on our foreign obligations indicates that we cannot and have not been able to finance this level of charity."

He points out in the early days of the foreign give away programs, the dollars had to be spent in the U.S. but in recent years this has been changed so that the U.S. gives the dollars to foreigners so they can buy what they need from the cheapest source. He reports by 1959 only 30% of the U.S. give away dollars were coming back to the U.S. to purchase goods. The rest went to cheap labor nations.

He says "If we are going to continue this massive international dole the least we could do is require that all purchases of goods and equipment be made in the U.S. so that it will support jobs in this country and not add to the problem we now face in our balance-of-payments deficit."

Thus, it appears there are two delusions in this talk of cutting tariffs so U.S. can sell more abroad. One is how a 50 cent an hour foreign worker can afford goods made by \$3 per hour American labor? The other is, how do you get people to start paying for things they have been getting for nothing?

## Time To Wave The Flag

Seldom in our history has our national resolution been so sorely tried as it is today. From every side the United States has been beset with the problems and crises and emergencies—which must be met with fortitude in the best American tradition and with no distraction from our purpose.

The cold War is a "different" kind of war because victory seems so hard to achieve and even the word victory in this kind of war is subject to so many different definitions. We are involved in a battle against the ideology which would enslave free men. Our weapons are political and social and economic rather than military.

If we are to win the Cold War, we must have faith in our cause, which we know to be right. And we must have confidence in ourselves and our nation.

Flag-waving may be old fashioned, and maybe even corny to some, but perhaps we need more of it in these perilous times. Call it "propaganda warfare" if you want to be modern, American business can well employ its communications techniques to tell the story of America. The Linen Supply Association of America, representing one of the nation's most extensive service industries, provides an outstanding example in its support of the "Have Confidence in a Growing America" program.

Throughout the month of May, the Association's thousands of delivery trucks, which you have doubtless seen delivering clean rental linens and garments to hotels, restaurants, merchants, professional men and others, will put the campaign on wheels. Millions of Americans will be seeing these posters—and we hope, thinking about their message. They should remind us that this nation, this America, is ALL of us—for that's the kind of a country we have. If we have confidence in ourselves, we have confidence in our nation. If we have confidence, we have growth.

The answer to cold war problems, economic pressures, political differences is on the poster for all to see: "You Bet We Have Confidence in a Growing America."

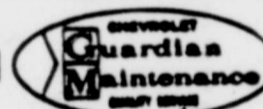

The theme, "Power for Peace" will be stressed again in the many exhibits and demonstrations slated for the 13th annual observance of Armed Forces Day.

The "open house" at Sheppard to which the public is invited will be from 1 to 4 p.m. and the parade in Wichita Falls will begin that morning at 9:30.

Many aircraft, representing the might of the "aerospace force" may be

seen from the skies as flyovers are scheduled throughout the day.

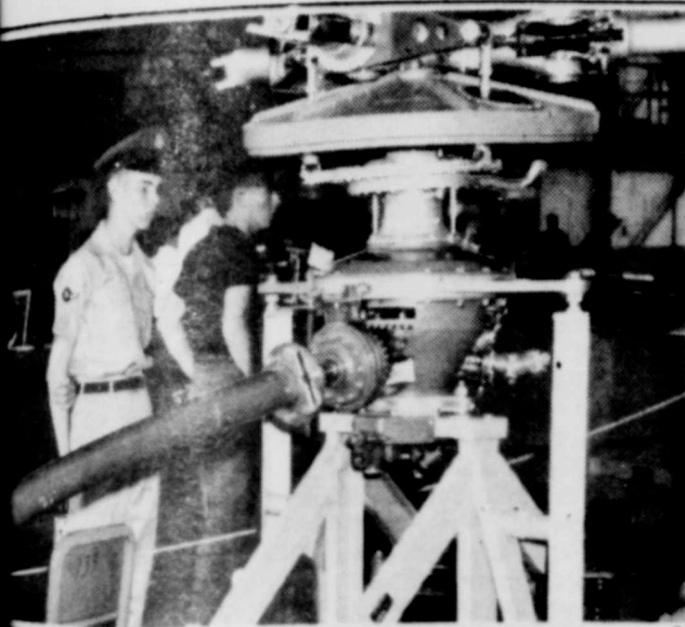
The displays at the "open house" will represent in addition to the weapons, the training conducted for the students. All seven training departments of 3750th Technical School -- Aircraft Maintenance, Comptroller, Communications, Intelligence, Missiles, Transportation and Utilities--will show some of the training they conduct or the training equipment they use.

In this way, the public may see how the men are prepared within the School, to man the powerful weapons and complicated machines used by today's Air Force.

The aircraft alone which will be displayed by the School are KC-97, C-124, C-54, C-123, C-119, C-130, C-45, H-19, H-21, H-43, F-102, F-84, B-66, T-28 and T-33.

The missiles to be displayed are the Thor, and intermediate range ballistic missile; and the Atlas, and Titan, intercontinental ballistic missiles.

The 4245th Strategic Wing will display the B-52 Stratofortress as well as other available Strategic Air Command aircraft.

## Technical Training Is Base's Keynoted

Major General Thomas E. Moore has been commander of Sheppard Technical Training Center since August 1, 1959.

He came to Sheppard from Randolph AFB where he had served as chief of staff at Air Training Command for two years.

A native of Collettsville, N. C., General Moore attended basic pilot training at Randolph Field and pursuit training at Kelly Field, Texas. His first foreign service tour was with the Caribbean Air Command from 1939 to 1942 where he performed pilot duties both in Panama and Puerto Rico.

In 1944 he was in the Southwest Pacific and later served in China, Central Burma and the Eastern Mandates. A B-29 pilot, he flew seven missions over Japan during World War II.

From September 1947 to August 1950, General Moore served as deputy commander of Keesler

AFB, Miss., and commander, 3380th Technical Training Group.

He went to ATC Headquarters from Third Air Force in England in May 1955 and served as deputy chief of staff for plans and operations there for 25 months. He was appointed Chief of Staff there in June 1957.

A command pilot, General Moore has more than 5,000 flying hours in jet and conventional type aircraft. His decorations include the Air Medal, Bronze Star and Legion of Merit with an oak leaf cluster.

## Maj. Gen. Moore Commands Sheppard

Sheppard Air Force Base, home of the 3750th Technical Training School is one of six technical training centers and 20 bases in Air Training Command. In addition to its mission in technical training, Sheppard also provides support for the 4245th Strategic Wing of the Strategic Air Command.

The Technical School at Sheppard includes seven departments of training. They are Aircraft Mechanics, Communications, Comptroller, Intelligence, Missiles, Transportation and Utilities Departments.

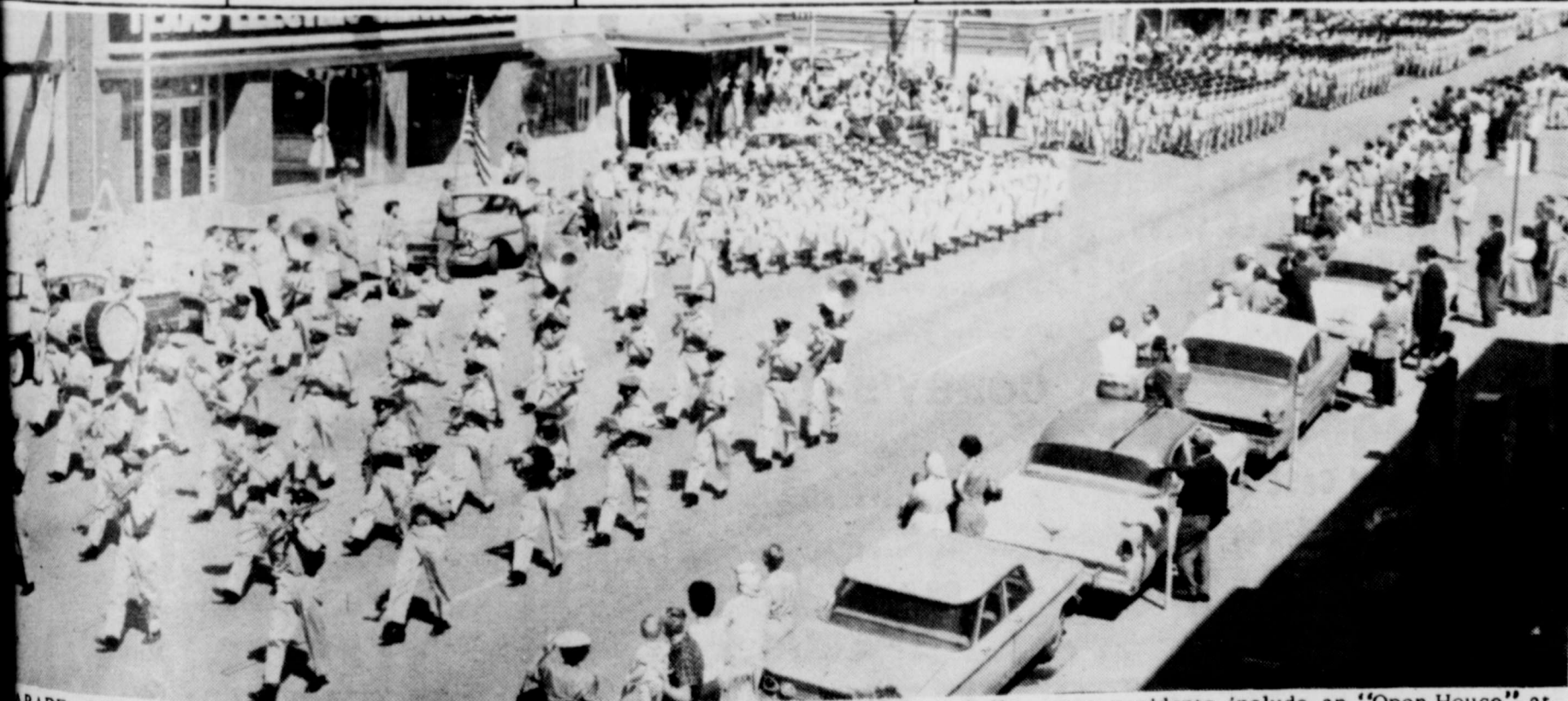
The School is the prime training center for four missiles, Atlas and Titan, intercontinental ballistic missiles, Thor and Jupiter, intermediate range ballistic missiles.

# Prepare The Man Symbolizes ATC

"Prepare the Man," Air Training Command's official slogan, aptly describes the mission of the Air Training Command, one of the major Air Commands of the United States Air Force.

Because the command's mission is to "Prepare the Man" for duties in today's United

States Air Force, Aerospace Power for Peace.

Sheppard AFB is one of six Technical Training bases in the command and one of 21 bases. Other Technical Training Centers are at Amarillo AFB, Tex., Chanute AFB, Ill., Keesler AFB, Miss.; Lowry AFB, Colo., and Greenville AFB, Miss.

Navigator training is conducted at Harlingen AFB, Texas, James Connally AFB, Texas, and Mather AFB, Calif.; and flying training at Craig AFB, Ala.; Moody AFB, Ga.; Stead AFB, Nev.; Vance AFB, Okla.; Williams AFB, Ariz., Laredo AFB, Perrin AFB, Randolph AFB, Reese

AFB, and Webb AFB, Texas.

Military training is the mission of Lackland AFB, Texas. ATC is also responsible for recruiting for the Air Force through its recruiting service based at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio.

These bases prepare the men and women who make up the United States Air Force for their individual jobs, as well as conduct flying and technical training courses for foreign students representing 45 allied countries.

Air Training Command to which some 170,000 persons are assigned, produces the one indispensable product without which no other command in the United States could operate--skilled, trained professional people who operate and maintain the planes, missiles and communications systems that make up the deterrent strength of the modern world's greatest power for peace.

Bombers, fighters, interceptors and missiles are all manned by ATC graduates. Support people--clerks, control tower operators, photographers, radio and radar technicians--even sentry dogs are all trained by ATC.

Four bases within the command comprise about 180 field and mobile training detachments at bases within the United States and abroad. Field training, a technical school in miniature, conducts advanced instruction for students who have completed the technical courses and are assigned to operational units.

The command teaches more than 1,200 technical courses, training radio and radar technicians, control tower operators,

jet mechanics, administrative personnel, missile technicians, photographers and specialists in hundreds of other fields. If one person were to attend each course offered by ATC, it would take him approximately 360,000 hours or 244 years.

## Briggs Leads ATC

Lt. Gen. James Briggs, a 1924 graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point, assumed command of Air Training Command August 1, 1959, coming from the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado where he had been superintendent three years.

The general has been a pilot for 30 of his years as an officer and is rated a command pilot qualified in both conventional and jet type aircraft. In addition to the Distinguished Service Medal, his decorations include the Legion of Merit with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal.

General Briggs' military career has been highlighted by such assignments as being a member of the Central Intelligence Group, commander of the Far East Air Forces Bomber Command, assistant deputy chief of staff for Operations, Headquarters, United States Air Force, and member of the faculty at West Point in the department of mathematics. While serving as assistant deputy chief of staff for operations he was given the additional duty of United States Air Force member of the Permanent Joint Board on Defense Canada-United States was project officer for Distant Early Warning Line in Canada and USAF based project.

# 25,612 Graduated

The seven departments of the 3750th Technical School at Sheppard Air Force Base graduated 25,039 students during 1961. This was an increase of 5,656 graduates over the number in 1960 and some 2,000 more than was estimated for completion at the first of the year.

The department of aircraft maintenance training led the schools with 7,675 graduates followed by the department of missile training with 5,884. Three departments--communications, utilities and comptroller--each had more than 3,000

While the department of transportation training had 55 graduates and the department of intelligence training, 428. In addition to the departments, the instructor training branch graduated 563 instructors making the total graduates at the base 25,612. As 1961 ended, there were 140 courses in session throughout the school and these were taught by 151 instructors in 650 classrooms.

The peak student load during the year in the technical school was November when 7,517 students were enrolled at one time.

The programmed peak for 1962 is 10,000 in April.

While the department of missile training has had an important buildup during this year, the department of aircraft maintenance has had the greatest buildup of students during the year. The over-all increase in the department is to be about 1,500. Most of this increase is due to the activation of Air National Guard and Reservists.

The department of utilities training, too, has shown a steady increase during the year; it now has some 500 more students than it did this time last year.

To care for the additional students many of the classes have been enlarged while some courses have been extended to the third shift. Of course, a number of courses were taught on three shifts previously.

Since all Air Force training for maintenance technicians on conventional reciprocating engine aircraft is conducted at Sheppard AFB, the responsibility for training on aircraft propellers for all Air Force aircraft was transferred to Sheppard in July 1961. This includes training on propellers for both reciprocating engines and turbo-prop engines.

In addition to the resident courses at Sheppard, the base's field and mobile training detachments conducted schools world-wide at various locations.

## Mission Changes

Several changes occurred in the mission of 3750th Technical School at Sheppard in 1961.

Missile courses were added to take care of the increased training loads and needs because of the activation of operational sites.

Air Force Flight Engineers training was transferred here in May 1961, with the first resident courses planned for January 1962.

Sheppard also assumed prime responsibility for support of the training on the "Blue Scout", space vehicle; training program development on the WS-621A, the anti-satellite inspection system to be launched by an intercontinental ballistic missile, and WS-624A, large space vehicle alunch booster program capable of launching manned space craft.

Training programs were developed on the C-140, economy size jet transport aircraft; and the C-141 jet transport aircraft.

**TECHNICAL SCHOOL COMMANDER**--Col. Frank W. Madsen Jr., has served as commander of the 3750th Technical School at Sheppard Air Force Base since July 1, 1960. He came to Sheppard from the Pentagon where he served as Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations in Headquarters, United States Air Force, Washington, D.C. A native of Harvey, Ill., he served overseas with the 20th and 13th Air Forces from 1945 to 1948. A veteran of 20 years military service, Colonel Madsen is a graduate of the Air Command and Staff School at the Air University.

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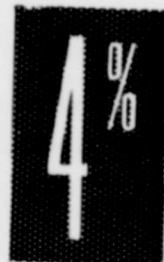

## Intelligence Field Features 3 Careers

The Department of Intelligence Training at Sheppard is responsible for providing air intelligence, photo intelligence, and radar intelligence training for officers and airmen of the Air Force, the Air Force Reserve, the National Guard, other Department of Defense personnel and foreign nationals.

This is the only intelligence training department in the Air Force; however a strategic intelligence course for officers is conducted in Washington, D. C.

While the department had only nine courses active at the end of 1961, plans were underway to implement 15 additional Special Training Courses and two resident courses by July 1962.

The peak student load in 1961 was in October when 130 students were enrolled. Four hundred twenty-eight students were graduated from the department in 1961 from courses varying in length from one week to 19 weeks.

Two of the courses are specifically designed for training foreign national students; they are intelligence officer and intelligence photo-radar (Mutual Assistance Program.)

The training equipment varies from the stereoscope, the primary instrument used by the photo interpreter, to radar ultrasonic trainer used in simulated radar bombing missions. The estimated value of the training equipment is \$300,000.

The department has 28,000 square feet of floor space and a total of 16 classrooms for instructional purposes.

A vital part of the department is the Library which supports the mis-

sion by controlling and accounting for intelligence training materials, assuring library service for faculty and students, operating a model intelligence library for students to observe, providing instruction in library procedures, among other duties. Approximately 250,000 documents are presently controlled by the library with an estimated 1,000 items received monthly.

Another important part of the Department is its Recognition Materials Branch which develops, evaluates, and produces aircraft recognition materials for training purposes with the Air Force.

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# TRANSPORTATION BY AIR FORCE S TAUGHT IN SAFB CLASSES

The Department of Transportation Training at Sheppard is the center of transportation training for the world-wide United States Air Force and presently provides this training with seven resident courses of instruction. The officer courses are advanced transportation management, air and surface transportation management, and a reserve refresher course. Airmen courses train air passenger and air freight specialists and aircraft loadmasters.

While the department is capable of providing instruction to various degrees, covering all five modes of transportation, the classes actually conducted are governed by the requirements of a major Air Force command in the Zone of Interior and overseas.

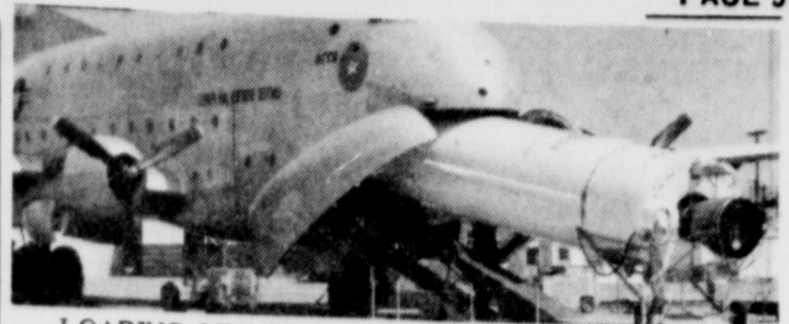
There were 755 students who graduated from the department in 1961 and 83 were enrolled at the end of the year.

The average course length in the department is 10 weeks; the minimum being

two and the maximum 24 weeks.

Four new officer courses are being developed to begin sometime in the summer. The anticipated peak load is to be 209 students in May of this year.

The Advanced Transportation Officer course which is evaluated as a nine semester hour college course, is 24 weeks in length and the students normally range in rank from captain through lieutenant colonel.

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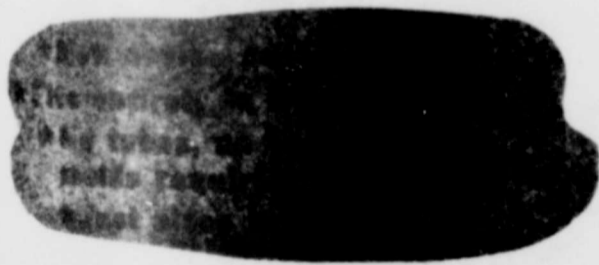
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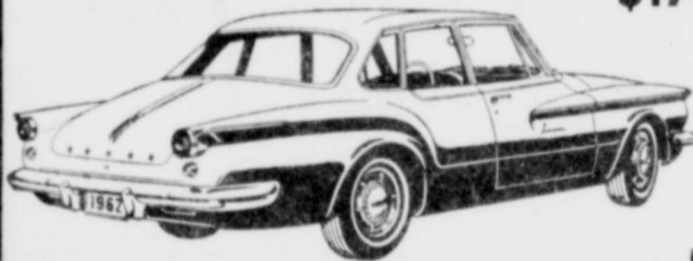
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# Technical Training Center Deputy Commander Is Col. Bailey

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# Mechanics Learn

The Department of Aircraft Maintenance Training's scope of responsibility in the Sheppard Technical Training Center is the training of aircraft and engine mechanics and related specialties. This is accomplished through apprentice, advanced, supplemental and special training courses. The apprentice courses are developed to train the non-mechanic, new enlistee, in the basic techniques of the mechanic's job for aircraft, engines, propellers, and in-flight refueling equipment.

The advanced courses address the advanced techniques and develops the student's knowledge in

management and supervision. Supplemental courses train the established mechanic in new techniques.

## SHEPPARD PREPARES WRITTEN MATERIALS

The Technical Writing Branch of 3750th Technical School prepares training publications to support the field training of Air Force personnel in 12 career fields. The Sheppard branch is one of seven like units in the Training Command. To accomplish its mission, the branch plans, writes and revises On-the-Job Training Package programs, USAF Extension courses and Air Force Training manuals. These publications are distributed to Air Force units and provide a mass source of training for thousands of field personnel.

By 1961 this mission generated a cumulative workload of 278 volumes of training material. This included 145 OJT packages, 7 Extension Course volumes, and six Air Force manuals. These training publications are book length manuals averaging over 100 pages. Many of them parallel resident school courses but are slanted to support a particular training situation in the field. Publications are revised periodically to keep abreast of technical or operational changes.

In 1961 the Branch was staffed with six supervisors, 20 artists and typists, and 52 writers. This staff produced 76 new revised volumes during the year. Each volume was researched, written, typed and illustrated in the Branch. Many required weeks of study in resident or factory

schools and visits to operational sites by the assigned writers.

**AIRCRAFT MAINTENANCE DIRECTOR**--Lt. Col. Jay S. Lee director of the Department of Aircraft Maintenance Training, came to Sheppard in June 1959 from Chanute AFB, Ill, where he served as commander of the 3498th Support Group of the 3499th Field Training Wing. A veteran of almost 22 years of military service, Colonel Lee has served overseas three times, once in Trinidad, British West Indies from 1951 to 1943 and in India - China - Burma from 1944 to 1945 and in Alaska from 1954 to 1956.

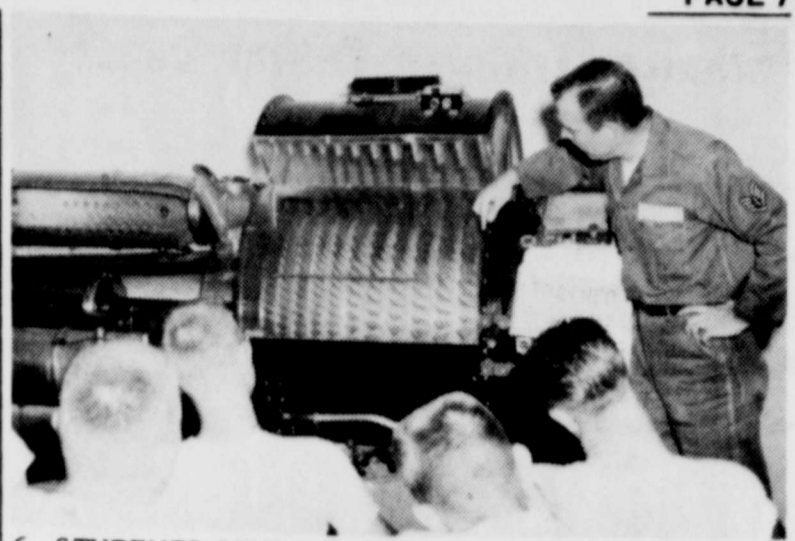
In 1961, this department graduated 7,675 students which was by far the greatest number graduated by any one department of the school. At the end of the year there were 2,190 students enrolled in the courses of the department.

The 24 different courses varied in length from 1 to 18 weeks with the average length being 15 weeks.

The normal in-training load for these courses was about 2,000 student, but on the ninth of August and eleventh of October, the peak of 2261 students was reached. The department normally has in training about 30 per cent of the students in the Technical School.

The department uses some \$45,000,000 worth of training equipment. This includes aircraft and engines, trainers depicting various aircraft and engine systems; supporting maintenance tools, plumbing and hardware; and technical publications and maintenance forms. The trainers vary in size from a very small socket to the barnlike C-124 aircraft.

The department's courses are taught in 193 classrooms; some are conventional and others are test cells. It also uses the floor space in four hangars and one-half mile of ramp surface.

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# 4245th Stays Alert

The 4245th Strategic Wing at Sheppard continues its training to be prepared as part of the Strategic Air Command's deterrent force. The squadron of B-52 Stratofortresses which arrived at the base in Jan-

uary 1960 will be joined this year in October by a squadron of KC-135 tankers.

In 1961 the wing's combat crews flew almost 900 "sortie" and slightly more than 9,500 accident-free flying hours, maintaining their proficiency as combat-ready crews. In fulfilling this flying commitment, over 33 million gallons of jet fuel were used, approximately 8 million gallons of which were provided to the B-52 bomber in in-flight refueling operations.

A new concept in bombing was initiated this past year. Using a combination of radio and radar contact between aircraft and radar bomb scoring sites, the 4245th can now actually score the bombing effectiveness of each of its combat crews without a single bomb's being dropped. The equipment for scoring is stored aboard railroad cars located at pre-selected sidings and within trailer-vans.

The advantages of having the bomb scoring units on rails offers the opportunity for faster mobility, a variety of terrain and wider range of unfamiliar targets and unfamiliar rou-

tes. The new system replacing the simulated bombing of fixed targets permits crews of the 4245th to receive realistic training in the use of radar bombing against industrial targets.

propeller type aircraft, helicopters, B-57, and F-66 jets and for intelligence data handling. Sheppard also trains personnel in such career areas as aircraft engine mechanics, hydraulic and electronics specialists, he-

licopter mechanics, intelligence and photo interpretation, transportation comptroller, equipment cooling, power production, utilities, wire maintenance ballistic missile systems and communications operations.

Since 1956, Sheppard has also conducted Phase II Basic Military Training and in 1959 the base assumed a world-wide training responsibility when it gained a part of the Field and Mobile Training Detachments.

## COMMUNICATIONS DEPARTMENT TEACHES FIXED WIRE COURSES

The Department of Communications Training at Sheppard conducts the only training in fixed wire communications for the Air Force.

The two branches, telephone and teletype, conducts the training in telephone and teletype communications operation and maintenance.

The outside plant of the Telephone Branch teaches the airmen in the installation and maintenance of aerial, underground and coaxial cable lines, fixed radio antennas, field wire communications systems and key telephone systems.

The inside plant of the Telephone Branch trains airmen in the installation and maintenance of manual central office equipment and five types of automatic or dial central office exchanges.

The maintenance courses of the Teletype Branch trains men in the installation and maintenance of teletypewriters, teleautograph, transmitters, cryptographic equipment and automatic message switching equipment used in the Air Force world wide communications network system.

In the operators courses, the airmen learn to operate all models of tele-

typewriter machines and automatic message switching center equipment.

In 1961, 3,629 students were graduated from the Department. At the close of the year there were 1,218 students enrolled in the department's 17 courses.

The length of the courses vary from three to 37 weeks with the average

length being 13 weeks. Training equipment in use now has an estimated value of \$394,000. This equipment is actual operational communications equipment. The smallest trainer is a vacuum tube rectifier. The largest is a Plan 55 switching center, which is a fully automatic switching system for teletype messages.

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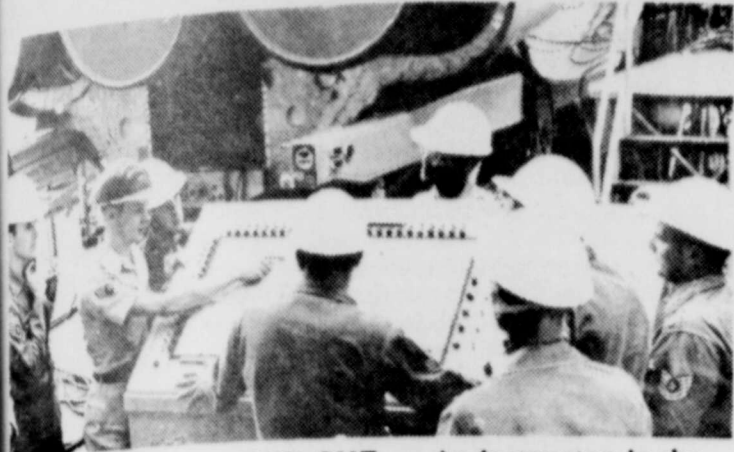

## Special Training Offered In Missiles

In addition to the resident courses conducted at Sheppard, the Department of Missile Training is responsible for field training and some special training programs.

In 1961 the Field Training Branch of the Missile Department had five Field Training Detachments under their supervision. Two were located in the United Kingdom instructing Royal Air Force personnel on the operation of the Thor Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile.

These two detachments completed their training mission in June, 1961, and the personnel returned to Sheppard.

Another detachment is located in Italy instructing Italian Air Force personnel on the Jupiter. Detachment II completed their training at Redstone Arsenal, Ala. and deployed to Turkey to instruct Turkish Air Force personnel on the Jupiter missile. Detachment 15, located at Vandenberg AFB, Calif. provides training to requesting agencies on various missiles and space systems, and also performs evaluation of individual training on ballistic missiles.

In addition to the standard courses, many peculiar training programs were established in the department to disseminate information early enough to

meet the timewise requirements generated by the concurrency development concept for ballistic missiles. These programs include training by traveling teams dispatched to the sites to give acceptance engineers information on equipment installed by the contractors.

**MISSILE DIRECTOR**-- Lt. Col. Abram B. Sheaffer, who came to Sheppard AFB in July 1957, has been with the Department of Missile Training since its organization serving as its director. During his 19 years of military service, he has been overseas four years, serving in the South and the Southwest Pacific area during World War II and in Okinawa from 1954 to 1956. He came to Sheppard AFB from Maxwell AFB, Alabama.

# Missiles Youngest Of Tech Schools

The Department of Missile Training is the youngest of the seven departments that make up the 3750th Technical School at Sheppard.

The department, established January 9, 1957, was given priority in its program after the launching of Sputnik I October 4, 1957. Since that time the department has grown into one of the largest training units on the base.

The department is responsible for developing the personnel subsystems to support the Atlas, Titan, Thor and Jupiter missiles and the Atlas Agena, Saint, Blue Scout and Space Booster Building Block Space Vehicles.

Of these systems the Department has 119 courses on standby, active or programmed status of which 45 are being conducted at present on the base. Many other courses and training programs which are conducted by industrial contractors from coast to coast and Field Training Detachments at Vandenberg AFB and North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries are monitored by the department.

Most of the 1,082 military and civilian personnel permanently assigned to the Department of Missile Training work in the 17-acre Kearby Hall complex. The department has 190 classrooms, most of which are 30' x 30' and environmentally controlled. In addition to the classrooms approximately 100,792 square feet of special laboratory and missile bay area is used to house the trainers that are too large for the classrooms.

Student participation in operational type equipment is the fastest and most efficient method of training mechanical skills and knowledges. To provide this type training the Department maintains approximately \$85,000,000 worth of training equipment. This equipment ranges in size and complexity from a single resistor board to the Atlas Launch Complex Systems and Facilities Training. With the exception of the propellant transfer system, the latter trainer

is a complete operational complex for the Atlas Inter-continental Ballistic Missile.

In 1961, 5,884 students graduated from courses which average 15 weeks in length. These courses cover every subsystem of the missile and support equipment except for the war head and generation of liquid oxygen. There was an average of 1,534 students in training during the year with a peak load of 2,057 students the first week of October.

tension course. Air Reserve Center specialized training courses, packaged On-the-Job training materials and advisory services.

The 4245th Strategic Wing was activated at Sheppard in January 1959 and the first permanently assigned B-52 Stratofortress arrived in January 1960. In addition to the B-52 squadron, a KC-135 squadron is scheduled to arrive at Sheppard in October of this year.

Existence of the Wing stemmed from the Strategic Air Command B-52 "Dispersal Concept" which is designed to strengthen SAC's deterrent power and to weaken the enemy's strike potential.

Among the other tenant units at Sheppard are the detachments of the Air Force Communications Service and Military Air Transport Service.

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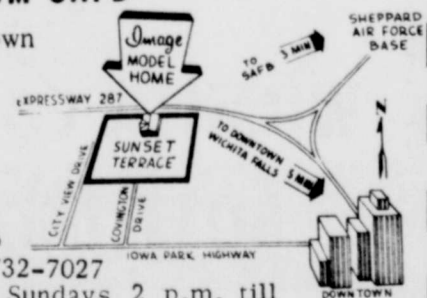
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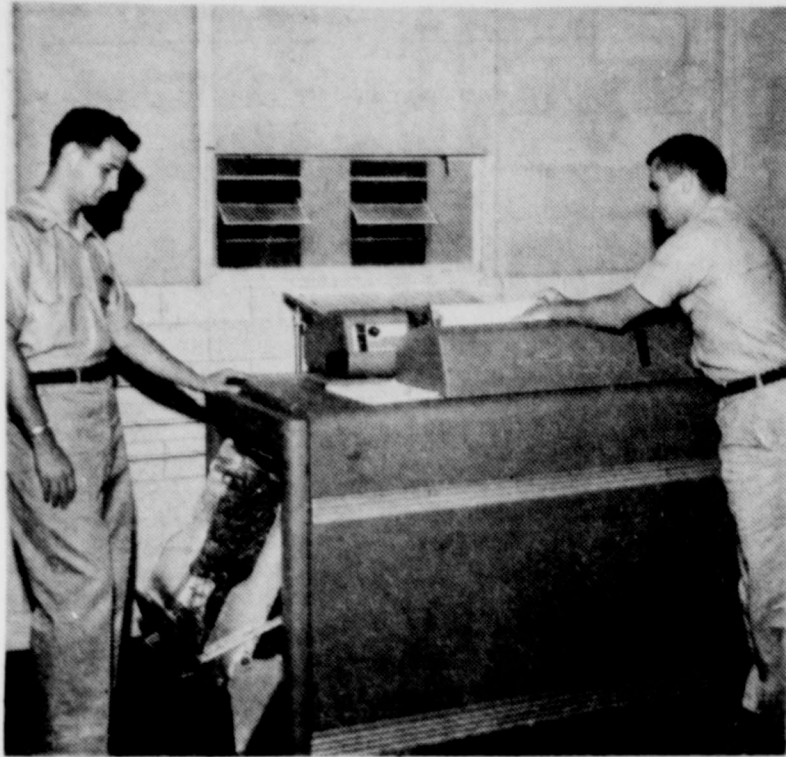

## Comptroller Courses Use Mechanization

The Department of Comptroller Training offers training through two branches, the Accounting and Finance Branch and the Management and Statistical Branch.

The Accounting and Finance Branch trains officers, airmen, civilians, and foreign nationals in Accounting and Finance, and Budget Administration. The Management and Statistical Branch offers training in Statistical and Data Processing and Management Analysis.

In 1961, the department graduated 3,070 students. At the end of the year 692 students were enrolled in 15 courses. These courses range in length from two weeks to 19 weeks with the average being 10 weeks.

The training equipment used by the department is valued at \$250,000. This includes data processing machines, calculators, addressograph machine, embossing machine, tape recorders, and both 16 and 35 millimeter projectors. The trainers vary from a desk-type calculator to a punch card accounting machine weighing several hundred pounds which rents for \$850 per month.

Classes are conducted in 28 classrooms that have a total of 45,000 square feet in area. The department was also responsible for training overseas, and at other bases in the United States. They conducted classes in two foreign countries and four locations within the United States.

Present planning within the Comptroller field indicates significant changes in two areas that will have a great impact on the future training program of the department.

The two areas are mechanization of Air Force systems and procedures and increased concern about financial planning and management.

In the area of mechanization it is anticipated that much greater demands will be made for additional training and expansion of current training particularly in the Electronic Data Processing area. Mechanization is being employed more and more not only in all functional areas of

comptrollership, but throughout the Air Force. Therefore, it is expected that mechanization will become an integral part of training in all functional areas. It will be a means for more improved financial and management planning.

With the added emphasis on financial management, it is expected that participation in several comptroller courses will continue to increase.

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## Department Teaches Many Trades

Courses in facilities, construction and utilities are taught by the Department of Utilities Training at Sheppard.

The facilities career field includes such courses as missile facilities specialist, electrician, power production and refrigeration.

In the construction career area are courses in roads and grounds, construction equipment operator, masonry and concrete worker, wood worker, painter and building maintenance mechanic.

Utilities include training in water and waste processing, plumbing, heating and work control.

In 1961, 3,608 students were graduated from the courses conducted by the department. At the end of the year, 1,193 students were enrolled in the 21 courses conducted by the Department. The peak student load was in December and it was 1,254 students.

The average length of the courses conducted by the school is 10 weeks, with the minimum, three weeks; and the maximum, 23 weeks.

The classes are conducted in 86 classrooms that have a square footage of 188,300.

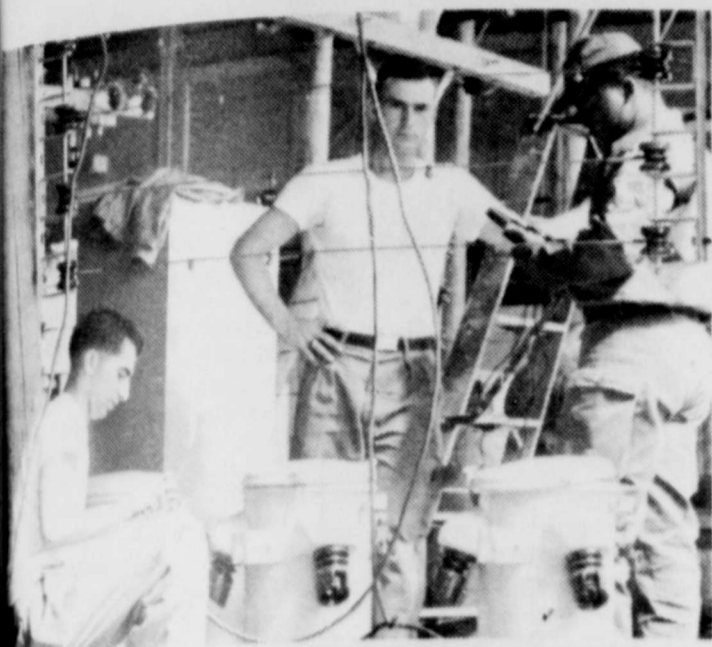
The Department uses training equipment valued at \$14,000,000. This consists of simulators and actual equipment designed to teach the students operation,

trouble-shooting and maintenance of representative type of equipment that students can expect in actual situations after graduation from the various courses.

The smallest training devices are cutaways and components of actual equipment some of which is approximately the size of a pocket watch. The largest training devices cover approximately 4,500 sq-

are feet in area. Some of the equipment can develop enough electrical power to supply a community of several thousand.

During 1962 several additional courses are to be included in the curriculum. One additional branch is being planned and the student load will probably be increased to approximately 1,500. A change in the name of the department is being contemplated.

## Sheppard's History Began In May 1941

The history of Sheppard Air Force Base as a training installation goes back to May, 1941, when construction of the first facilities began.

Officially opened in October 1941, the base first trained aviation mechanics. Also offered in the early years at various times were basic military training, glider mechanics courses, advanced pilot training, liaison aircraft training school for ground force officers, training school for instructors, training courses for B-29 engineers and C-82 mechanics and helicopter pilot training.

The base was a separate center from September through November 1945 with a peak strength of 46,000.

Deactivated in August, 1946 the base was reopened August 15, 1948, as a

basic training center supplementing training at Lackland AFB, Texas.

Soon, however, Sheppard became a large Airplane and Engine Mechanics School. It still offers training in that field, through the Department of Aircraft Maintenance; but the curricula have changed to keep pace with the changing times.

Other departments of training conducted here are Intelligence, Comptroller, Transportation, Missiles, Communication and Utilities. Training for instructors is offered also.

The base was named for Texas Senator Morris E. Sheppard, an advocate of military preparedness. As chairman of the Senate Military Affairs Committee, he led the fight for military preparedness preceding Pearl Harbor.

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## Commandants Of Troops Division Coordinates

The Commandants of Troops Division of 3750th Technical School exercises over-all staff supervision and management of school squadrons.

It coordinates and guides activities of the 15 school squadrons to insure efficient operation consistent with the accomplishment of both technical and military training missions.

The division is also responsible for organizing and accomplishing such functions as Phase II, Basic Military Training, Military Indoctrination Training Program for Initially Assigned Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps graduates, training the

base drill team, honor guards and supervision of reviews and retreat ceremonies.

School squadrons are responsible for morale, welfare, administration, discipline, housing and military training of assigned and attached personnel. The normal squadron has from 400 to 600 men assigned. The total average number of airman students assigned to this division was 8,000 in 1961. Two new squadrons were activated in 1961.

Phase II, Basic Military Training graduated 13,751 students in 1961; the peak month being May when 3,097 students were enrolled.

This course is 96 hours long. Ten classrooms and two theaters are used for the academic lessons while the drill field and physical training fields are for the physical activities. Basic airmen attend class two hours per day, five days a week for eight weeks.

The Special Activities Branch evaluates and inspects all squadron areas, formations, noon reviews and determines standardization policies for all squadrons. It conducts all retreat and parade forma-

tions. Retreat ceremonies are held four days a week and three parades, with an average of 2,500 men participating, are held a month.

He came to Sheppard from Caracas, Venezuela, where he had served for three years as advisor to the Venezuelan Air Force on construction and maintenance of air fields. His overseas duty was in the South Pacific, England and French Morocco.

His overseas duty has been in Germany, Sweden and two combat tours in the Pacific during World War II.

## Instructors At Sheppard AFB Receive Training

The mission of the Instructor Training Branch at Sheppard is to train selected technically qualified officers, airmen and civilians for duty as apprentice instructors capable of guiding student learning activities in the field of their specialty.

The Branch also supervises formal In-Service instructor training program. In the eight-week course, the prospective instructors study principles of learning, lesson planning, teaching methods, instructional aids, evaluation and measurement and techniques of guiding student activities. They then become student teachers, practicing in actual classroom situations to complete their qualifications for assignment to full time instructor duties.

During 1961, 563 instructors completed the course and 46 students were enrolled at the end of the year. The peak load was 102 as of April 29, 1961.

The estimated value of equipment used by the branch is \$50,000. The 13 classrooms used by the branch has an area of 16,000 square feet.

Other training offered by the branch includes effective writing, oral communication, test and measurement, American Language and Supervisor course. These are all short courses designed to meet local Technical School training requirements.

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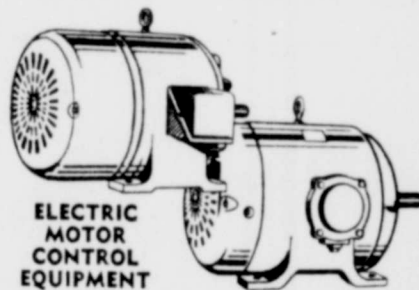
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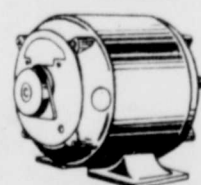
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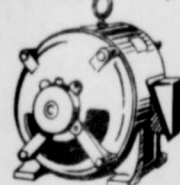


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# General Thomas S. Power Directs Air Force's Strategic Air Command

General Thomas S. Power is commander in chief of the Strategic Air Command, one of the major commands of the United States Air Force, whose motto is "Peace Is Our Profession."

The 4245th Strategic Wing at Sheppard AFB is part of this global command and is assigned to the Second Air Force at Brooksdale AFB, La., which is one of the largest of the four Air Forces comprising the Strategic Air

Command. The others are the Eighth and Fifteenth Air Forces in continental United States, and the Sixteenth in Spain and North Africa.

In addition to the aircraft, the Strategic Air Command is responsible for operation of missiles. Only recently the Command announced the redesignation of some divisions and wings to become Strategic Aerospace Divisions and Wings. This was in keeping with the USAF policy

to give greater recognition to the role of numerous SAC units in aerospace operations.

SAC's main weapons now are the B-52, KC-135, B-58, B-47 and KC-97 aircraft and the Titan and Atlas Intercontinental Ballistic missiles.

General Power, a native of New York, has served as commander of the Strategic Air Command since July 1, 1957. He was commissioned a second lieutenant following completion of flying training in February 1929.

Between 1929 and 1943 he served primarily with the bombardment units and attended various service schools. After going to the Mediterranean Theater of Operations and Italy, he returned to the States to go overseas again to Guam. From there he led and directed the first large-scale fire bomb raid on Tokyo on March 9, 1945.

General Power was deputy chief for operations of the U.S. Strategic Air Forces in the Pacific during the atomic bomb attacks on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Following the war he participated in the 1946 atomic bomb test at Bikini Atoll, Operations Crossroads, as assistant deputy task force commander for air.

He then served at Headquarters, US Air Force, Strategic Air Command and Air Research and Development Command before assuming his present position.

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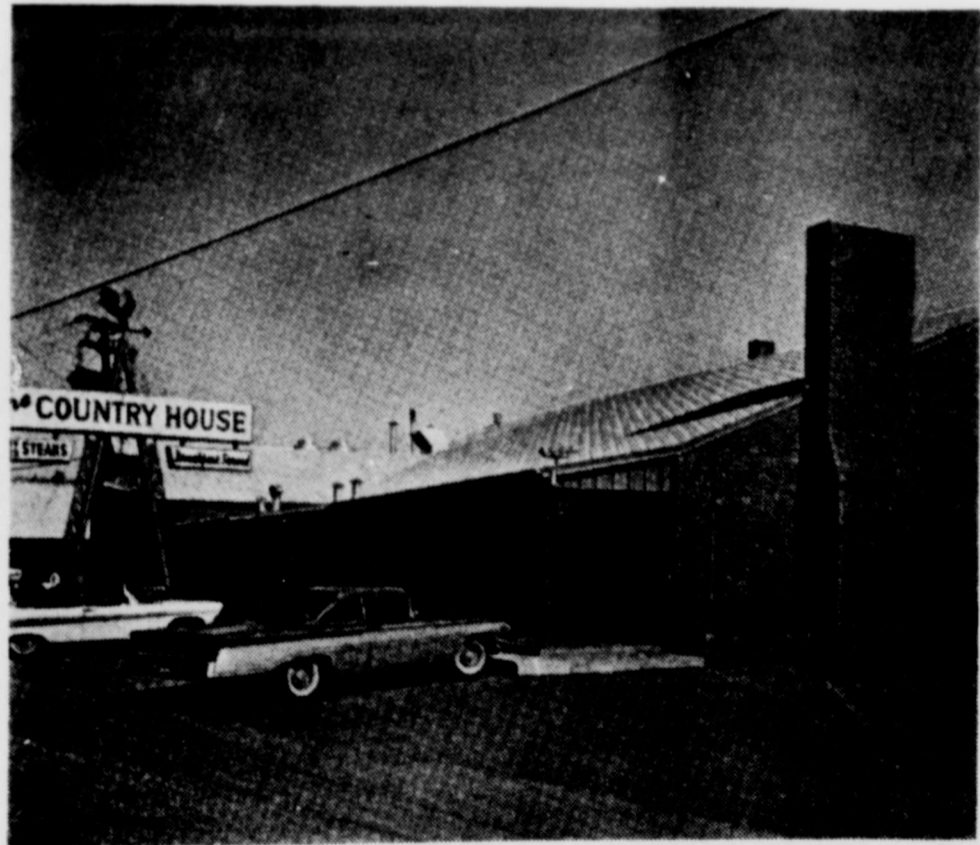
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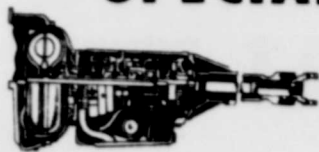

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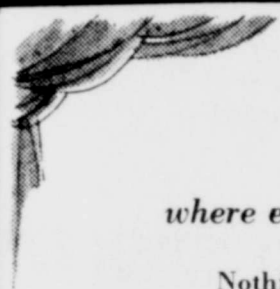
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The program objective is to aid Air Force commanders in accomplishing their mission with formal on-site individual technical training for aircraft maintenance technicians and aircrew personnel in maintenance and operation of aircraft and support equipment and in management procedures.

Sheppard Technical Training Center's Aircraft Maintenance Training Department has 31 Field Training Detachments and 23 Mobile Training Detachments located throughout the United States and overseas in some of the most remote areas of the world.

The Field Training Detachments are those units permanently located on sites to provide training as may be required in support of missions. Mobile Training Detachments may be required to move from one location to another to meet training needs on a varying schedule. A Mobile Train-

ing unit may spend from three months to several years at a location.

In 1961 there were 44,832 graduates of the hundreds of courses offered by Field and Mobile Training Detachments. The peak student load of 5,782 was in training in October. The courses offered had an average length of 65 hours, per course, with the shortest being six hours and the

longest, 360 hours. This world wide school has a total floor space of approximately 144,000 square feet and consists of about 400 classrooms. There are 30 officers, 22 civilians and 570 enlisted instructors that man the 54 training detachments. Usually one officer and from 9 to 25 enlisted instructors form the training unit.

Many people notice leaf spots on ligustrum, euonymus, gardenia, holly, photinia and other broadleaf evergreens at this time of year. These fungal leaf spots may be of different sizes and colors. They lower the aesthetic value of shrubs; however, the plants are damaged little since the damage is on one year old leaves that will soon be ready to naturally fall from the shrub. Several different fungi or molds may cause these leaf spots.

If the value of the shrub is high enough to justify the cost, a preventive spray program is effective in reducing the damage by leaf spots. Use two tablespoons of captan or two tablespoons of zineb per gallon of water. Add a spreader-sticker to the spray. A combination

of zineb and captan may be more effective. Zineb or captan may be used with safety during any part of the year. It is more important to have plants protected during times of above average rainfall or high humidity. A Bordeaux mixture can be used if you avoid hot weather which did help to lessen spray damage. Copper A Compound or Tri-basis Copper Sulfate can also be used.

Leaf spots may occur during the growing season. Continued premature loss of leaves may weaken a shrub so that it is more susceptible to other troubles. A good spray program plus proper fertilization and watering will help improve the health of shrubs. Avoid wetting foliage while watering as this tends to spread leaf spots.

Chlorosis or yellowing of

plants results when the green coloring matter fails to develop or is destroyed. Affected plants range from light green to yellow to almost white.

The loss of color is most often due to lack of iron in plants. The diseased condition may also be due to viruses, deficiencies of sulphur, manganese or nitrogen, poor drainage or aeration, nematode damage, root rots or crown gall.

Lack of iron is most common in apple, apricot, aborviate, ash, catalpa, cedar, cherry laurel, Chinese Tallow, citrus, grasses, magnolia, oleander, peaches, pecan, pyracantha, rose, strawberry and many other shrubs and flowers. Most soils on which iron chlorosis occurs are well supplied with iron, but is in a form unavailable for plant use. Iron chlorosis is controlled by adding iron sulfate (copperas)

or iron chelates to the soil. These chemicals can also be applied as a foliage spray in late evening when the plants are actively growing. In general, spraying will give quicker results but will not last as long as proper soil application. Applications of large amounts of well rotted compost at regular intervals are also recommended. For further information, ask your county extension agent, or one of the trained leaders for the publication, L-435, "Iron Chlorosis."

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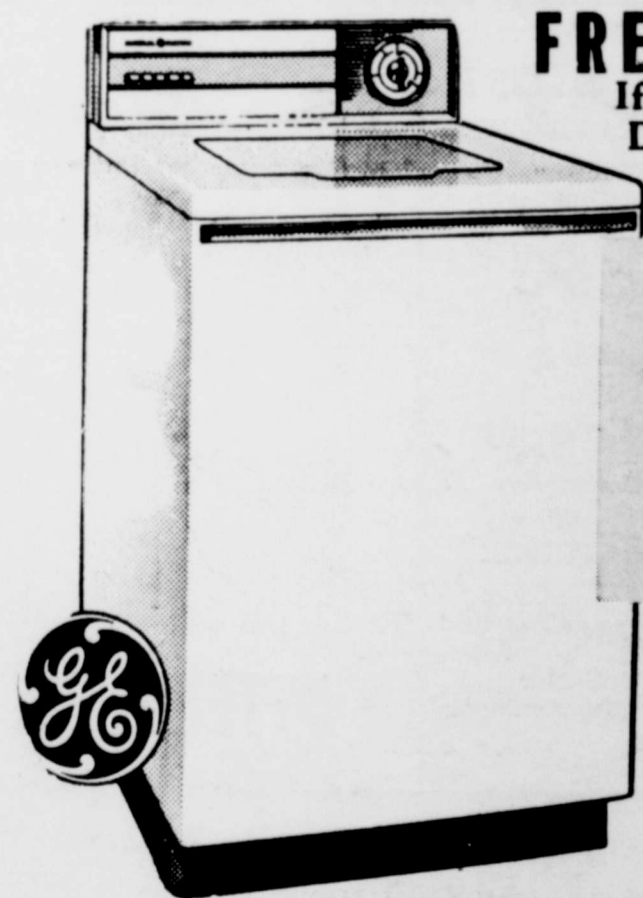

## J. C. Hinkle Has First Load Wheat for 1962

J. C. Hinkle, farmer three miles southwest of Burkburnett for 25 years, produced the first load of wheat in Wichita County with a load of 229 bushels Wednesday morning.

Hinkle's wheat weighed 61 pounds per bushel and had 13.38 per cent moisture. He received \$2.02 per bushel at the Harlan Mills Elevator in Burkburnett.

Hinkle estimated he would make 20 bushels per acre in the 44-acre planting that produced the early load. The wheat was of the Early Triumph variety.

Accounting for his early delivery, the first in his farming career, Hinkle said he had winnowed the 44-acre patch last Friday and Saturday, a process he has followed successfully the last three years.
