Distributive Educational Training Approved for Burk Burnett High

Mr. I. C. Evans, Superintendent of Public School, announced that the Burk Burnett High School would initiate a Distributive Education program beginning in September of this year.

Distributive Education is a vocational training program in which qualified junior and senior students are actively engaged in retail, wholesale and service-selling businesses. D. E. students attend classes in the morning which include a course that is directly related to their afternoon job training.

The State Education Agency makes a thorough survey of the school system and city before approving application for participation in the Distributive Education program. The progressive attitude of the city of Burk Burnett and the Burk Burnett School system resulted in approval of a Vocational D. E. teacher unit.

Mr. Lloyd Bloodworth has been employed as the D. E. Teacher-Coordinator and has recently returned from a Distributive Education Workshop which was held in Austin, Aug. 5 through Aug. 10th. Mr. Bloodworth is presently contacting businessmen who have shown an interest in this program and further informing them about the D. E. Program. Mr. and Mrs. Bloodworth have three children and reside at 806 Easy in Burk Burnett.

Junior and Senior students interested in taking Distributive Education should contact Mr. Bloodworth at the High School in the mornings from 8:00 to 10:00 a. m.

OPENING NEW DOORS

You may think that the production and distribution of electric power is pretty much a cut-and-dried matter that changes little if at all over the years. If so, you're dead wrong. For the utility industry, and the manufacturers of electrical equipment, are eternally engaged in efforts to do the necessary jobs better and more economically. And the key to opening new doors is research.

A booklet just issued by the Edison Electric Institute tells the story. For one thing, this year 125 electric companies are participating in 23 nuclear power projects involving company expenditures of about \$700 million. The program of research and development in atomic power in this country is the most comprehensive in the world, and utility company scientists and engineers are playing an important part in it.

There is more, much more. For instance, a group of 12 utilities and a manufacturer recently announced the success of an experimental laboratory device making use of a principle with a real jawbreaker of a name — magnetohydrodynamics. It involves a process in which the conventional turbine generator is not needed. Other new and exotic power sources, making use of the latest discoveries in chemistry and physics, are being exhaustively studied.

The detailed story is a long and dramatic one. The purpose of it all is clearly and tersely summed up in the booklet's last sentence: "With the aid of research, investor-owned electric companies stand ready and able to meet in full the future power needs of all Americans."

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

There is a rumor making the rounds that a measure will be introduced to raise Social Security tax rate a fraction of a cent to provide senior residents with free plumbing service.

This new measure, to be known as Plumblincare, will provide for fixing leaking faucets, stopped up toilets, installing water heaters, other plumbing work for everybody 65 or over, whether they have the means to afford a plumber or not.

Of course, this is a facetious proposal . . . or is it? It was sparked by the successful settlement of a building trades strike in California in which the U. S. Dept. of Labor ended the deadlock, largely so the vast government projects in that state could proceed.

In a kind of a "let's hold down inflation by reverse action" the plumber's union was persuaded to accept a contract that calls for pay, plus benefits, that will reach \$7.55 per hour. On regular time this will give them almost \$16,000 per year, and with a modest amount of overtime at double rates, should give plumbers around \$18,000 per year.

This, of course, gives the plumbers a bigger income than the majority of the nation's doctors. Now it is being touted that the nation's senior citizens cannot afford to pay for medical services. If that is a true premise, then obviously they cannot afford to pay for plumbing services.

In addition, adequate plumbing facilities are probably as essential to good health as medical care.

So perhaps this idea of Plumblincare should not be taken as a joke. Some worthwhile things could develop.

For example, if Social Security taxes are raised to finance both Medicare and Plumblincare, it would open new opportunities to young men.

A lot of young men, instead of spending years and thousands of dollars studying to practice medicine partly under bureaucratic control, could elect to become plumbers, which of course would also be under bureaucratic control. They could earn good money during the comparatively short apprenticeship, then step right into earning more than they could hope for in the first few years of medical practice.

Of course, in time this is liable to result in nation having lots of plumbers, few doctors. But if the situation got too unbalanced, bureaucracy could rise to the crisis.

After all, under Medicare and Plumblincare, both plumbers and doctors would be on a semi-civil service status, and it would be a simple matter for a bureaucrat to change classification of any number of plumbers to that of a doctor.

That would be simple, for has not the United States, founded on the principle of freedom and free enterprise, elevated to highly influential positions such men as Galbraith and Schlessinger. Apparently anything is possible.

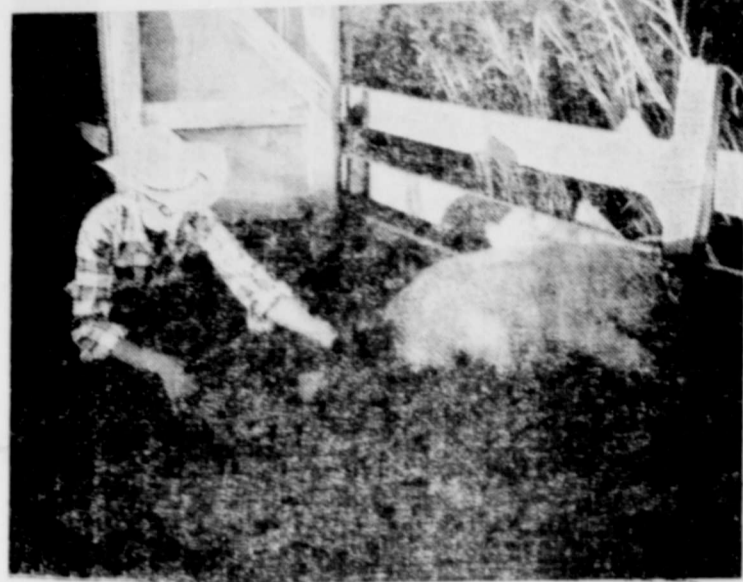

OPENING NEW DOORS

You may think that the production and distribution of electric power is pretty much a cut-and-dried matter that changes little if at all over the years. If so, you're dead wrong. For the utility industry, and the manufacturers of electrical equipment, are eternally engaged in efforts to do the necessary jobs better and more economically. And the key to opening new doors is research.

A booklet just issued by the Edison Electric Institute tells the story. For one thing, this year 125 electric companies are participating in 23 nuclear power projects involving company expenditures of about \$700 million. The program of research and development in atomic power in this country is the most comprehensive in the world, and utility company scientists and engineers are playing an important part in it.

There is more, much more. For instance, a group of 12 utilities and a manufacturer recently announced the success of an experimental laboratory device making use of a principle with a real jawbreaker of a name — magnetohydrodynamics. It involves a process in which the conventional turbine generator is not needed. Other new and exotic power sources, making use of the latest discoveries in chemistry and physics, are being exhaustively studied.

The detailed story is a long and dramatic one. The purpose of it all is clearly and tersely summed up in the booklet's last sentence: "With the aid of research, investor-owned electric companies stand ready and able to meet in full the future power needs of all Americans."

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

There is a rumor making the rounds that a measure will be introduced to raise Social Security tax rate a fraction of a cent to provide senior residents with free plumbing service.

This new measure, to be known as Plumbicare, will provide for fixing leaking faucets, stopped up toilets, installing water heaters, other plumbing work for everybody 65 or over, whether they have the means to afford a plumber or not.



Of course, this is a facetious proposal . . . or is it? It was sparked by the successful settlement of a building trades strike in California in which the U. S. Dept. of Labor ended the deadlock, largely so the vast government projects in that state could proceed.

In a kind of a "let's hold down inflation by reverse action" the plumber's union was persuaded to accept a contract that calls for pay, plus benefits, that will reach \$7.55 per hour. On regular time this will give them almost \$16,000 per year, and with a modest amount of overtime at double rates, should give plumbers around \$18,000 per year.

This, of course, gives the plumbers a bigger income than the majority of the nation's doctors. Now it is being touted that the nation's senior citizens cannot afford to pay for medical services. If that is a true premise, then obviously they cannot afford to pay for plumbing services.

In addition, adequate plumbing facilities are probably as essential to good health as medical care.

So perhaps this idea of Plumbicare should not be taken as a joke. Some worthwhile things could develop.

For example, if Social Security taxes are raised to finance both Medicare and Plumbicare, it would open new opportunities to young men.

A lot of young men, instead of spending years and thousands of dollars studying to practice medicine partly under bureaucratic control, could elect to become plumbers, which of course would also be under bureaucratic control. They could earn good money during the comparatively short apprenticeship, then step right into earning more than they could hope for in the first few years of medical practice.

Of course, in time this is liable to result in nation having lots of plumbers, few doctors. But if the situation got too unbalanced, bureaucracy could rise to the crisis.

After all, under Medicare and Plumbicare, both plumbers and doctors would be on a semi-civil service status, and it would be a simple matter for a bureaucrat to change classification of any number of plumbers to that of a doctor.

That would be simple, for has not the United States, founded on the principle of freedom and free enterprise, elevated to highly influential positions such men as Galbraith and Schlesinger. Apparently anything is possible.

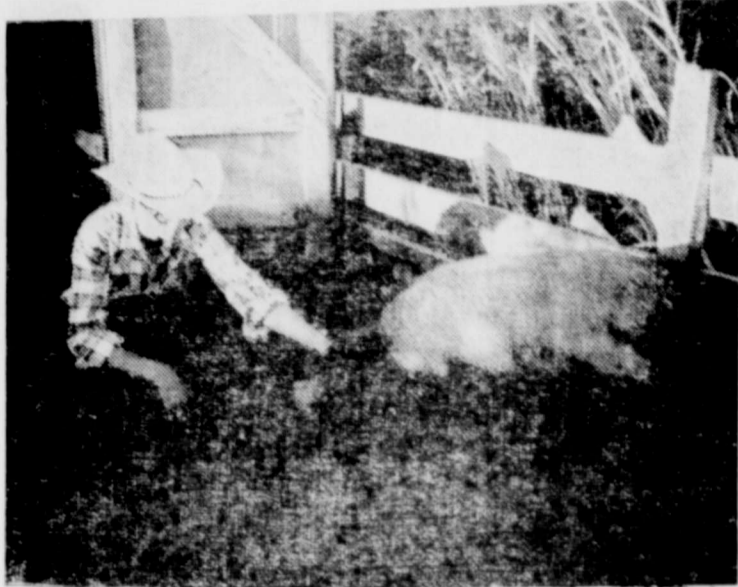

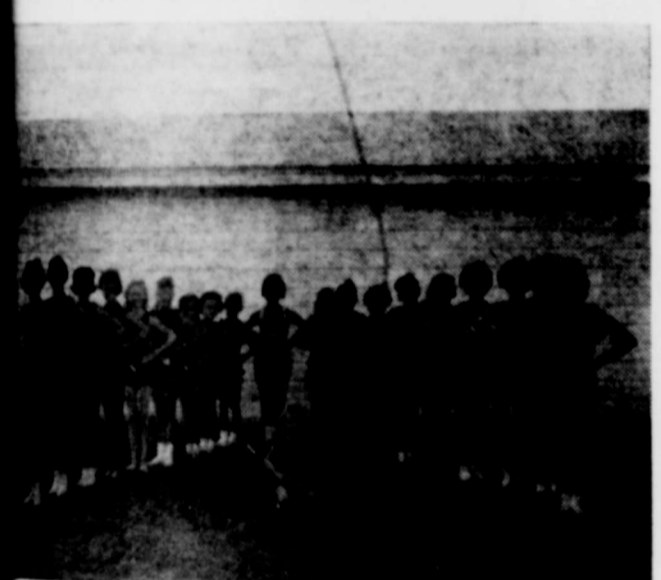

A—The average age is 68.1 and the average annual income, according to most recent Veterans Administration figures available is \$3,034.

Medical Exam Urged
