PHONEY CLAIMS

Almost every day there is an announcement somewhere that totally refutes the claims of public power advocates that only the government is capable of meeting our ever-growing need for electric power. These announcements have to do with new projects, of every size and kind, started by the investor-owned, heavily taxed utility companies.

A very recent and typical example of what is going on throughout the country comes from the mountain states. Three utilities will build a 255-mile, 230,000-volt interconnecting line between Idaho and Montana points. The line, as a spokesman explained, "is another forward-looking step in pooling resources of the systems to reduce generating capacity requirements of the three companies for the benefit of their customers."

The utilities concerned have been coordinating their systems for 20 years, in order to assure top service, under all conditions, at minimum rates to homes, farms and industries, and one of them has three high voltage transmission lines under construction. Utility systems the nation over have long been doing the same thing.

Whether it's a transmission line or a power plant, the taxpaying utilities, given the chance, will provide it. There is no more need for socialized power than there is for socialized newspapers, department stores, or automobile factories.

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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By an affirmative vote of 92%, the nation's independent business and professional people voting through the National Federation of Independent Business approved a measure that was introduced in Congress to raise the interest rates on government loans to electric cooperatives. At the same time 87% voted for the Senate resolution to reduce government competition with private business.

The creeping socialism which has been infecting the government of the United States has created many situations that defy all reason or logic.

Boys when they first learn to shoot marbles, are admonished to "shoot from law." In other words, everybody starts from the same line, with no advantage to any.

Yet side by side there can be two electric utility systems. One, the private stockholder owned one, needs borrow money at whatever the prevailing interest rates are. In addition, it must pay full tax rates on income. The other, operated under the sacred name of "public owned" which covers a multitude of socialistic practices, gets loan from the government at a rate of interest usually lower than it has been costing the government to borrow money.

There is a substantial question as to whether or not the government should not be prohibited by constitutional amendment.

ment from loaning money to any cooperative operation.

For example, one of the biggest canning complexes in California, about two years ago became a co-operative.

Two things immediately resulted which gave it a competitive edge.

One, of course, was the fact that it escaped a great deal of the income tax payments formerly made. Equally as big in an industry which borrows vast sums for operating capital during the packing season, it qualified to borrow from the government sponsored bank for cooperatives and thus able to borrow money for about 2% below the prevailing rate.

In the meantime, through the Federal Reserve Board, in the event that an administration gained power that believed in all out socialism, it is possible to practically completely communize the nation.

For after all, it would be a simple matter for the Federal Reserve Board, if so inclined, to run the cost of borrowing money up so high that industry after industry would be forced into organizing as cooperatives merely to get working capital at a cost that could be justified.

History always writes dramatically about revolutions in terms of bloodshed, and groups engaged in street battles.

But after all, no revolution yet succeeded unless before the shooting started, the economy and money supply had been rigged. It is dangerous when government supplies working capital at a lower rate to those who compete with individual free enterprise.

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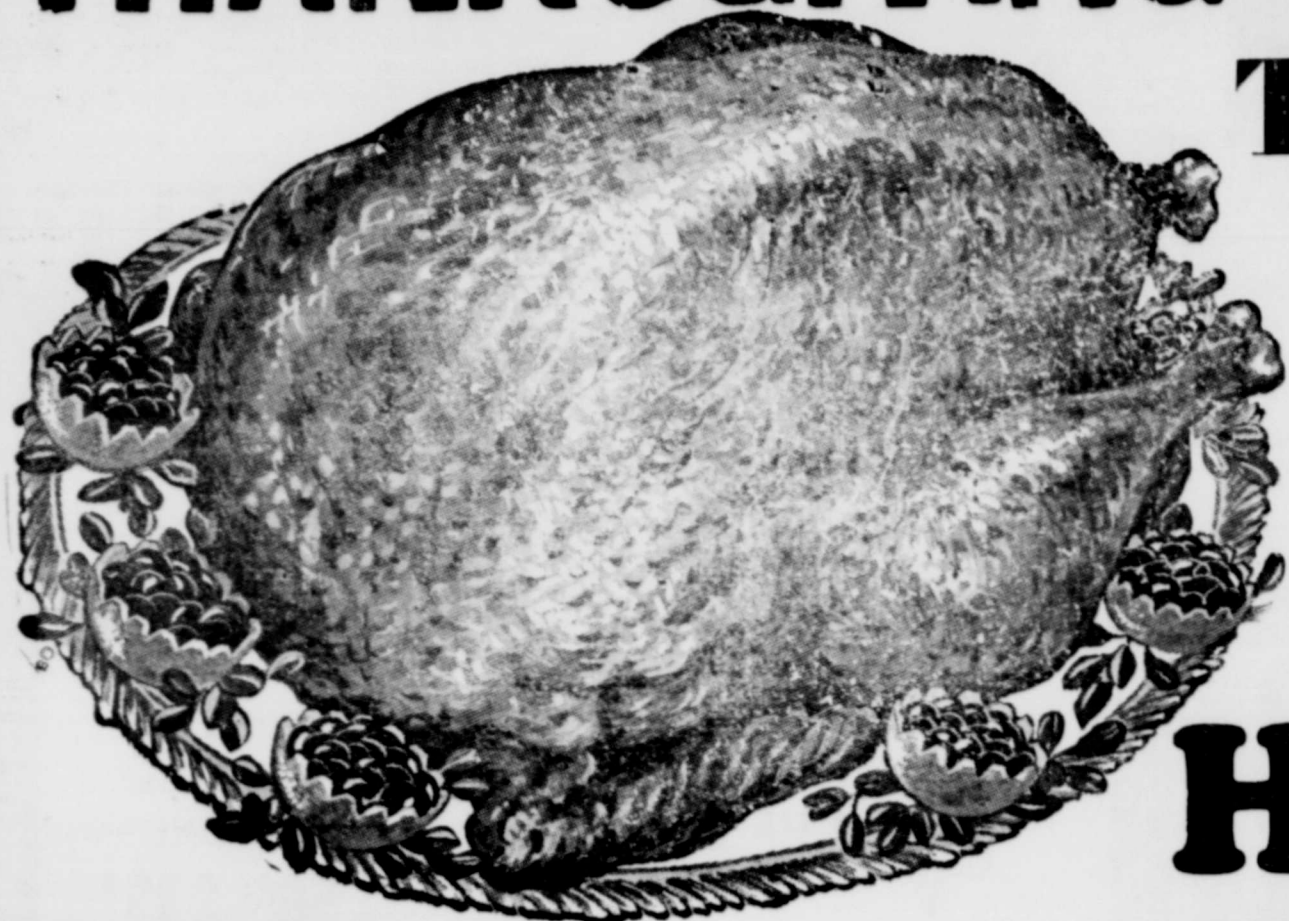

Chocolate Jewels

Makes about 48
Sift together:

- 1/4 cup sifted flour
- 1/4 cup quick chocolate flavored mix
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Beat well:

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup sugar

Add:

- 1 egg
- Blend well. Stir in dry ingredients, mixing well.

Add:

- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Mix well.

- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup mixed candied fruit
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 package (6-oz.) semi-sweet chocolate morsels

Mix well. Drop by heaping teaspoonful onto greased cookie sheets. Top each cookie

with a candied cherry half. Bake in a moderate oven (325°F.) for 15 minutes. Cool slightly. Remove from sheet.
Peanut Butter Fudge
Makes about 1 pound
Combine in a saucepan:
2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons light corn syrup
2/3 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon salt
Bring to a boil, stirring until sugar has dissolved. Cook to soft ball stage (235°F.), or until a small amount forms a soft ball when dropped in cold water. Remove from heat.
Add:
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup peanut butter
Cool 5 minutes, or until lukewarm. Beat until mixture is creamy and begins to thicken. Turn into a buttered loaf pan (9x5x3"). Cool; then cut into squares.

Gift Wrapping Hints

The gift wrapping stylists have done it again. Here are just a few helpful hints which make gift wrapping easy and fun for all!

1. Look for a smooth, hard surface on which to wrap your gifts. Be sure that there's ample space for all necessary supplies such as scissors, glue or rubber cement and a ruler.
 2. During the holidays, keep on hand a supply of gift wrapping items such as paper, ribbon, seals and gift tags. This will see you through any "emergency wrapping."
 3. When choosing a wrapping paper design look for one that will completely cover the surface of the box.
 4. When wrapping your packages, allow 2 inches of overlap around the box. For the neatest side corners, make certain that the edges to be folded at each end are slightly more than 1/2 the depth of the package.
 5. Wrap round or cylindrical objects similarly, with the ends pleated into triangular folds.
 6. To make sure that the wrapping paper stays in place, secure each step of the operation with glue or seals.

VETERANS Questions & Answers

Q—Is it true that the widow of any veteran may get a GI loan to buy a home?
A—No. Only unremarried widows of World War II veterans, or Korean Conflict veterans who died from service-

connected disabilities may qualify for GI loans.
Q—what are the requirements for the VA War Orphans Education Program?
A—That (1) the death of the veteran parent be due to service-connected causes originating in either wartime active duty, or in peacetime active duty since September 16, 1940, until the Universal Military Service and Training Act terminates;

the child may still be living without changing the definition of "orphan" for purposes of this law; the son or daughter may be married or single and still be considered an "orphan" for purposes of this law; the courses are not limited to college work but can be vocational subjects leading to an occupational goal.
Q—Do veterans or their dependents who are now being approved for pensions have any choice as to the pension law they will come under?
A—No, only those veterans or their dependents who were already on the pension rolls on June 30, 1963, can choose to stay under the old pension law or come under the new pension law. All those coming on the pension rolls after July 1, 1960, automatically come under the new pension law, PL 87-211.

'Let's Go Fishing'
WITH
CATFISH PEPPER

How many times have you received a refusal to go fishing from one of your friends, who gave one of the following excuses—

"To far," "No fish around here," "No place to fish," "Land owners just won't let you in any more?" Actually the list of unjustified excuses is an extensive as are the possibilities and potentiality in our area.

Take it from one who should know—there are literally hundreds of acres of fishing (and I mean GOOD FISHING) water in Wichita County that are practically virgin. Then add to this, thousands of stock ponds that (with a little of your help) could be made into wonderful bass, catfish, brim and (even the worst of all for a small pond) crappie. "This last statement will be explained in full at a later date."

There is no doubt as to the presence of game fish in several hundreds small innocent looking ponds around the area. I know for I put them there. Do you ever think of moving a few of the small ones from a known pond to one (that there is a strong possibility) that is barren of game fish? I DO, therefore, there is always a place for me to catch (not just go) fish.

Then the one big excuse: "Land owners just won't let you in any more." Basically this is true, but have you ever stopped to consider the facts? Most of all of us know at least one person well enough to be allowed to fish in his stock pond. Now you may say, "Sure, but who wants to waste time in a mud hole like that, and besides all you can catch are mud cats." Yours truly agrees to this 100%, but a little time and labor on your part can change this in a matter of a year or two. The pond can be cleaned of all undesirable fish at a very small cost. An application of gypsum will then clear the water. If you do not care to catch and transfer fish for the re-stocking, they may be obtained from the Texas Game and Fish Commission Hatchery at Diversion Lake.

In a co-operative endeavor as this, it is wise for all concerned to discuss the plans and set it up on a year to year basis. This method will continue to prove fruitful to the angler.

Now, for a little thought as to the intentions of this column. It is my desire to bring out various methods, tips, hints, and etc, as to how, when, and where to catch fish in our local waters. It is not in our plans to discuss trout, walleyes, muskies, salmon and etc, but, to tell of our local fish and various LEGAL methods of catching them. Anyone having any tips that they wish to pass along to other people, be it casting, flycasting, spinning, bait fishing, or trot-line fishing, may do so by sending them to me, CATFISH PEPPER, Care Burk Burnett Star, Burk Burnett, Texas. 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Texas Safety Association

By dimming your bright auto headlights you are saying: "Good evening, Fellow driver." It's this spirit of goodwill on the highway that will make motoring at night much safer, it was declared today by the Texas Safety Association's General Manager, J. O. Musick.

He added that a National Safety Council study shows that slightly over one-half of last year's traffic deaths in the United States occurred in nighttime mishaps, although the traffic volumes are not as great during the hours of darkness as during daylight.

"It's very noticeable that the time of sunset is creeping up earlier each day now," Musick observed.

"Workers who have been used to getting home in daylight now are encountering dusk, and it won't be long before it will be really dark when they leave their jobs at the close of a working day."

The safety director urged car owners to check all vehicle lights, making certain they are functioning properly. He said that in a nationwide vehicle safety-check program in the U. S. last year 18.5 per cent of more than 1,300,000 vehicles inspected were found defective in some manner.

"Nearly two-thirds of the defective items were related to a driver's ability to see or be seen under adverse weather conditions or darkness," Musick said.

"Faulty rear or front lights led the list of flaws," he said.

"By percentages, the automobile defects were noted thus: rear lights 26.5 per cent, front lights 16.3 per cent, front signal lights 6.4 per cent, rear signal lights 6.2 per cent, inadequate windshield wipers 4.9 per cent, glass 3.1 per cent and rear-view mirror 0.8 per cent."

The nation-wide checkup showed that of those cars found defective, 13 per cent had inadequate brakes, 8.4 per cent had faulty exhaust system, 6.9 per cent had poor tires, 5.2 per cent had an imperfect steering mechanism, and 2.3 per cent had no horn or a horn not in good working condition.

"Headlights should be dimmed when meeting a car on the road at night, and also when following another car," the director concluded.

"At no time should the parking lights be used as driving lights."

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
