Music For Spring Concert At MU Set For April 6

The second annual "Music for Spring" concert by the combined musical organizations of Midwestern University will be presented by the Department of Music on Saturday evening, April 6, at 8:00 p. m. This year's hour and a half program of the finest music for band, chorus and chamber orchestra is scheduled for the University Auditorium as the first major musical offering from that stage since the "Oklahoma" production of the 1959 season by the combined fine arts departments. The public is invited with no admission charge to hear a carefully programmed showcase of works from all segments of music literature.

The University Choir will run a gamut of repertory from the double chorus works of Palestrina and Vaughan Williams through Bach chorales to Negro spirituals. Under the direction of William V. Boland, associate professor of voice, the choir will add a special sequence of excerpts from the Broadway success, "Music Man." The sequence will feature staging by Frank Pal. The University Chamber Orchestra under the direction of Thomas Greer, will center its attention upon the Baroque era with a "Concerto for Four Violins" by Vivaldi, and a solo keyboard concerto of J. S. Bach featuring Miss Georganna Fitzgerald, pianist.

The third and final portion of the evening will be carried by the University Concert Band, conducted by Dr. Joe L. Haddon, director of bands at M.U. A well rounded representation of major works for symphonic band will be concluded with full band and pipe organ joining forces in the Manzoni "Requiem."

Hidden But Comforting

According to the Southern Pine Association, "hidden values" have a wide surface impact on the comfort of a home. For example, the resiliency of wood in the structure that supports the floors. What the Association suggests is a layer of solid boards over the framework of the outer walls and beneath the surfacing materials. The high insulation of this wood 'lining' makes the home warmer in winter, cooler in summer, and keeps heating and cooling costs to a minimum.

THE LEGION MARCHES ON

Forty-four years ago, come March 15th, a handful of war weary but victorious World War I fighters gathered at le Cirque de Paris in the French capital and associated themselves together "for God and Country" in what came to be the largest and most influential organization of war veterans in history.

Today, The American Legion will celebrate its 44th birthday with a 1963 enrollment which is running well ahead of 1962, in spite of the fact that death now claims about 55,000 Legionnaires (largely from among the WW I founders) each year. It is thus apparent that veterans of WW II and Korea continue to join at a rate that more than compensates for the Reaper's scythe.

The central theme of the 1963 birthday party in the thousands of posts in the 50 states, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, on American bases and in various cities around the world will be an "American Legion Showcase of the four programs to which the founders dedicated themselves so long ago. These are: Americanism, child welfare, rehabilitation and national security—goals that may never be completely attained, but which will be fought for and advanced by the Legion in war and in peace, so long as that body exists.

National Commander James E. Powers who has endorsed the "Showcase" as an effective means of parading the continuing serious work and accomplishments of the Legion, has suggested also that there are eligible men and women in every community who have never joined the Legion, and that every post can make this anniversary memorable by inviting such people to membership and holding a special Initiation Party.

We know there are some fine people in this community who are veterans and are not members. And we suspect that in many cases this may be simply because no one ever thought to invite them, personally and individually, to join these distinguished, public spirited ranks.

We congratulate The American Legion and our own local post on this occasion, and share Commander Powers' conviction that none should be overlooked who can add further drive and enthusiasm and lustre to this enduring crusade for God and Country.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Although not widely publicized while France's premier, and English and Canadian prime ministers deal headlines of metropolitan press, there is before U.S. Senate a most vital piece of legislation.

Briefly, adoption of Senate Resolution No. 30 would give American independent businessmen privilege to enjoy by Indians, Negro, civil service workers.



Because Senate Resolution No. 30 introduced by Sen. Winston Prouty of Vermont gives Senate Small Business Committee authority to investigate matters affecting small business including that of reporting out directly to the Congress at four legislative important to independent business.

During last session of Congress nation's independent businessmen rising through the National Federation of Independent Business supported by an 87% majority this measure which was introduced at that time but was lost in the session's closing day amidst over-foreign matters.

Introduced early in this session by Senator Prouty, the Washington office of the Federation, under the direction of George Burger, its president in charge, discussed the matter with other U. S. Senators.

There then developed one of the most encouraging manifestations of Congressional awareness of independent business.

ness of the true U. S. domestic problem as 12 other Senators, almost evenly divided as to party, joined in as co-sponsors. In Senate's venerable history has a measure been so extensively co-sponsored.

In introducing the resolution, Senator Prouty said, "There are over 40 million small businesses in this country. They are the most important segment of our economy. Our small business community needs confidence. The adoption of this resolution is sorely needed to build that confidence."

The Senate also traced the history of the Senate Small Business Committee.

It is widely acknowledged in the past 15 years some of the most solid and brilliant work in government has been accomplished by the Senate Small Business Committee.

But as a Select Committee, it can only recommend to a standing committee that remedial legislation be introduced in the Congress. This action is often delayed in vital issues is almost the peril point.

This is not due to the members of the Senate Standing committees being unsympathetic to the problems.

Instead, the delays are created by the tremendous work load already faced by the over-burdened standing committees which has been aggravated by the many foreign schemes that are now thrown into the laps. Thus, often they lack the time to get the job done. Hence the vital need for passage of this measure.







ORDINANCE No. 265
An Ordinance defining food, potentially hazardous food, adulterated, misbranded, food-service establishments, temporary food-service establishment, health authority, utensils, equipment, etc.; providing for the sale of only unadulterated, wholesome, properly branded food; regulating the sources of food establishing sanitation standards for food, food protection, food-service personnel, food-service operations, food equipment and utensils, sanitary facilities and controls, and other facilities; requiring permits for the operation of food-service establishments; regulating the inspection of such establishments; providing for the examination and condemnation of food; providing for incorporation by reference of the 1962 edition of the "United States Public Health Service Food Service Sanitation Ordinance and Code"; and providing for the enforcement of this ordinance, and the fixing of penalties.

form of the 1962 Edition of the "United States Public Health Service Food Service Sanitation Ordinance and Code", three certified copies of which shall be on file in the office of the City Clerk; Provided, that the words "municipality of Burk Burnett, Texas" in said unbridged form shall be understood to refer to the City of Burk Burnett, Texas; Provided further, That in said ordinance all parenthetical phrases referring to grading and subsection H. 2. e. shall be understood to be deleted; and provided further, That subsections H. 7. and H. 8. shall be understood to be deleted.

SECTION 2: Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200.00. In addition thereto, such persons may be enjoined from continuing such viola-

tions. Each day upon which such a violation occurs constitutes a separate violation.

SECTION 3: Provided further that sub-section 12 of Section A of Part IV of said "United States Public Health Service Sanitation Ordinance and Code" shall be understood to be amended to read as follows: "12. Health Authority shall mean the City of Burk Burnett Health Officer, and or The Wichita Health Unit of Wichita County, Texas or their designated representative or representatives."

SECTION 4: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect 12 months after its adoption and publication as provided by law; and, at that time, all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Wilbarger-Wichita SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



In order to keep any soil at a high level of productivity, requires the maintenance of a good organic matter level in the soil, states James Park of the Iowa Park Conservation Unit. Organic materials are necessary in the soil to increase water intake into the soil, to aid in holding individual soil particles apart to avoid soil compaction. Therefore allowing both air and water to move more freely through the soil, which is essential to good root growth of any plant.

Organic materials serves as a media for holding a high level of soil nutrients available to plants when needed.

To maintain the organic level in a soil requires the growing of more frequent high residue producing crops, such as small grain, sorghums and grasses, than low residue producing crops such as cotton. To maintain the fertility of a soil requires the rotation of crops in a given sequence so that each acre is covered more frequently with a high residue crop if the organic level is to be maintained.

Where large quantities of carbonaceous materials such as straw and stalks are added to the soil the nitrogen level of the soil should be maintained to hasten decomposition of the added materials.

This may be accomplished by the addition of a legume crop such as peas, vetch and clovers grown and turned under or the addition of nitrogen fertilizer applied to the crops or residue.

Car Inspection Deadline Near

With the deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 30 per cent of the vehicles in Wichita County have been inspected," Captain Alan

Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week.

Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations when the April 15 deadline approaches. "The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspec-

tion of Texas registered vehicles without delay if owners will not wait until just a few days before the deadline," Johnson said.

"Any driver operating a vehicle registered in Texas, that is required to be inspected, on public roads after April 15 will be operating in violation of the law," he said. Captain Johnson called atten-

tion to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 per cent to 4 per cent. "The purpose of the motor vehicle inspection program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident

and, by removing the link, prevent the accident," he pointed out.

TRUST ARRANGEMENTS EXPLAINED

When property is placed in trust, it is turned over to a trustee who will see to it that the property is managed for the benefit of a person or persons named as beneficiaries. It is a means of disposing of your property and may be used in many ways. It has many advantages. It may be used to provide for persons unable to manage their own property, to provide for a child's education, to provide for the maintenance of a charitable institution, or to provide a gift to a charity. In these days of high taxes, a trust may be utilized to minimize the tax burden. If carefully planned, a trust may determine the income and inheritance of a grantor. The trustee may be a bank, an individual,

or a trust company. The grantor through a trust instrument tells the trustee how to distribute the trust property or income. The trustee will then manage and distribute the trust proceeds or property in whatever manner the grantor desires. A very common arrangement is to place the property in trust with directions to pay the

income from the property to a wife for her lifetime, and upon her death the trust to end and the property to be distributed to the grantor's children.

An interesting type of trust is that which is sometimes called a spendthrift trust. This is an arrangement whereby one sets up a certain sum of money to be given out to another at a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.

This type of trust is generally used in wills where a person desires to leave money to an individual, but feels that the individual is not capable of properly caring for the money and that if left to him in full that the person receiving the money will spend and waste the money and not receive the maximum benefit from it.

Trust property quite often consists of securities. The law regulates the type of property in which trust funds may be invested. However, the grantor may designate the type of investments the trustee may make.

The effectiveness of a trust is dependent largely on its proper creation. To avoid the pitfalls and dangers of lawsuits and ineffective trust operations, a trust instrument should be properly prepared. A poorly planned or carelessly drawn trust instrument cannot only defeat the objectives of its crea-

tor, but may prove costly as well. Your lawyer can advise you whether a trust arrangement will be advantageous in your particular situation, and is qualified by education and experience to prepare properly the legal papers necessary to set up a trust. If you have in mind some bank or trust company to act as trustee, that firm's trust officer will be glad to discuss the matter in a conference with you and your attorney.

PEANUT BUTTER VS. PEANUT SPREAD

Q. My children simply love peanut butter. Is it a good food?
A. Plain, old fashioned peanut butter, which contains nothing but roasted peanuts with a little added salt, is a highly nutritious, but hard to find, food. The old fashioned variety has a somewhat limited shelf-life and the oil tends to rise to the surface. To "improve" the quality of peanut butter, many manufacturers add various chemicals and hydrogenated oils. This generation is a process which hardens an oil into a solid fat with good keeping qualities. The food regulations under the term "peanut butter" are more spacious than those for "peanut spread." Manufacturers have now switched to use of the term "peanut spread." If you want to avoid peanut butter containing a variety of questionable additives, examine the labels carefully before buying.

LOW-CHOLESTEROL DIETS

Q. Do medical scientists recommend more noise as suitable for diets designed to control or lower cholesterol blood factors?
A. Many clinical investigators who have tested out diets for the control of serum cholesterol levels permit the use of mayonnaise. The position of various brand-name mayonnaise probably varies quite widely and it is not usual for the doctor to specify a brand name to contain suitable fats.
