An Age Of Miracles

The feature article in the May 3rd issue of Time magazine deals with the miracle—the almost incredible miracles—performed by modern surgery. It is accompanied by a superb series of full-page color photographs. Some, inevitable, are on the gory side, and will disturb the squeamish. But all show innovations, discoveries, perfections of technique and apparatus, and, beyond all, human skill and knowledge that not only saves lives, but makes possible productive living that would have been impossible not long ago.

We see the repair of a diseased heart, an operation requiring nine specialists of various kinds along with a complex machine. We see the replacement of a faulty kidney, and the restoration to vigorous life of a man who had been given only eight weeks to live. We see the new and amazing freezing attack on the hitherto incurable Parkinson's disease. We see the removal of a cancered breast, and the lymph nodes that house and harbor this killer. We see the repair of a hand deformed, seemingly beyond hope, by arthritis. And we see micro-surgery, where the surgeon, looking through a high powered microscope into the middle ear and using instruments and skills of the utmost delicacy, restore lost hearing.

These are wonders. Unknown numbers of people will benefit from them as the years wear on, and as knowledge spreads and gains. They are not, of course, just American achievements, science, in medicine or in any other area, recognizes no national barriers. The bases on which they are built go back, in many cases, for a century or more, and many men made their contributions until, finally, a whole was achieved. But they were made possible by men and women, individual men and women—not by committees, not by governments, not by bureaucracies working from books and rules. The results speak for themselves, and need no argument, and the words they speak are the words that affirm the freedom to try, to fail and succeed, to push on in the face of discouragement, always with a given end in view. This is the case, the irrefutable case, for free medicine.

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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Recent votes taken by the National Federation of Independent Business indicate nation's independent businessmen are firm in their overwhelming desire to see legislation that would make organized labor subject to the nation's anti-trust laws.

At one time the sole aim of this move was to prevent the collusive agreements between Big Labor and Big Corporations which result in rigging segments of the economy.

But the desire for this reform is being accelerated by the growing knowledge that organized labor is attaining economic power through the control of vast stores of money.

Today, there is considered there are 17,000,000 dues paying members of Big Labor. In most instances the dues payer has no choice in the matter. It is deducted from his paycheck.

In addition, due to the current fringe benefit demands by labor, the last report by the Department of Labor shows that these welfare and pension plans by the end of 1960 showed accumulations of slightly over \$50 billion. Here, too, is a source of tax free capital.

These funds are invested. It is reported, without confirmation, that collectively labor unions are the largest single

stockholder in General Motors. Whether this is true or not, is most difficult to ascertain due to the murky labyrinths in which management of union funds appear to often move, as witnessed by Dave Beck case.

Yet the fact remains that labor, through tax free exaction from both the worker and employer, is amassing huge piles of wealth.

This fact also helps explain why there are so many power fights in the labor movement because whoever can control the major share of this take can exert great powers.

It is also important to bear in mind that these vast stores of capital can be quite fluid.

There has often been public wonder expressed over why some big corporations have almost automatically given in to the demands of the labor leaders, despite the fact logic did not justify meeting the demands.

While the following would naturally be quite hush hush, it is not inconceivable that in some of these instances labor barons have used this economic power to force compliance with demands. After all, big corporation executives are employees. Thus, all any labor leader has to do is point out that they have at their command enough capital to buy up controlling stock interest in any corporation, and fire the officers.

It is quite possible in few years, control of the big corporations will be wielded by labor leaders. Thus, only free economy nation can perhaps look forward to maintaining its that of independent business.

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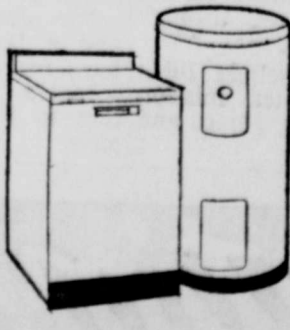
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Western Study Club Elects New Officers

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Simple Rules For Floor Care Easy to Follow

The conscientious homemaker who is disturbed about the appearance of her smooth-surface flooring may find that the deep, dark secret behind floor care success is amazingly simple if she'll only change a few of her

old cleaning and polishing habits.

While modern flooring materials and floor care items have gone a long way toward reducing the burdensome aspects of routine floor maintenance, many housewives have neglected to keep pace with the times. Despite their efforts, the gray cloudy floors in their kitchens, bathrooms and family rooms indicate incorrect floor care procedure.

All floors require a regular program of washing, polishing and waxing. Reasons for floor

care dissatisfaction normally involve one or more of these activities and they often point to neglect of a few basic floor care steps.

Chief among these, according to home economists of the Armstrong Cork Company, is washing floors too frequently with strong soaps and cleaners. With some types of flooring, these strong solutions can fade and discolor the material more readily than constant wear.

Thorough washing can be limited to three or four times a year, or when exceptional soiling has occurred, if spills are wiped up before they become sticky or dry. In all cases, strong cleaners should be avoided unless diluted with their high alkali content can ultimately cause chemical changes in color pigments or compositions.

When floors are exceptionally soiled and need a thorough cleaning, a good all-purpose solution is a half-cup of household detergent and a half-cup of ammonia diluted with a gallon of warm water. This solution will also remove excessive wax accumulations which cause graying or yellowing.

Application of a protective wax or polish should always follow thorough cleaning, but should be started only after the washed floor has dried completely.

The inconvenience of scrubbing a floor, waiting for it to dry and then applying wax has been removed by new products that clean and polish in one step. The development of combination cleaners and polishes and other liquid, self-polishing products over the past few years have cut the time required for floor care and have erased the need for hand-and-knees application of paste waxes.

In choosing cleaners, waxes and polishes, a good rule-of-thumb is to use products recommended by the manufacturer of the flooring. Because of their natural interest in effective floor care, some manufacturers

produce maintenance products especially designed to be safe and efficient for their types of flooring. Labels should be read carefully to insure that the correct care item is used for the flooring.

Solvent-type waxes are not recommended for asphalt or rubber tile or some types of flooring such as linoleum installed in six-foot widths.

One common mistake is the application of wax too thickly. A thin film hardens more quickly and gives better protection because the moisture content of the wax can fully evaporate. Thick coatings leave sub-surface wax softening, increasing the floor's vulnerability to denting and surface scratches. Because of the nature of their formulations, the cleaner-polish combination products provide a safe guard against thick applications.

Equally important, liquid polishes and waxes should be applied in a single direction to avoid the spotty and "checked" appearance of floors when they have dried.

In addition to immediately wiping up spills, a thorough sweeping is all the care normally required for daily maintenance. A soft hair broom used only for floors will help reduce scratching and will prevent dust from becoming ground in.

Furniture rests will help prevent denting caused by heavy furniture and modern pieces with pointed legs. These rests spread the weight of the furniture over a larger area and remain flat even when the chairs are tilted. Roller casters are more likely to dent floors because weight is concentrated in a small area.

Deep gouges are often caused by moving furniture across the flooring without dollies. When furniture is too heavy for lifting, small scraps of carpeting or heavy cloth should be placed beneath legs to give protection needed.

Americans spend more than \$500 million annually on unnecessary food supplements, according to Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

We have progressed from the snake medicine peddler at the county fair to the modern food peddler on television who uses Madison Avenue techniques.

Food leaders for Wichita County home demonstration clubs have studied the use and misuse of food supplements and other fads. The leaders are now giving the results of their study to organized groups. The leaders point out many Americans subscribe to the concept that vitamin pills or two or three food supplements pills a day are a necessary way of life. And so called "health foods" and other fad foods are increasing and confusing the dietary picture even more.

While there are some nutritional deficiency problems in this country resulting from lack

of iodine, iron and other nutrients, the greatest deficiency disease is that of dental caries or tooth decay, which can be prevented, the leaders are emphasizing.

Excess weight is another big problem. 35 percent of the adult population and 15 percent of the nation's teenagers are obese. This leads to many food fads.

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Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

The following changes in the charges for long distance calls between points within the State of Texas will be made effective June 15, 1963:

Basic rates for station-to-station calls between 9 p.m. and 4:30 a.m. between points more than 82 miles apart will be reduced from 5 to 50 cents, with a maximum charge of 80 cents for a three-minute call, anywhere within the State of Texas.

Station-to-station rates remain unchanged on calls of less than 83 miles, and on calls made before 9 p.m. In Texas, the lower "after 9" rates will not apply on collect calls or on calls charged to a third telephone.

Person-to-person rates will not be changed on calls of 56 miles or less.

Basic rates for most person-to-person calls between points more than 56 miles apart will be increased five cents for both day and evening calls.

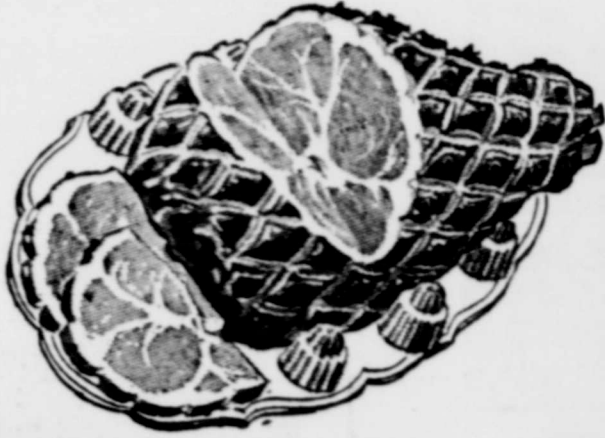

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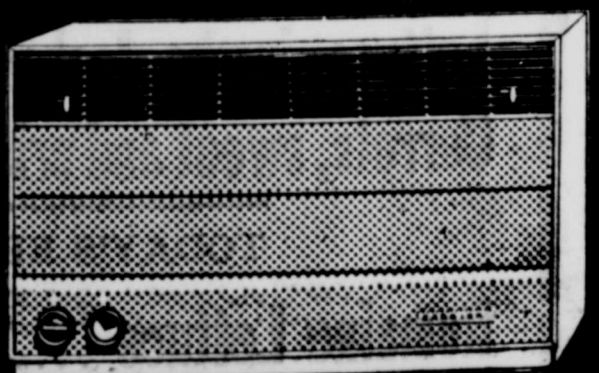

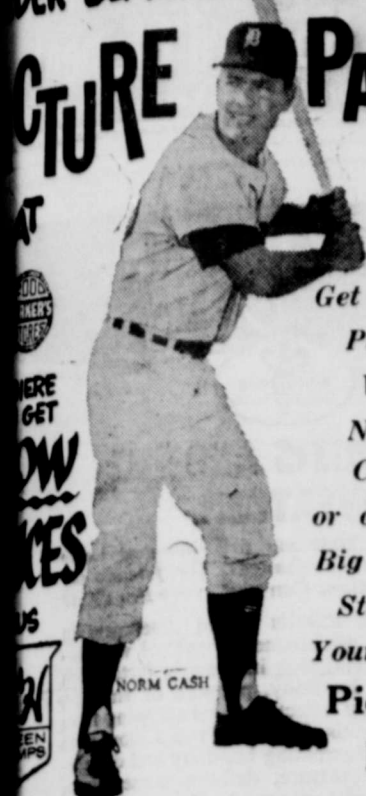

Medical Mirror

ARTHROSIS AND THE WEATHER

Q. I am sure that my arthritis gets worse when the weather changes. My friends say it's all imagination. Can you prove I'm right?

A. We can try. Results of an experiment in which complete environmental control was possible show that variation in a single factor such as temperature, humidity, pressure or air flow, did not materially affect patients suffering from rheumatoid arthritis. But when two factors were altered, such as increasing humidity and decreasing barometric pressure, definite worsening of arthritic symptoms occurred. It can be concluded from this that weather changes may well induce flareup of arthritic symptoms.

GLANDULAR FEVER

Q. What causes glandular fever? Can it be spread from one person to another?

A. The causative agent of glandular fever (the medical name is "infectious mononucleosis") is not definitely known but it is thought to be a virus which is transmitted from person to person by intimate oral contact (kissing).
