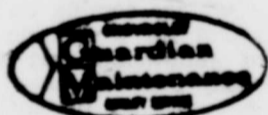

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

The most frequent question brought up by independent businessmen, according to the 300 man field force of the National Federation of Independent Business is how government has gotten into the position it is now in. The emphasis is on the heavy expenditures. This is a source of wonderment, it is reported.



It is difficult to isolate a single cause, but the biggest factor is that the Congress has let too much of its authority slip away from it.

Thus, perhaps in the larger sense, the responsibility goes right back on the people of these United States for not paying sufficient attention to Congress.

It is probably quite fruitless to expect any single man in the White House, regardless of who it is, to correct the existent evils. There is little possibility of the American people electing either a stupid man, or a rascal to that job, because there is no selection that is made with a more merciless glare of publicity, more deeper probing into a man's background, connections, than goes into the election to any major political office.

The real issue today is the people versus bureaucracy. This battle has defeated the people in many countries. The usual solution is that eventually a dictatorship is established.

to head the nation, and with dictatorial powers, bureaucracy can be chopped down.

The Founding Fathers of this nation expected Congress to take care of this chore, and it is a chore that must be continually attended to, otherwise, bureaucracy, like Johnson Grass, takes over everything.

Recently Congressman J. Arthur Younger of California gave an example of unbridled bureaucracy at work.

Last year, he says, the Interior Dept. set up a new bureau known as the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. It was set up with a budget of \$28,000 and 15 employees. In the fiscal 1963 budget it had grown to \$1,100,000 with 95 employees, and now in fiscal 1964, \$2,462,000 is wanted plus 218 employees.

This has all been done, Rep. Younger says, before Congress has given any approval to the whole idea in the first place.

Congress could, with little effort, recapture fiscal control of the government and hence avoid such flagrant abuses of the public purse.

But before this is done, Congress must have the feeling of assurance that the people are most conscious of what Congress is attempting to do.

Thus, perhaps in the final sense, responsibility for a fiscally sound government lies with the people themselves. If the people continue to neglect their responsibility as citizens, then perhaps they cannot point the finger at anyone.



### BRING BACK THE BOBBER

Some fishermen like to think they've "outgrown" the bobber. But this traditional symbol of barefoot lads has as much significance in the tackle boxes of experts as it does hitched to the cane pole of a beginner, say the fishing authorities at Mercury outboards.

They point out that a bobber can be extremely valuable to even the most proficient caster under certain conditions. Though it's a simple, inexpensive accessory, it extends the versatility of spinning and casting rigs when conventional techniques prove unequal to the task at hand.

A small transparent float can be used to convert a spinning rig for fly casting when fish are rising to the surface. Although not as satisfactory as a flyrod, this modified outfit gets you back into business during the feverish action of a "hatch."

When drift fishing over weed beds the use of a bobber allows you to keep your bait or light lure at the proper depth without continually "hanging up." It is also handy for slow trolling in shallow waters. You can fish with a long line, far back from any disturbance the boat makes. And it prevents the lure from sinking too deeply into the snags.

For many situations, repeat the Mercury folks, the bobber is indispensable. It definitely belongs among the array of equipment possessed by every angler. Instead of thinking you've outgrown it, use it. Bobbers have often "saved the day."

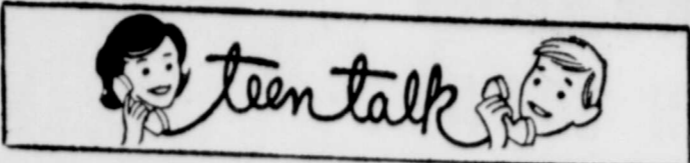

**BOATIQUE**

Boating, from dinky dinghies for large mud puddles to yummy yachts that go to sea, has become America's most popular outdoor sport.

So no matter where you live, in which of the fifty states, chances are you will go near the water this summer.

Whether the boat in your future is a raft or something really big and boss, etiquette afloat remains the same. If you're already familiar with boatiquette, skip this and turn to the sports page. If not, heed the hints and your day on the water will be nice as well as nautical.

First, keep in mind that whoever is at the tiller, wheel or oars is in command. What he (or she) says is not a request. It's an order. Change your seat, help with a line, hand him (her) a sweater—don't ask questions and do what's asked quickly. On the water, the majority doesn't rule, because the person in charge of the boat is responsible for the safety of everyone aboard.

Second, don't wear high heels or leather-soled shoes. High heels make holes that eventually become leaks; leather-soled shoes are too slippery for safety on a wet deck.

Third, do keep your wardrobe simple. You want to have fun, not put on a fashion show. Don't forget a plastic bag for carrying home your wet bathing suit, and a sweater for after sundown.

Fourth, bring plenty of sun tan oil as well as a hat for protection. If there isn't any shade, the captain can't grow a tree.

Fifth, save your questions for calm moments. And sixth, bring lots of good food. The gal with the tiniest appetite eats like a trencherman after a few hours at sea. And so will you. Bring gobs of goodies for between-meal munching, be-



cause hunger pangs are constant after a few hours on the water.

Gobs' Goodies, a date-and-nut fudge which takes a mere five minutes to make, are extra smooth because extra-creamy evaporated milk is used. Bake the fudge in foil pans to make the tote to the boat easy.

To make about two pounds of Gobs' Goodies, stir 1/2 cup (small can) undiluted Carnation evaporated milk, 1 1/2 cups sugar, and 1/2 teaspoon salt in saucepan. Heat to boiling, then cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Start timing when mixture begins to boil. Remove from heat. Add 1 1/2 cups (16 medium) diced marshmallows, 1 1/2 packages (6-ounce size) semisweet chocolate pieces, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 cup chopped dates, and 1/2 cup chopped walnuts. Stir 1 minute or until marshmallows and chocolate are melted and completely blended. Pour into buttered 9-inch square pan. Cool; cut in squares.

## News From The County Agent

The annual Wichita County Vegetable Show will be held at the 4-H Barn in Wichita Falls on Saturday, June 29. This show is sponsored by the Nurseryman's Association. Farmers and anyone with gardens are invited to exhibit all kinds of vegetables. Prize money and ribbons will be awarded. There will also be door prizes. The Nurserymen will have special displays. All vegetables are to be in place by 9:00 o'clock. This program is open to the public.

Farmers are urged to check their cotton weekly for cotton insects. Some thrips and fleahoppers are showing up in cotton fields.

As of May 1, 98 Texas Counties were modified certified brucellosis free. 9 were Type II control counties being tested. 16 had petitioned for or were proclaimed Type II counties, 26 were preparing for eradication and 11 were Type I control counties.

A constant summer problem of every dairy farmer is the control of flies. This problem can best be solved by eliminating the places where flies breed, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

For example, barnyard manure should be spread every three or four days to prevent flies from breeding in it. Manure can be stored in compost piles if it is treated chemically with equal parts of calcium cyanamid and superphosphate at the rate of one pound per bushel of manure.

Ground control (immediate treatment of all wounds regardless of cause) is of major importance in the screwworm eradication program at this time. County Agent B. T. Haws said today that it's that time of the year when screwworm cases normally begin a rapid increase and cautioned all livestock producers to be even more alert in their checking for possible worm cases.

The screwworm will be eradicated by your constant vigilance, Haws said. He advised livestock producers to treat every wound regardless of cause, including

those from castration, sheep and goat shearing, docking, dehorning, wire cuts, or others, with approved materials. These include EQ-335 or 5 percent Korlan as smears or 5 percent Co-Ral as a dust. These are recommended for use on all surgical cases, Haws said.

He listed the use of .25 (twenty-five hundredths) Co-Ral or .5 percent (five-tenths) Korlan as sprays for control of livestock pests.

Haws further suggested that all livestock be checked at least once a week and more often if practical for screw-

worm signs. He emphasized the need for even better reporting of worm cases and the importance of taking worm samples every infested wound. He brought onto the farm or

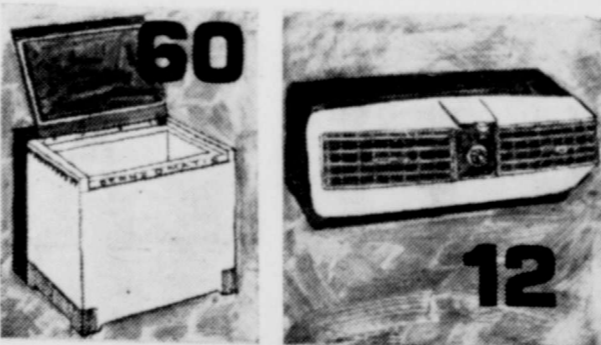

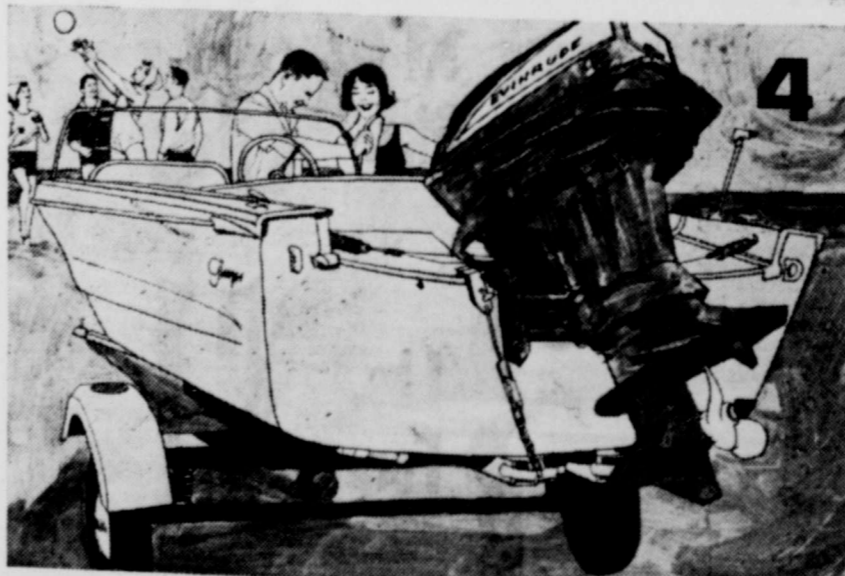

**Cool Off With Iced Tea**



Next to a dip in the pool or a visit to an air-conditioned movie, a tall glass of iced tea is just about the best summer cooler there is. It's a refresher that really quenches your thirst and, because it's so low in calories and cost, you can drink all you want, all the day long. To make a big family-size pitcherful use this easy open saucepan method.

**Iced Tea by the Pitcherful**

Bring 1 quart of freshly drawn cold water to a full rolling boil in a saucepan. Remove from the heat and immediately add 1/2 cup loose tea or 15 teabags. Stir and let stand for 5 minutes uncovered. Stir again and strain into a pitcher holding another quart of cold water. Or use the convenient instant teas, allowing about 4 tablespoons of the soluble powder to 2 quarts of cold tap water. Serve in ice-filled glasses with lemon and sugar to taste. Or serve it tropical style with fruit kabobs made by loading a swizzle stick or sipper with a cube of pineapple, a grape, a quarter slice of orange, a red cherry, a slice of lime and a strawberry.

Now let me give some simple rules regarding the purchase of such house lots. They are based on careful experience and apply whether you are speculating or buying for the purpose of settling on the land and some day bringing up a family. Every city has its best growth in some one direction — whether to the north, west, east or south. Often the direction is

toward the land highest in elevation. This is especially true if it is to the west facing the sunsets. Remember, too, that subdivisions which are near tenement districts or railroad tracks may not be as attractive as others. Personally, I made a mistake in buying land in Wellesley fifteen miles from Boston under the direct route of the airplanes leaving Boston for

New York and elsewhere. I made this mistake many years ago, but those looking for subdivisions now should take this problem into consideration. **What About Houses?**

I do not like houses as an investment unless they are duplex houses, where I can live in one half and rent the other half. As an investment I like something that does not need to be shingled or painted, and that does not have windows that break. Even a new house depreciates from the very day it is completed; but the land, if in a proper neighborhood, gradually increases in value. This is the reason for buying an extra lot adjoining the one on which you will live. Also buy the lot to the rear of your house.

When buying houses or land, recognize that all land and all houses are worth something, but the price should be considered according to the above suggestions. It will always be possible to build and buy new houses. The price will depend upon supply and demand, just as does the price of mortgages. There will sometimes be a shortage of houses and often a surplus of houses. There, however, will never be any more land on this globe. This is something to remember when you read articles on the coming "population explosion."

**Importance of Water**

The availability of fresh water is something to consider when buying house lots. The talk in the papers today regarding the "pollution" of water is very sound. This refers to the pollution of streams not only by waste from industrial companies, but also from the detergents which our womenfolks use every day and from the deadly chemical pesticides which are being sprayed in such profusion

throughout the nation. This latter is the subject of a very popular book entitled "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson. This book should be read especially by those who are thinking of buying land near a stream. Despite this, land adjoining good rivers should always be in demand — for homes, farming, and speculation.

I was born and brought up in Gloucester, Massachusetts, by the seashore, where the waves from the Atlantic Ocean dash up twice a day. This picture applies to the whole length of both our Atlantic and Pacific Seaboards. There never will be any more of it; hence, if possible, it is well to own some land as an investment on one or the other of these seacoasts. Let me close by emphasizing the importance of diversification. Do not put all your money in one thing — real estate, stocks, bonds, or bank accounts — and be especially cautious about investing in deteriorating houses.

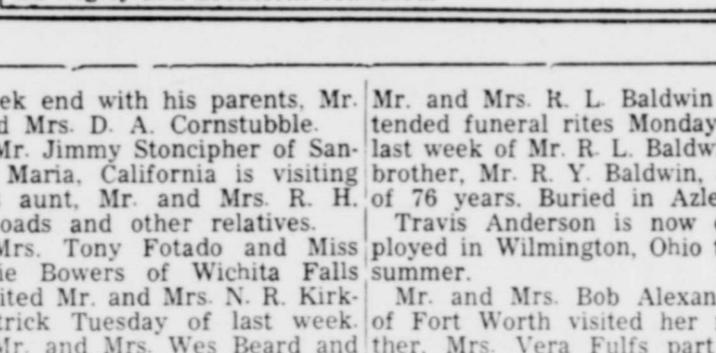

These dollars were collected through taxes, and so do not show up on the grocery store price tag, but they were there just the same. It appears that every person in the United States is paying \$3 or more every year for the political control of the sugar consumed.

Now something has happened to upset the politically-controlled production and the price is going up. So sugar is now a political issue, but we can not expect political inquiries to solve the problem. It can be resolved only by restoring to American farmers the right to employ their land to produce crops for American tables without political strangulation.

**Let's Correct It!**  
This is something we, the people must do for ourselves—and we can, if we compel action on the LIBERTY AMENDMENT. It is designed to outlaw such practices in sugar production as well as in other fields of private enterprise. The LIBERTY AMENDMENT, pending in Congress as H. J. Res. 23 and already approved by Wyoming, Texas, Nevada, Louisiana, Georgia and South Carolina, provides that:  
"Sec. 1. The Government of the United States shall not engage in any business, professional, commercial, financial or industrial enterprise except as specified in the Constitution."  
"Sec. 4. Congress shall not levy taxes on personal incomes, estates, and or gifts."

## Medical Mirror

EYE EXERCISES

Q. Both of my children are nearsighted (myopic). Would eye exercise improve this condition?

A. In some cases eye exercises seem to improve the ability to use the eyes and thus improve vision to a slight degree. However, nearsightedness (myopia) is an optical defect . . . the distance from the lens to the retina is too great. As a result, the image is formed in front of the retina, with resulting "fuzzy" vision. It's like a camera being out of focus. No amount of exercise will correct the physical defect which causes nearsightedness.

Q. Is a doctor required by law to treat a stranger who has been injured in a highway accident?

A. There may be a moral and ethical obligation to render first aid in such an emergency, but there is no legal requirement.
