"It's all over but the singing," was a comment heard in town Saturday morning, after the Burkburnett Bulldogs' third straight conference loss. But it's not over yet, and the Bulldogs are out to salvage what they can as they travel to Brownwood, Friday night, to do battle with the explosive Lions at 8:00 p. m.

The Lions have suffered two setbacks in conference action, one a 12-6 pasting at the hands of Stephenville in their district opener, and the other a 33-0 bombardment by the powerful Rider Raiders. Despite these two letdowns, the Lions refused to play dead. Just like in the Southwest Conference of College football, leaders are made to be beaten. So, last Friday, the Lions struck down the previously unbeaten Graham Steers, throwing the conference leadership into a tie between Graham and Rider.

Now, it's not at all impossible, for the Bulldogs to beat Brownwood, but highly improbable. They will have to generate something more than what they have thus far to do so. They must figure out a way to stop fleet fullback James Harris, halfbacks Bob Simons and Wayne Nichols, and the throwing arm of field general Jimmy Thomason. Left tackle Jimmy Freeland is a dandy kicker, going for field goals or extra points. Guard Alvie Cantwell is a tough customer, on the defensive line.

For the Bulldogs this will be a week of striving to correct mistakes and recover from injuries. Not too much is known yet as to how strong the home-towners will be Friday night when they take the field, but hope is that their attitude is right and "trial by error" pays off.

However, records speak for themselves, and there comes a time when common sense must prevail over loyalty. Ill have to ride the Lion express and pick Brownwood — by two touchdowns. Here's hoping I'm wrong.

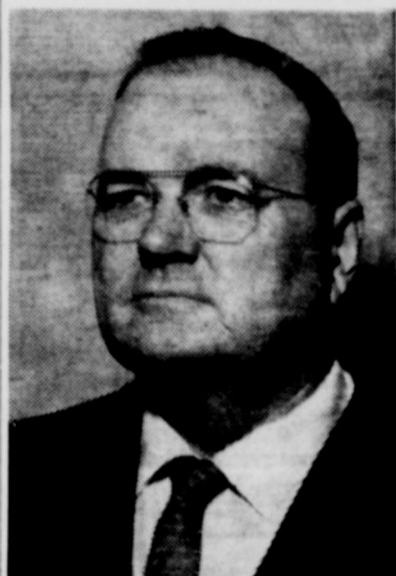
Ricky was rushed to Shepard Air Force Base hospital where his burns were treated and he was admitted to the hospital for treatment and observation.

Southside P.T.A. Association To Hold Meeting Nov. 18th

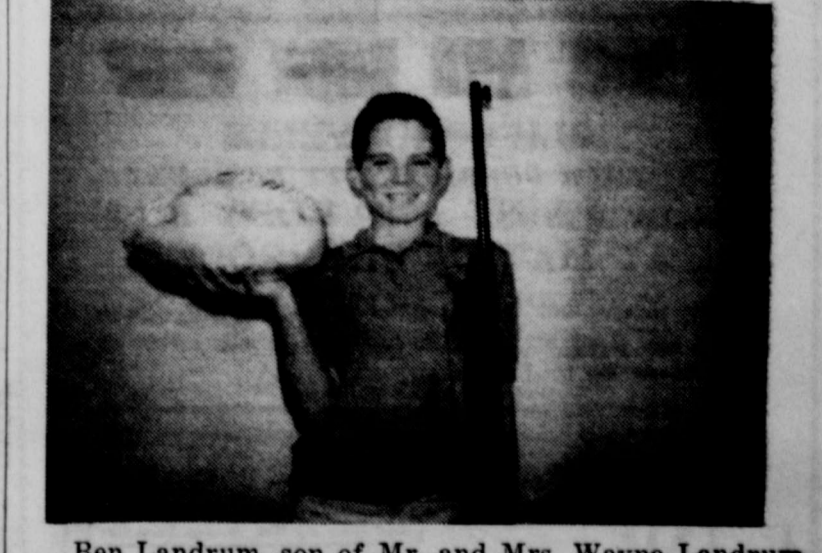

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Spreading An Empire

More and more taxpayers are beginning to wonder why the federal government should build tax-exempt power systems to serve "preference" customers—that is, those who are served by publicly-owned facilities—at cut rates because of tax freedom, when publicly regulated, taxpaying electric service is already available in the "preference" area.

Representative John P. Saylor of Pennsylvania recently voiced his belief that the territorial limitations of federal power projects should be determined by Congress rather than by interested bureaus, otherwise Congress could be by passed on vital issues.

This opinion followed the order of the Interior Department making Southern Idaho a part of the Bonneville public power complex. Mr. Saylor said this move would cost taxpayers \$5.5 million a year to save \$600,000 a year for some 19 "preference" power distributors in the area while Bonneville is already losing some \$15 to \$17 million a year. He pointed out that such extension of the Bonneville power marketing area can only be regarded as a spreading of the "federal power empire." He said it was accomplished by administrative fiat.

Various federal agencies have for years opposed construction of many investor-owned, publicly-regulated, taxpaying power projects which local companies seek to build. The federal, and local governments are deprived of tens of millions of tax dollars annually in order that "preference" customers of government-owned power plants may have tax exempt cut rates. Thus is the tax load increased for all taxpayers.

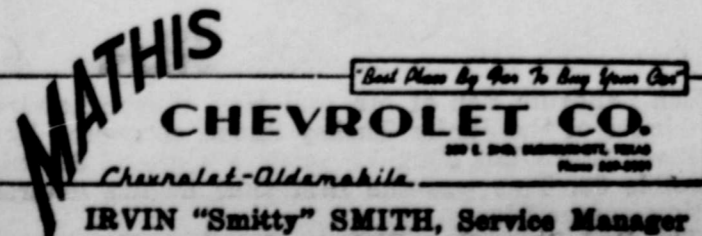

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

For a long time, the nation's independent business proprietors, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have requested Congress to take government out of private business.

Much has been accomplished, but inasmuch as government encroachment in private business to provide more and more jobs for more and more bureaucrats is a many-headed hydra, there are still many heads to be chopped before the final solution is reached.

A case at point is the practice of many federal agencies, and some states, to carry on their payrolls huge staffs of engineers. This has resulted in a decline in the use of private engineering firms, with a resultant heavy cost to the public.

At the present time the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Park Service, and many others have become "engineer happy."

No one so far can come up with the true figures on what this is costing the taxpayers.

Perhaps best insight into the appalling waste involved is the example of the mammoth California highway building programs, where figures and data do exist. Most of this is paid for, of course, by Federal grants.

In addition, the California highway department maintains a staff of engineers, using no private engineering firms. The

engineering costs are startling. The most recent year on which figures are available, 1957-58, \$213,083,112 worth of highway work was done in California. The engineering costs were \$41,052,749, or 23.95% of the total cost of the completed roads.

In the same period, using private engineering firms, the Texas Turnpike Authority built \$36 million worth of roads with an engineering cost of only 8.43% Illinois Toll Highway Commission almost \$290 million worth with engineering only 9.02%. New York almost \$800 million worth with engineering costing 9.62%, the Florida Turnpike Commission built \$43 million worth with an engineering cost of 7.85%.

The average, where states do not maintain the luxury of huge engineering staffs, is about 9%. Thus, the taxpayers to the State of California, as well as all taxpayers who contribute to the federal grants to California roads, pay 15% more to help maintain a huge California bureaucracy. In one year this amounted to over \$41 million.

Or to put it another way, for every 100 miles of highway built in Florida only 84 miles can be built in California.

With California finding this luxury so expensive, it causes shudders to even try to contemplate what the Federal government waste on engineering costs totals. But it all seems to follow a pattern. Socialize engineering, then take the next step. Eventually, everybody could be either on the government payroll, or relief, and the theme song in Washington will then be "I wonder where the taxpayer went?"

God hears and answers prayers, but not everyone knows how to pray. Even the Lord's disciples asked that he teach them how to pray.

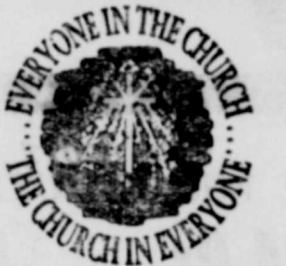

Give Thanks For Turkey



The juicy, golden-brown turkey on the holiday table is good reason to give thanks for the abundance of the season. With the addition of Ac'cent monosodium glutamate, your bird can be a paragon of good flavor. Ac'cent brings out all the sweet, delicate taste of the meat and makes it seem juicier, too. Shake it on the skin and inside the cavities—and be sure to use it in the stuffing and gravy, too. Allow about one-half pound ready-to-cook turkey per serving when purchasing the bird—and allow extra weight for seconds, sandwiches, and the incomparable turkey hash.

Holiday Turkey

Wash turkey in cold running water. Pat inside dry with paper towels; leave outside moist. Use 1/2 teaspoon Ac'cent per pound of turkey ready to stuff. Set aside half the total amount for the dressing and gravy; divide the remainder between skin and body cavities. Sprinkle cavities also with salt and pepper. Stuff turkey. Fasten neck skin to body with skewer. Push legs under band of skin at tail, or tie them to tail. Place turkey, breast side up, on rack in shallow open roasting pan. If desired, cover with a loose covering or "tent" of aluminum foil. Roast turkey in a slow oven (325° F.), according to weight. Cook the bird 3 1/2 to 4 hours for a 6 to 8-pound turkey; 4 to 4 1/2 hours for an 8 to 12-pound bird; 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 hours for a 12 to 16-pound bird; 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 hours for a 16 to 20-pound bird; 6 1/2 to 7 hours for a 20 to 24-pound bird.

It was decided that we shall give a Thanksgiving basket to a deserving family again this year.

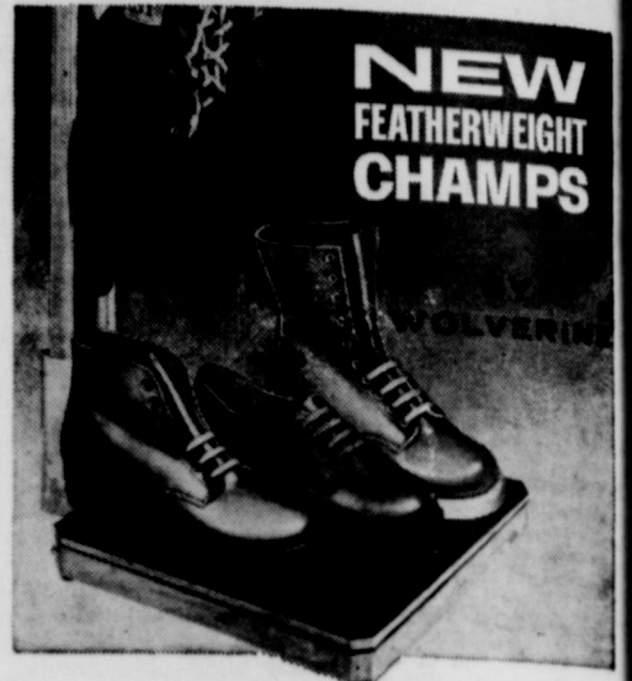

The system of justice rests on the "adversary" theory where both sides fight and duty to fight earnest for real stakes of the court can then bethe the merits of the

hears the other side speak. This is why a court may frown upon "friendly law suits" where two sides agree to go to court and get a decision interpreting an important legal question.

Without a real contest, the court may not see what a true adversary would make clear — that is, that there is another side to the question before the court, and that, perhaps the interests of many other people may be involved.

The other day one court threw out such a made-up law suit where a county in another state and a prospective county bond buyer had agreed to "test" the legality of some bonds in a friendly suit at the county's expense. One side would have pretended to put up a fight.

The courts go a long way to get real contests. They allow "friends of the court" (amicus curiae) to enter on one or both sides to fight in earnest.

In old Rome any passing stranger, or amicus curiae, might speak up to tell the court of a possible error it was making.

In America, the friend of the court often helps to point up the important issues.

For instance, a little known sect may print a religious tract or leaflet in some remote village. The constable may arrest one of its followers for "littering the streets." The fine may be a trifle, but the issue is big: Can any government unit, of whatever size, curb the freedom of the press or freedom

VETERANS Questions & Answers

Q—My husband was recently discharged from a VA hospital because of what the hospital said was "MHB." What does this mean?

A—The letters stand for "Maximum Hospital Benefit." This means that hospital officials believe that the patient's condition has improved to the point that additional time in the hospital would bring about no further improvement.

Q—When I enter a VA hospital next month, may I continue to draw my disability pension?

A—Veterans with dependents will not have their disability pensions reduced while in a VA hospital. Veterans without dependents who draw their pension under Public Law 21 will have it adjusted to \$30 per month at the end of the second full calendar month of hospitalization. At their discharge from the hospital the full pension will be resumed. Veterans without dependents who draw their pensions under the Old Pension Law will have it reduced at the end of six months to 50 per cent or \$30 whichever is the greater amount. The full amount will be resumed upon discharge from the hospital. Payments of amounts withheld under the Old Pension Law may be made on termination of hospitalization.

Q—Can a veteran obtain a GI loan to buy a home in Mexico?

A—No. The property must be located in the United States, its territories and possessions.

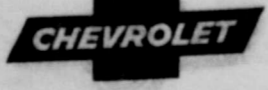

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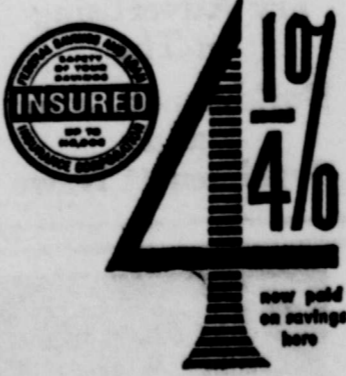
