## Sen. Hart Mislabeled His Bill

Congress, it seems, is to be asked by Michigan's Senator Hart and sundry do-gooding supporters to emulate the infamous Emperor Nero and fiddle while vital issues smolder—and while American housewives burn.

Mr. Hart dreamed up a measure that has been called the "Truth in Packaging Bill" which, in plain fact has nothing to do with truth and everything to do with Government control—regulation of the shapes and sizes and enforced drab uniformity of the packages in which the little woman may be allowed to buy foods, drugs and cosmetics.

Truth in packaging has already been taken care of. A manufacturer may now be hauled into court anywhere, anytime for putting 11 ounces of something into a package and labeling it 12, or making any other false claim on his label. Acres of office space are now being occupied by civil servants enforcing such laws.

Supporters of the bill (S-387) believe that the American housewife should buy on price alone. Even if she has shown her preference for convenience and attractiveness, for ingenious dual-purpose containers, these frills, say these theoreticians, are uneconomic (which isn't so, either) and should not be permitted. If a homemaker can buy more bug juice for her money in a jug with a cork in it, she shouldn't be allowed the luxury of a push button aerosol package.

Senator Hart and friends plainly do not trust us to know what is good for us. They do not think we are smart enough to get our money's worth without their help.

By the same token, they misjudge the concept of free enterprise by which American industry gained world leadership; and the force of competition—that has proved more effective than Government regulation in pressing values upward and prices down.

If the backers of the Hart Bill are right, then free elections are wrong. But most of us, we suspect will continue to prefer democracy in the polling booth—and in the market place.

## Take Time Out For Tea



AFTER A SERIES OF PARTIES with late hours and rich foods, set aside a few hours for a quiet get-together around your tea table. There's no happier way to spell hospitality and your friends will appreciate a leisurely afternoon lull with steaming cups of tea and a few simple refreshments. Tiny finger sandwiches, spread with softened cream cheese mixed with a little grated lemon rind or orange juice, are just right. So are thin slices of fruit or pound cake. Or make a two-layer white cake, cover with a fluffy white frosting and decorate with colorful chopped candied fruits.

Do be sure the tea you serve is freshly made and piping hot. The easiest way to make sure of this is to prepare a tea concentrate beforehand. Then at teatime you pour a little concentrate into the teacup and fill up with piping hot water. The usual proportions are one part of concentrate to 5 parts of water, though by varying the amount of the concentrate, you can vary the strength of the tea to suit all tastes.

### HOT TEA CONCENTRATE

Bring 1 1/2 quarts cold freshly drawn water to a full rolling boil. Remove from the heat and immediately add 1/4 pound loose tea. Stir to immerse leaves. Cover. Let stand 5 minutes. Strain into a teapot until ready to serve. This makes enough concentrate for 40 to 45 cups of tea.

### BABSON DISCUSSES INVESTMENTS FOR A YOUNG COUPLE

BABSON PARK, Mass. In a recent column, I outlined four divisions of study for youngsters at home on vacation from college and considering the "electives" for their next term. These were ENGLISH, SCIENCE, PHYSICAL HEALTH, and RELIGION (or FAITH). That column should be carefully retained for future reference.

This week, I wish to mention ten "investments" which a young couple who have finished high school, and perhaps college, should acquire:

(1) A FAMILY. Whether or not you get married is none of my business. If, however, you are married, your first investment should be a family. The cheapest and best time to begin this is when you are young.

(2) YOUR HOME. At the same time, it is important to locate your home in the right state. True, every one of our fifty states has its advantages and disadvantages; but it is most important that a young couple settle in a state suitable in climate, business opportunities, and probable growth. I cannot help individuals through correspondence; but this matter should be your main study, covering several months, before you definitely settle anywhere. Perhaps the Chamber of Commerce where you now live will help you with this. Personally, I like a comparatively small city showing considerable growth now.

(3) LIFE INSURANCE. After starting a family and getting located, you should take out life insurance. Take it out when you are young, for several reasons — you can get a low premium, and you need it most then. I think a twenty-year straight life policy is probably the best for you. Premiums would naturally be payable for twenty years, but with no more payments necessary after that. On the other hand, if you should die soon after the policy is taken out, your beneficiaries would receive payment in full. Later, you may want to change from straight twenty-year life to an endowment or some other fancy policy, but not for your first one.

(4) FURTHER TRAINING. By this time, you and your wife should have decided what you are best fitted for — whether it is a clerk, an engineer, or a salesman. Or, you may be best fitted for agriculture. Once you have decided, get all the training you can in that field.

(5) EDUCATION OF CHILDREN. I believe in savings bank accounts; every family should deposit at least 5% of their income in the savings bank for the education of their

children. If you start when the children are young, it is surprising how savings accounts will grow with only a small but regular deposit. Once when I asked Thomas A. Edison who was the greatest inventor, he replied: "The man who invented Compound Interest was no slouch."

(6) CHURCH AFFILIATION. The young couple who is trying to get along without active participation in some church is making a great mistake. I am not appealing for any special denomination; but the denomination in which you were brought up probably has a church near you. Be not content merely to attend it, but take an active part in its welfare, and have your children attend its Sunday School.

(7) CHILD DEVELOPMENT. Carefully watch your children develop. Do not try to make them follow some line that you and your wife want them to follow. Probably each child inherited some trait from some ancestor. Although they may be brothers, children can be entirely different in the traits they have inherited.

(8) EARLY COMPANIONS.

You can "select" your children's playmates and friends as they grow up. This is something which is very important and should be carefully studied and watched.

(9) HOME INFLUENCE. Instead of letting your children go out to too many parties in other homes, encourage them to have parties in their own home where you can largely determine who should be invited. But do not be too rigid about it.

(10) GUIDANCE. Experience teaches me that money spent GUIDING your children will be well invested; but this must be done very carefully without trying to force them into any

definite social group of any line of endeavor. In short, your most important investment will be the TIME and THOUGHT given to your children... and NOT MONEY! Your children's love or interest or friendships cannot be bought.

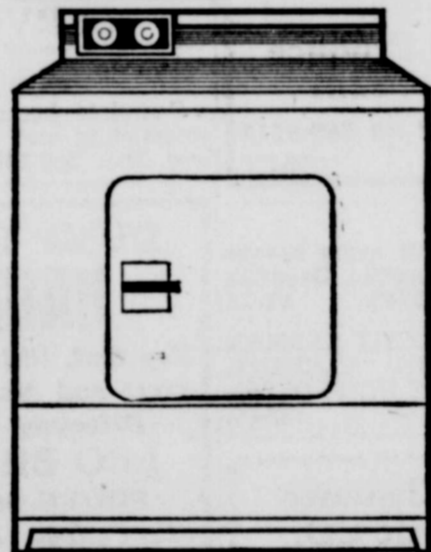

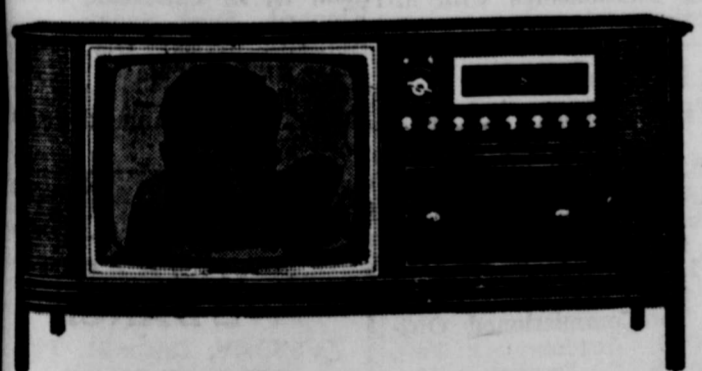
