**Eubanks Accepts

**Land Bank Reduces Rates  
To 11.25 On Farm Loans**

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11.25 percent on farm loans and 11.75 percent on farm-related business and rural residence loans, said James R. Isenhower, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman.

These rates becomes effective January 1, 1983.

"The Land Bank's objective is to provide credit to Texas agriculture at the lowest possible cost, consistent with sound business practices," said Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas in Austin.

"For over two years the Bank's average

cost of funds consistently has been higher than the loan rate," Benson continued. "However, for the past four months, we have begun to see a decline in bond costs.

"As a result of this decline, we are able to reduce the Bank's loan interest rate," he said. "We hope that the decline in bond interest rates will continue, allowing us to make further reductions in the loan rate."

The Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman makes long-term real estate loans on farm and rural residence property in the counties of Coleman and Callahan.

Claims Life Of Weatherford Man**

Jack Cronkite, 54, of Weatherford, died Thursday at 4 A.M. from injuries he received when his pickup was struck by a car driven by Mozelle Akins of Odessa, Wednesday at noon about 1½ miles from here on I-20.

Mrs. Akins and her husband Carl were enroute to Carrollton, Texas to spend the Christmas holidays with their daughter, when she lost control of her car when she swerved to miss a hitch-

hiker that stepped out into the roadway.

EMT personnel and law enforcement officers work close to an hour trying to remove Mr. Cronkite from the overturned pickup. He was then transported to Hendrick Medical Center where he underwent surgery. He suffered internal injuries and leg fractures in the accident.

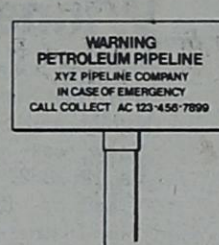

When you see signs like those shown above, they tell you that there's a pipeline nearby. If it's underground, you can't see it, of course. But it's there, working quietly to provide energy for you and other consumers throughout this nation.

Some of these signs list the commodity transported in the pipeline, the name of the operator, and a telephone number where the operator's representative can be reached at all times.

Although pipelines have an exceptionally good safety record, once in a while a leak can occur. Indications of a leak might include:

- A strange or unusual odor in the vicinity of a pipeline.
- A hissing or roaring sound (caused by petroleum or product escaping from a pipeline).
- A dense white cloud or fog.
- A spot of dead or discolored vegetation.
- An accumulation of petroleum

- Avoid creating sparks or sources of heat which could cause the liquids or vapor to ignite and burn. If you find yourself in a suspected vapor area, do not light a match, start an engine or even switch on an electric light.
- Notify the pipeline operator as soon as you reach a safe area. Call collect. Give your name, a description of the leak and its location. If you do not know who the pipeline operator is, call your local fire, police or sheriff's department, or the state police. Advise them of the nature and location of the emergency.

If you see someone digging near a pipeline or doing other construction work... or if you plan to do such work near a pipeline yourself... please call the telephone number shown on the sign and let the pipeline company know so damage can be avoided. It's in your interest... and the nation's.

# 1982 Report On Callahan County Activities

As 1982 comes to a close, we look back and take inventory of what has transpired in our County. We have had both pleasant and unpleasant occurrences.

On a pleasant note, the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show in Cross Plains was a real success. A lot of work went on by a lot of different groups and individuals to make this such a great show. We are certainly fortunate in our County to have the calibre of Agriculture teachers and County Extension Agent helping us train and set christian examples for our school children. We appreciate them and I know you do. A special thanks go to the men that donated their time, material and talents for the addition to the west side of the show barn. This addition is certainly helpful during show time.

The 66th Legislature in 1979 by one vote on the last day of that session passed Senate Bill 621. This law requires that all taxing entities re-appraise all real and personal property. This is never a pleasant task but we hope it will soon be completed.

In February the Jail Inspector for the State Jail Standards Commission inspected the Callahan County Jail. They put us on notice for non-compliance. Sheriff Skinner, Commissioner Shackelford and I met before the Commission in Austin. The Commission granted several variances on non-compliance items and with quite a bit of expense and added ad-

ditions we were allowed to continue to utilize our jail.

Rural Hospital Management Inc., the Lessee of the County Hospital gave us written notice they were terminating their lease on September 15. We contacted many hospital leasing and Management Companies and on October 1, the United Hospital, Inc., of Memphis, Tennessee assumed control of the hospital by lease. The Firm seems to be doing a good job from all reports and observation. The citizens of our County are certainly supporting the hospital.

It seems every year we have someone murdered. This year was no exception. We had a lady and her daughter killed in the southwest part of the County. The person responsible for the crime was apprehended and convicted and is now serving a life term in the State Penitentiary.

This year, being an election year created little interest until the General Election in November. Then our people came through and were well represented at the polls in this election.

The courthouse employees were saddened this year with the death of Mr. Bonnie Thompson. Bonnie had been custodian of the courthouse for over forty years. We all certainly miss him.

As 1983 approaches we wish for all of you a good, safe and enjoyable year.

# County Shows Increase In Sales In 1982

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday sent \$42.1 million to 973 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for December.

The 1982 statewide total is up 8.8 percent over the 1981 year-end total. This payment reflects taxable sales made in October and reported to the state by the end of November.

Towns in Callahan County received checks totaling \$8,736,800: Baird, \$1,088,800; Clyde, \$2,655,450; Cross Plains, \$4,459,780; and Putnam, \$532,770.

Yearly totals for each town was: Baird, \$28,541,080; Clyde, \$67,175,140; Cross Plains, \$75,711,840; and Putnam, \$13,304,350; totaling 184,732,410 for the County. This is an increase of 12.17% over last year's total.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

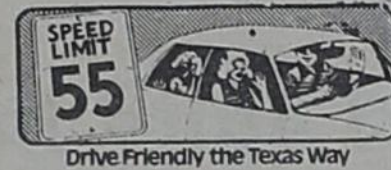

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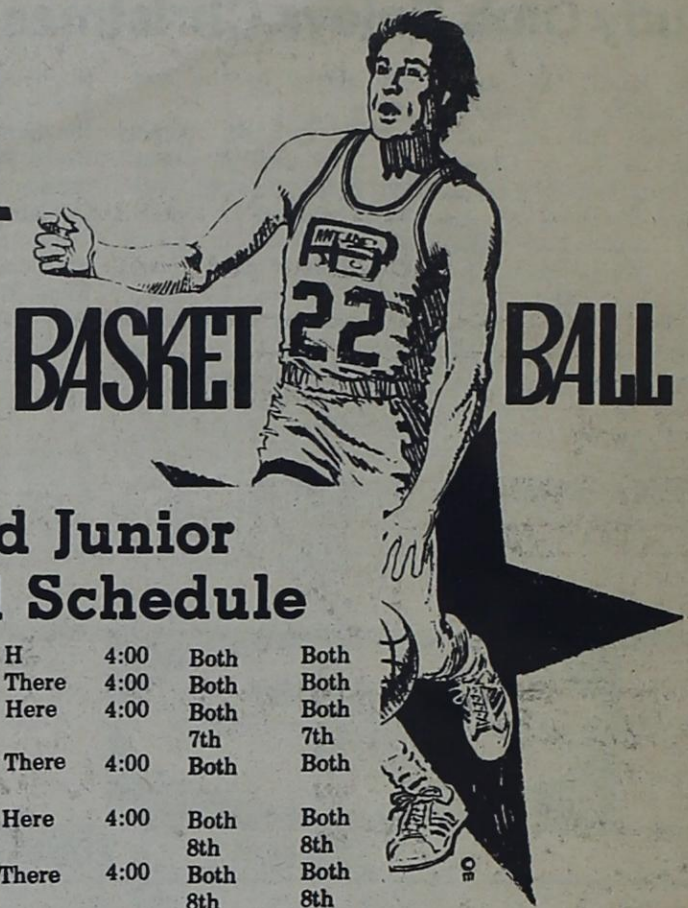
