WASTE OF GOOD MONEY

Last December, former President Eisenhower made a speech in which he recommended that Rural Electrification Administration expenditures be cut back or eliminated. This constructive proposal brought a strong endorsement from the Daily Record of Stroudsburg, Pa.

It pointed out that the REA was established back in the depression days to finance power service to rural areas which did not then have it for one reason or another. The interest rate on the loans was set at two per cent — which is about half of what the Treasury must pay on its long-term borrowings. Then the Record said: "The private enterprise, public utility companies which serve most of the nation have now reached into just about every corner of the nation are of course in competition with these government-subsidized electrification agencies. Federal help in this area is no longer necessary. Federal competition is a waste of good money."

"President Eisenhower's suggestion should be heeded in Washington by President Johnson while he is in an economizing mood and looking for ways to cut the federal budget.

It can be added that REA co-ops, using their taxpayer-supported financial advantages, have been trying to move into suburban and industrial service area which have no connection whatsoever with rural electrification. It certainly is time that a halt be called.

STILL VALID

As everyone knows, the Administration is giving the medicare plan top priority. Unfortunately, this highly controversial proposal is charged with emotion. Then, to make a bad matter worse, it is doubtful if any but a small fraction of the people — including those over 65 whom medicare is supposed to benefit — have any knowledge of the problems it would create.

Some time ago, Chairman Mills of the House Ways and Means Committee pointed out that hospital costs will continue to rise and that this will require increases in the amount of earnings taxable for social security, to which medicare would be attached. Then Congress would be faced with two alternatives: 1. To go along with a total social security program "which we would know was actually unsound," or 2. To commit itself "into the indefinite future to a steady but wholly uncontrolled increase, due to the hospital part of the program, in the amount of wages taxed for social security purposes."

We might have to accept one of those unhappy alternatives if medicare were the only way to meet the health needs of the aged. But the fact is that existing programs, public and private, are doing an ever-improving job in this area. The Kerr-Mills Act, providing aid under a federal-state plan for the needy, is liberal and broad—much broader, in truth, than medicare, which is essentially only a limited hospital and nursing-home program.

Medicare, finally, would threaten the very solvency of the social security system. Its costs, in all probability, would be far greater than the optimistic estimates of its supporters. The considerations which caused Congress to refuse to approve it in the past are more valid and compelling than ever with continued inflation staring us in the face.

Family Converted Carport To Gain New Living Space

When cars and kids vie for space in an overcrowded home, the kids usually win. As a result, one of the most popular remodeling projects is converting a garage or carport to living space.

That's what the Arthur Jappes of Centerreach, N.Y., did when their youngest child reached his teens. With five children and two adults living in a three-bedroom home, something had to give.

Since the Jappes' lot isn't large, their seldom-used carport was the likeliest spot for expansion, especially since it was already completely roofed.

The Jappes turned the project over to Danark Associates, Inc., a local remodeling firm. The result was a 12 x 27½-foot oak-paneled room that doubles as family room and sleeping quarters for their son.

To add extra space without making basic structural changes, the front wall of the addition was bowed out. A group of three

wood windows in the front wall—a central fixed unit flanked by two double-hung windows—provides light and adds architectural interest. Three more double-hung wood windows along the side wall insure a cheerful atmosphere and adequate ventilation.

All the windows are stock units, factory-made of ponderosa pine. The stock windows, which came from the local building materials dealer completely weatherstripped and ready to be installed, helped keep carpentry costs down.

The exterior facing material on the new addition is pre-finished white mineral fiber, similar in appearance to the siding on the older part of the house. The Jappes chose mineral fiber siding because its acrylic finish will last for years without painting.

The Jappes' house cost \$13,500 eight years ago. Today they estimate its resale value at about \$17,500. The recent remodeling cost about \$2,500.

Big "Breakthrough" Expected Soon At Major Post Offices

Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman said today he has received word from Postmaster General John T. Gronouski in Washington, D. C. that a big "breakthrough" has now been made on electronic machines to read Zip-coded addresses on mail.

The Postmaster General said he expects to begin installing these sophisticated new machines in major post offices starting in about a year, the postmaster explained.

The Burkburnett postmaster said each machine will be able to sort, as well as read, at the rate of 35,000 letters an hour. The offices to get the address readers have not been announced, but the local postmaster said they will have significant effects on the mail in and out of each community regardless of whether it gets the new machines.

This is because they will speed incoming mail to smaller offices from major cities and step up the dispatch of mail deposited in smaller communities but which must be processed enroute at major mail massing points.

The postmaster emphasized, however, introduction of the "seeing eye" device next year does not mean Zip Code isn't useful already. "ZIP Code," he explained is important in mail handling under the system of mail processing already in use which will continue to be in use as the basic system at most points.

These machines will be just another step — in conjunction with the mechanical mail sorting machines we have developed—to help keep pace with the growing volumes of mail. Neither will the machines endanger jobs—they will only help us meet mail expansion with minimum manpower expansion.

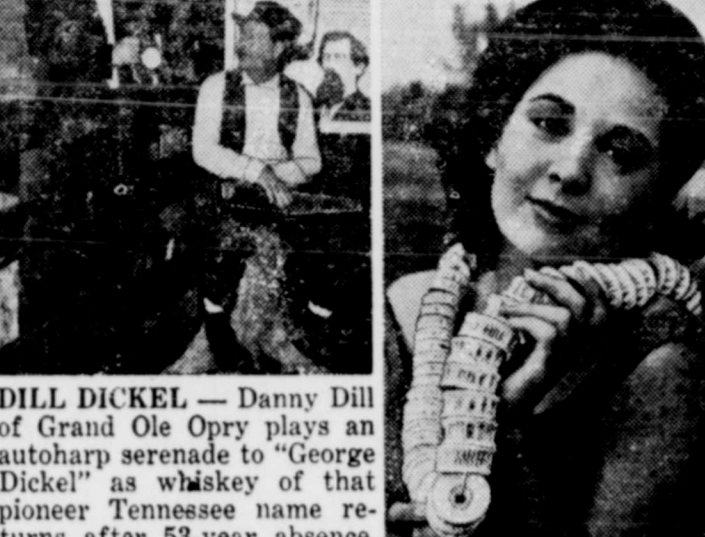

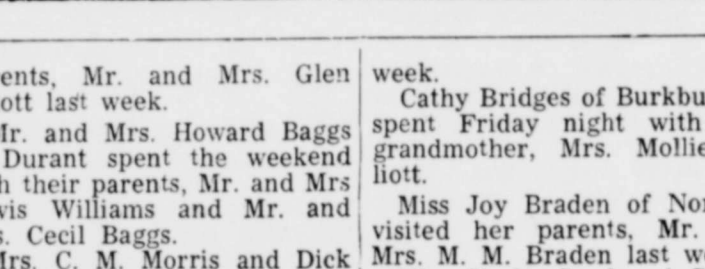
