Last December, former President Eisenhower made a speech in which he recommended that Rural Electrification Administration expenditures be cut back or eliminated. This constructive proposal brought a strong endorsement from the Daily Record of Stroudsburg, Pa.

It pointed out that the REA was established back in the depression days to finance power service to rural areas which did not then have it for one reason or another. The interest rate on the loans was set at two per cent - which is about half of what the Treasury must pay on its long-term borrowings. Then the Record said: "The private enterprise, public utility companies which serve most of the nation have now reached into just about and Means Committee pointed out that hospital costs will every corner of the nation are of course in competition with these government-subsidized electrification agencies. "Federal help in this area is no longer necessary.

# STILL VALID

As everyone knows, the Administration is giving the medicare plan top priority. Unfortunately, this highly controversial proposal is charged with emotion. Then, to make a bad matter worse, it is doubtful if any but a small fraction of the people - including those over 65 whom medicare is supposed to benefit - have any knowledge of the problems it would create.

Some time ago, Chairman Mills of the House Ways continue to rise and that this will require increases in the amount of earnings taxable for social security, to which medicare would be attached. Then Congress would be faced with two alternatives: 1. To go along with a total "President Eisenhower's suggestion should be heeded social security program "which we would know was ac-Vashington by President Johnson while he is in an tually unsound," or 2. To commit itself "into the indifinite future to a steady but wholly uncontrolled increase, due to the hospital part of the program, in the amount of wages taxed for social security purposes."

We might have to accept one of those unhappy alternatives if medicare were the only way to meet the health needs of the aged. But the fact is that existing programs, public and private, are doing an ever-improving job in this area. The Kerr-Mills Act, providing aid under a federal-state plan for the needy, is liberal and broad-much broader, in truth, than medicare, which is essentially only a limiteed hospital and nursing-home program.

Medicare, finally, would threaten the very solvency of the social security system. Its costs, in all probability, would be far greater than the optimistic estimates of its supporters. The considerations which caused Congress to refuse to approve it in the past are more valid and compelling than ever with continued inflation staring us in

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





Between two and three thousand have fled to the United States and South America. Many of them prefessional people whom Cuba could ill afford to lose.

The public schools teach Communism and atheism — at one time 2,000 school children were sent to Russia to be educated. Because money for any purpose can not be sent to Cuba, mission work has been slowed down, churches have been closed but members meet in homes for prayer and Bible studies. Only two American missionary families now remain here but more than 160 Cuban Baptist workers are on the field and trying to keep open 87 churches and 125 missions

Besides the work done by the churches the Cuban Baptist Convention has a Home for the Aged, A Baptist Hospital, A Seminary and a Baptist Student Union.

Government troops are some times sent to break up revival meeting and when one of the churches was ordered closed, a filthy garbage truck was sent to carry off the pulpit, benches and hymnals. The Home Mission board ministers to the Cuban refuges in our own coun-We must seek to share Christian love and friendship with them. We must pray for their salvation and witness to them of the sacrificial love of Christ; We must befriend the friendless; We must examine our own hearts to see if we have done all we can to make availble to them the blessings



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
