### Boy's Heroic Act Praised By Burk Pastor

Rev. Roy Oakley of Burk Burnett, a Baptist evangelist, Monday night paid tribute to 10-year old Johnny Wayne Golson of Devo, Okla., who was credited with saving the lives of his four younger sisters Sunday when the family home caught fire. Johnny's father, Henry Clay Golson was at work and his mother was in Oklahoma City with the oldest brother, Joe A. Golson, who was in the hospital. The home caught fire at 4 p. m. Sunday, according to Rev. Oakley. Johnny led them from the home, put them in the family car and drove to the nearest neighbor for help. The car had failed to start early Sunday morning, Rev. Oakley said, but it started for the boy. Johnny's sisters are Daria Fern, 10; Patsy Lou, 9; Lawane Kay, 6; and Donna Laverne, 4. Another brother Robert, 7, was visiting a neighbor at the time of the fire. The family home burned to the ground and the Golsons lost all their possessions with the exception of the family car and the clothes each was wearing, Rev. Oakley said. Rev. ## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

WAYZATA, MINN., HERALD: "The sale of this newspaper . . . terminates my tenure of responsibility for these editorial columns, a tenure that spans almost thirty years. . . . WALDOBORO, ME., PRESS: "The eternal inconsistency of government! Most states pay for care of blind and deaf children, but charge parents of mentally retarded children over \$1,500 per year. On top of that, the federal government only allows a deduction of \$600 for that same child."

LOUIS, MO., LABOR TRIBUNE: "Minorities with grievances have gained infinitely greater redress by taking their causes to our courts than by mass protestations when they themselves violate the law by their violence, as has happened so often during the past year and in the process they create a climate of hatred and intransigence that never existed before."

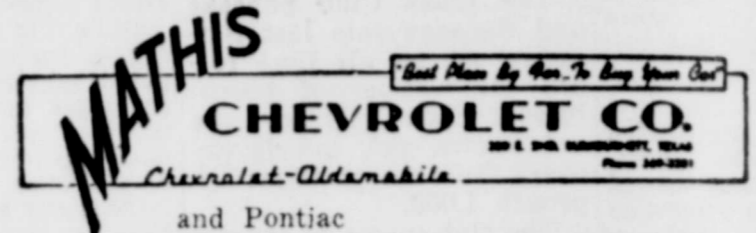

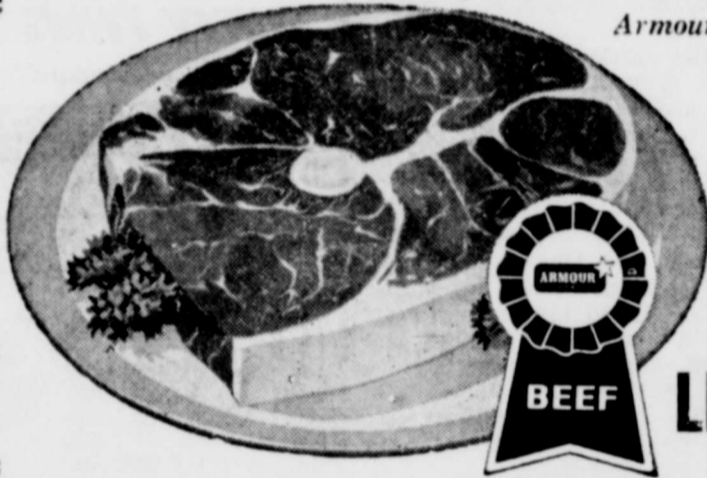

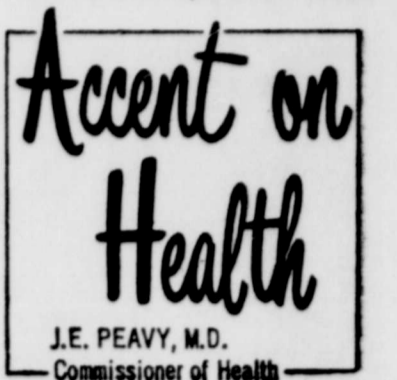
### CITY OF BURKBURNETT SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE NO. 290

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE PLATTING AND REPLATTING OF LAND INTO SUBDIVISIONS SITUATED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT AND WITHIN ONE MILE THEREOF; SETTING FORTH THE TITLE AND PURPOSE OF THE ORDINANCE; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS; PROHIBITING NON-CONFORMING SUBDIVISIONS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; ESTABLISHING PROCEDURE AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR PLATS; PROVIDING FOR FILING FEES; ESTABLISHING MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR PRELIMINARY PLATS AND FINAL PLATS; REQUIRING CERTAIN IMPROVEMENTS PRIOR TO ACCEPTANCE OF FINAL PLAT OR GUARANTEES IN LIEU THEREOF; ESTABLISHING GENERAL SUBDIVISION DESIGN PROVISIONS FOR STREETS, STREET SIGNS, SIDEWALKS, BLOCKS, LOTS, PARK, AND SCHOOL SITES; PROVIDING FOR APPROVAL OF FINAL PLAT BY SECTIONS; REQUIRING A TWO YEAR MAINTENANCE BOND FOR FACILITIES; ESTABLISHING REQUIREMENTS FOR REPLATTING; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; ALLOWING CERTAIN VARIANCES; SETTING FORTH PROCEDURE FOR RECORDING FINAL PLAT; PROVIDING SEPARABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY OF A FINE NOT TO EXCEED \$200.00 FOR EACH VIOLATION; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; EFFECTIVE DATE AND ADOPTION.

#### PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, THERE ARE NOW NO ADEQUATE RULES AND REGULATIONS IN FORCE IN THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT GOVERNING THE PLATTING OF LAND INTO SUBDIVISIONS OR REPLATTING OF SUBDIVISIONS IN THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, AND WITHIN A DISTANCE OF ONE MILE OF THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, AND REQUIRING PLATS OF LAND INTO SUBDIVISIONS AND REPLATS OF SUBDIVISIONS TO CONFORM TO SUCH RULES AND REGULATIONS, THERE EXISTS AN URGENT AND IMPORTANT NECESSITY FOR SUCH RULES AND REGULATIONS OWING TO THE EXPANSION OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT AND THE INCREASING NUMBER OF PLATS OF SUBDIVISIONS AND REPLATS OF SUBDIVISIONS IN THIS CITY AND ADJACENT AREAS, AND WHEREAS, THE NECESSITY OF SUCH RULES AND REGULATIONS ARE IMPERATIVE FOR THE IMMEDIATE PROTECTION OF THE GENERAL HEALTH, SAFETY, PROPERTY AND GENERAL WELFARE, AND TO INSURE THE SAFE, ORDERLY, HEALTHFUL, ECONOMIC GROWTH AND ELIMINATION OF THE POSSIBILITIES OF ALL CONDITIONS WHICH ARE CONDUCTIVE TO OR CREATE BLIGHT, ED OR SLUM AREAS WITHIN OR NEAR THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF SAID CITY, IN THAT PLATTING OF LAND INTO SUBDIVISIONS OR REPLATTING SUBDIVISIONS IN ACCORD WITH THE RULES AND REGULATIONS HEREIN MADE KNOWN WILL ABATE CONGESTION IN PROPOSED THOROUGHFARES WILL PREVENT OVERCROWDING OF LAND, WILL AID IN PREVENTING THE UNDUE CONCENTRATION OF POPULATION, WILL PROVIDE ADEQUATE LIGHT AND AIR SPACE FOR THE POPULATED AREAS AND WILL GUARANTEE THE SUFFICIENT PROVISIONS OF WATER POWER, SEWAGE AND OTHER UTILITIES, PARKS, SCHOOL AREAS AND OTHER PUBLIC REQUIREMENTS; ARTICLE X EFFECTIVE DATE EMERGENCY CLAUSE. The winter killer—Carbon monoxide—takes its toll of lives about this time each year in Texas.

You, too, may be flirting with carbon monoxide poisoning if you make a habit of any of these practices.

Do you drive around in your auto on cold winter days with all windows and vents tightly closed?

Do you sometimes warmup the car engine in your garage without first opening the garage door?

Do you neglect a checkup of exhaust and manifold on your car unless something starts rattling or falls off?

If your answer to any of these questions is "Yes", you are asking for trouble.

Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless, tasteless gas that comes from your auto exhaust. In the open air it usually is dissipated without harm to anyone. But in an enclosed space it can be deadly.

Each winter brings reports of deaths from carbon monoxide poisoning. The gas can seep up through the floor boards from a leaky exhaust. The victim becomes drowsy and then falls asleep. It takes only a short time for an engine running in a closed garage to fill the building with deadly gas.

No one knows how many accidents are caused by motorists whose reaction time is somewhat slowed by a small seepage of carbon monoxide into a closed auto. If your exhaust and manifold are in good shape and fitted tightly, you are more likely safe. But it's even safer to leave a rear window open a crack.

While the car is moving you can escape danger even with a leaky exhaust.

The most dangerous time comes sitting in a parked car with the motor running and the windows closed. This is a frequent occurrence in cold weather when the auto heater is turned on. Always open a window when you're parked with the motor running.

Carbon monoxide poisoning is a serious health hazard. Remind yourself and your family to be on the alert against this danger.

#### Peel Off Paint

Camouflage your aluminum boat by spraying it with surfacing paints used to line professional spraying rooms. Then paint camouflage over this film. At season's end, just peel under surface away. Any auto body shop can tell you where to get

**The Children's Corner . . .**

**SEED NECKLACES**



Chris is making a seed necklace like the one around her neck. She is using sunflower and red kidney bean seeds which make a red and black and white necklace for her white blouse.

There are many different kinds of seeds that can be strung into necklaces. Watermelon seeds make a pretty black necklace and pumpkin seeds a cream colored one.

But Chris is using sunflower seeds and kidney beans because it is winter time and both of these are easy to buy from a store. The only trouble is that they are so dry they have to be soaked in water to soften them in order to stick a needle through them. This soaking isn't needed when seeds are freshly gathered from the garden.

Chris soaks a few at a time of each kind of seed in a saucer and meanwhile strings those already soaked. She is using ordinary sewing thread, such as you'll find in Mother's work basket, and has doubled it for greater strength after threading it through her needle.

First Chris threads on 20 sunflower seeds, sticking the needle through the middle of a flat side of each seed. Then she threads on one red kidney bean seed, but with this seed she pushes the needle through from one end to the other.

You'll see a completed necklace using the same two kinds of seeds around Chris' neck. The materials for these necklaces are easy to find -- just needle (not too fine, but very sharp), thread, scissors and seeds. If YOU wear one of these necklaces to school, every one of your friends will want one too.

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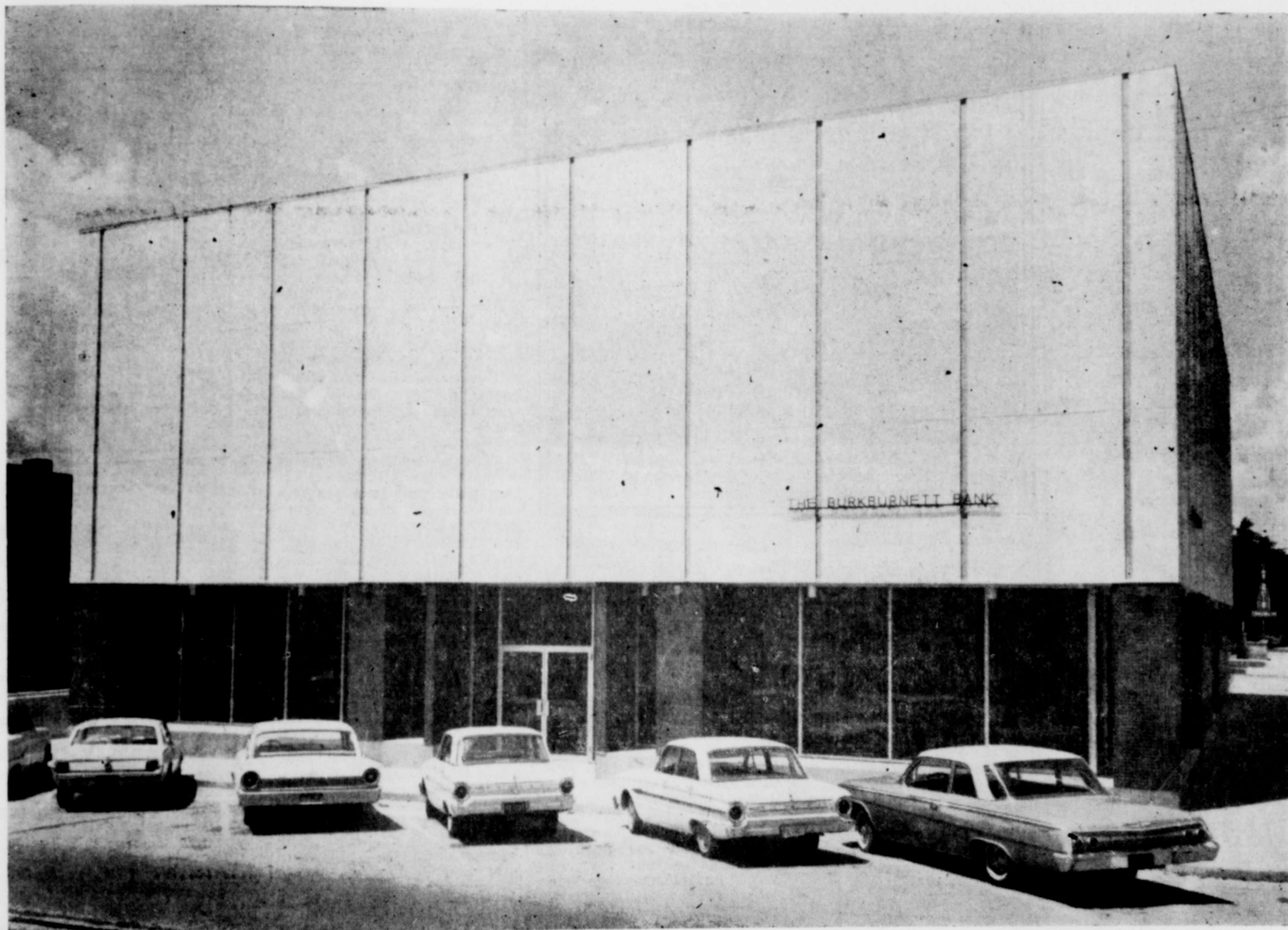
