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GRASS ROOTS OPINION

ROSHOLT, S. D., REVIEW: "We doubt whether Congress overwhelmingly liberal as it is, will knuckle to the demands of the big union to repeal right-to-work laws, and forcing people to join labor unions if they want a job. If they can make this stick, then it would be logical to assume that every individual could be compelled to join a particular religion or a particular political party. Is this the kind of infringement upon an individual's freedom of association, freedom of choice that most Americans want? We certainly would say it is incompatible with a free society."

BEVERLY, MASS., TIMES: "Real equality will come only when the American Negro is given a chance to vote. This is only the answer to the dilemma of civil rights. And the sooner Congress can solve it the better."

CORRIGAN, TEXAS, TIMES: "Don't feel left out if the government hasn't yet got around to building you a house, paying you for not growing something, or providing a guaranteed wage. The latest idea to pay rent for those not poor enough to get in a housing project and too poor to pay regular rent. A lot of us ought to qualify."

STORM LAKE IOWA, PILOT-TRIBUNE: "Various resolutions have been introduced in the Senate and House at Washington calling for a constitutional amendment to overturn the Supreme Court's decision on State legislative apportionment. Write your senators and congressmen supporting such a measure, which would allow a state to apportion one branch of the legislature on some basis other than population."

HAVANA, ILL., DEMOCRAT: "...In Britain where its socialized medicine was figured at under 200 million pounds a year. The cost for the first year alone was more than twice as much, and the French social security system, according to government announcement, is tottering on the brink of disaster. Why? Because, like Medicare, too many people recognize it as a 'good thing' who ordinarily can afford to take care of their own hospital obligations. The Eldercare program limits benefits to only those who cannot afford to pay for costly health care and therefore is a much sounder financial bill than Medicare. It is our hope the administration wakes up and smells the coffee."

SCOTTSVILLE, KY., NEWS: "The myth that the federal government's urban renewal program has been responsible for improvement in cities has been explored by an expert in the rehabilitation of heavy populated areas. Dr. Martin Anderson of the Graduate School of Business, Columbia University, in a recent speech, declared that it was private enterprise that has succeeded in renewing our cities while the high-cost urban renewal program has been a failure. Congress should take a good hard look at the federal urban renewal program to determine if it is deserving of being continued."

FINDLAY, OHIO, REPUBLICAN COURIER: "There's at least one U. S. government corporation that makes money. The other day, the board of directors of Federal Prison Industries turned over \$4 million of profits to the U. S. Treasury. The corporation operates 55 shops and 23 factories in federal prisons throughout the country. So despite the old adage, crime does pay. But not for the criminal."

FOREST CITY, PA., NEWS: "The following advice has been offered by Juvenile Judge Philip B. Gillim of Denver, Colorado. 'Always we hear the plaintive cry of the teen-ager, "What can we do? Where can we go?" The answer is, go home! Hang the storm windows, paint the woodwork, rake the leaves, mow the lawn, shovel the walk, wash the car, learn to cook scrub some floors, repair the sink, build a boat, get a job. Help the minister, priest or rabbi, the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, visit the sick, assist the poor, study your lessons. And when you are through, and not too tired, read a good book.'"

GRAND JUNCTION, COLO., SENTINEL: "Most of all, labor wants to end all state Right-to-Work laws. President Johnson has publically mentioned repeal of the section of the Taft-Hartley law which permits such state legislation. He is expected to go even further in this field. It may be that the President is attempting to trade support for labor legislation."

FINDLAY, OHIO, REPUBLICAN COURIER: "The Supreme Court rules that a shaving cream commercial showing how to shave a piece of sandpaper was deceitful. This leaves us up in the air as to exactly how we are supposed to shave our sandpaper."

CAMBRIDGE, NEBR., CLARION: "In its research for added regulatory power the federal government has turned from new fields to conquer to new water to navigate. This evidenced by the Administration's insistence on the creation of a new federal agency to take over water pollution control. The governors of 24 states have testified that the U. S. Public Health Service is doing a completely adequate job of protecting the nation's health in the water pollution control field and that its jurisdiction should be continued. In our view the establishment of an unneeded new federal agency would result in chaos and could hamper, rather than improve, water pollution control."

A challenge to scientifically inclined Texas high school students to seek careers in the broad fields of nuclear science was made in the closing sessions of the Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools that ended Wednesday at the University of Texas.

Nearly a dozen outstanding scientists and educators addressed the 300 students and 200 high school science teachers in the four day symposium co-sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas.

The students were told that this nation is on the verge of an age of "energy unlimited" in which man will have almost unlimited power to extend and transform his environment.

They heard Dr. Gerald F. Tappé, member of the US Atomic Energy Commission urge them to complete many of the tasks that present day scientists have started.

Other speakers included Dr. W. E. Drummond, professor of physics at the University of Texas, one of the nations outstanding authorities in the field of plasma theory as applied to nuclear research. He described the major step that has been taken in the development of education in the new science of plasma physics as a result of the financial support being given research at the University of Texas and Texas A and M University by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

The TAERF, composed of 10 investor-owned electric power companies in Texas, including Texas Electric Service Company is supporting a major research effort aimed at harnessing the thermonuclear (fusion) reaction—the source of power of the hydrogen bomb—for the eventual economical generation of electricity.

This research is being carried out in the laboratories of the General Atomic division of General Dynamics Corporation at San Diego, California, and at the University of Texas and Texas A and M University, where Texas scientists work in cooperation with General Atomic scientists in the long range fusion effort.

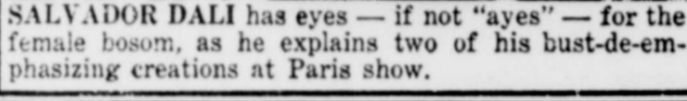

E. A. McCreary To Study In New York



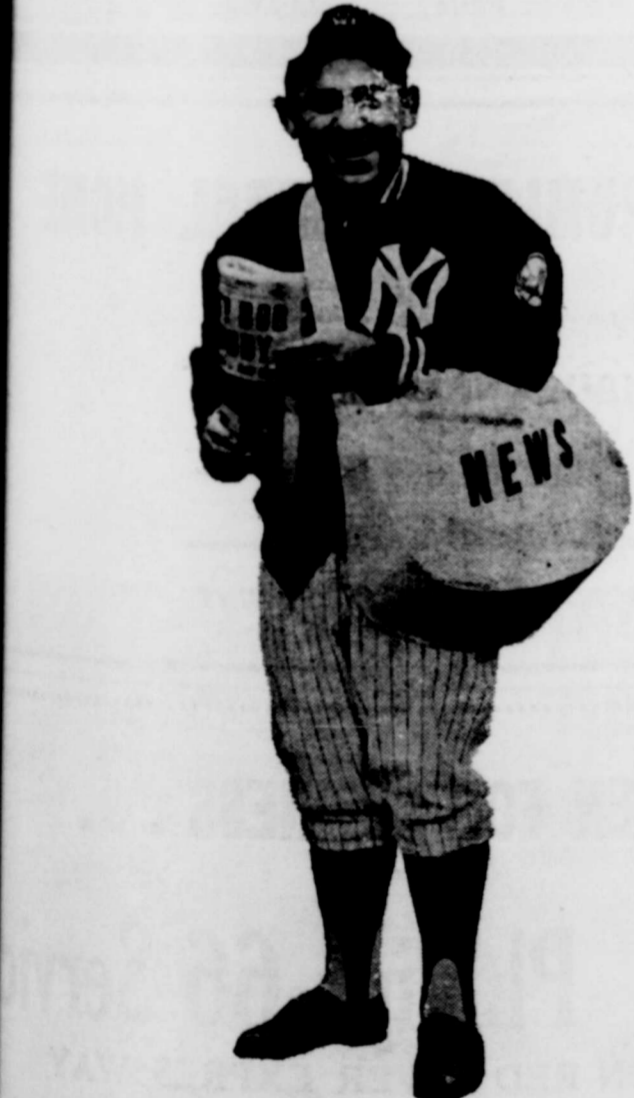
E. A. McCreary, principal of the Skellytown Elementary School, has been named recipient of a National Science Foundation Award.
