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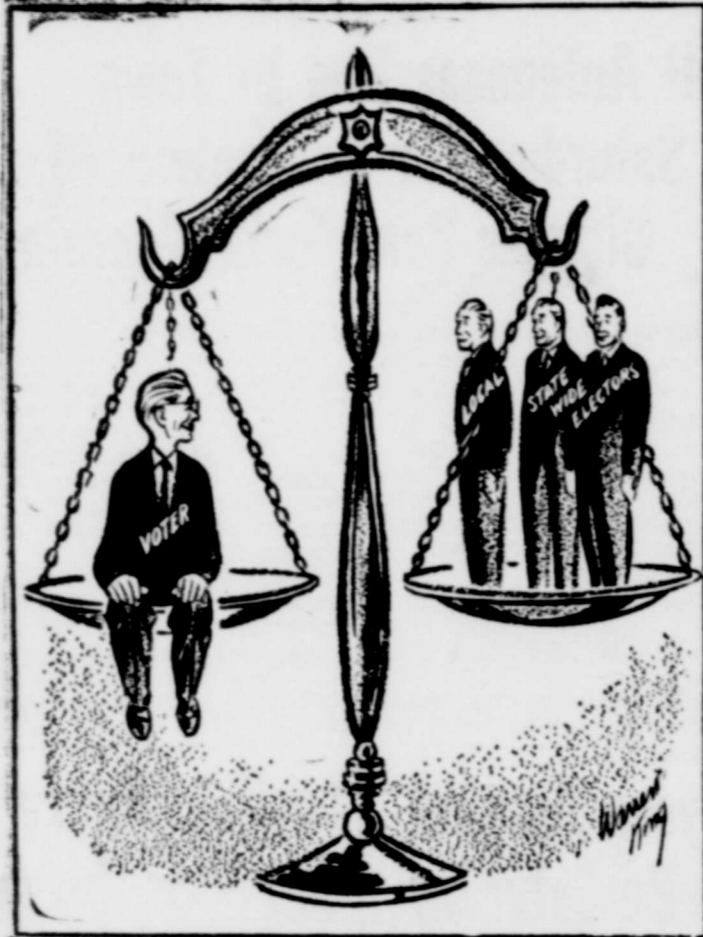
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## ELECTORAL COLLEGE BALANCE URGED



### FOR EQUAL REPRESENTATION

An underlying objective in the creation of our form of government, and one which has avoided many abuses of other forms of government, was to achieve diffusion rather than concentration of government power.

The present operation of the Electoral College system results in a concentration of power in certain parts of our country. In order to achieve a better balance, a Constitutional amendment aimed at choosing Presidential Electors by districts comparable to the system of choosing members of the House of Representatives is recommended.

Under this proposal (S. J. Res. 12) each voter, no matter where geographically located, would have the identical privilege of voting for three Presidential Electors, two on a state wide basis, and one from the local district. Such a diffusion of power and influence would cause the choice of Presidential candidates, the framing of platforms, the conduct of conventions and campaigns, local, state, and local tax bills, directed on a truly national basis.

This district system would make the President the man of all the people and would reduce the effect of improper election practices, exaggerated influence of groups and individuals in control of block votes and eliminate the unfair system of having votes of large minorities cast opposite to their wishes.

We commend its serious consideration by the Congress of The United States.

## MEDICINE'S PRIMARY OBJECT

The United States has long been blessed with the most progressive, efficient and generous physician's system in the world. Improvement is constantly sought.

The reason for the high character of the profession can be found in the words of James Z. Appel, M. D., President of the American Medical Association. He says physicians, "as individuals and as a group," must constantly bear in mind the basic principle that "the primary object of the medical profession is to render service to humanity."

This objective points up the sharpest, greatest difference between medicine and business, Dr. Appel explained. Most people do not expect a businessman to be motivated primarily by any other desire than that of making money. If it so happens that the principles of service and altruism help him toward that goal, so much the better. Most people have a different attitude toward the medical profession, Dr. Appel asserted. Even though they may never have seen or read any code of medical ethics, they are surprisingly sensitive to the basic principle to humanity.

Business and industry, where they are not already doing so, might well emulate the code of ethics referred to by Dr. Appel, in their contact with the public.

## Health and Safety Tips From AMA

### EXECUTIVE HEALTH

It isn't absolutely necessary for executives to have heart disease, ulcers and strokes, ailments commonly associated with American businessmen who reach the management level.

Further, these ailments are by no means limited to executives. They can affect almost any one.

A few suggestions offered by the American Medical Association to help executives preserve their health also can be readily applied to most Americans, regardless of level of employment.

—Watch your weight. Strenuous diets usually aren't necessary. Just eat less.

—Exercise. Golf is fine, if you enjoy it. But if you're one of the many who lose their tempers and get upset over every missed stroke, brisk walks will serve just as well a golf, probably better.

—Take vacations. Real vacations, not just an occasional day or two. And plan your vacation so that there is time to relax and unwind.

—Smoke less. Better still, quit smoking altogether, if you can. There is much debate about the effect of tobacco on health, but there is no argument on the premise that it doesn't do anything good for you.

—Cut down on drinking. Two cocktails before dinner may be one too many. One might be too many for some people.

—Get plenty of sleep. And try to sleep without the use of drugs, if at all possible.

—Put business worries out of your mind when you leave the office. This sometimes is easier said than done. Perhaps you will need to get active in something else, such as the affairs of your church, to get your mind off your job.

Byron Tunnell To Step Up His Campaign Trips

Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell, seeking his first elected term on the Commission, will step up his campaign during the final two weeks before the May 7 Democratic primary election.

The 40-year-old Commissioner, who has campaigned vigorously across the state, will campaign this week from the Valley to the Panhandle and from the Gulf Coast to West Texas. He will spend the final week of the campaign in other sections of Texas, returning to Austin on May 7 to receive election returns.

Tunnell had been assured reelection as Speaker of the House when Gov. John Connally appointed him to the Railroad Commission on the eve of the opening of the 59th Legislature. "He has the background of a lawyer, a legislator and as Speaker of the House," said Connally. "He has demonstrated he has unlimited capacity, determination and courage needed to a marked degree on the Railroad Commission."

A native of Tyler, Tunnell is a veteran of World War II. He received his law degree from Baylor University. He is married and the father of two daughters.

After serving three years as assistant district attorney for Smith County, Tunnell entered private law practice in Tyler where he compiled an impres-

sive list of church and civic accomplishments.

He was elected to the Texas Legislature in 1956, representing Smith and Gregg counties. He was elected Speaker of the House by the 58th Legislature, the 58th Legislature.

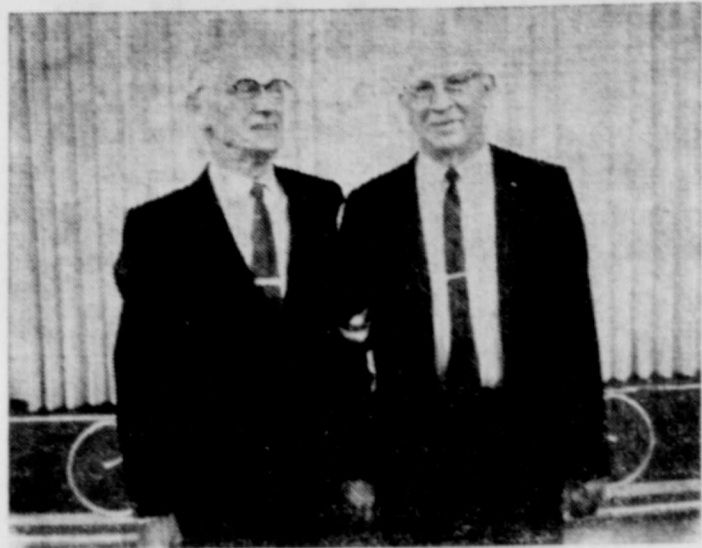

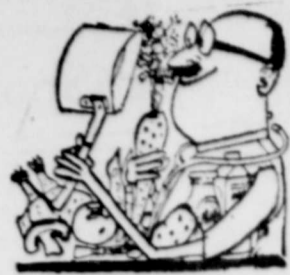

### Doctor in the Kitchen

#### SAY "CHE-E-E-E"

You don't have to be on a candid camera to say "cheese" and so broaden your smile. It's also a smart thing to say when you want something interesting for a simple menu, easy to prepare, tasty and nutritious.

Cheese is made from milk, skimmed milk or cream. Most types are made from the curd, but some are based on whey. The process is one of enzyme or ferment action; the ferments are derived from various molds or bacteria. The type of cheese is determined by the mold or the bacteria and by the process used.

**A Concentrated Food**  
Cheese is a concentrated protein food, containing up to 36 percent by weight of protein, mainly casein. This a three ounce portion of cheese would supply about one ounce of protein, or about 40% of a day's requirement for an adult male (154 pounds) doing average work. The fat in cheese varies from almost none in uncreamed cottage cheese to about 30 percent in the more fat cheeses.

Almost every nation has its favorite cheeses, determined by the kind of milk used, the enzyme, and the conditions of curing. Practically every variety of foreign cheese is paralleled by a similar type made in the United States. Often the domestic is indistinguishable from the import. This is due to the immigration of expert cheese makers from many nations, and the duplication of aging conditions such as constant-temperature caves, where the same procedure can be carried on as in the original setting.

**Cottage Cheese Popular**  
Possibly the cheese in most common use is cottage cheese, because of its mild flavor, less calories, and its adaptability to

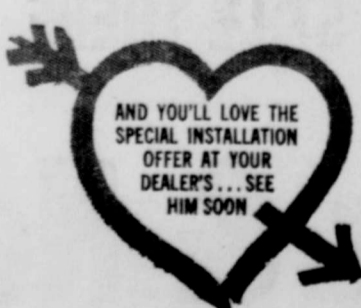

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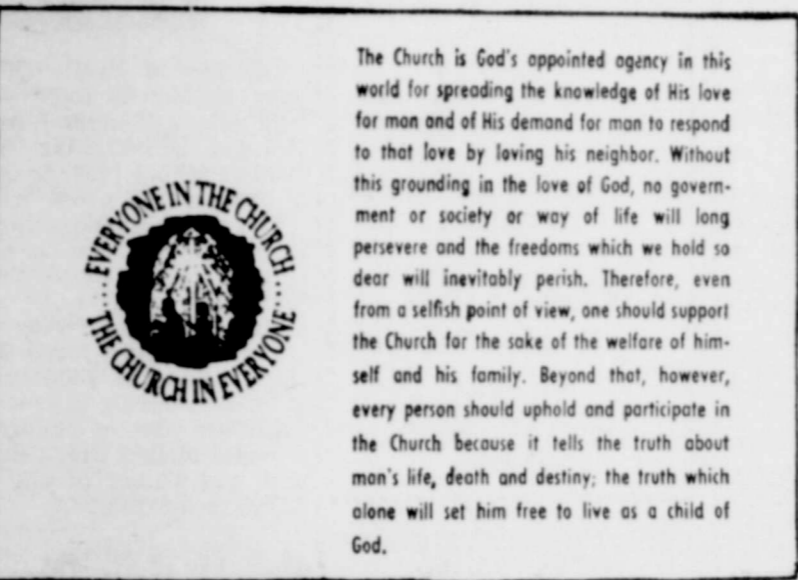
