City Schools Are Granted Funds For 'Head-Start'

The U. S. Education Office has approved a \$16,184 Head-Start grant to the Burkburnett Independent School District. Congressman Graham Purcell announced Tuesday.

The money will be used for a pre-first grade summer program for 62 children from culturally deprived homes.

It is the first Head-Start federal money to be allocated to a public school in Wichita County, according to information received by Supt. I. C. Evans.

Evans said the Head-Start program would be administered at the Hardin Primary School for a period of two and one-half months this summer starting May 31, ending Aug. 8.

The program authorizes hiring of a director, five teachers, five teacher aides, a school nurse, custodian, secretary and cook. The noon meal will be served, as classes will extend from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m.

Head Start funds are allocated through the Office of Economic Opportunity.

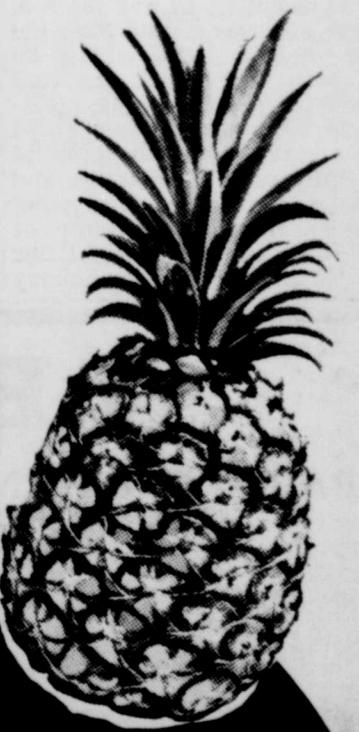

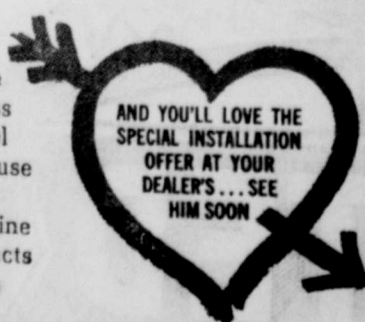

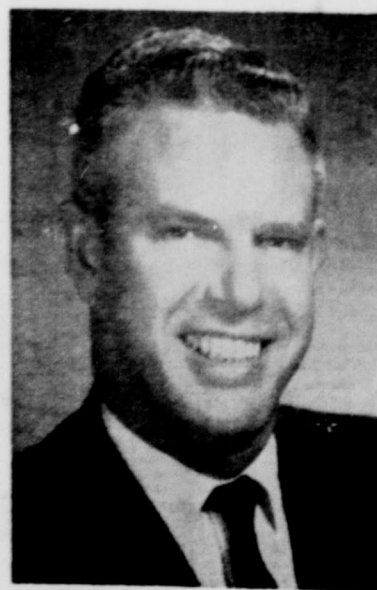

grass, each bit of soil and each bush or tree provides a source of food for some living creature. When these creatures become too numerous and eat too much of any particular part of your lawn, they are considered as pests. It's up to you to take some form of protective action, reminds the agent.

Your scientific defense weapons are the modern chemical pesticide products, available in many stores near you. With careful pesticide use, you can keep your lawn green, growing and living.

The agent reminds you that your garden—with its supply of good things to harvest and eat—is also a target area for pests. You must be more selective in your choice of a pesticide for garden use, however, she cautions.

First, carefully identify the particular type of pest. Then identify the plants that it attacks. Next, select the right insecticide to control the attacker, while remembering to stop the applications well ahead of the harvest date. This date for cleasing application of a pesticide will be found on the label

of the product, reminds the agent.

Remember that the careful use of pesticides is your personal responsibility. You should make it a part of your lawn and garden activities. Additional information on the safe use of pesticides is available at the county office, 305 Federal Building, Wichita Falls. Bulletins on Insect Control, Lawn Care and other subjects of interest at this time are free.

Mr. and Mrs. Pete Wyatt have added outdoor storage to their planned landscape. It is most attractive as well as useful. It not only provides storage space for tools, insecticides, outdoor eating equipment, etc., but is easy to get to the stored items and easy to clean.

Such storage is an asset to any landscape. It should be planned around the individual family needs.

Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Davis worked on furniture repair this past week. They are serving as home improvement demonstrators for the year and have planned extensive work on furniture

repair. Their home improvement project is a family affair.

Before your rearrange your furniture, be sure you will not be sacrificing convenience or use of space, says Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. There may be only one way to arrange it for the best use of the space you have.

Furniture arrangement need not follow a set pattern. Livability is the first and final rule. Think of the needs of different members of your family in each room as you plan a workable arrangement of your furniture.

Arrange the living room furniture so that comfortable seating and adequate lighting are provided for each member. Think in terms of groups that are usable and convenient and not in terms of individual pieces.

Miss Wirges suggests these guides for good furniture arrangement:

- 1. Keep traffic lanes open.
2. Place large pieces first, parallel to the lines of the room.
3. Balance the pieces in a group and each group on each

side of the room.

4. Accent a center of interest.

5. Locate a good light in the proper place for each conversation group.

6. Plan an interesting and attractive group at the spot first seen as you enter the room.

Depending on where you are going, you may need some vaccination shots. Tetanus, certainly, for anyone who expects to include some out of doors activities. Typhoid, if your journey includes areas where the water supply is uncertain. Smallpox, if you're planning to leave the United States to visit a foreign land, and want to re-enter the United States. Ask your doctor about these, and possibly other immunizations.

Use common sense about your vacation diet. Many a family trip has been spoiled by too many roadside hamburgers and soft drinks. A sound rule while driving cross-country is to eat lightly. Be cautious about heavy rich meals, particularly if you're not accustomed to such fare at home.

Know what sort of climate you will encounter at your vacation spot and dress accordingly. It can get cold in the mountains at night, even in mid-summer. Good walking shoes are important to the travel wardrobe.

News From The County Agent

With farmers actively engaged in land preparation and spring planting, the problem of what to do with empty fertilizer bags must be considered.

Carelessness may creep into a farmer's busy schedule, and he may create a danger as well as eyesores on his property by improper disposal of the bags, says county agent B. T. Haws. Some farmers can't resist placing the empty bags upside down on the nearest fence post. Sometimes entire fences bordering fields are literally covered with the bags. Not only does this practice create an unsightly scene, but it is potentially dangerous. Cattle in surrounding pastures may be poisoned by remains of the fertilizer, regardless how small.

Dumping the bags over the fence at the end of the row can prove equally dangerous. Not only does such action litter the countryside, but empty bags have been known to blow into the path of passing vehicles, causing wrecks and, at times, serious injury. Some farmers may argue that

they don't have time to retrieve the bags during the busy planting season. In this age of mechanization, this is a lame excuse. Proper disposal of empty fertilizer bags, by burning or otherwise, benefits the farmer as well as those passing through the countryside, concludes the county agent.

A recently released study by agricultural economists at Texas A&M University dealing with land sales and prices shows that both have increased during the past three years. Since 1949 land prices have increased each year but volume of sales consistently declined. This trend in sales has done an about-face during the past three years say the economists. They cite urban influence as the reason for the steadily increasing prices. Urban demands for land for hobby farming, rural homesites, speculation and recreation push prices higher each year.
