Council Agenda of Business Is Carried Monday

The agenda of the Burk Burnett City Council was varied Monday. The regular monthly meeting, at which Councilmen J. L. Caffee, Gene Allen, J. Alexander, Pete Simmons, and C. J. Lippard were present, opened at 7:30 p.m.

One of the first items on the agenda was information about the new library. Claude Adams, chairman of the Library Board, recommended the Council recommend Mrs. A. T. Nice as librarian of the new library. He stated that the Board was very impressed with her qualifications, which included work as catalog librarian at Army Medical Service School and a law degree from New York Law School. Mr. Adams also commented that he believed Burk Burnett was fortunate to find someone with Mrs. Nice's capabilities. The Council approved the recommendations of the Library Board.

Mr. Adams next requested that the Library Board be given free hand in spending the \$6,000 allocated by the city. Joe Lippard recommended that the Board have this freedom but that all bills be channeled through the office of City Manager Jess Whatley and recommendations passed. Also it was noted that all books previously donated were being stored in a rent-building here.

Next, Ken Blankenship, member of the Parks and Recreation Board of Burk Burnett, asked for authority to contact landscape artists to seek ideas about long-range plans for Hardin and Permian Parks. Permission was granted by the Council.

Approval for a payment to Hester-Bellamy & Associates, architects of the new library building, was given by the City Council. This represents one of a series of the contract, according to contract terms.

Other items were a decision to pay the balance of the electric bill of the Little League baseball team and to purchase a new deep fryer for the Town Hall upon the recommendation of Mrs. F. M. McMurry.

22 Accidents On Rural Highways Are Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 22 accidents on rural highways in Wichita County during the month of July, according to Sergeant L. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The crashes resulted in ten persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$15,240.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1966 shows a total of 102 accidents resulting in one person killed, 62 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$64,178.00.

The Sergeant reminds all motorists of the State Law regulating traffic in regard to school buses. "The drivers of a vehicle upon a highway outside the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

Burkburnett City Council Votes To Accept The Resignation Of City Manager By Split 3-2 Vote

We are suffering an attack of what we call "tight money." Let's take a look at some of the pressures inflation has forced upon us:

—Consumer prices have risen alarmingly to their highest point in our nation's history. On a 100-point index based on 1959, consumer prices have risen to 112.9.

—The current annual rate of cost inflation is between four and five percent. In only six months the cost of food has risen 2.5 percent. Commodities have risen 1.6 percent. Services are up 2.5 percent.

—The 1933 dollar is now worth 40 cents. The 1940 dollar is worth 43 cents. The 1959 dollar is worth 88 cents. Never before has the value of our dollar been so low.

—Higher taxes and higher prices more than wiped out whatever additional income Americans earned in April, May and June. The average American has \$10 less purchasing power in those months than he did during the first quarter of this year.

—Interest rates have risen to their highest point, and bank liquidity has fallen to its lowest point in 36 years. The prime rate for bank loans is now 5 1/2 percent. Home mortgage rates are averaging over six percent, and rates of seven to eight percent and climbing are reported.

—The U. S. Treasury's national debt managers are borrowing money at the highest interest rate the government has paid in 45 years.

—Interest rates on automobile loans and installment credit have increased in many areas.

—A general credit contraction has occurred. It has become increasingly difficult for both businesses and individuals to obtain loans.

—The nation's savings and loan institutions are, for the first time in their history, facing a serious outflow of funds. In April alone they lost \$1 billion in deposits to other higher interest investment opportunities. U.S. News quotes a Houston savings and loan executive as saying, "We're a \$50 million loan operation, and we have not made a single new loan since May 1st."

—Because loan money is not available, residential construction has dropped sharply — in some places 30 percent — in reaction to both increased costs and the credit contraction. Home building last month hit a five-year low.

—And, in the face of these ominous trends, the Administration is operating with a budget sure to run a deficit of between \$5 and \$10 Billion or more, the largest deficit in our history.

We are now faced with this deteriorating situation because of federal insistence on following a policy of "administering inflation." Inflation, which some bureaucrats hoped could be tolerated and controlled in small doses, has not been contained. It has grown beyond all safe proportions and has turned from threat into reality.

In an emotion-charged five-hour session the Burk Burnett City Council voted 3 to 2 to accept the resignation of City Manager Jess Whatley, Monday night.

Mayor-Councilman C. J. Lippard made an impassioned plea to the other Council members to give the people of Burk Burnett a chance to voice their wishes before the motion to accept the city manager's resignation was voted upon. Lippard said he believed some council members had allowed personal differences to cloud their judgment as to what course of action would be in the best interest of Burk Burnett.

That in making a decision as important as this, the Councilmen had a duty to the citizens who had elected them as their representatives to give these citizens a voice in the matter and assurance of true representation.

The Mayor reminded the officials of the large number of people who met with the Council when Mr. Whatley's resignation was first tendered, asking that it not be accepted. Lippard said he felt a time had been chosen to bring the matter to a vote when no visitors were present to voice a protest.

The motion as made by Councilman Pete Simmons was "to reject the water department operating policy submitted by City Manager Jess Whatley and to accept Whatley's resignation." Motion was seconded by Jack Alexander.

Lippard delayed asking for a vote on the motion, tabling it until he could make a motion, seconded by Luther Caffee, "that the vote be delayed for two weeks and the people of Burk Burnett be polled concerning their wishes in accepting or rejecting Whatley's resignation."

Motion failed.

The Mayor then called for a vote on Simon's motion. Motion carried 3 to 2. Simmons, Alexander and Allen voting yes; Lippard and Caffee voting no.

In the several hours of discussion, Councilman Simmons stated repeatedly that Whatley had failed to carry out the orders of the Council, but when asked to do so, Mr. Simmons refused to give any specific incidents in which this had occurred. He said he would not give this information to the press, nor at a Council meeting, but would give it to individuals if they would come to him outside of a Council meeting.

Just before the midnight adjournment, the Council named Dick Chambers as acting City Manager.

HOW ABOUT A PRICE TAG?



COST OF GOVERNMENT

Some people say, "don't buy a pig in a poke," while others say, "be sure and read the fine print before you sign," but irrespective of what expression you use, it simply does not make sense to buy anything before you know the price of the article.

Yet, Congress has not seemed anxious to adopt this principle of checking a price tag before enacting legislation, or setting up new or expanded programs with their possible "time bomb" price effects.

One of the latest proposals of this nature has been offered by Congressman C. F. Bennett (D-Fla.). This would amend the rules of the House of Representatives to require committee reporting measures proposing creation of new Federal programs, or expansion of existing ones, to present statements estimating costs for each of the first five fiscal years.

The idea of "price tags" is not new. It is being employed more or less effectively on legislation in a number of states. The procedure calls for attaching "fiscal notes" to legislation to show potential effects on the treasury. Price tags are needed to show state and local governments what is will cost them to participate.

Let's cancel the blank checks in government programs and provide price tags clearly marked so Congress can see where the taxpayers money is going.

INFLATION IS A DISEASE

Associated Press Business News writer, Jack Lefler, reports: "Inflation is the big worry of economists and government officials. There is talk of a possible tax increase and price and wage controls to combat it. Simplified, inflation is too many dollars chasing too few goods."

Inflation, too, is a "guns plus butter" policy on the part of the government, which attempts to fight an ever-expanding war in Viet Nam and at the same time advance welfare programs of unprecedented cost and extent at home.

The tragedy is that the weight of inflation falls mainly on those who are least able to bear it — those on fixed retirement incomes, on public relief, in the low-wage brackets and so on. The irony is that these are the very people the governments welfare programs are supposed to help. But that help will be illusory indeed — a snare and a delusion — if inflation continues to erode the few dollars they have to spend on the necessities of life.

Inflation is to a country what disease is to the individual — a source of constant destruction unless it is cured.

"The future really rests with human beings, not with machines," William A. Clark of the Monsanto Company of St. Louis, said: "We have the machine capability. We have some good techniques, and in the minds of the newer graduate students, we have some ideas for still better techniques. What we need to solve is a people problem."

WHAT EPISCOPALIANS BELIEVE

PART I OF A MONTHLY SERIES

Episcopalians believe the Bible to be the record of God's action and love toward men. It contains His Message to all mankind; therefore Episcopalians speak of the Bible as God's Word. They believe, however, that the words which make up the Bible must not be confused with the Word of God. Those words contain God's Word as it has acted to reveal God and to save men throughout history. The Word of God itself is, of course, Jesus Christ. "The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us. (John 1:14)

The Bible is the record of God's action with men. The Old Testament records God's preparation of His people, the Hebrews, for the coming of Christ — the Word made flesh. The New Testament is the witness of the time when the Word of God entered the world as Jesus and the results of His life, death, and resurrection. It makes no claim to tell the entire story of Jesus but attempts to show that He is "the Christ, the son of the living God." (John 20:30-31 and John 21:25)

Episcopalians — because the Bible contains the Word of God — read the whole Bible. This is so in two ways. First, we still use the books of the Old Testament called the Apocrypha which the early Church also read. Most protestant churches gradually dropped these books from their Bibles. The Church of England and some followers of Martin Luther continued to use them. It seems strange that these books were removed since the New Testament is filled with quotations and references to these books. One can easily see this in a Cross-reference Bible where the references to *Wisdom, I Esdras, Tobit I and II Maccabees, and Ecclesiasticus* abound. Some of the names in Matthew's list of Jesus' ancestry come from the Apocrypha (Mt. 1:12), and Jesus, himself, refers to teachings in these books.

Episcopalians also read the whole Bible in another and even more important way. The Bible is read in its entirety in the services of public worship. Thus the choice of what parts are to be read is not left up to the personal whims and preferences of any individual, but the entire Scriptures — Old and New Testaments — are read in all Episcopal Churches. In the course of a year Episcopalians read the old Testament and Apocrypha through once, the New Testament through twice, and the Book of Psalms through monthly.

All the ministers of the Episcopal Church, before being ordained, must state that they believe the Bible to contain all doctrine necessary for salvation and further that they will teach nothing as necessary for salvation except that which can be proved by Holy Scripture.

The Episcopal Church invites you to find out more about this Church which is uniquely Bible-centered. The Church which produced the first Bibles in English and which produced the King James' Version, beloved by all English-speaking Christians. Find out how the glorious experience of truly Bible-centered worship and learn the grace and strengthening power of a Bible-centered faith and life.

A PRAYER: Blessed Lord, who hast caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning; Grant that we may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that by patience and comfort of thy holy Word, we may embrace, and even hold fast, the blessed hope of everlasting life, which thou hast given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen. (The Book of Common Prayer, p. 92)

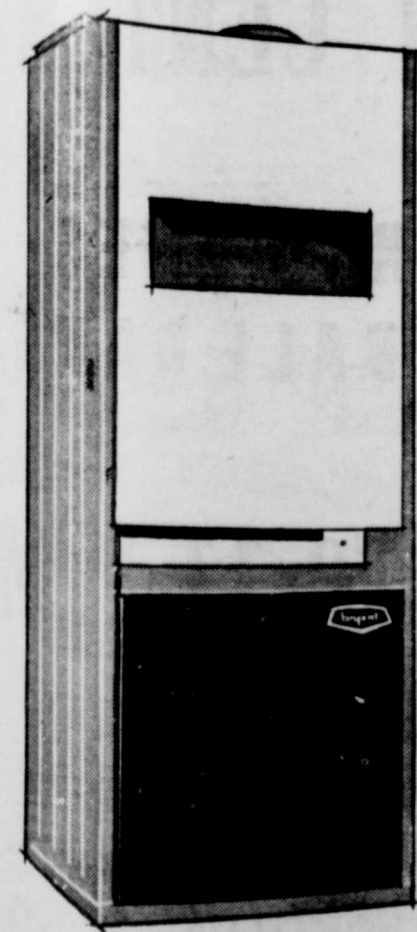

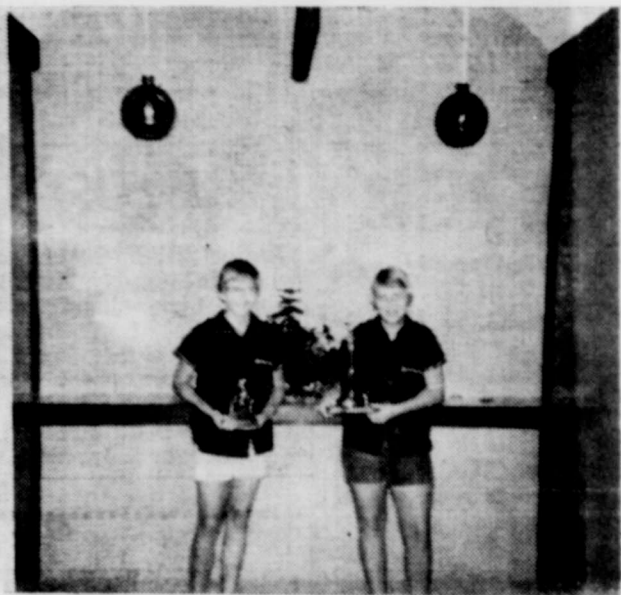

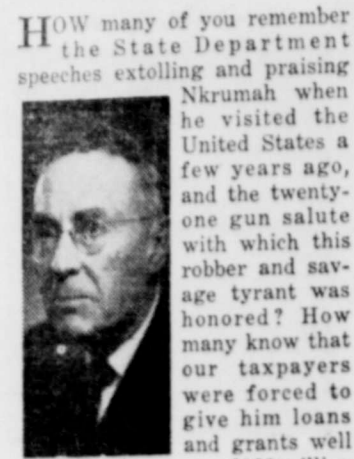

Tyrants Honored



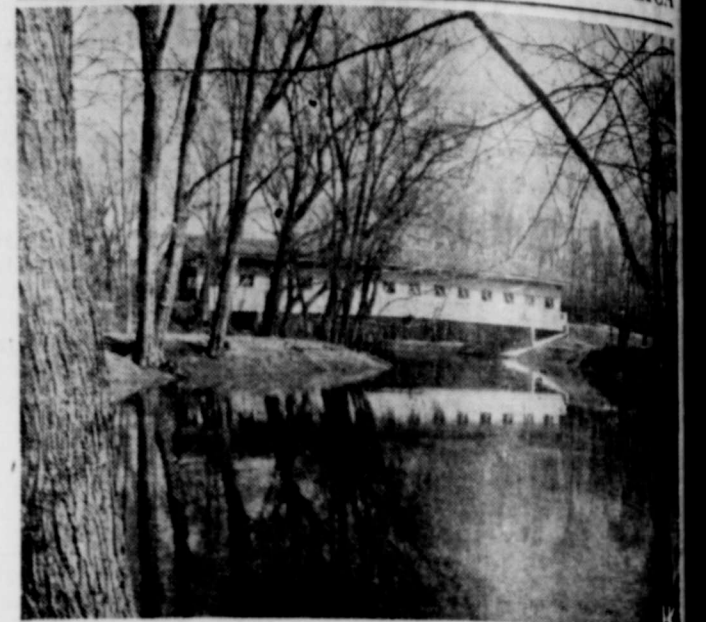
HOW many of you remember the State Department speeches extolling and praising Nkrumah when he visited the United States a few years ago, and the twenty-one gun salute with which this robber and savage tyrant was honored? How many know that our taxpayers were forced to give him loans and grants well

Dr. Kershner over \$100 million since he became the usurper of all authority in Ghana in March, 1947, through 1964? No doubt a considerable part of this money is stashed away in Lebanon or Switzerland, and will now be used to finance his campaign to recover the power he has lost. It is curious how our State Department and many of our religious, educational and journalistic leaders have shouted for joy when Nkrumah and other dictators of his ilk have seized power in more than two dozen African countries. We have been gleeful when the representatives of free western civilization have been thrown out of these countries, and tyrants, many of them with Communist leanings, have seized power. We have rejoiced at the so-called freedom that was being gained by country after country in Africa, when actually the considerable measure of freedom and well-being which the people possessed under the leadership of the Europeans was sacrificed in order that the local dictators might take over. Don't misunderstand me; I am for freedom and for independence for all colonial peoples as soon as they are ready for it; but I cannot get ecstatically happy when any country succumbs to a dictator masquerading as a liberator.

In this connection, the enthusiastic eulogies and acclaim given to Communist dictator Castro by our State Department people will be recalled. In shame we remember that he was referred to as "the George Washington of Cuba." This same great and honorable distinction was accorded to Sukarno of Indonesia by a high official of the State Department whom I heard introduce that pro-Communist dictator to an American audience.

I am sick and tired of befouling the name of the founder of our country, by comparing him with Communist thieves, murderers and savage dictators. There is not and never has been the slightest basis for comparison. George Washington was at the opposite pole in morals, statesmanship and integrity from the cheap, immoral, blustering tyrants with whom our State Department has seen fit to compare him.

MODERN MATERIALS CREATE RUSTIC REPLICA



COVERED BRIDGE that combines the authentic rusticity of colonial America with the latest in modern design and materials has been erected over the Sangamoo River in Illinois. Steel girders are its main supporting members, lowering costs and simplifying erection.

Blending with its rural setting, the picturesque bridge in Lake of the Woods Park in Mahomet, Ill. is of wide interest to engineers because of several unique structural details, including a knee-like steel socket that transfers loads from the bridge's timber columns to its supporting steel beams. The bridge was designed by Prof. German Gurfinkel of the department of civil engineering at the University of Illinois.

Spanning the stream on steel, this two-lane reproduction promises to defy the time and wear that long since caused the collapse of most of its historical predecessors.



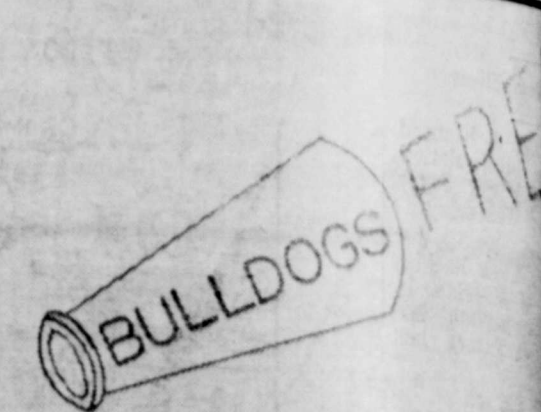
