



During the past year, the cost of labor in manufact- | FRIDAY 9-SATURDAY 10 ing increased an average of five per cent, a direct reflection of sizeable wage gains combined with a much lower rate of production per manhour, according to a recent report of the United States Department of Com-

Higher unit labor costs in manufacturing mean one of two things, or a combination of both: higher prices and lower profits. There is abundant evidence that both factors have been present in the manufacturing sector over the past year.

The report indicates, although the figures are not final, that productivity growth in manufacturing during 1967 may be as low as one per cent, the smallest in many years, as compared to a 3.4 per cent increase in 1965 and a 3.1 per cent increase in 1966.

Labor and management have a great responsibility to the American public when they negotiate contracts this year. In order to prevent further inflationary pressures on the entire economy, they should make sure that any increase in final labor costs will be counterbalannced by a comparable increase in productivity.

Such a balance is essential if industry is to retain sufficient risk capital for expansion, in order to provide more jobs for more people.

Worst Kind Of Discrimination

Within a matter of months, we are faced with another presidential election. As in every election, strenuous efforts will be made to get out the vote. And again, millions of citizens will be deprived of the right to vote, because they did not meet state residence requirements. At present, these requirements deprive upward of five million, otherwise qualilfied voters, of their right to participate in the choice of President and Vice President. Every year, countless thousands of citizens are transferred by employer corporations from one part of the country to another. Through no fault of thir own, they are disenfranchised when election time rolls around. They have not had time to live long enough in their new homes to become zoting citizens. A bill is now in Congress establishing September 1 residency as a uniform eligibility standard in all states. As The New York Times observes, it ". . deserves passage to erase some of the present discrimination against citizens on the move."



News From The County Agent

As soon as the small grain fields are dry enough it will be time to topdress your small grain. We need to start top dressing before the wheat starts jurting, which may be early this year. From 30 to 60 pounds lowing cotton or grain sorghum will require heavier applications of nitrogen.

Cattle lice may not create much of a problem in the warm months but its a different story during the winter season, reminds county agent B. T. Haws. Closer confinement aids the spread of lice from infested to clean animals

By the time lice are easily already have been done. The time to treat lice is while the infestations are light.
