Leugemors joined the Lodge, May 18, 1918 in Yale, Oklahoma. Since that time he has become a Shriner and belonged to the Rotary.

Still very spry, with a happy personality, he lives with his wife, Audrey, whom he married in Barnsdall. His daughter, Mrs. Mary Moland, also resides with them.

There are two sons: Paul, of Wichita Falls; and Evret, of Pauls Valley, Okla.

Mr. Leugemors worked for the Government during World War I and World War II.

Until he turned 60 years old, he worked as a tank builder in oil fields. "He built wooden tanks so that they wouldn't leak a drop," stated his daughter, Mary.

It was in 1945 that he moved to Wichita Falls to work on the Thornberry Lease as manager and pumper. He retired at the age of 76, in 1962.

EASTER 1968

Easter is a joyful occasion throughout the civilized world. All over America, the churches enjoy record attendances.

While we join in the outward observance of Easter — the egg hunts, the new finery, it is well to pause and think about the spiritual reason for the celebration.

Here is how it was described in the gospel of St. Matthew:

"And the angel answered and said to the women, 'Fear not ye; for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here, for he is risen, as he said. Come see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly and tell his disciples that he is risen from the dead; and behold, he goeth before you into Galilee; there ye shall see him. Lo, I have told you.'"

Civilization has come a long way. It's a good time to count our blessings and let good deeds speak for us.

The petroleum requirements of the U. S. armed forces have doubled since the Korean War, but military officials report that the men in Viet Nam are being kept well supplied with fuels. Oil Facts, published by the American Petroleum Institute, quotes military spokesmen as saying that more than half of the tonnage shipped to Viet Nam consists of petroleum products. Once the oil reaches Viet Nam, it is kept moving to its destination by barges, pipelines, trucks and aircraft. Oilmen and the military have created complete petroleum installations where nothing had previously existed but sand and jungle.

The American Gas Association notes that modern offshore drilling rigs, used in prospecting for natural gas beneath the sea, may be as big as football fields and cost \$10 million to build. Many have crews up to 50 men and are equipped with living quarters, recreation and dining rooms, workshops and a heliport for taxi service to shore.

According to Mr. Thomas M. Goodfellow, president of the Association of American Railroads, "Right now the re-election syndrome dominates the Potomac Basin. Some Congressmen are eager to get re-elected because they know they can't make a living in private business under the laws they passed while in Congress."

"Increased taxes bring demands for increases in pay, and the inflationary spiral will keep us on a never-ending merry-go-round, with rising costs," remarks Representative Theodore R. Kuperman of New York.

NEEDED: A VICTORY GOAL

Though Communism has been a ruthless force of conquest in the world for more than 50 years, many people in free world countries still have not recognized its true nature or come to understand how to deal with it. This observation has special application to the events in Vietnam in the last couple of months.

In this period, the Viet Cong smashed into the cities of South Vietnam — even attacking the U.S. embassy in Saigon — and North Vietnamese units engaged in conventional war operations supported by Soviet-built tanks. The toll of American casualties rose shockingly in this period.

As a result, the American people are more deeply disturbed than ever about the course of the war in Asia. They see the Communists pushing ahead with vigor, only a short time after the U.S. public was assured that all was well. And in North Korea, the Soviet-oriented Communist regime has been threatening fresh war against the United States.

The trouble the U.S. faces in Vietnam and elsewhere stems from a refusal to recognize the nature of Communism. The Kennedy administration first bought the notion that the Soviet Union was mellowing. One wonders how that notion strikes the U.S. special forces who had to stand up against fire from Russian-built tanks in Vietnam. There was nothing "mellowing" about the Soviet armor.

Since the beginning of the Vietnam war, Secretary of Defense McNamara argued for only very limited pressure against the Communists. He consistently opposed each step-up in the air war, though he has been overruled from time to time. Because of Mr. McNamara's opposition, the U.S. has not blockaded the North Vietnamese port of Haiphong or the ports of Cambodia where the Reds also obtain supplies.

In recent weeks, American fighting men paid heavily for

the failure to blockade Red supply ports. The Russian tanks surely weren't brought into Vietnam on jungle trails on the backs of coolies. They reached Vietnam via Communist ships that were allowed to pass unharmed.

The question arises: how can America hope to win in Vietnam while the supply ports are untouched and the Reds' privileged sanctuaries in Cambodia and elsewhere are immune from attack? How can American soldiers and Marines triumph in the field where they are not

permitted to pursue the enemy to his bases in North Vietnam? The answer is that the U.S. can't win under the rules laid down by those who want to treat the Communists with kid gloves so that they will come to a conference table.

Years ago, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who knew all about success over a determined enemy, said that "there is no substitute for victory." The Kennedy and Johnson administrations have scorned his advice. They have sent young Americans into battle while denying them a victory goal. It is a shame and an outrage.

It is shocking that the United States, the strongest nation on earth, should be tied down by a fourth-rate power such as North Vietnam or be humiliated by a pipsqueak nation such as North Korea. An administration that refuses to carry the war to the enemy's doorstep and that accepts humiliating offenses by he Communists is an administration unworthy of the electorate's support.

The U.S. certainly has the strength to win in Vietnam — indeed to triumph over Communism everywhere in the world. But the job can't be done by fighting with one hand behind one's back or by giving the enemy every break. In World War II, the United States launched a powerful air offensive against the German cities. It was aimed not only at hitting military targets but at smashing the Nazi will to resist.

In the Vietnam war, however, the U.S. has not attempted to smash the Communist will to resist. No great fire raids have been ordered against Hanoi such as were ordered against Hamburg, Stuttgart and other German cities. It is no wonder, therefore, that North Vietnam still feels relatively immune, for the American bombing is directed only against selected targets and periodically is slowed down

to encourage peace feelers. Clearly, it is time for a change in policy. Communism aims at the destruction of the United States. It is engaged in a simple, unified, worldwide campaign against the American people and economic system. Communism in Southeast Asia can only be crushed when the President gives the order to crack down—and crack down with tremendous power—against North Vietnam. U.S. soldiers in the field are entitled to a victory goal being set by the administration in Washington.

Grizzlies Once In Texas

REPORT FROM CONGRESS

Dear Friends:

Lyndon Baines Johnson is a man his fellow Texans and all the Nation have had a difficult time understanding. He is a complex man, who has many times during his career of public service been most controversial.

He has received the harshest criticism from some quarters of any modern political figure. He has been pictured as a completely political person, interested only in his political gain, trying to quench an insatiable thirst for power.

I have known President Johnson for many years. I have had many opportunities to be closely associated with him. I have tried, in my own inadequate way, to defend him on many occasions. Last Sunday night he wrote the best defense of himself that could have been written.

The speculation about why he decided not to seek reelection had begun almost before he finished talking, certainly as soon as the initial shock of his announcement subsided. Again, there are the cynics who are trying to maintain that there is a selfish personal reason for his statement.

Those of us who know him best know better. The great American has written the finest chapter in a life-long career of dedicated public service. His decision, I am firmly convinced, was based solely on what he sincerely believes to be the best interests of this Nation and the cause of world peace. He is sacrificing the remainder of his political career for national unity and the hope of peace in Southeast Asia. It is truly a great act of patriotism.

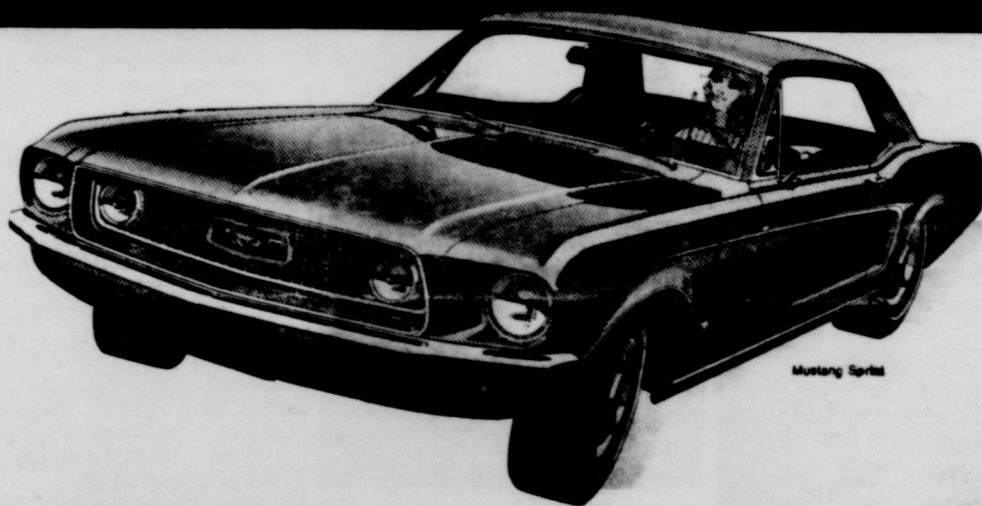

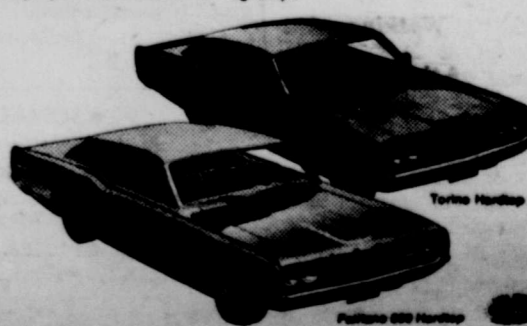

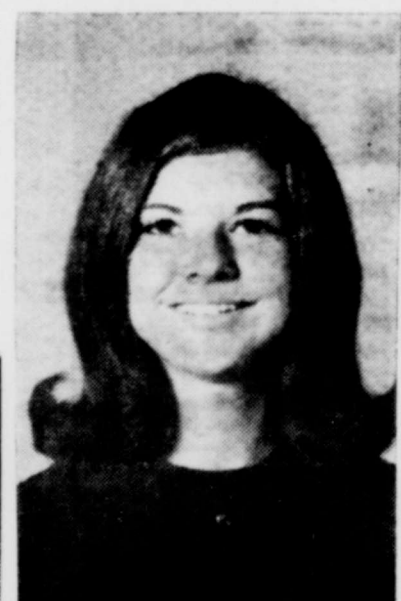

WHO ARE WE?

This congregation is a group of Christians drawn together by the Spirit of Jesus Christ for worship and service. This act becomes in the penitent believer, his death with Christ to self and sin, his burial of the former sinful self and his resurrection to a new life in Christ.

We do not exist merely for selfish purposes, but to follow Him who came to minister and give His life a ransom for many. We help at home and abroad in mission work and benevolence.

Our marching orders are the Lord's world-wide commission. Our desire is the building of His world-wide Kingdom. Our hope is the resurrection of the dead. For we preach not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. For it is God who said, "Light shall shine out of darkness" who shined in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ. (II Corinthians 4:5,6).

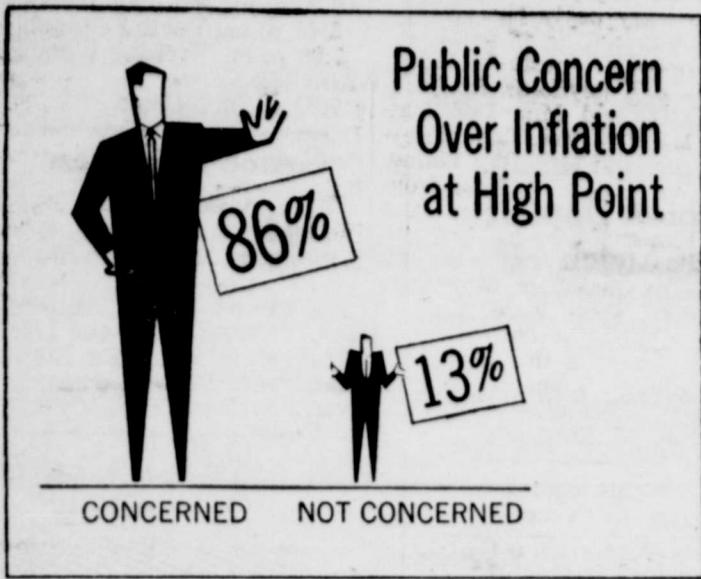

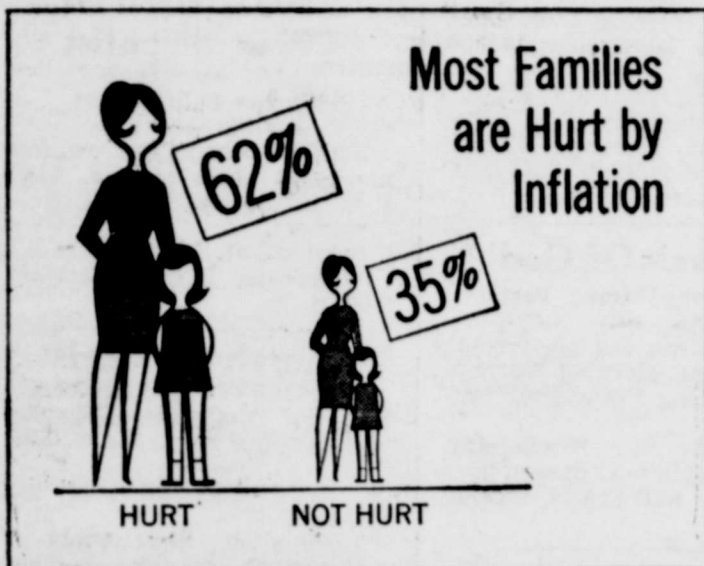

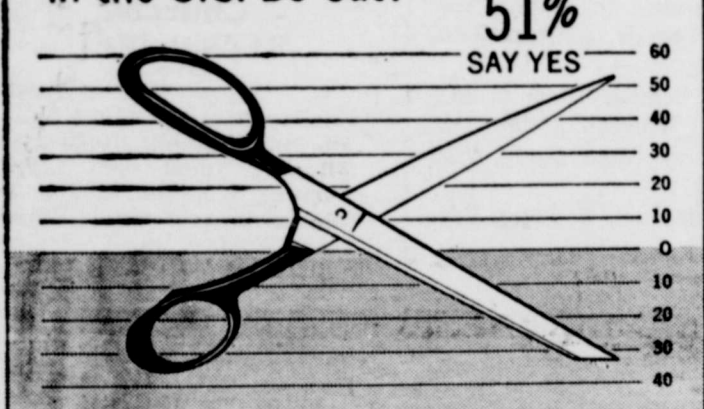

On April 30, Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, will give information on "When Your Freezer Goes Off" along with information on using your freezer for entertaining.

How well do you know the aristocrat of the fresh vegetable world — asparagus? With its short season many people don't get fully acquainted with this green vegetable.

Supplies at local markets are the most plentiful during April. May reports Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. Even then, supplies are limited because asparagus is a highly perishable specialty crop. It must be harvested at the peak of tenderness or it is tough and fibrous.

When shopping for asparagus, look for closed, compact, deep green or bluish-green colored tips, says the agent. A wilted appearance or a spreading tip often indicates considerable time has elapsed since cutting. Avoid excessive amount of white stem as it is likely to be tough and stringy.

Keep your asparagus cold and moist and prepare for serving as soon as possible.

One pound of fresh asparagus makes three to four servings.

Prepare the asparagus by bending the stalk so it snaps at the tender spot or cut above the white area. Wash well.

The secret of cooking asparagus is to tie the stalks together loosely. Stand them upright in two or three inches of boiling water. Cook 10 minutes, then cover and let tips cook in steam. For cut pieces, cook the lower part of the stalks in a saucepan with a small amount of boiling water. Cook 10 minutes, then add tops and cook till tender.

There's vitamin A, vitamin C, riboflavin, niacin and iron in this vegetable. Serve by itself — or with cheese sauce, butter, grated nutmeg, lemon, garlic salt, salt, pepper or hollandaise sauce. Add asparagus tip, cut into bite size pieces, to scrambled eggs. Or serve cold as a salad: marinate in French dressing, garnish with hard-cooked egg slices and tomato wedges.

Mr. and Mrs. Sam Spencer raise asparagus locally and have proven it very adapted to our section of the state.

Don't expect the impossible, but cooperate with the inevitable.

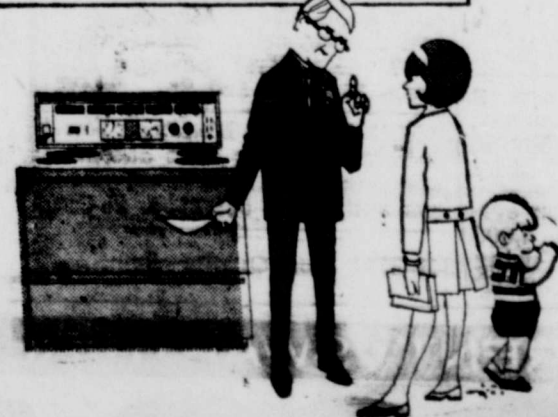
