





A noted West Coast columnist, in commenting on guns, has this to say: "Many of those who yell the loudest for gun con trols are those who know nothing of firearms. ... never shot a predator, never thrilled to the joys of upland game shooting and have never had to protect life or property with the aid of a gun. . . . I do not think I am much different in my gun owning and using habits from millions of other Americans. . . . And like many other Americans, I reserve the right to use those guns to protect my home and my family from anyone bent Texas has heretofore ordered is the total estimated amount on stealing from the former or bringing harm to the latter. . . . Those of us with the moderate view - and I think most Americans are in my camp - ask for moderate controls."

In the final analysis, an orderly society can exist only appropriated punishment of the lawbreaker regardless of the alleged merit of his causes or his numbers. It would make good sense to attach the stiffest of penalties to the use of firearms in the commission of a crime. The point would be missed if gun ownership and the challenge of learning to shoot well and with care is restricted for millions of lawabiding citizens who now find enjoyment and satisfaction in this sport.



Mr. Brister was pleased to note that many of the platforms are within "range" of small boats. Local sports men hope at least a few of the new oil rigs will be constructed in time to aid fishermen this summer. Oil companies frequently go to costly lengths to protect the habitats of wildlife. In this case, the more fortuitous circumstances of their development of petroleum deposits under our coastal waters has improved the fishing!

NOSE DIVE FOR HAPPINESS

Your dollar will probably buy a little less next year than the panner planned! It is reported that even with the 10 per cent tax surcharge and \$6 billion reduction in spending demanded by Congress, the federal deficit for 1968 will be around \$25 billion - \$5 billion more than expected. Delay in passing the tax increase and higher Viet Nam war costs are blamed.

The red ink outlook would be a good deal less grim if our public officials could do a bit better in figuring out what we don't need. Many unbelievable projects pop to the surface of the federal budget and another one is reported by the Clarkton, North Carolina, Times. It seems the U.S. Public Health Service, as part of a \$249,000 research program, ". . . has been sending psychologists and social scientists down to Puerto Rico to ask its citizens what causes them joy or sorrow. "It is not surprising that they discovered people were happier if they were healthy, had money, were educated and were young.

Tart-Sweet Plum Good Mold

versity.



Our recipe suggestion for today introduces the spritely taste of pureed fresh plums molded with a snap of ginger and lemon juice. California leads in the cultivation of this plump and juicy fruit in season through September, with July and August the biggest months.

West Coast plums are mainly of Japanese and European variety-the Japanese, mostly shades of red verging to yellow-the European, mostly purple to black. When they yield to slight pressure, plums are ripe for eating.

They are a succulent source of a useful amount of vitamins and minerals and pleasantly low in calories. Fresh plums, a favorite snack, are a perennial favorite in the summer fruit bowl, and pionic hamper.

FRESH PLUM MOLD

2	envelopes unflav	ore
	gelatine	
1/2	cup cold water	
1/2	cup hot water	
.1	cup sugar	
1/8	teaspoon ginger	

1/2 teaspoon fresh lemon juice 1¼ pounds fresh ripe plums 1/8 teaspoon salt 1 egg white Whipped Cream (optional)

Soften gelatine in cold water. Add hot water, sugar, ginger and lemon juice. Stir until gelatine is dissolved. In the meantime, slice plums, mash and put through a food mill or electric blender until purced. Fold into gelatine mixture. Chill until mixture mounds when dropped from spoon. Add salt to egg white and beat until soft peaks form. Fold into plum mixture. Turn into a 1-quart mold. Chill until firm, about 4 hours. Serve with whipped cream, if desired. Makes about 6 servings.
