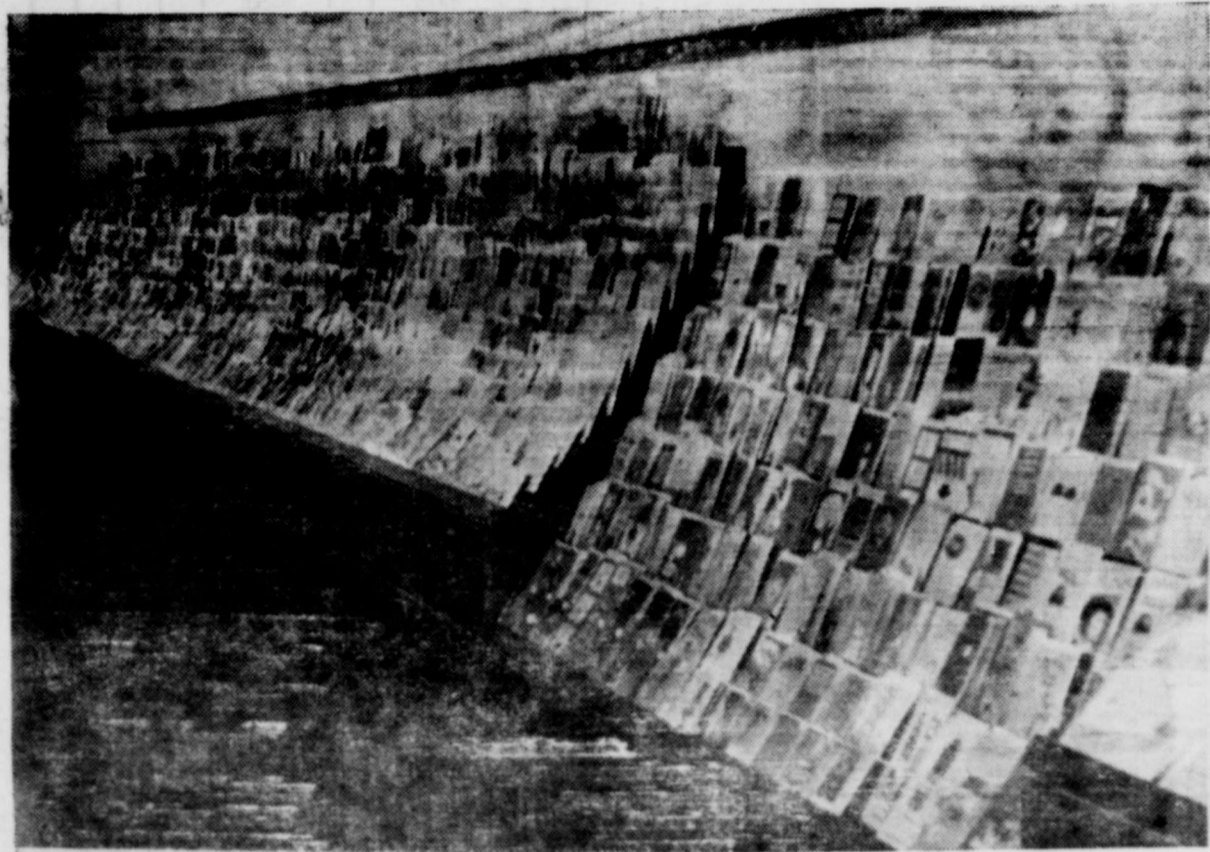

## Mailing Deadlines For Christmas Delivery Listed

"Mail early and get better service by avoiding the last minute rush," Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman advised today.

The Postmaster issued suggested mailing deadlines for assuring delivery before Christmas Day.

Domestic gift parcels should be mailed before December 2 if they're destined for distant states, and not later than December 14 if destined for local areas.

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than December 11 and those for local delivery not later than December 16.

Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. Unless tightly filled, boxes may be crushed.

Parcels should be clearly addressed on one side only, and should have the address and return address written again inside the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off.

The Postmaster noted that special attention again will be placed on the delivery of mail to servicemen in Vietnam and the surrounding area, and stressed use of Apo and FPO numbers on all overseas military mail.

The deadlines for gifts to all members of the Armed Forces are:

- Surface Transportation Nov. 9 (Large Packages)
- Space Available Nov. 23 (Small Packages)
- Parcel Air Lift No. 30
- Airmail Dec. 11

Cards and letter mail will receive approximately the same service as during non peak periods.

Nearly 27 million pounds of mail were processed by the United States Post Office during the holiday mail rush last year for delivery to members of the armed forces in Vietnam.

This year, that number is expected to increase. Last year all Christmas mail posted before the suggested deadline was delivered prior to the holiday. To be absolutely sure of on-time delivery, these deadlines should be met, Postmaster Zimmerman said.

At least four floats will be entered, one by each of the classes at Burkburnett High School.

with those riding costumed in the roles of famous movie characters.

"Gazebo" will be the title of the senior class float, which will be ridden by the four contestants for the title of Homecoming Queen.

Vying for the honor will be Kathy Smith, Lana Carroll, Pam Fowler and Betty Smith, all seniors.

The Queen will be announced and introduced during halftime ceremonies at the football game.

"Carousel" will be the theme of the junior class float. Riding on the float will be Linda Young.

Sandy Houghtby will ride the sophomore class float, which is entitled "Camelot."

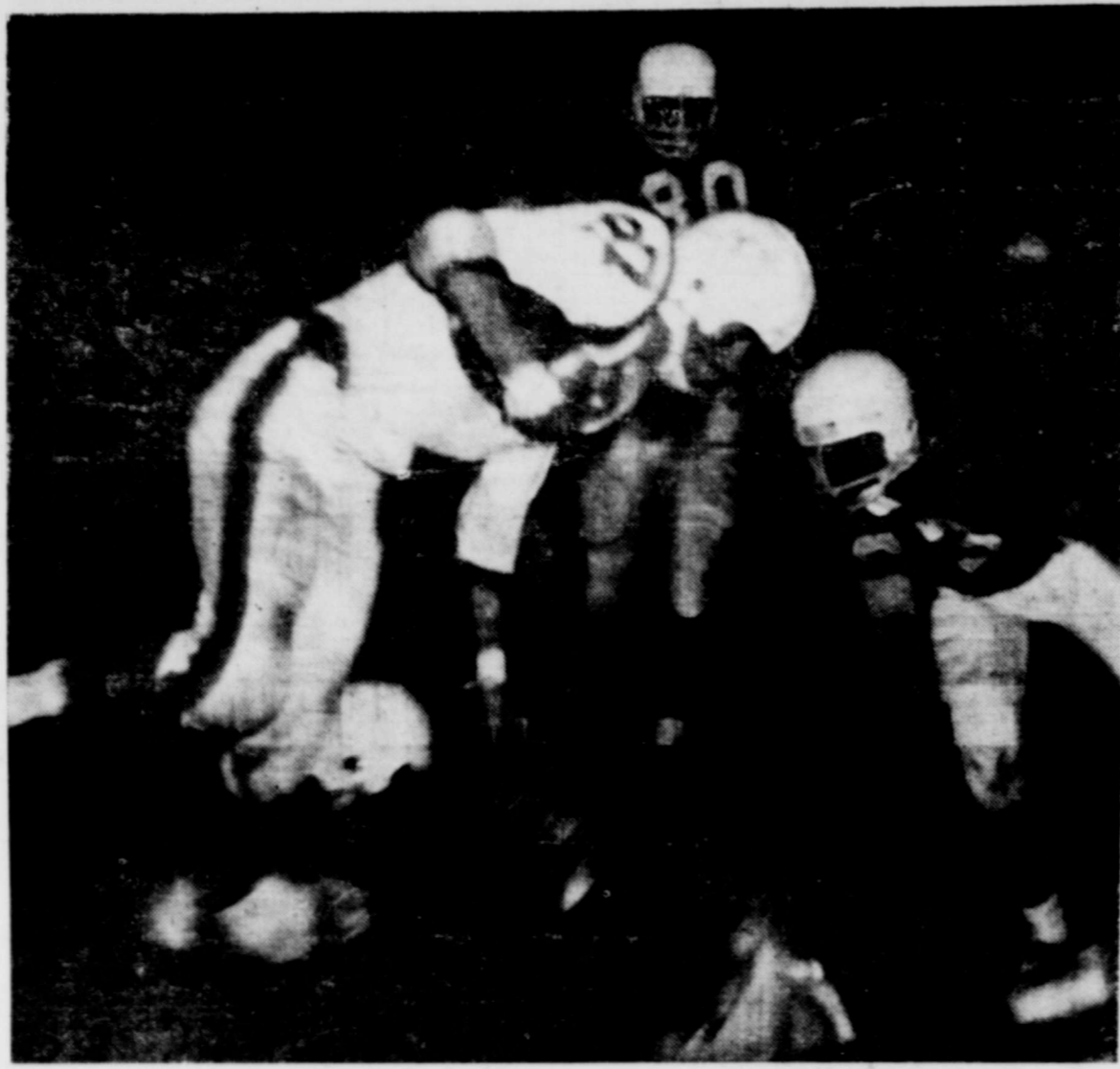

## DRINKING DRIVERS RUN NEW RISK OF BEING ARRESTED

Austin — Drinking drivers run a new risk of being nabbed — through a tell-tale scientific breath analysis device going into use in Texas.

Col. Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, Department of Public Safety Director, announced that 90 new "breathalyzers" have been purchased by the DPS and 450 highway patrolmen trained to operate them. Device will test a suspect's breath to determine the percentage of alcohol in the bloodstream.

Instruments, simple to operate and read, will be placed in 80 of the state's most-populous counties, at fixed locations and used under strictly-controlled scientific conditions.

Suspects who consent to the test will blow into a tube and the percentage of alcohol in their blood will register on indicators. About 15 minutes' waiting time is allowed before testing begins and actual test takes only five minutes. Experts report a direct relationship between alcohol content in blood and breath.

Drinking, according to DPS statistics, figures in 40 to 50 per cent of Texas' traffic deaths — perhaps more than 1,600 of last year's 3,367 highway fatalities. Over the nation, use of alcohol leads to annual traffic death toll of 25,000 and 800,000 vehicle accidents — the largest single actor in fatal crashes.

A driver with 0.15 per cent blood alcohol content by weight is 25 times more likely to be involved in a wreck than a non-drinking driver. Average person achieves that danger point after consuming five ounces of 100 proof alcohol an hour without eating, DPS chemists figure. Consumption leading to intoxication, of course, varies with weight, time between drinks and amount of food eaten.

Tests will "clear" drivers suspected of being drunk who are actually driving erratically due to illness or other reasons.

"It is hoped the DPS breathalyzer project will hit hard at the problem and help reduce the traffic death rate in Texas," Colonel Speir said.

A fast U.S. cargo ship will be designated the "1968 SANTA CLAUSE SPECIAL," sailing from Oakland, California next month with Christmas parcels.

To meet the sailing deadline and assure pre-holiday delivery of gifts sent with surface postage, items should be mailed during the October 14 - November 9 period. They should be marked "SANTA CLAUSE SPECIAL" just below the stamps.

The "SANTA CLAUSE SPECIAL" will sail during the latter half of November and stop at Da Nang, Qui Nhon, Cam Ranh Bay and Saigon, Vietnam. It takes approximately three weeks for a fast ship to cross the ocean.

All gifts should be packed in strong containers with adequate cushioning and correctly addressed, including APO and FPO numbers.

There are several options available for mailing to the military which can save money. Post offices across the nation have free pamphlets which outline the mailing programs for servicemen and women overseas.
