### Chicken 'n Biscuits for Your Family



There's nothing quite so good as chicken and biscuits when the chicken is freshly baked-the gravy is made from the pan drippings-and the biscuits are the crisp, brown, homemade kind. Biscuits made with a high-quality solid all-vegetable shortening are best since they have a mild delicate flavor and are sure to be flaky, tender and golden brown. ### PLANTATION CHICKEN 'N BISCUITS

- 4 pound roasting chicken | 2 cups sifted all-purpose Salt and pepper 1/3 cup butter or margarine 2-1/2 cups chicken stock 1/2 cup flour
- 2 cups light cream 1 tablespoon lemon juice 34 cup milk
- flour 3 teaspoons double-
- acting baking powder 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/3 cup Crisco shortening

Sprinkle inside of chicken with salt and pepper; place on rack in shallow roasting pan. Melt butter and brush on chicken. Roast in 350° (moderate) oven 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until tender. Brush frequently with butter. Cool chicken, remove meat from bones and slice. Arrange in shallow 2-quart dish or pan. Add stock to drippings in roasting pan; boil until liquid is reduced to 2-1/4 cups. Blend 1/2 cup flour with cream; stir into reduced liquid. Cook, stirring constantly, until sauce boils 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Add lemon juice and salt and pepper to taste. Pour over chicken.

About 1 hour before serving, combine 2 cups flour, the baking powder and 1 teaspoon salt in bowl. Cut in short-ening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add milk and stir until blended. Transfer to floured surface and knead lightly 10 times. Roll out dough 1/2 inch thick and cut with floured biscuit cutter. Arrange over chicken. Bake in 400° (hot) oven 30 minutes, or until biscuits are brown.






