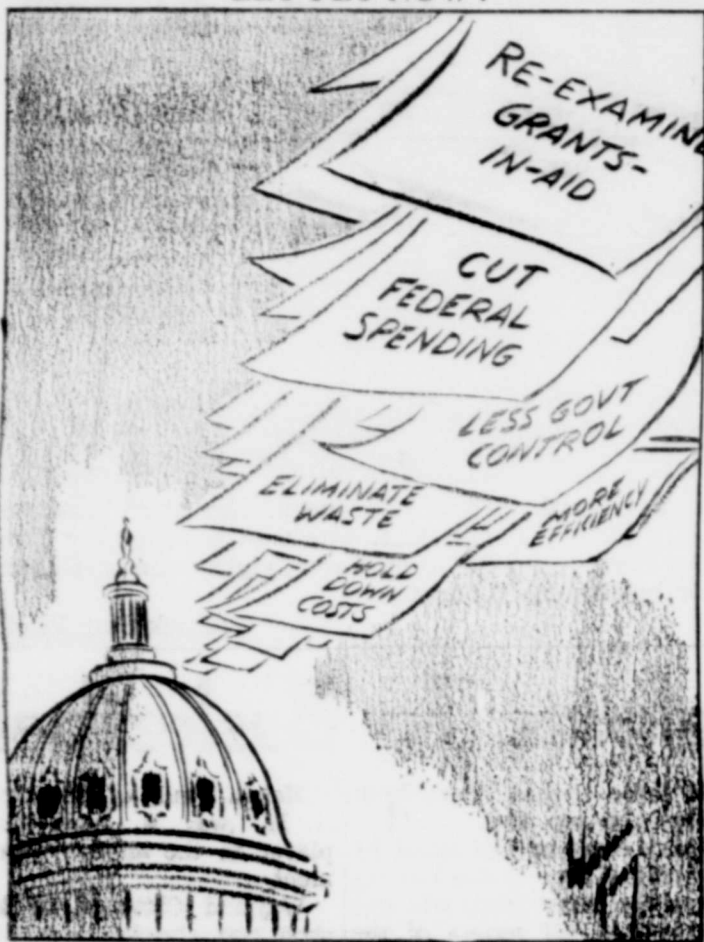

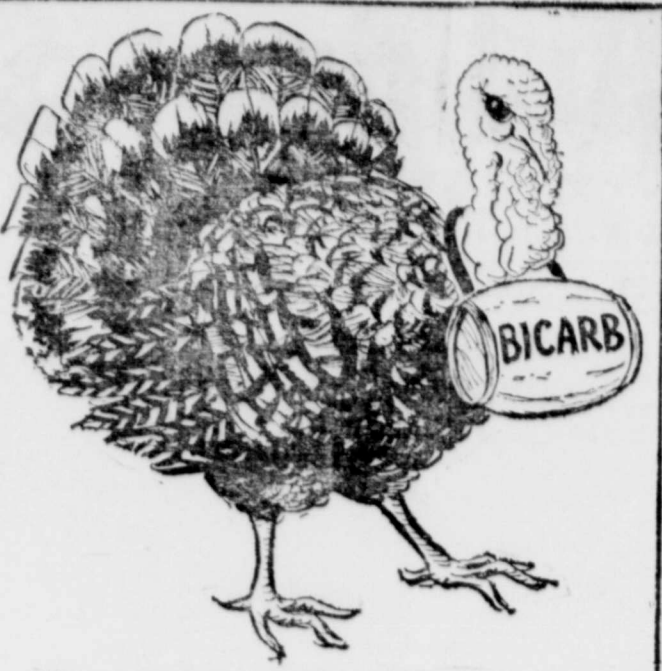

COUNTY H-D AGENT NEWS

Start now to make your plans and get your Christmas shopping done in a business-like way, suggests Thelma Wires, county home demonstration agent. Haphazard, last minute shopping can run the budget, as well as your disposition. It isn't too late to get plans well in mind.

Here are some suggestions that will help. Watch advertisements in local papers. They are filled with ideas. Before you shop, do some pencil planning by making out lists.

Take time to study catalogs or folders. You may want your gift sent directly from the store. This is certainly time saving — no packaging, no waiting in line at the Post Office. Be sure to take addresses to the store with you, if you plan to take advantage of the direct mailing service.

Get to the stores as early in the day as possible, you can accomplish a lot more. A schedule of where you will shop will help, too. List gifts to look for in each store. Give some thought to your "line of march" within the store or shopping center, you'll save miles of

back tracking. Any plan that puts you in control of the situation results in easier shopping, reminds the agent. Be efficient but not rushed, so your selection will be satisfying and suited to your gift budget.

Shrubs make lasting gifts for a young couple just starting out or for anyone on your list who enjoys adding plants to the landscape.

You will find a wide variety of ornamental shrubs to select from when Christmas comes. Also, native shrubs of ornamental value are found in all parts of Texas, so spot a few now, for gifts you plan to give.

Native plants found near your home will be especially well adapted to the soil and climate of the area. They may take less care than introduced plants.

Rose plants make fine gifts, too. There are many different types to choose from. . . best varieties for Texas are listed in "Roses for Texas," by A. F. DeWorth, head, department of Floriculture and Landscape Architecture, Texas A&M University. Reprints of this article are available from your county home demonstration agent, Thelma Wires. Get your copy and study, so your selection can be wise.

Check your own yard for little shrubs which may be under older ones.

You might take those geraniums up before long and make cuttings. By Christmas, they will make most interesting little gifts.

Your English Ivy has most likely taken on lots of new growth. Before long, take up a few little pieces, put them back and give during the holiday season.

If you plan and don't wait until the last minute you can save dollars and have fun making preparations.

It just won't be Thanksgiving and Christmas without the cranberries.

Insuring us adequate supplies of cranberries and at the same time maintaining a stable price for producers has been the purpose of new action taken by the cranberry industry. According to Thelma Wires, county home demonstration agent, this new approach is aimed at stabilizing market supplies.

This year's cranberry production is forecast at more than 150 million pounds, 7 per cent above last year and 9 per cent above average. USDA's Consumer and Marketing says supplies from this year's crop are already moving to market. You can select from whole cranberries, sauces and cocktails.

Include Cranberry Mince Relish in your holiday plans.

1 lb. can cranberry sauce, jellied
1/4 cup mince meat
1/4 cup chopped walnuts
Crush cranberry sauce with a fork. Stir in the mince meat and nut meats. Make 1 pint relish. It's delicious with meat.
