


huana. In the meantime, there is another side to marihuana that should be remembered, particularly by young people. Marihuana smoking is a criminal offense. Persons with criminal records are handicapped all through life. In many states, a person with a police record must meet special conditions to obtain or renew a driver's license. Conviction can prevent a person from being able to enter a profession such as medicine, law or teaching. It can make it difficult for him to get a responsible position in business or industry. Special hearings are necessary before he can hold a there, worked there, was a mment job.

In addition to the legal penalties of marihuana smoking, the health element is something for youthful pot smokers to keep in mind. Statements being reported by students that the use of marihuana is "medically safe" are not supported by scientific evidence. It is hoped that research now underway may add to the little currently known about the effects of the use of marihuana. Eventually, more will be known about marihuana and health. In the meantime, there is no mystery about marihuana and the law.

CASE FOR THE SHERIFF

Taxpayers can kick about high taxes, but little good it will do them if they continue to measure the performance of their elected representatives solely by their ability to push through spending programs that benefit local constituents. A U. S. Representative George H. Mahon, chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations, declares, "Following the right course in national fiscal affairs is not alone the decision of government. The will to bend to the job of containing inflationary pressures must spring from all segments of the economy-from business, industry, labor, the people generally. Everybody has a stake in it. Everybody has an obligation to restraint and disciptine . . . Men have recognized from the beginning that one of the chief dangers to stability of popular government is that it will throw away or erode its self-restraint and liscipline." A tax payer's revolt by people who want the 'other fellow' to make the sacrifices is about like the spendthrift who thinks he can beat the bill collectors if he refuses to pay his bills. He soon becomes a case for the sheriff.
