City Council unable to form a quorum; no action able to be taken

Special meeting called for Feb. 2 to address agenda items needing vote

Mayor Thomason called for a special meeting for Feb. 2 - Groundhog Day - to discuss and vote on the agenda items not able to

Councilmember Gloria Mc-Donald, Nick Ornelas, and Mayor Thomason. At least four members needed to be present in order to take action on any agenda items, however, with only three members present, the Council was only allowed to facilitate Public Comment, three public hearings, and a few scheduled presentations.

For the Public Comment section of the meeting, several community members came forth to show their support for the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce, United Way, and the Big Spring Convention & Visitors Bureau. The public comment focused on the agenda items aimed at addressing the Lease Agreements for the Big Spring Area Cham-

ber of Commerce and United Way, possible relocation of the CVB; and the discussion surrounding the Big Spring EDC and reappointment of two staff members.

Community members from around the area spoke in support for the three agencies and requested that the Council consider voting against the possibility of increasing rent or changing locations due to the altered state of the country already causing major struggles in smaller communities.

"Now is not the time to raise rent for people. Every penny that we have has got to go to help our citizens... We need every bit of the funds that we can get to help our citizens... I

hope that you would consider leaving things as they are right now," a member on the Board of Directors for United Way Kenda Jones said.

Community members from District 5 and 6 also came

Midland Health donates 800 Pfizer vaccines to Scenic Mountain Medical Center

Special to the Herald On Tuesday, January 26th, Midland Health graciously allocated 800 of the Pfizer vaccines to Scenic Mountain Medical Center (SMMC) to aid in vaccinating the Big Spring and surrounding communities. Scenic Mountain will hold a community vaccination clinic on Wednesday and Thursday, January 27 - 28, from 10 am to 4 pm at Scenic Mountain Medical Center Whatley Plaza, located on the northwest corner of the hospital's front parking lot. Scenic Mountain Medical Center is located at 1601 W. 11th Place in Big Spring. "All of us at Scenic Mountain Medical Center, as

well as the Big Spring community, are incredibly grateful to Russell Meyers and his team at Midland Health for including our community in their COV-ID-19 vaccine allocation," said Stacey Brown, President of Scenic Mountain Medical Center. "This demonstrates once again how our area hospitals have come together in the best interest of public health."

The vaccine will be available to individuals who fall within Phase 1A, frontline workers, and Phase 1B, over the age of 65 and people with medical conditions that put them at a greater risk of severe disease or death from COVID-19. Medical conditions include but are not limited to:

- Cancer
- · Chronic kidney disease
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease) · Heart conditions, such as heart failure, coro-
- nary artery disease or cardiomyopathies
- Solid organ transplantation
- Obesity and severe obesity (body mass index of I Couldant) 30 kg/m2 or higher)
- Pregnancy
- · Sickle cell disease
- Type 2 diabetes mellitus

Vaccines will be offered on a first-come-first- I served basis until 4 pm or until vaccine supply is served basis until 4 pm or until vaccine supply is 1900 E. 3rd exhausted. Once arrived, please enter through the north driveway entrance off Martin Luther King Blvd. Follow the direction to the waiting lot; staff will be directing traffic. Wait in your car and once our clinic staff is ready for you, they will escort you inside to register and receive your vaccine. The vaccine is free of charge. These vaccines are designated for first dose administration only. The Pfizer vaccine cannot be administrated to those who have already received the Moderna vaccine. Second doses of the vaccine will be scheduled once that shipment is received.

forth to the Council to express their concerns about not having proper representation of their districts with some of the agenda items for Tuesday night's meeting. District 5 and 6 makeup one-third of the Big Spring population and currently do not have representation in the Council.

Afterward, recognition was given to four new Big Spring Police Officers. The new Big Spring Police Officers recognized included Officer Dario Panedo, Officer Castro, Officer Joseph Bryant, and Officer Edgardo Cuevas.

"We appreciate all these gentlemen for stepping up to serve and protect the citizens of Big Spring," Mayor Thomason said.

There was also a presentation to city employees for their 10, 15, and 20 years of service to the city. Deputy Chief Christopher Glen, Deputy Chief J. Holt, Lieutenant Channley Delt, Judge Timothy Green, Kathy Ontiveros, and Christopher Mahern, were the employees recognized for their 20 years of service to the city. City employees Lieutenant Jeffrey Wright and Steve Selenas were recognized

for their 15 years of service to the city. For their 10 years of service, Robert Hicks and Sergeant Keith Jones were also recognized during the meeting.

Another presentation was given of the Planning

and Zoning Commission's Final Report to City Council concerning amendments to the Big Spring Zoning Ordinance regarding carports and accessory uses, travel trailers, recreational vehicles and manufactured housing, and short-term rentals. Without a quorum, no action could be taken on the newly presented amendments, however, public hearings were held for each amended ordinance. While a public hearing was held on each amendment proposal - carports and accessory uses, travel trailers, recreational vehicles and manufactured housing, and short-term rentals – no public comment was made.

During the City Manager's Report, City Manager Todd Darden spoke on the Large Item Pickup Update for District One. According to Darden, for District One, over 25,000 pounds of trash was picked up from residents. The next Large Item Pickup for District 2 will take place on Feb. 17. The last day to schedule a pickup for District 2 is Feb. 16.

Darden also gave an update regarding the E-

waste event that took place on Jan. 23. According to Darden, the event was deemed a success as Big Spring residents were able to get rid of unused electronics free of charge.

"We appreciate the citizens that participated in the event and we hope to do more like it," Darden said.

Gutierrez said. "Our classes aren't humongous, so we have the opportunity to really get to know all of our students."

Big Spring ISD announces Cannon McWilliams as District Athletic Director

Big Spring ISD has officially announced the appointment of Cannon McWilliams as the district's Athletic Director. The move was made at a recent BSISD Board Meeting, with long-time Big Spring HS principal Mike Ritchey relinquishing the role in favor of McWilliams.

The decision comes early into the new semester, allowing a seamless transition both for Mc-Williams into the role, and for Ritchey to return focusing sole attention to the administrative and education side of the high school. Ritchey had been actively maintaining both the role of high school principal and athletic director since the departure of then-AD/Head Coach Mitch McLemore early in

That timeframe also marked the beginning of Mc-Williams' tenure as head football coach, following two years as the team's Defensive Coordinator. In the two seasons since taking over the role, McWilliams has led a shift in the programs culture and identity while also providing much needed stabil-

ity. Prior to McWilliams' appointment, Big Spring was entering into a third coaching change in four seasons after the retirement of long-time AD/Head Coach Phillip Ritchey.

The outlook going forward for the entirety of the department, as well as the football program, is as steady as it has been over the last five years. There will be immediate benefits for McWilliams taking over after Ritchey steadied the department for nearly two years, rather than in the midst of another transition period. The belief is that McWilliams will be able to hit the ground running

and quickly elevate the entire department with a very similar focus and blueprint as to what Ritchey had installed during his time at the helm.

Speaking on McWilliams' abilities, Ritchey said, "That's why it was easy to step down, because you have someone in place that has the leadership, he's a great supporter, he cares, he's passionate about not only football, but all sports, all programs, all

The effects will be felt beyond just the athletic department, however. The move allows Ritchey to return his full focus back to the role of principal and guiding Big Spring HS through what has been, understandably, 12 months that have been unlike any other stretch of time. Ritchey also cited a chance to be with his family more going forward as an additional reason for handing the reins off to McWilliams.

"I'm excited about solely focusing on one detail, one responsibility as being the high school principal," Ritchey said. "I can be there more frequently for teach-

ers and I'm excited about that, for other programs that aren't sports related but are just as important for the culture of Big Spring High School, but above all I can get to my family as needed."

For Big Spring Steer athletics, and the High School campus then, this feels more like a tweak than a full-on change — and one that leaves both sides with more positives to look forward in the

Dear Athletic Support: One of my children's junior high coaches has been making very strong political posts on his social media page. I'm trying to keep this as vague as possible



Brantley rejoins Astros to complete unfinished business

An erroneous report saying Michael Brantley had agreed to a contract with the Toronto Blue Jays had the outfielder fielding goodbye texts from his Houston Astros teammates most of Wednesday morning.

By the afternoon those same teammates were sending him notes of congratulations and welcoming him back after he agreed to a \$32 million, two-year contract with the Astros. He will earn salaries of \$16 million annually.

"There were a lot of a lot of mixed emotions, obviously, in a small timeframe," Brantley said Monday. "But I got a lot of great texts and I'm excited to be back, and a lot of my teammates reached out to me and they're excited that I'm coming back. So it means the world to me."

While Brantley never had a deal in place with Toronto, he admitted he was in

discussions with the team.

'We were close," he said. "Obviously we were in talks and there was interest on both sides, but... everything worked for where I wanted to be.'

Houston general manager James Click said the team had been in conversations with Brantley for months, but negotiations heated up when the Astros learned the Blue Jays also were pursuing him. The Astros had already lost George Springer to the Blue Jays a day before when he signed a \$150 million, six-year contract, and they couldn't afford to lose another starting outfielder.

"I don't know if there's any substitute for the feeling that something might might be going away to really make you focus on how much you value something," Click said.







Pass 1 NT Opening lead — ace of diamonds. This deal is from Dorothy Hayden Truscott's book "Bid Better, Play Better." It appears in the chapter called "The Art of Signaling," which does much to dispel the confusion

over what constitutes a signal. The hand is a fine example of the effectiveness of defensive signals and the subtle ways they can be applied. Actually — though she does not mention it — the deal occurred in a national pair championship, where Truscott sat West and B. Jay Becker, the former editor of this column, sat

Tomorrow: Good management.

She led the ace of diamonds, and Becker signaled with the ten for a continuation. His ten play was based on the possibility that his partner might have the A-x or A-J-x of diamonds, in which case he wanted the suit continued.

But, oddly enough, the ten was read by Truscott — very properly as a good reason to stop playing the suit. She realized that Becker couldn't have the K-J-10, since he would have signaled with the jack rather than the ten with that holding. (It is customary to signal with the highest of equal cards, so East's failure to play the jack indicated that South had that card.)

Since another diamond lead would establish dummy's queen as a trick. Truscott shifted to the jack of spades. After this play, South had to lose two spades and two diamonds and go down one.

Another odd twist occurred when Becker played the ordinarily discouraging deuce on the spade jack though he was delighted with the shift. Declarer ducked, but Truscott, realizing that he might have no higher spade to signal with, led another spade.

Thus, the overall effect was that Truscott discontinued diamonds when Becker encouraged them, and continued spades when he discouraged them, and as a result, the contract was defeated.







Five years ago: The Ferguson, Missouri, Police Department agreed to overhaul its policies, training and practices as part of a sweeping deal with the Justice Department following the 2014 fatal police shooting of 18-year-old Michael Brown. As he honored four people for risking their lives to protect Jews, President Barack Obama warned during a visit to the Israeli Embassy in Washington that anti-Semitism was on the rise; he said an attack on any faith was an attack on all faiths.
