Making A Difference By Rex M. Rogers

Gambling is a moral cancer in society

I grew up in a Christian home that considered gambling in all its forms to be wrong. I was never permitted to use "playing cards," and my parents were suspicious of most other kinds of cards as well. We used dice when we played Monopoly, but that was about all, and I never pitched pennies as a boy or participated in office pools as an adult.

As a youth I had a difficult time understanding why gambling might be wrong because I tended to focus on the device, like cards or dice. But the device is not intrinsically evil. Cards, dice, pennies, dollar bills, horses, greyhound dogs--all sometime-instruments of gambling--are no more evil than baseball, basketball, or golf--also instruments of gambling.

Gambling is immoral because it is a wrong use of the resources that God entrusts to us. Gambling is not, in the words of a newspaper columnist, "benign entertainment." Gambling is a potentially addictive misuse of funds.

The biblical principle that gambling violates is stewardship. It is to God that we must give account for every action, every word, every use of the time, talent, and treasure He has granted to us. God says in Proverbs that "he who works his land will

have abundant food, but he who chases fantasies. They yield to the lure of quick riches, the "something for nothing" enchantment.

Gambling is a black hole, a bottomless pit. It doesn't matter what device we use, gambling always asks us to play the odds, and always in the long run gambling wins. Gambling is a moral can-

cer. Fight it at every turn.

Protecting Seniors From Financial Exploitation

Protecting the elderly is a top priority for my administration. Our agency is responsible for enforcing nursing home standards and for investigating and prosecuting Medicaid fraud. But as many of you know, senior Texans also need our support and protection in the area of financial exploitation.

Financial exploitation comes in many forms, ranging from employees, caregivers, and even family members who take money and property from the elderly without permission, to conartists who wheedle and trick financial information, checks, and cold cash from trusting or confused seniors. We tell seniors over and over that it is okay to hang up on telemarketers announcing prizes and lottery winnings and special opportunities available "today only." If you know a senior Texan who has just won a foreign lottery, please show him or her this column. Foreign lotteries are weil known scams, and they rob many thousands of people of their life savings every year. This month, we will be recognizing a number of individuals who have made an outstanding effort to protect senior Texans from financial exploitation. They are bank tellers who were alert enough to notice when elderly customers began to make withdrawals in a pattern that signaled possible financial abuse. These tellers, like many banking professionals, were aware of the telltale signs of financial abuse and exploitation. They not only spotted the abuse, but then went the extra mile, helping their customers to change their account numbers, credit card and PIN numbers, and even their phone numbers, in order to secure their accounts from unscrupulous telemarketers. We ask tellers to look out for elderly customers who seem confused, or who are accompanied by other persons who may be exerting pressure or undue influence. It is not unheard of for cons to accost an elderly person in a bank parking lot, and use threats to make the customer

Colon cancer is the second leading cause of death in both men and women in the United States. Colon cancer is preventable and frequently curable.

Colon cancer can occur with no symptoms. That's why regular screening is so important, even if you are feeling fine.

The following symptoms might indicate colorectal cancer:

- A change in bowel habits diarrhea or constipation
- Unexplained weight loss
- Blood in stool or anemia
- Narrower than normal stool or feeling that the bowel does not empty completely
- Abdominal discomfort (gas, bloating, fullness, cramps)

Screening tools currently being used:

- Flexible sigmoidoscopy is a visual examination of the lower third of the colon.
- Colonoscopy is the "gold standard" for colorectal screening. It is a more thorough visualization of the entire colon to look for suspicious lesions or to remove polyps.

Who should be screened for colon cancer? Everyone age 50 years or older.

High risk groups: Family history of inherited forms of colon cancer, history of inflammatory bowel disease, and personal or family history of colon cancer or polyps.

Texas House Bill #1467, effective September 1, 2001, stated that all health benefit plans delivered, issued or renewed on or after January 1, 2002 covers preventive colon cancer screening for individuals not meeting high risk criteria at age 50. Insurances will pay for average risk patients to have colonoscopy every 10 years.



After serving 4 years in the United States Navy, James was an electrician for 48 years, retiring from EEX, Sweetwater, TX.






