

Costliest Cases

The campaign director said that in addition to the various types of prolonged and costly treatment required, thousands of patients need new appliances, braces, new wheelchairs and other equipment essential to everyday life.

"Many hundreds each year," he said, "must live encased in respirators, with nurses constantly in attendance; these are the most costly cases of all. Their care may range from \$7,000 to \$10,000 a year, and sometimes much more."

In its 13 years of existence, the director revealed, the National Foundation has spent some \$94,than were sent last year. The 000.000 in patient care, almost total of cards and parcel post two-thirds of it in the last three years. An increasing part of each year's expenditure has been for patients from previous years' epi-

demics, he said, for with continued high polio incidence in succesive years the number of long-term cases increases.

"Even this is not the full bill, since many thousands will look to us for help in 1951, if they are to continue their lives under conditions as normal as science and money can make them," Mr. Cabaniss continued. "We cannot let them down; we must open our hearts as never before in the 1951 March of Dimes."

Mr. Cabaniss predicted this year's March of Dimes would be "the most intensive of its kind in local history." He said March of Dimes committees were now being organized and that all members chosen thus far were determined that "this year's appeal will set a new record to match the increased size of the need."



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

A report recommending construction of the Three Rivers dam and reservoir on the Nueces River as a solution to the water problem of the Coastal Bend region is now being studied by high Washington officials, according to reports received here this week. Harry P. Burleigh of Austin, area planning engineer for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, who made the report after a survey of the entire Nueces River basin, last week took the final report to Washington.

The report will be studied by the various agencies affected such as the U. S. Geological Survey, the National Park Service, the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and others.

Then the report, with the comments of the various agencies, will go to the Secretary of the Interior for his final approval. After receiving his endorsement, the report will be sent to the Bureau of the Budget for thorough study and comments. 
