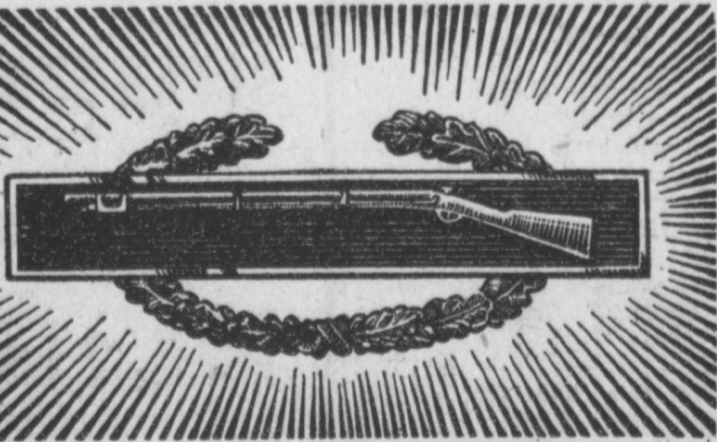

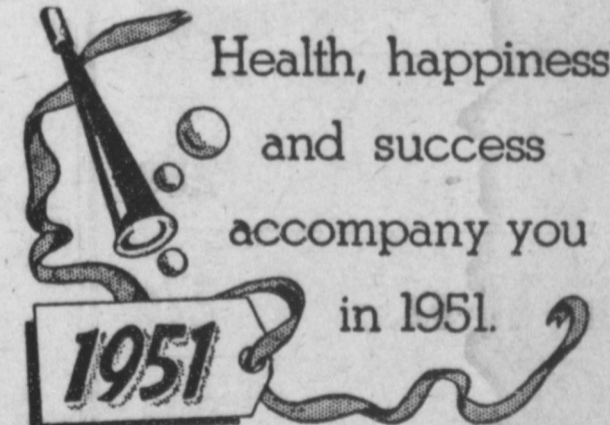

FEBRUARY DRAFT CALL EXCEEDS ONE FOR JANUARY

February draft call for Texas for 2,559 men—exceeds by 522 the call for January, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, has announced.

The January call, received in early November, was for 2,037. The December call, now being filled by state Selective Service Boards, is for 2,008.

Local board quotas for the February call will not be made up and sent to the local boards until sometime after the first of the year. Calls are usually sent to local boards about a month before deliveries are to be made.

The February call of 2,559 brings the number of men called for from Texas since the beginning of the conflict in Korea to 15,084. First call was filled in September for 2,513.

The 2,559 Texans called for in the February induction period is the state's share of a national quota of 50,000 announced several days ago in Washington by the

Department of Defense. National quota for January is 40,000.

Calls are made by the Secretary of Defense on the national director of Selective Service in Washington, who allots quotas to the states on the basis of federal draft regulations. Under the same regulations, state directors fix quotas to their local boards.

General Wakefield, the Texas state director, described Texas as "prepared to supply men to fill the February quota." He said that Texas "has plenty of men examined and acceptable to fill December, January and February quotas."

The highest monthly quota received by Texas since Americans entered the fighting in Korea was for November, a total of 3,453. General Wakefield said this quota, as well as all others, have been filled.

The state director revealed that approximately 7,500 draft registrants will be given pre-induction examinations in January in preparation to fill calls for March and later months.

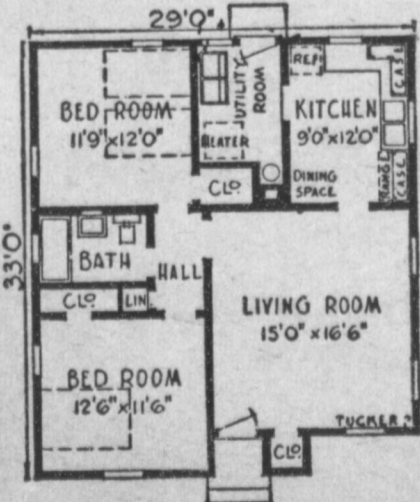

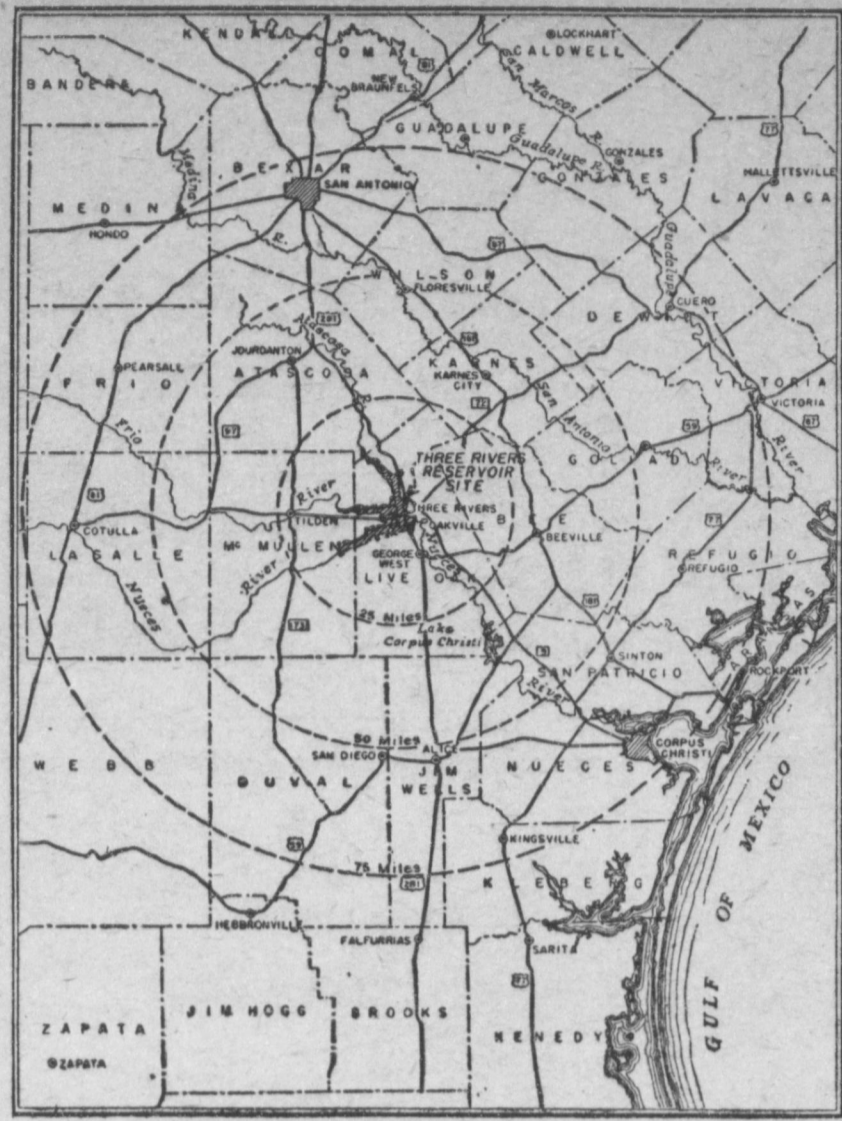

It will be the largest fresh water lake in the region, covering approximately 60,000 acres, and is designed to supply the water needs of eight South Texas counties for the next 50 years. The map above shows the distances from the lake to various towns throughout the region.

Washington Officials Studying Coastal Bend Water Problems

A report recommending construction of the Three Rivers dam and reservoir on the Nueces River as a solution to the water problem of the Coastal Bend region is now being studied by high Washington officials, according to reports received here this week.

Harry P. Burleigh of Austin, area planning engineer for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, who made the report after a survey of the entire Nueces River basin, last week took the final report to Washington.

The report will be studied by the various agencies affected such as the U. S. Geological Survey, the National Park Service, the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and others.

Then the report, with the comments of the various agencies, will go to the Secretary of the Interior for his final approval.

After receiving his endorsement, the report will be sent to the Bureau of the Budget for thorough study and comments.

After that, it will be laid before the next session of Congress, probably about March 1, for final action.

A large delegation of South Texas civic leaders and business men favoring construction of the dam is expected to appear before Congressional committees to urge approval of the plan, while opponents of the plan from Three Rivers have stated that they likewise will send a delegation to Washington.

The project is the outgrowth of more than a year's work by South Texas leaders to find a long-range solution to the water problem.

At first the Lower Nueces River Water Supply District set out to find an adequate supply of water for the Corpus Christi area. Officials from Cotulla and other South Texas communities then suggested that an effort be made to solve the water problem of the entire Coastal Bend region instead of the Corpus Christi Bay area alone.

The U. S. Bureau of Reclamation was requested to survey the entire Nueces River basin and recommend the most practical solution to the water problem.

The University of Texas bureau of business research was called on to determine how much water would be required during the next 50 years. They estimated that 400,000 acre-feet per year would be required sometime between 1985 and the year 2000.

On that basis, the Bureau of Reclamation recommended construction of a large dam and reservoir about four miles below Three Rivers at a cost of \$38,000,000.

The federal government will build the dam, and the federal money will be repaid with two percent interest through the sale of

The project has drawn sharp opposition from civic leaders in Three Rivers, since the town would have to be relocated to avoid flooding.

The Bureau of Reclamation estimates that the reservoir will provide enough water to meet the needs of Aransas, Bee, Jim Wells, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio counties for at least 50 years.
