A party of four fished with Crist Tuesday, bringing in 120 fish.

W. A. Cobb of Corpus Christi and Mr. Stanley of Falfurrias, fished with Hugh Morrison on the "Rambler" Saturday, getting 107 trout. Mr. and Mrs. George Hall and the Maspero brothers of San Antonio, caught 122 trout Sunday. On Monday Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Watson of San Antonio and Matt Scott of Rockport landed 119 trout, and on Tuesday E. B. Clark and party of four from Tyler, brought in 106.

Mrs. J. B. Green of Houston has been having good luck fishing at Palm Village. She caught four nice trout Wednesday morning, two of them 17 inches long. She fishes with artificial bait.

Mills Wharf reports fishing fine all through the past week. Most of the boats have gone out every day and each of them has brought in good catches of trout. The trout seem to be larger recently.

At Perry Jones' Wharf the fishermen are getting lots of trout, both from the boats and at the pier.

The city of Corpus Christi furnished the beef which was provided by Swift and Co., ration free for the celebration.

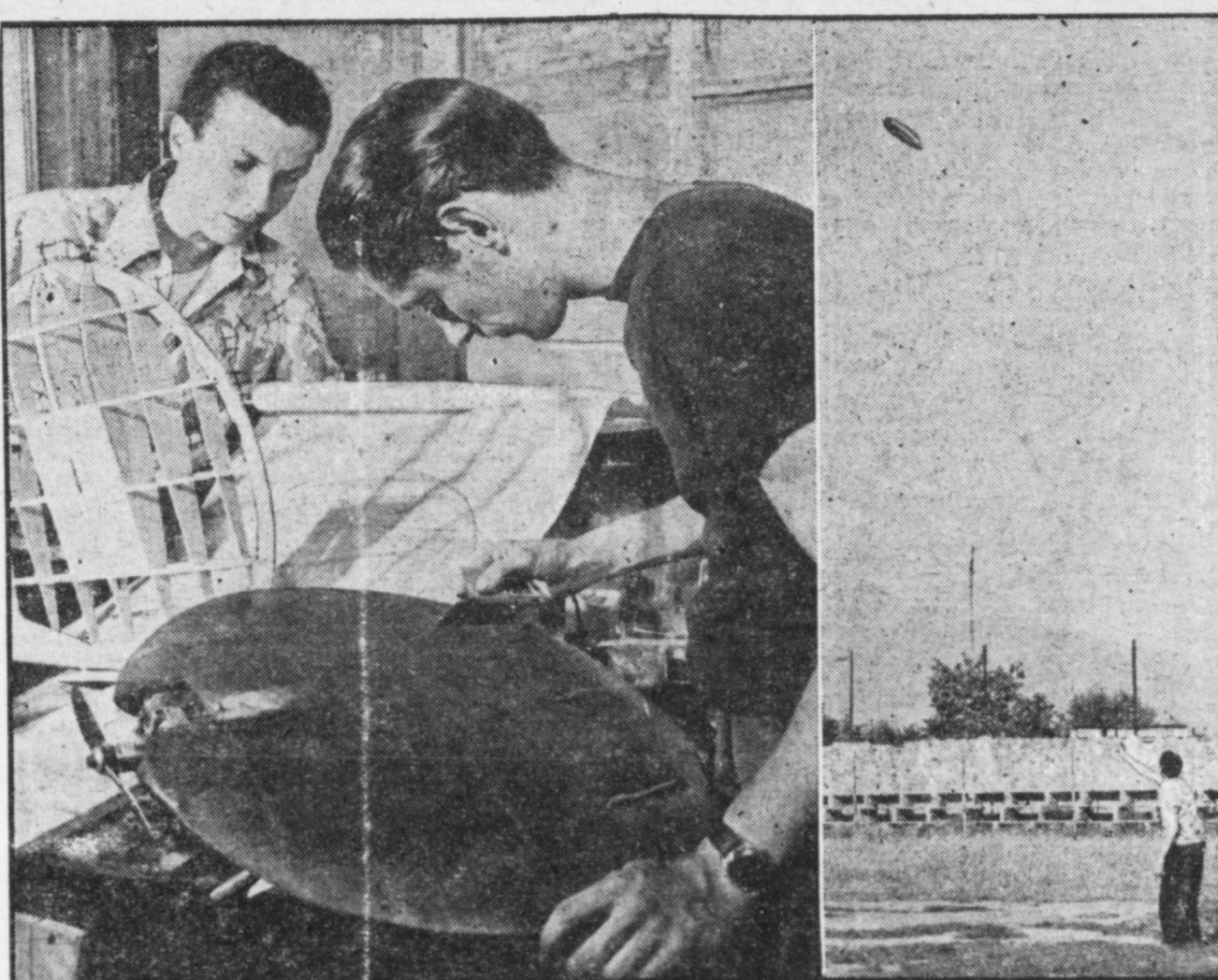

U. S. APPROVES HUNTING DATES

Austin, Texas. — The executive secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission has been notified of U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service approval of recommended mourning dove hunting regulations for Texas.

He also was advised by telegram that the fall waterfowl regulations for Texas will be approved probably on August 8.

The federal agency has final authority over dove and waterfowl regulations since doves, ducks and geese are migratory.

It approved a 40-day mourning dove hunting season for North Texas beginning Sept. 1 and a 40-day season for South Texas beginning Oct. 1. Shooting will be restricted to afternoons, beginning at 12 o'clock noon and ending at sunset. The limits are ten birds per day and ten in possession.

The Washington agency also approved the whitewing season, recommended by the commission, for Sept. 12, 14 and 16, shooting to begin at 4 p. m. and to last until sunset. The limit is the same as mourning doves.

Both mourning dove and whitewing dove regulations are identical with 1951 except that the South Zone mourning dove opening date was changed from Nov. 15 to Oct. 1 and the whitewing dates were altered to provide for a weekend hunting period beginning on a Friday and extending through a Tuesday.

The executive secretary said all indications were that the waterfowl regulations will be announced much earlier than last year. He has been designated to attend a National Flyway Conference on Aug. 5 which will have a part in final decisions.

The Game & Fish Commission has recommended Texas be zoned for waterfowl, with a proposed north zone season beginning Oct. 31 and a proposed south zone season starting Nov. 21. On the theory that a longer season than the 50-day 1951 season may be allowed if the zoning request fails, the commission asked that statewide waterfowl hunting begin Oct. 31.

Texas had a 50-day waterfowl season last year, beginning Nov. 9 and ending Dec. 28.

EAST FULTON WELL MAKES MORE OIL

The Placid Oil Company No. 1 Fulton Outlet Unit 5, second on-shore test for the new East Fulton Beach Field, Aransas County, had recovered pipe line oil on two more drillstem tests and Tuesday was at 7,888 feet, reaming to drill ahead to 8,000 feet.

On a 15-minute test at 7,741-45 feet, through 3/4-inch chokes, working pressure was 165 pounds and recovery was 1,500 feet of pipe line oil and 100 feet of oil cut mud. Bottomhole pressures were 3,075 and 3,550 pounds.

On a test at 7,702-07 feet, with packer set at 7,700 feet, top pressure was 120 pounds, recovery was 450 feet of pipe line oil and 260 feet of mud cut oil and bottomhole pressures were 1,975 and 3,025 pounds.

This well, 1,100 feet northwest of the field's dual gas-oil discovery, had made pipe line oil on a test at 7,155-61 feet, oil cut mud and salt water at 7,492 1/2-500 feet and salt water on tests at 7,507-13 and 7,555-58 feet.

The field discovery was at the A. O. Phillips and Bonner Smith No. 1 L. E. Sanders, Jr., completed for oil on perforations at 7,176-80 and 7,192-98 feet and for gas and distillate at 7,118-28 feet.

Offshore from the East Fulton Beach discovery, the Atlantic Refining Company No. 1 State Tract 122, in Aransas Bay, was drilling at 7,668 feet. Atlantic still was releasing no information on the No. 1-121, which is bottomed at 8,836 feet and has pipe set at an undisclosed depth.

In the Lamar Field part of Aransas Bay, the Sun Oil Company No. 1 Aransas State 77 was testing on perforations at 8,602-08 feet. It has 5 1/2-inch casing set at 8,616 feet, a foot off bottom.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 385, Aransas County strike two miles east of Lamar, recovered 18.4 barrels of oil and 607,000 cubic feet of gas daily on a 24-hour test through 3/4-inch chokes from perforations at 8,170-90 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 33-100-1. Working pressure on the test was 425 pounds.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 372, wildcat six miles southeast of Lamar, was drilling at 5,767 feet on a slated 8,750-foot permit.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 51 Copano Bay State Tract 32, in West Fulton Beach Field, will be 330 feet from the south and west lines of Tract 32. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 42 Copano Bay State Tract 47, in the East Fulton Beach Field, will be 1,787 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of Tract 47. It will also be 1,320 feet north of Sun's No. 31, an oil well in the same tract. Permit depth is 6,600 feet.

Richardson & Bass of Ft. Worth has made locations for two more slated 13,000-foot Aransas County wildcats eight miles southeast of Rockport.

The firm's No. 1 State Tract 262 (No. 31907) is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east line of State Tract 262 in Aransas Bay and 2,800 feet northwest of St. Joseph Island.

Location for No. 1 State Tract 235 is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west line of State Tract 235 in Aransas Bay and 1,140 feet west of St. Joseph Island.

Operators are releasing no information on these tests, but one small gas discovery has been unofficially reported.

Richardson & Bass No. 1 in State Tract 265 (No. 31910), opener of the Blind Pass (Frio) Field eight miles southeast of Rockport in Aransas County, was completed for 8.8 million cubic feet of gas daily.

Gas-distillate ratio was 76,400-1. The distillate was 52 gravity. Production was through perforations at 7,998 to 8,010 feet in 7-inch casing at 11,889 feet.

Tubing pressure was 3,365 pounds on an 11/64-inch choke and 24-hour shutin pressure was 4,040 pounds.

C. G. Glasscock and Pontiac Refining Corp. No. 8 Copano Bay State Tract 48, in West Fulton Beach Field, will be 660 feet from the south and west lines of that tract.

Leased For Development Airport Property to Be

The Commissioners Court of Aransas County are asking for bids for the leasing for oil, gas and mineral development on approximately 100 acres of property belonging to the Aransas County airport.

Due to favorable shows in the Sanders well and Placid Co., adjoining or nearby the property, it is expected that quite a bit of interest will be shown by bidders.

In a legal notice on another page of this issue of The Pilot, a description of the property involved is listed. Instructions to bidders, form of oil, gas and mineral lease, copies of operating agreement between Aransas County and the United States Navy, who have the property leased for airport purposes, are available at the office of Judge John Wendell, county judge.

The children will be under the supervision of the Future Homemakers, who are earning extra summer credits. Games, stories, records and refreshments will be provided each day. Mothers are invited to visit the school if they so desire.

Wyoming Asks Help In Hunting Antelope

AUSTIN—Wyoming needs outside help to reduce an over-population of prong-horned antelope, reports Lester Bagley, Wyoming Game and Fish Commission, in a letter to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Bagley writes that Wyoming is faced with the problem of reducing its antelope herd by approximately 40,000 head, and adds: "We are soliciting your cooperation in sending as many of your (Texas) hunters as you can to hunt antelope in Wyoming."

The Wyoming request coincided with the Texas Game and Fish Commission's decision to close the season on Texas antelope this year because of severe herd losses from drought.

The Wyoming season varies in different areas. The earliest opening is September 3; latest closing date is October 14. The season limit is one antelope in all except the Northeastern area where two may be taken with two permits. Out-of-state permits cost \$25 each. Further information may be secured by writing the Wyoming Game and Fish Commission, Box 335, Cheyenne, Wyoming.

If the letter is to serve as an application for a permit, the \$25 fee should be enclosed. The applicant also should give his age, physical description and designate the area in which he wishes to hunt. Permits are issued only for one of the 16 specified areas. Season dates in most areas are either September 3-15, Sept. 15-22, or September 3 to October 3. However, the season in the big Northeastern Area, where permits for two antelopes may be secured, is from September 20 to October 14. Deer also may be taken in the Northeastern Area where the seasons partially overlap. Deer permits are \$30 each.

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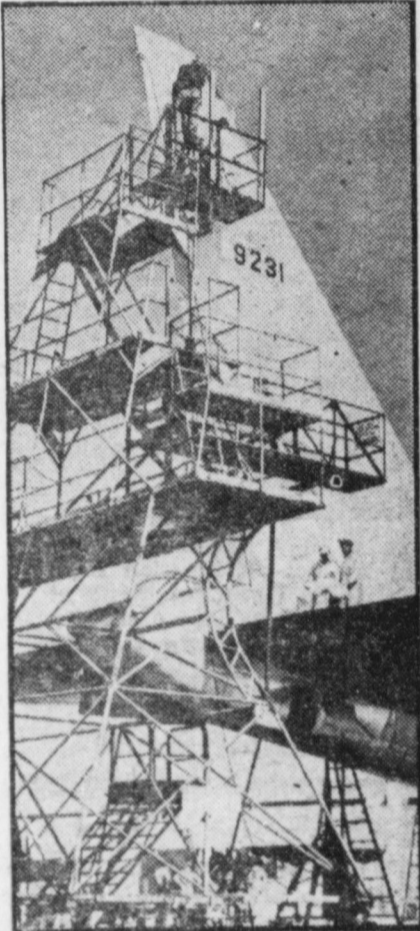
Skating Rink Opened On Beach Last Friday

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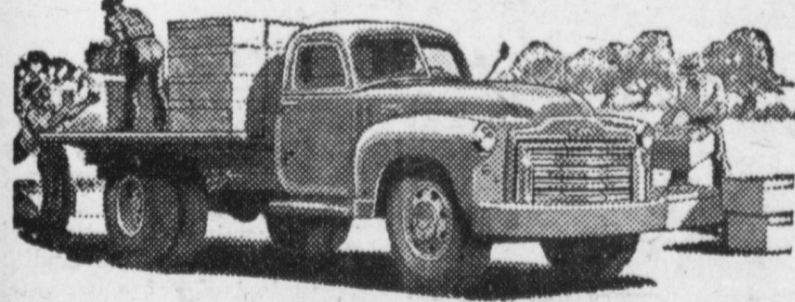

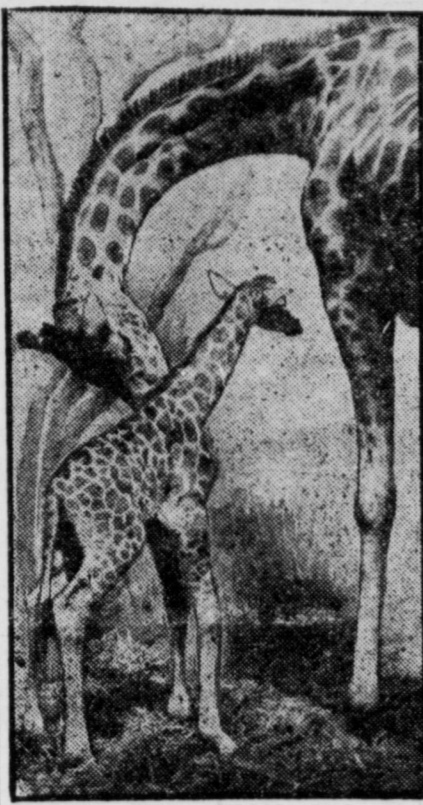

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Payments to Retiring Workers Now Figured By New Method

Anyone who has been in work covered by social security since Jan. 1, 1951, and who is now 65 years old has the advantage of a "new start" under the Social Security act.

This means that many persons now have enough employment after 1950 to have their old-age and survivors insurance figured under the new formula. Benefit payments to a retired worker range from \$20 to \$80 monthly. Monthly benefits to a family may be as much as \$150.

Since all retirement and family insurance payments are based on the earnings of each worker, Cleveland cautioned employers of domestic workers, farm help, or other newly-covered groups to be sure to file accurate and complete tax returns.

Anyone who is over 65 and in doubt about his standing with respect to social security payments should call, write or visit the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi. Experienced personnel there will explain the old-age and survivors insurance provisions.

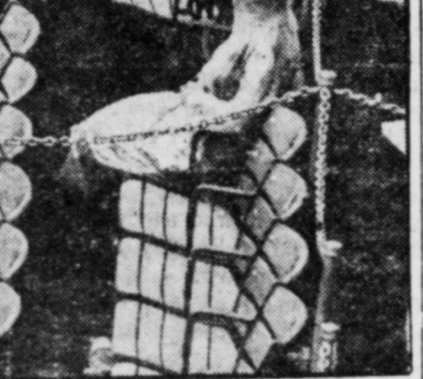

Health Talks

The package that mankind comes wrapped in at birth has a heap of stretching—and growing to do to cover the same person at 40 years of age that it wrapped up as an infant. If after-40 is a period of continuous spread, the so-called middle-age spread, that packaging has an even bigger job to do.

That package is known as skin and different periods of life are noted for the different aspects of the skin. That soft, velvet texture and peaches-and-cream look of infancy means little to the infant but is the cherished aim of his older female relatives. The hiccups and bumps that are the heartbreak of adolescence, the glow that marks the skin during pregnancy, the folds and wrinkles that foretell aging are all part of life's cycle.

A baby's skin is very delicate, and for the first few days after births should be cleaned only with oil, olive or mineral oil. Some babies are born with birthmarks, either blood-vessel birthmarks or moles. Other babies develop rashes, ether from outside contact with substances that are too harsh for the skin or from internal contact with substances that set up a skin reaction.

During childhood the skin is usually pretty well ignored except for stubbed toes, bruised knees and such. And except for the "rash" childhood diseases such as measles, chicken pox and scarlet fever. These rarely leave any mark upon the skin, except for an occasional pockmark from an infected chicken pox.

It is during adolescence that the skin looms so large. Actually, the skin is only one part of the body that is undergoing constant change and activity but since the skin is a vital part of appearance at life's most self-conscious age, all of adolescence seems to be tied in with the skin.

Not only for health purposes, but also for mental well-being, an adolescent with a skin problem should be under the care of a physician, care which includes a program of extreme cleanliness and a diet which excludes certain foods that might aggravate that particular youngster's condition.

There are many changes in the skin during pregnancy, some good and some bad. The skin often darkens during pregnancy, usually more noticeable in brunettes, and may not return to its former light-

Most pregnant women develop stripes, lines on the abdomen, hips, and breasts during the period of "expansion," and while the streaks fade after the skin returns to normal tension, they do not entirely fade away.

From middle to old age the process of drying up is usually quite obvious in the skin. Hot baths and strong soaps rob the skin of its remaining moisture and should be replaced by tepid baths and mild soaps, often supplemented by oils.

Wrinkling, itching and thickening of the skin are often a part of the picture of old age. The itching is by far the most uncomfortable. At any age, itching may be the easiest skin affliction to cure or it may be the most persistent, most difficult of all diseases to pin down to one cause or to treat effectively.

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ELECTRICITY IS STILL TODAY'S BEST BUY!

53-Cent Dollar

The dollar that was worth 100 cents in 1939 is now worth an average of only 53 cents, says U. S. News & World Report. But, the magazine goes on, nobody is scoring the dollar — it's still the world's most valuable coin. All values mentioned here are in terms of living costs.

A dollar is worth on the average only 53 cents because it has a relative value with respect to some things that differs from its relative value with respect to some other things. All values level out at 53 cents.

U. S. News mentions only one commodity that is worth more in 1952 dollars than in 1939 dollars. Electricity. In terms of electricity, the 1939 dollar is now worth 105 cents. It notes, that, on an average, there has been no inflation in electric-power rates, while practically everything else was going through the ceiling and into the attic.

In food, the 1939 buck is now worth only 41 cents. In clothing it is worth only 41 cents. In house furnishings, 49 cents, in labor 38 cents, on a new house only 43 cents, in farm lands only 40 cents.

At the end of World War II the dollar was worth 77 cents; just before Korea it had sunk to 53 cents. The magazine finds that the supply of dollars has been rising as value declined. Before World War II dollars in the money supply totaled 70 billion. At the present time there are 185 billion, "and that total is starting a new rise."

"At home," says U. S. News, "people find the dollar — even the 53-cent dollar — very valuable, too. They notice that it takes many more dollars to get along than it did a few years ago, but no one is spurning the dollar, and, if enough can be had, the dollar is freely exchangeable for an immense variety of goods and services. A dollar's worth of these goods and services, however, varies by types and goods or services or property compared with 1939."

Worst-hit apparently are the older people who retired to live on annuities. In many cases their standard of living has been cut in half, and the annuitants have not the consolation of looking forward to an increase in their income.

Health Officer Urges Children Be Physically Ready For School

Austin, Texas. — Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, urges the parents of all children who will respond to the school bell for the first time in September to be sure the child is physically ready for school duties.

"First and foremost is the need for vaccination against smallpox. Parents should see that children are vaccinated before they are one year of age; however if not done previously, at school age vaccination becomes absolutely necessary," Dr. Cox said. "If your child has not been vaccinated, have it done immediately for his own protection and that of others."

Immunization against diphtheria is also highly important, Dr. Cox declares. This disease which causes serious illness and deaths among young children can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded killing disease. Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

"In addition, before you send your child to school you are urged to take him to your family physician and dentist for a thorough examination," Dr. Cox adds. "You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defects they should be corrected at once. Don't let your child start his school life with any avoidable handicap."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. c19

BILL OF RIGHTS GUARANTEES INALIENABLE PRIVILEGES

The American "Bill of Rights," consisting of the first ten amendments to our federal constitution, all adopted at one time in 1791 specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and jealously guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies today.

Among the most familiar of our constitutional guarantees are those related to freedom of religion, of speech, and of the press. The same article protects the right of peaceable assembly and the privilege of petitioning the government for redress of grievances.

Another amendment secures our persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, and specifies that no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, and unless supported by oath or affirmation.

The due process of law amendment encompasses not one but several guarantees. Every American is secured against being placed twice in legal jeopardy for the same offense; against being compelled to be a witness against himself in a criminal case; against having his private property taken for public use without just compensation; and against being held for trial for a capital (death penalty) or other infamous crime, unless upon a presentment or indictment of a grand jury. And,

of course, no person may be deprived of life, liberty or property without orderly court procedures, on due process of law.

The right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, in the locality where the crime was committed, the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and the rights to compel attendance of defense witnesses and to have the assistance of defense counsel in all criminal prosecutions are secured by another section of the "Bill of Rights."

Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment VIII. Other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time.

Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the underlying intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

Thus, that fundamental philosophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and that "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed," has been carried forward into the highest law or of land.

Amended Social Security Law Is Now In Full Operation

The Social Security Act amendments of 1950 is now in full operation. The last phase of the law to become effective provides for the use of a new benefit formula, which usually yields higher retirement and family insurance payments, for those who have earned six calendar quarters of covered work after 1950. So says H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"Since six quarters is a year and a half, those who have been working steadily since Jan. 1, 1951, and retire now at age 65 or after, come under this provision," Cleveland explained. "It applies equally to all workers, the self-employed as well as employees."

Old-age and survivors insurance is based on each worker's average monthly wage. Only those who make at least \$3600 a year can qualify for the highest monthly payment.

"Another provision which may not be generally understood, is that anyone who is 75 years of age or over can file a claim and receive his payments even though he continues to work and does not retire," according to Cleveland. "In some cases, however, the amount will be reduced if the application is filed before 1953."
