Social Security Insurance Payments To Be Increased

About 6,000 people in this area of South Texas will receive higher social security insurance payments beginning early in October as a result of the social security amendments which President Truman signed into a law last week.

H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi social security office, emphasized that no one needs to apply for the increased payments. "The Social Security Administration is already changing the accounts," he pointed out. "We expect to get them changed in time to have them in the mail Oct. 3, the regular delivery date, but if in a few cases we don't meet that schedule we'll send the regular check and make up the difference in a later check."

Under terms of the law most families will get an increase of about \$5 a month; some will get less, some will get more.

Beginning Sept. 1, the new law increases to \$75 a month instead of \$50 the amount of money a beneficiary may earn and still receive the monthly benefits, Cleveland said.

Another change in the law now permits insured wage earners who retire in 1952 to have their wages for this year used immediately in figuring the amount of their benefit payments.

An amendment allows beneficiaries aged 75 or over already on the rolls to take advantage of the higher benefit payments provided under the new formula, if they have had at least a year and a half of covered work after 1950, according to Cleveland.

The amended law allows social security wage credits of \$160 for each month of active military or naval service after July 24, 1947. This provision is simply an extension of the one which already gives social security wage credits to servicemen of World War II. It applies to service in the armed forces up to Jan. 1, 1954.

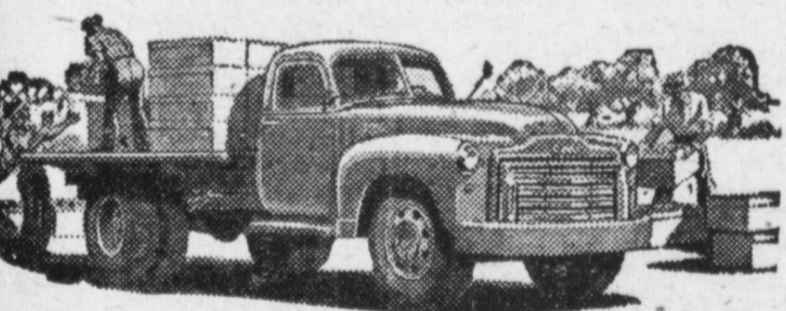

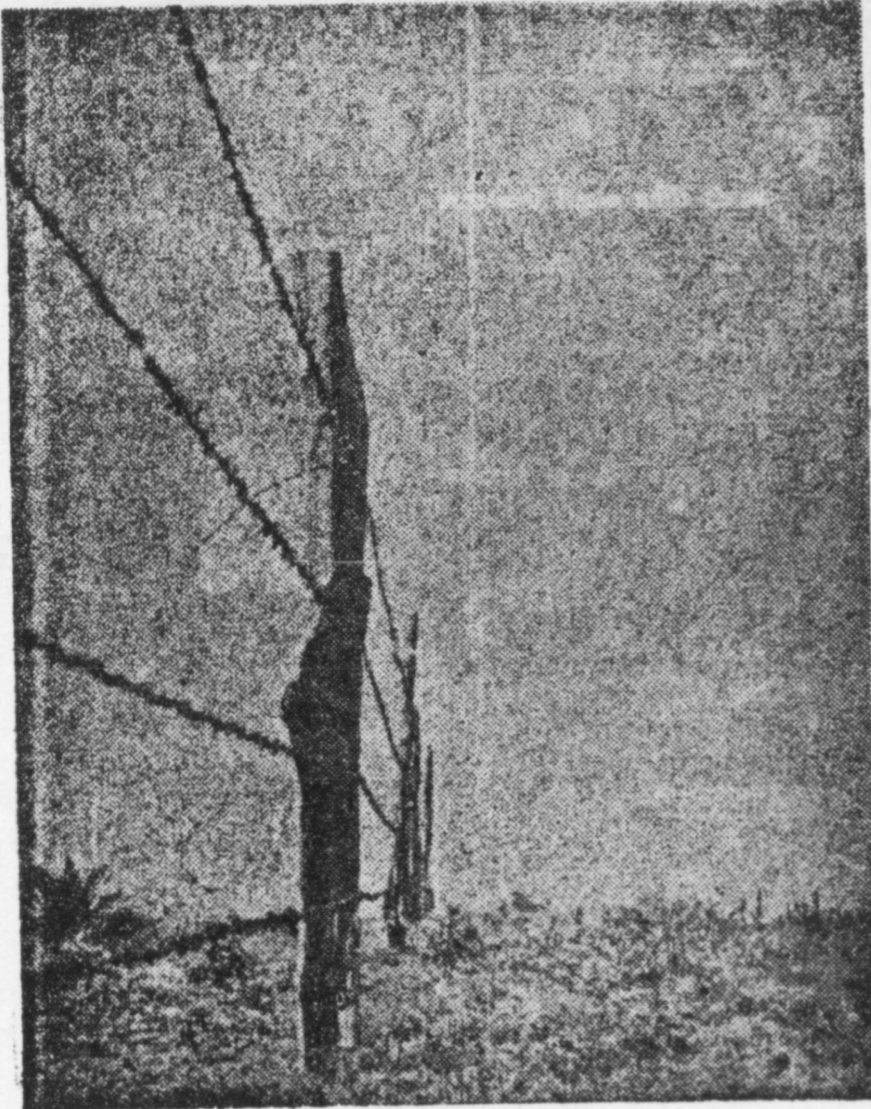

BARBED WIRE FENCE

In 1876, John W. Gates, a young drummer, sold barbed wire to the ranchers of Texas. In San Antonio the cattlemen laughed at him. In response to their jibes, Gates fenced in a city plaza and called for the "worst fence busters" of the herds. The cattle charged the wire as was expected but their hides were pierced by the barbs. They soon retired. Barbed wire came into use throughout the range area by 1883. Strife arose between cattlemen and fence-cutting became general. In some counties feeling ran so high that there was threat of civil warfare. An act of Legislature, together with the Texas Rangers, ended the strife.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

Citizens Asked To Help In Mosquito Control

Jess Hardy, Insect and Vector Control, State Health Department, was in Rockport Friday afternoon and issued the following information in regards to mosquito control in Aransas County.

Mr. Hardy says there are two types of mosquitoes in Aransas County, those breeding in salt water marshes and those breeding in fresh water around our homes and immediate area.

After rains mosquitoes hatch in old auto tires, cans, roadside ditches, and even at times in blades of grass.

Home owners can help control at least 50% of the local mosquitoes by cleaning up their premises, getting rid of cans, tires and anything holding water. Standing water in ponds and ditches treated with a little kerosene weekly will help greatly.

Tall grass and weeds and low shrubbery give the mosquito an excellent place to hide during the day.

The salt water marsh mosquitoes hatch off after rain falls in the flats and marshes, and they are carried by the wind into nearby towns. These mosquitoes are easily carried up to 15 miles or more. Space spraying with power sprayers helps reduce these.

The task of mosquito control is hopeless unless each citizen cooperates in ridding his own premises of breeding and harboring places.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. c19
