

Grand Jury Criticizes Jail and Courthouse Facilities

County Judge John Wendell Says Report Justified, Jail And Courthouse Poor Risks

Commissioners' Court, In Light of Grand Jury Censure Holds Additions to Court House and Jail Hoping to be Able to Make Necessary Changes

The Grand Jury, in a report dated the 9th of September, severely criticized jail facilities in Aransas County, pointing out that they were sub-standard and did not comply with state and federal laws which define accommodations for prisoners of various types. The Grand Jury believes this state of affairs should be remedied before the county is the subject of public censure. Moreover, jurors pointed out in their report that jury accommodations were exceedingly primitive, and of such a nature as to place a hardship on anyone who was aged or infirm. The text of the report follows:

Now come the Grand Jurors of Aransas County, Texas, for the September, A.D. 1954 Term, of the District Court of said County and State, and report to said Court that the said Grand Jurors have inspected the Aransas County Jail during their present session, and find from such inspection that the jail is clean and well kept considering facilities available to the Sheriff and the jailer, but that nevertheless the County Jail is deficient in many respects and particularly:

- (1) Provisions for separating male and female prisoners are makeshift and unsatisfactory;
- (2) There is no satisfactory way of segregating juveniles from adult prisoners;
- (3) There are no facilities for holding insane persons;
- (4) The jail is too small;
- (5) The jail is not strong and secure enough to safely keep prisoners determined to escape, and;
- (6) The jail does not permit keeping of prisoners apart from each other.

The Grand Jurors further report that during the four days they have worked in the Courthouse during their present session that they have observed and find that the Jury Dormitory on the third floor is entirely too small to accommodate 12 jurors and an officer and that it is not equipped with lavatory, toilet or shower, the nearest such sanitary facilities being on the first floor of the Courthouse, and that the present arrangements work an unnecessary hardship on jurors who are kept overnight. It is further noted that the Grand Jury Room on the third floor is hard to reach, and is not accessible to witnesses who are lame or infirm. It is also poorly ventilated and uncomfortable. The said Grand Jurors are of the further opinion that the present storage facilities for Court and County Records do not adequately safeguard them from destruction or damage by fire or storm.

No criticism of any County officials or officials is meant or intended by this report. The Grand Jurors find and report that the Courthouse has been as well kept as possible with the means available and what the officers have had to work with.

The Grand Jurors request that this report be spread upon the Minutes of the District Court of Aransas County, and that a certified copy hereof be furnished the Commissioners' Court of Aransas County.

County Judge John D. Wendell when contacted, said the report was justified, and that at the next meeting of the Commissioners' Court, on September 30, the problem would be thoroughly explored, and some means sought of correcting the conditions mentioned. For this reason, plans for an addition to the courthouse and for a jail building that were approved some two weeks ago are being held in abeyance. To meet the objections of the Grand Jury report will require a more extensive program than that originally planned, but

Rockport-Fulton Harbor Development Bond Approved

In an election marked by an exceptionally heavy turnout of voters, the Rockport-Fulton Harbor Development Bond Issue carried by a vote of 433-205. Also given approval by a vote of 370-181, was the ten-cent maintenance levy, made in connection with the bonds, but will replace the old Rockport seawall levy, which expires next year.

The vote gives the Aransas County Navigation District the go ahead on three projects: construction of a harbor capable of accommodating one hundred thirty boats at Fulton, with improvement of the Fulton waterfront; dredging Rockport harbor, with improvement of the Cove area, where an industrial harbor is projected. Estimated income for Aransas County schools during 1954-55 is \$366,767.93, as of Sept. 1. Taxes and local maintenance, based on 90% collection on a \$20,000,000 valuation would amount to \$180,000 of this, and per capita income will provide another \$74,800. The balance will be made up from other sources.

Winning plans were drawn by Mitchell Ammons and his group. Mervin Jones was made Superintendent of the job, Ray Washington and Eddie Morrison were made the foremen, the rest of the class being carpenters. Mr. Baldwin feels the practical experience gained in this project will be very beneficial to the boys in their shop work. He was very proud of the work and the enthusiasm shown by the class as a whole.

1954-55 SCHOOL HANDBOOK READY

The 1954-55 School Handbook is ready, said Pat H. Greene, superintendent, who remarked that there were a number of policy changes in it with which parents should become familiar.

Recognizing that, where a program involves as many people as that of the Aransas County Independent School District, some misunderstandings and irritations are almost inevitable, the book has been prepared to explain the school system.

It is the desire of the School Board to adjust any reasonable complaints that may arise in connection with the schools, and they make plain that any pupil, patron or employee having a just complaint has certain prescribed ways of obtaining a hearing on the matter. This is one of the things fully explained in the booklet.

Other policy changes have affected the manner of grading, and the basis of promotion or graduation.

Mr. Greene feels that every parent having a child in school should obtain one of these books and read it carefully. The books are available at the High School office.

Aransas County Has 3 Wildcats; Indicated Strike Cases

Aransas County has a wildcat preparing to run casing, three wildcats slated, and another deep test nearing permit as the week opened.

Plymouth Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 124, wildcat five miles west of Rockport in Copano Bay, was preparing to run 7-inch casing to total depth at 9,002 feet. Packer failed on attempted drill-test from 8,970 to 9,002 feet where it had sidewall cored oil shows. The test earlier had oil and gas shows on a test from 8,632-35 feet and yielded oil and salt water on a test from 7,688-93 feet. Location is on a 313-acre lease.

Plymouth has staked location for two 12,000-foot wildcats in the immediate area. The firm's No. 1 State Tract 125 is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west line of Tract 125. It is on a 275-acre lease.

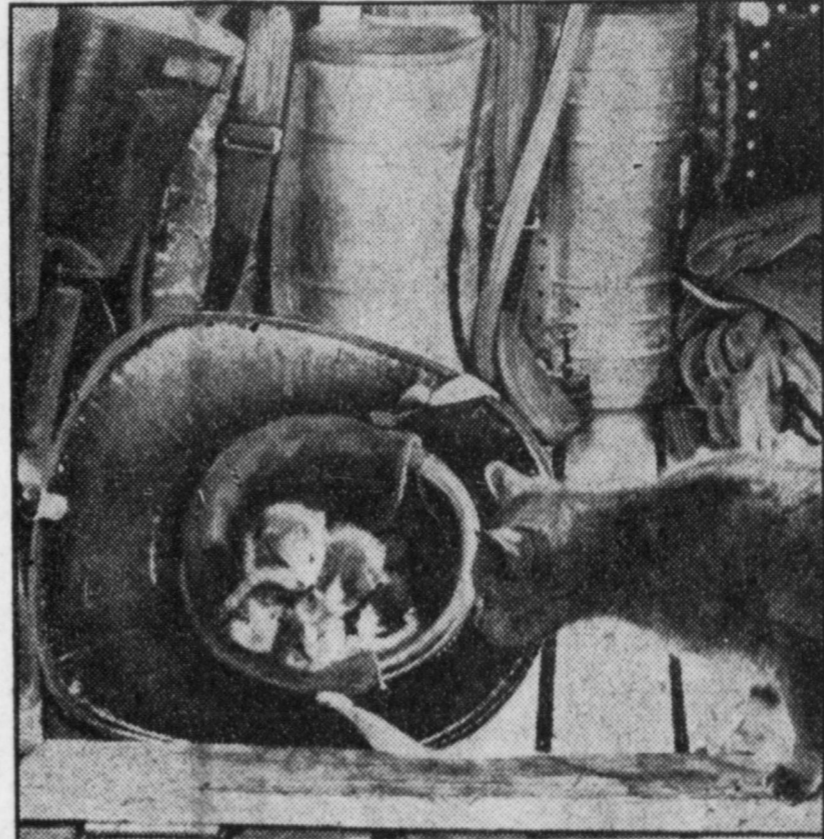
The same firm's No. 1 State Tract 126 is 330 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west line of Tract 125. The test is on a 125-acre lease.

Atlantic Test.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 J. J. Kring, scheduled 9,200-foot semi-wildcat for the one well Aransas East Field 3½ miles northwest of Aransas Pass, was being rigged up with a Bankhead Drilling Co. rig of Aransas Pass.

The test is 160 feet from the northeast and southwest line and 330 feet from the northwest line of Lot 4 and 14.55-acre lease in J. D. Wheeler Subdivision in John Phillips Survey, A-175.

Atlantic No. 1 Kring is some 3,500 feet southeast of Atlantic Stanolind, and Skelly No. 1 R. R. Barber, gas-distillate discovery completed in July for 1.9 million cubic feet of gas plus 40.8 barrels of 50 gravity distillate and one percent salt water from 32-shot perforations at 7,014-22 feet. CAPT. OSTENSEN SAYS SHRIMPING EASIER THAN EAST COAST FISHING

Capt. Jacob Ostensen, New Bedford, Mass., says Gulf shrimping is easier than fishing for flounder and ground fish off the east coast. "There," he said, "catches were dropping off, and it was getting harder and harder to make a living. We fished 24 hours a day, and stood regular watches, six on and six off. About forty boats came to the Gulf. We were the next to the last to leave Massachusetts. It's time time last April. "We are making out pretty

well," he said, "but it's entirely new fishing to us, and we're having to learn from the ground up. The gear is different, nets are different, and we aren't used to handling a boat with so few men. This Gulf shrimping rig makes it easy, however, compared to the way we fished on the east coast. "We like it here, and, as soon as we can sell out in the north, will move our families down. It isn't nearly as hot as we had thought it would be, except for

one thing. Our boats all have their sleeping quarters below decks, and here, when you're lying still, that sure makes them hot. It was all right for cold winters in the north, but it's too warm for here." Ostensen says that fishermen can make more here, in a shorter time, when the shrimp run is on, than they can in Atlantic waters, and as his boat, a 54-foot lugger is too small to operate far offshore on the Grand and Georges Banks, he moved south.

Oregon Returns
With 13,000
Pounds of Tuna

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Exploratory vessel Oregon returned to Pascagoula the first of this month with 13,042 pounds of tuna on board, taken in the Gulf of Mexico. Twenty-one sets were made in the northeast Gulf, and a total of 7,160 baited hooks were set during the cruise. Yellowfin tuna were taken on 17 sets. The average catch was two tuna per hundred hooks. Two blue and 26 white marlin were also caught, and scientists aboard the Oregon took several species of young tuna in dip nets at night. This is the third cruise on which tuna have been obtained. They may, eventually, offer a good off-season fishery for boats in this area.

A. H. Cadwallader, Jr., of the Mortgage Investment Company, San Antonio, proposes to construct, 120 feet north from the extended south line of King St., Rockport, a 500-foot extension with a 40-foot T-head to the existing 410-foot wharf at the above location. According to the plans submitted, the wharf extension would have a deck elevation of 4 feet above mean low tide and the bayward end of the wharf would be located in water having a depth of 4 feet at mean low tide.

A. W. Samuels proposes to construct a timber T-head wharf at a location in Aransas Bay, approximately 2 miles north of Fulton. The T-head portion of the wharf would be 14 feet wide and 16 feet long and would be connected to shore by a walkway 6 feet wide and 600 feet long. The wharf would have a deck elevation of 4 feet above mean low tide. The bayward end of the wharf would be located in water having a depth of three feet at mean low tide.

Recent Law Aids Texas Shrimpers

Congress, during its last session, enacted legislation of benefit to Texas shrimpers.

The law provides that in case where a vessel of the United States is seized by a foreign country on the basis of rights or claims in territorial waters or high seas which are not recognized by the United States, and there is no dispute of material facts with respect to location or activity of such vessel at the time of seizure, the Secretary of State shall as soon as practicable take such action as he deems appropriate to attend to the welfare of such vessel and its crew while it is held by such country and to secure the release of such vessel and crew.

In any case where a vessel of the United States is seized by a foreign country under the above conditions and a fine must be paid in order to secure prompt release of vessel and crew, the owners of the vessel shall be reimbursed by the Secretary of the Treasury in the amount of the fine actually paid.

Considerable controversy has arisen in the past since Mexico claims territorial waters out 10 miles while the United States recognizes her claim only to the three-mile limit.

A number of shrimping boats have been arrested and fined on charges of violating Mexican territorial waters. It is not known just what effect the new law will have, but local shrimping interests see it as lending some protection not enjoyed in the past.

Few, if any local boats, have been arrested for the offense, but a number of shrimpers working out of Brownsville have been fined by the Mexican government on charges of violating that country's territorial waters. Until the two countries agree on the territorial limits, the problem will probably arise repeatedly.

Shrimp landings were off last week, the catch being about 17,000 pounds less than the preceding week. Bay shrimping was slow, and, although the shrimp were a nice size, not too many were coming in. Total for the week of September 4 to 10 inclusive was 97,882 pounds. Prices were down; 15-20 count were selling at 45c Saturday; 10-15s were 49c. This makes is rough on the little fellow whose maintenance costs have been increasing from year to year.

**COUNTY BUDGET
HEARING HELD**

A public hearing was held Sept. 2 on the proposed county budget for 1954-55.

The budget, which was compiled by Judge Wendell and County Auditor Jimmy Houlihan, was submitted to the Commissioners' Court some time ago for their study and recommendations, and at Thursday's hearing the public was invited to attend a general discussion.

In preparing the proposed budget, which outlines the county's financial operations during the coming year, the various revenues expected have been detailed, as have the expenses that may be incurred. This routine was followed through the various departments, with anticipated expenses and revenues for each estimated.

In his budget message, Judge Wendell offers recommendations which he considers necessary to keep county equipment in a good condition and at the same time hold the budget in balance. Purchase of a number of new items of equipment are allowed for.

An analysis of tax valuations and collections for the coming year was given. Property and oil valuations in Aransas County will be approximately \$17,500,000. Also listed is a detailed description of the county's indebtedness, together with a schedule of payments.

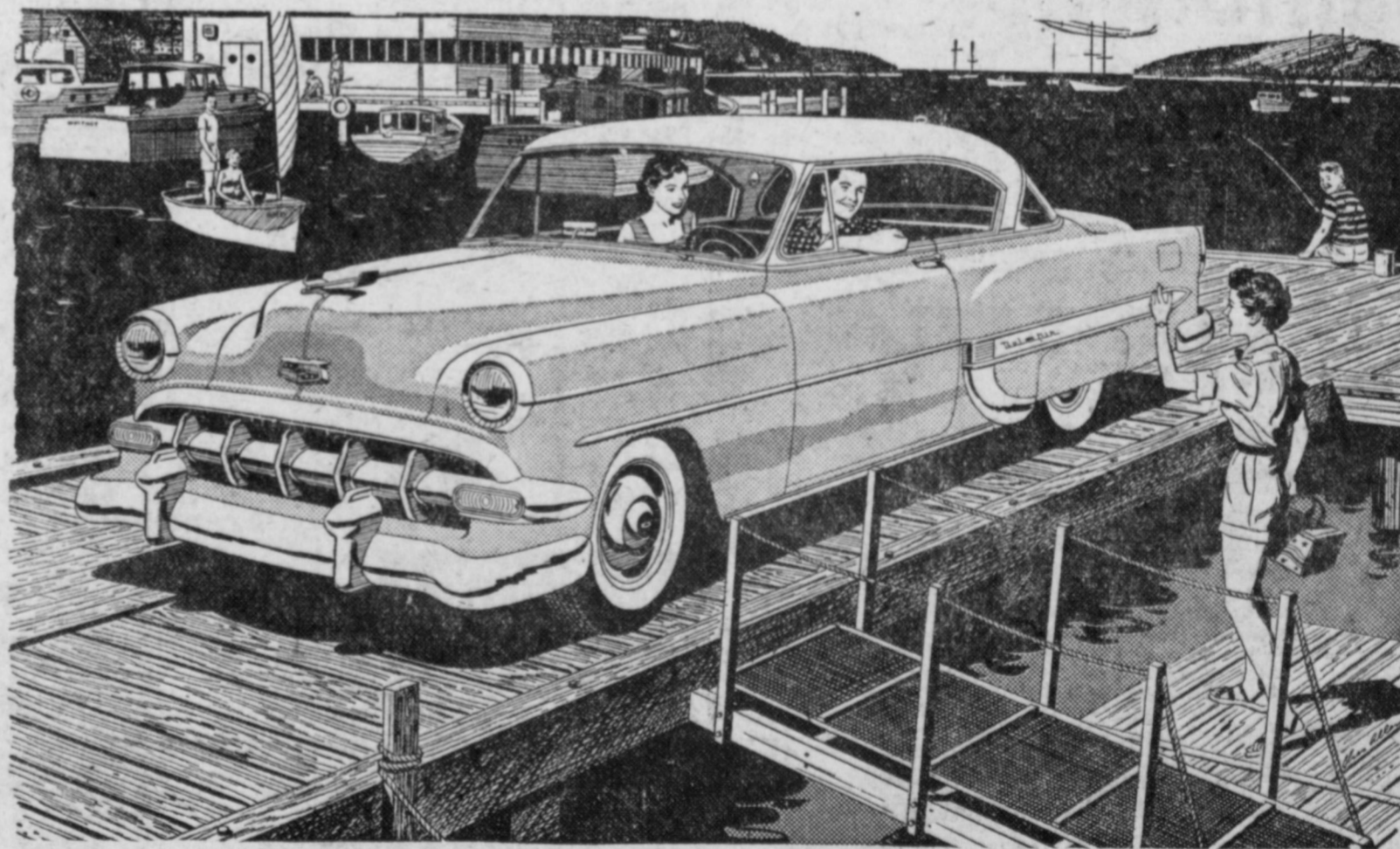
