Macaroni Casserole

(4-6 SERVINGS)

8 ounces macaroni	1/4 cup Fluffo	1/4 cup chopped mushrooms
1/4 cup flour	2 cups milk	1/4 cup chopped green pepper
2 cups (1/2 pound) grated cheese	1 teaspoon salt	1/4 cup chopped red pimiento
2 cans tuna fish, drained and flaked		1/2 cup chopped onion
		1/2 cup chopped olives
		1/2 cup corn flakes

Cook macaroni 20 minutes in salted boiling water; drain. Melt Fluffo in saucepan, blend in flour, add milk and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Stir in salt and cheese until melted. Combine remaining ingredients, except corn flakes, with macaroni. Place in 2-quart casserole which has been rubbed with Fluffo and top with corn flakes. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400° E.) about 25 minutes.

Luke Short Was An Interesting Texas Character

As a youngster around Fort Worth in the 70's, Luke Short's education was sketchy but adequate. He could ride almost anything with hair on it by the time he was twenty, and was about as vivid an enterpriser when it came to handling a six gun as the average man wanted to tackle.

He was also a mean hand with a running iron, and his loop was wide enough it rarely missed a yearling, no matter whose brand it bore.

However, he saw no future in the cow business, and hid himself forth in search of adventure. The trail was long; the pay was low, and, after he hit Dodge City (then in the height of its glory) he was busted.

To a man of Luke's talents this was annoying, but not necessarily fatal, and within a few days he and a friend were headed for a thicket just ten miles south of the great Sioux Indian agency in North Dakota.

They were traders; their stock was 150 cases of whiskey!

By the time an exasperated cavalry captain (in the absence of his partner, who was away replenishing their stock of Old Bushaid) had ridden Luke out of the thicket on a swaybacked mule, the boys had accumulated \$60,000 in cash and Short had a private burying ground that held no less than six Indians!

In later years, however, he always refused to tally these scalps, holding that no credit accrued to a man for abolishing one of the savages.

At Denver the partners split up and Short, taking his \$30,000, was off to the races, all 140 pounds of him, after first acquiring a wardrobe.

His checkered suit, tailored to hide his hardware, hung gracefully around his 5-foot-6-inch form. His derby hat was cocked over one eyebrow. Across his vest of robin's-egg blue was festooned a massive watch chain. A scarlet silk cravat served as the resting place of a diamond roughly the size of a locomotive headlight, and on his dainty feet gleamed a pair of patent leather boots whose brilliancy matched that of his stickpin!

Only a man of Luke's unquestioned talents could have survived such raiment. However, survive he did. A number of rough characters who misjudged his deftness with artillery were either temporarily retired or permanently planted, and Luke went his merry way associating on equal terms with such masters of trigonometry as Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, Doc Holliday and other prominent members of the Homicide Club, all of whom were reputed to think highly of his speed with a gun.

Finally, however, he wound up in Cowtown once more, the best dressed, most polite package of sudden death ever to honor that community. There he founded the White Elephant — the finest, fanciest saloon and gambling house in the city. Patrons of the ornate bar could and did obtain anything seryed at any other bar in the U. S., and if a customer wanted to take a little flutter at roulette or faro, White Elephant dealers were always ready to oblige. If some cattle king drifted in, looking for large chunks of action, all he had to do was ask for Mr. Short, and Luke would come a-runnin'.

Then reform lifted its ugly head. Luke was smart; he sat tight and watched his competitors. Instead of running wide open, they merely closed their front doors and received their patrons through the alley.

So did Short. However, there was one difference. The reformers imported, as head collector and enforcement officer for their regime one Courtwright, reputed to be a gun-slinger.

As Luke was the only gambling house operator in town who refused to pay off, it was inevitable that he should be the early recipient of a visit from this eminent member of the purity party.

Short planted him for keeps; the White Elephant continued to do business unhampered by any similar manifestations of foolishness; and Luke was tendered a vote of thanks by sundry grateful citizens.

Five years later, having shot it out with the best of them, Short died peacefully in his bed, without ever having been touched by a bullet or knife!

Man-Made Law?

Some people find confusing our different state and national laws dealing with the same things. Income tax laws for an example.

Surely, they say, you can have no real justice, unless there is some one "best way" to do each thing — to hold property, to manage traffic, to pay taxes, or to enforce contracts.

So it bothers them. Why should Englishmen drive on the left side of the street? Why should married couples hold title under community property laws in some states and not in others?

Is law merely a man-made contraption?

Is it true that like good manners much law is man-made, growing out of custom or local problems. In card games you can play many different games with one deck. You merely change the rules. But as with cards and all games, the law goes deeper than convention into man's basic needs for order, for a grasp of the part he is to play, and for a way to settle disagreements.

Law provides an orderly way to do things so that people can make long-range plans and work together. Its rules help you to find out where you stand — your rights and duties. And last, law has binding ways of settling disputes if need be, first to keep the peace, and then win people over by deal-

You can find these traits in most groups from the most primitive to the civilized.

As man finds out more and more about himself and his world, as his experience and wisdom grow, the law may get better. For example, as the psychological laboratories find out more about man's reaction times, his fears and faults, our laws about driving, for instance, may improve.

And here is another purpose the different kinds of laws may serve. You may look upon each as a sort of experiment. Some turn out badly, and some well.

But in the give and take of public discussion, these efforts may yet bring us more nearly to the "one best way" — if any such thing exists.
