School, City Elections On Saturday, Tuesday

Citizens are urged to turn out at the polls for these two important elections. Polls close at 7:00 p.m.

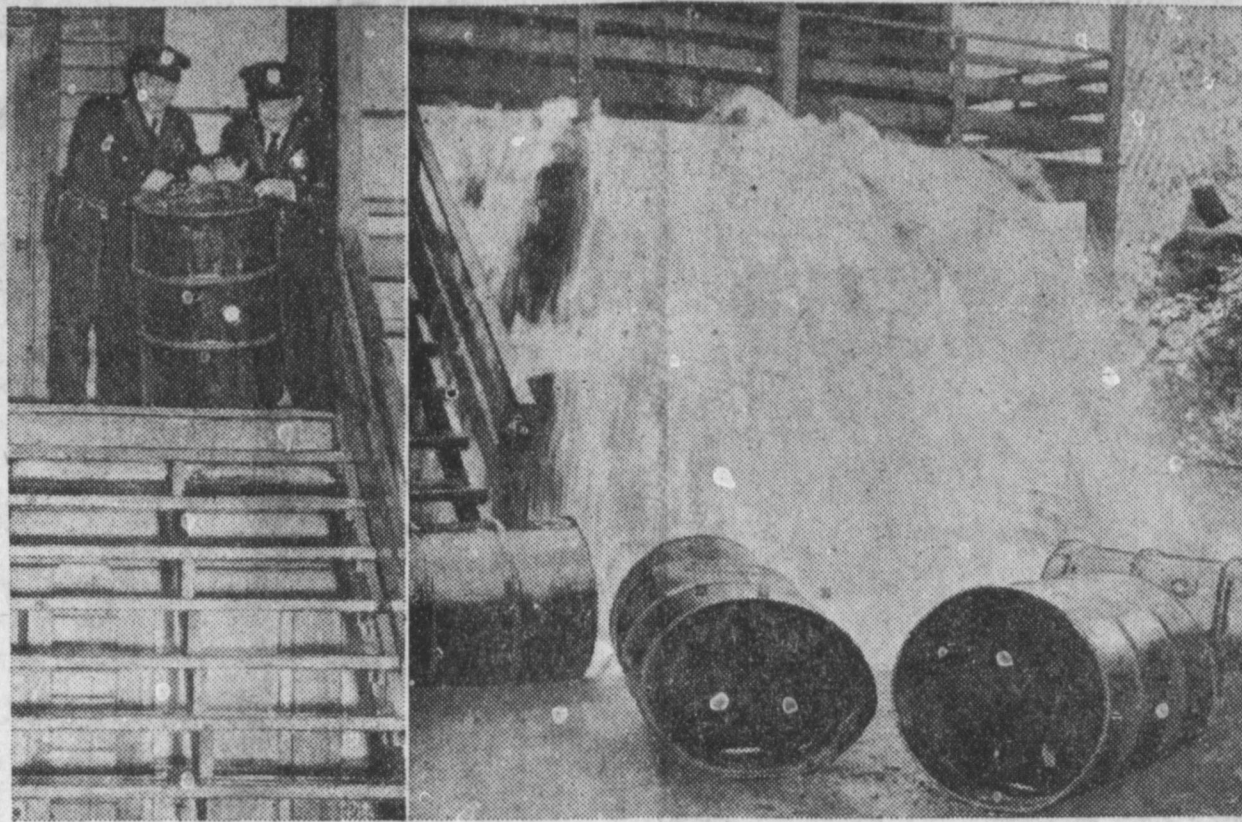
Annual Club Tournament Gets Underway April 25

Commissioners Authorize R-O-W Acquisition

At a regular meeting of the Aransas County Commissioners' Court Tuesday morning, County Judge John D. Wendell was authorized to proceed with acquisition of necessary right-of-way for widening Highway 35 from the north end of Copano Causeway to the Refugio County line.

In addition, commissioners gave Judge Wendell the needed authority to proceed with lowering of gas and oil lines crossing the highway between those points.

A bid of \$3,200 plus a trade in two Buffalo spray and duster machines to be used by the county in mosquito control was accepted from the Fricke Flying Service of San Antonio for the airplane formerly used in dusting the county, and the commissioners also approved rental of a dirt buggy to be used in building an access road to the two new T-hangars at the county airport.

In other action they disapproved a request for closure of a section of street in Precinct One, and decided that no trailer houses would be allowed on airport property.

John Sutherland, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee on tourist promotion, then presented a number of suggestions on which the committee asked the commissioners help. The commissioners promised to give the proposals their thorough consideration.

The proposals made by Sutherland were as follows: Water and drain lines across the beach roads should be filled in. All broken off border lines should be straightened and filled in and also holes in the many places where driving is anything but comfortable. Stop or slow signs—not too many, but without fail have them placed at cross or entrance roads to the beach roads at what we know to be dangerous points and also to points of interest. Rocks large and small should be left on the water border where

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Southern Minerals Asks Engineer Permit

Southern Minerals Corporation has asked for a Department of the Army permit to operate in Aransas Bay at locations in the north 80 acres of the north 1/2 and north 80 acres of the south 1/2 of State Tract 179; the south 80 acres of the north 1/2 and the south 80 acres of the south 1/2 of State Tract 180; and the south 80 acres of State Tract 181, central to a point approximately 5 miles east from Rockport.

The company requests a blanket permit to authorize erection and maintenance of structures to be used in connection with the drilling of wells for the production of oil and gas. The work at each well site would consist of placing a shell mat, driving four 3-pile dolphins, twelve single piles and three batter piles, sinking a drilling barge, erecting a derrick having a maximum elevation of 140 feet above mean low water and constructing a protective structure. Channels and basins would be dredged and pipe lines would be placed within the area.

Five Fire Calls Answered In Week

Five fire calls have been answered during the past week, two of them serious, and resulting in almost complete demolition of one home and the gutting of another.

First was the Ed Traweck fire last Friday about 4 p.m., approximately four miles south on Highway 35. Mr. Traweck was in the house when the blaze started and managed to attract the attention of Mrs. Traweck, who led him to safety from a flaming room.

By the time fire apparatus arrived the whole house was blazing, and despite all efforts, was almost totally consumed.

Fire apparatus from Fulton, Rockport and Aransas Pass battled the blaze with six trucks answering the call.

A brush fire on Market Street Monday afternoon was next, and this was extinguished by the Rockport Fire Department.

Tuesday morning about 9:30 a.m. the office and dwelling of the manager at Flamingo Courts, belonging to Chester Johnson, caught fire, and by the time apparatus from both Fulton and Rockport reached the site, most of the building's interior had been gutted.

Although ostensibly extinguished at that time, the blaze broke out again for a few minutes during the noon hour. Both the Rockport and Fulton departments once again were at the scene.

Cecil Cole, C. P. & L. employee, was momentarily overcome by smoke and rushed to a local hospital, but he was released with no permanent ill effects.

A fifth was answered Thursday morning to extinguish a brush fire back of the high school.

Fire chiefs Dick Fox and Raymond Owens both say everything is very dry, and that extreme care should be taken by everyone to prevent a disastrous conflagration.

Two Pirates Place, Third Reaches Finals In Refugio Relays

TIDEWATER ASKS ENGINEER PERMIT

Tidewater Oil has asked a Department of the Army permit to operate in Aransas Bay on State Tracts 122, 123, 124, 125, at a point approximately 3 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport proposing to place two pipelines at the above location. Top of the pipeline would be placed at a depth of 1 1/2 feet below the bed of the bay except through shell reefs or beds where they would be placed 1 foot below the bed. The lines would extend from Well No. 1 in State Tract 125 and Well No. 1 in State Tract 124 westerly to a junction in State Tract 123 then westerly to the mean high tide shoreline, the longest line being approximately 7,160 feet.

Coast Guard Auxiliary Planned Here

Water safety classes, under the leadership of the Corpus Christi Coast Guard Auxiliary, got underway here this week at the 813th AC&W Squadron, with about 45 military and civilian personnel attending the first one, at which Commander Johnny Mitchell spoke briefly.

The classes, taught by C. W. Holmes and J. W. Winston, of the Corpus Christi Flotilla, are open to anyone interested, and are held at the recreation building at the radar base, according to Sergeant J. R. Angleman, special serviceman at the squadron. They will continue every Monday night at 7:30 for three more weeks, the Sergeant said, and anyone wishing to attend can either contact him or call the office at Marineland in Rockport.

The sergeant said that efforts are being made by Rockport people interested in water safety and by the base to form a Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla here, with the squadron as the sponsoring organization.

Almost all boatmen are eligible to join this organization, Angleman said. Auxiliary members are U. S. citizens over 17 who own a quarter interest or more in a motorboat, yacht, private airplane, or licensed amateur radio station. The Auxiliary is first and foremost a boat owners' organization.

But—it is obvious that you don't need to own a boat to mishandle one. So the Auxiliary extends its training in small-boat handling through public instruction courses to all interested persons who can contribute to the general safety at sea by becoming wiser sailors.

Wearing of the Auxiliary uniform is optional for all members. The Auxiliary is a strictly non-military organization without the military discipline and duties of regular Coast Guard service.

Skippers who are real seamen are one objective of the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Instruction in seamanship, piloting, motor maintenance, aids to navigation, rules of the road, lifesaving and accident prevention is how it is done. Most of Auxiliary education is on an informal basis within flotillas, with men and women who cruise on your own waters and know local conditions.

In addition, there are top-notch correspondence courses obtainable at cost from the U. S. Coast Guard Institute—piloting, celestial navigation, and mathematics for navigators; meteorology, and elementary and advanced radio engineering. Education is not the Auxiliary's only activity, however. With awareness of the fine points of boat handling come greater confidence and pleasure, more hours of real relaxation on the water. Many boatmen find new range—new places to go and new waters to cruise—secure in the knowledge of the fun and the hazards involved.

Richardson Gets Contract at Cove

Navigation Commissioners Authorize Letting Contract to Aransas Pass Firm In Wednesday Night Meeting

At their meeting Wednesday night Aransas County Navigation Commissioners received reports on dredging progress in Little Bay, between Rockport and Fulton; approved an agreement for use of spoil from this project by the Texas Highway Department; and authorized a contract for construction of an industrial harbor at the Cove.

Homer C. Innis, of Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam, Corpus Christi engineers, reported that

approximately 140,000 cubic yards of material had been removed from Little Bay. This, he said, left roughly 75% of the project to be completed before the recreational boat facility and the mile-long crescent of new beach constructed of sand from the dredging are ready for use.

Innis also reported that an agreement had been reached between the dredging contractor and the State Highway Department for use of approximately 30,000 yards of spoil from the project to construct a traffic interchange on Loop 70, the business route taken by Highway 35 through Rockport. He asked for approval of the agreement, which the commissioners granted.

In further action, after considerable discussion, they authorized Chairman Dick Pickett to enter into a contract with the Loyd W. Richardson Construction Company of Aransas Pass for dredging the district's fifth harbor, planned for industrial use at the Cove.

This harbor, approximately a mile south of town, will be dredged to a depth of -11.0 feet at mean low tide and will extend for 1,200 feet east and west and 750 feet north and south. Available docking space along the E-shaped basin will amount to almost a mile, and is planned for work boats of all sorts as well as for light industries.

Access will be furnished by highway and rail, while the harbor will be just off the Intracoastal Canal Cut-off, now being dredged between Rockport and Old Ingleside, so that it can be used as a barge terminal on the canal as well.

Plans for Band Boosters Barbecue Proceeding Nicely

According to Sheriff A. C. Shivers, president of the Athletic Booster Club, four ladies have been appointed as chairman of the group furnishing potato salad and other trimmings for the barbecue to be held by the club on April 11. They are Mrs. Shivers, Mrs. Joe Johnson, Mrs. Weldon Cabaniss and Mrs. Monte Rouquette.

The barbecue proceeds will go to pay off the \$600 balance due on the big clock at the Pirate stadium, installed last fall, during football season.

There will be plenty of barbecued chicken and all the trimmings, and the price will be one dollar a plate to the public.

However, as a membership drive is part of the program, Sheriff Shivers said, all paid up members, whether new or renewal can attend free of charge by showing their membership card.

Membership in the organization costs \$2.

The scene of the barbecue will be at the Lions Pit, in front of the Woman's Club building.

There will be no admission charge, Coach Borchert said, and the public is invited.

Post Office Dept. Options Sites

The Post Office Department announced today that options had been taken on three pieces of property in Rockport with a view to possible construction of a new post-office here before the Department's lease on its present location expires early in 1960.

Negotiations were conducted by Carl P. Seale, post office department real estate representative from Fort Worth.

The three pieces of property optioned are the lots belonging to Emory M. Spencer immediately across from The Rockport Pilot office on Wharf Street; those belonging to Weldon Cabaniss on the corner of Market and Magnolia Streets, immediately in the rear of the fire station in Rockport; and others belonging to C. C. Fowler on the corner of Market and Church Streets, next to the Fowler home.

Postmaster Jimmy Simmons said that the options are for 90 days with renewal privileges in case the property is chosen for the postoffice site.

Once this is done, he said, plans and specifications for the building will be presented to contractors for bids. Usual procedure in such cases, Simmons said, is for some individual to erect the structure as a private venture, after purchasing the optioned property, and, to lease the building to the government on a long-term contract.

The building which the post office occupies at present belongs to Fred A. Bracht.

FLASH!

Just as The Pilot goes to press, it has been announced that material for work on Loop 70, the Highway 35 business route through Rockport, is being unloaded along Market Street.

According to Jim Heldenfels, of Heldenfels Brothers, contractors who have the job, work on the storm sewers is scheduled to start Monday, or sooner if possible, and excavation on the right-of-way in about a week or 10 days.

The excavation will start at the south end of the 2.7 mile project, which will furnish curbing and guttering along most of its route, and which will improve Austin Street, making it 100 feet wide, with a traffic interchange at the T. Noah Smith corner.

There will also be a traffic interchange on the land formerly occupied by the old Tri-Argle Cafe and Filling Station.

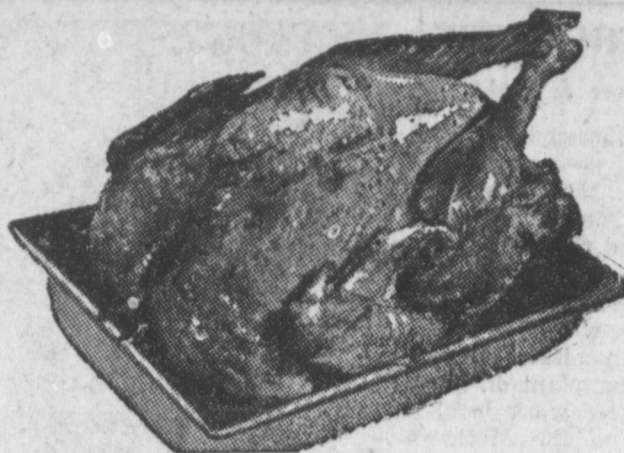

ROCKPORT SCIENCE STUDENTS TO TOUR REYNOLDS METALS

Four local science students, Stephen Weber, Raymond Mikeal, Gary Horne and John Cabaniss and science teacher E. G. Brooks, will be part of the group when Reynolds Metals Company plays host to some 80 or 90 area high school science students Thursday, April 9, in the second annual Science Youth Day sponsored by the company's two plants at La Quinta.

The event was announced by Dwight P. Keller, manager of the Reynolds San Patricio aluminum reduction plant, and Ralph S. Sherwin, Jr., manager of the company's Sherwin alumina plant.

The day's program for the student visitors will begin with a plant briefing session, where they will be formally welcomed by Mr. Sherwin and Mr. Keller. The students then will tour the two plants in small groups.

A film session showing other scientific aspects of aluminum production and fabrication will be another feature of the program. New applications of aluminum made possible by recent scientific advancements will be discussed by W. A. Condon, industrial market representative for Reynolds in Houston.

The Reynolds Science Youth Day is part of a national program to put increased emphasis on science education for the youth of America.

Sutton's Gold Is Still There For Treasure Seekers

Sutton's ghost no longer rides a white horse through the mott of twisted oak trees that bear his name, and J. D. Hlepaska, who lives at its edge, says it has been years since treasure hunters dug for the old man's gold. But in the old days things were much livelier in the little grove, three miles south of Victoria, just off the Refugio highway.

Old man Sutton was plenty salty and a rugged individualist who ran sheep in cattle country. This added nothing to his popularity, but worried him little, for he was not precisely sociable, either. Always ready to unlimber his old hogleg Colt, and a fair to middlin' shot, few people crossed him until the day he planted a citizen whose son resented his daddy's demise.

One Sunday morning shortly thereafter, Sutton departed this life in a blaze of gunfire on the steps of a Goliad church and apparently went into the haunting business almost immediately. And, as time wore on, his ghost was joined by others—those of horse thieves hung in the mott—until superstitious persons in the area refused to pass the woods at night, claiming that they could see what amounted to a whole cavalry troop of spectres that rode through the trees, cantered up the oaks and vanished, like wisps of fog, from the tips of the topmost twigs.

People who live in the mott today say that one gigantic oak, whose gaunt arms reach for the sky, was a favorite gallows, and that the limbs from which men were hung always died. If so, horse thieves were plentiful, for every bough on the old tree is dead and bleached to an ivory white by the suns of South Texas summers.

And, from all accounts, the gnarled trees mark almost as many buried treasures as there were horse thieves.

Before brush took over the prairie, the oaks were a prominent landmark in whose shade travelers rested during the day or built their campfires at night. And countless cattlemen returning from the sale of their herds or cautious travelers, afraid to carry money with them over the lonely trails, are supposed to have buried saddlebags containing gold and silver in the wood, rather than face robbers on the road.

But they never returned and the gold, legends say, is still waiting for some lucky finder.

Old man Sutton also buried his excess cash at the foot of one of the huge oaks, as well as that of his widowed daughter who, so the story goes, had married a man in Galveston. When her husband died she sold out, took all her money and headed for home and daddy, carrying her wealth in an old iron pot.

He took the potted cash and buried it along with his own, but his sudden death from lead poisoning gave him no time to confide its location and it's still there, just where old man Sutton hid it.

SELF-EMPLOYED PEOPLE MUST FILE INCOME REPORTS

Self-employed people who had net earnings of \$400 or more from a business in 1958 must file a tax return by April 15, 1959, said H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the social security office in Corpus Christi.

These tax returns are used for the dual purpose of establishing social security credit and to compute the amount of taxes. It is important that the returns be correctly prepared to show the exact income and expenses of the business.

Farmers use Schedule F, and the operators of other businesses use Schedule C for this statement of profit and loss. These separate schedules are a part of the income tax returns. Other income and expenses which are not related to the business are not shown on these schedules. The self-employment tax is figured from the net earnings of a farm or other trade or business without regard to the number of dependents the taxpayer has. To assure proper credit, the name and social security number of the self-employed person must always appear on the tax return exactly as they are shown on the social security card, Cleveland advised.

Businessmen will protect their rights and the rights of their dependents to retirement, disability, and family insurance now and in the future by filing their tax returns correctly when due. Returns which are accurately completed expedite the payment of social security benefits.

The returns for 1958 are due in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by April 15. Anyone who has questions about reporting his self-employment income can secure information from the Internal Revenue Service or the Social Security Administration.

Lower Shrimp Catch Due To Sharks, Northers

Sharks and northers were responsible for the fact that the Texas shrimp catch in February was 30% lower than the same period a year ago, according to C. E. Nickerson, of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Weather prohibited trawlers from fishing much of the time and sharks that attacked the shrimp nets caused a loss of production as well as considerable damage to the nets.

As a result, Nickerson said, heavy freight shipments from the high seas off Tuxpan, Obregon and Campeche, Mexico, were credited with a large portion of the month's total landings.

Preliminary comparisons show that Brownsville produced only 450,200 pounds of heads-off shrimp this year against 634,100 in 1958; Port Isabel, 344,000 against 390,200; the Coastal Bend, including Corpus Christi, Rockport and Aransas Pass, 138,200 pounds in 1959, against 320,800 pounds a year ago; Freeport-Matagorda, 34,300 against 42,500; and 4,700 pounds in the Galveston-Sabine Pass region against 13,000 pounds in 1958.

Prices during the month ranged from 75c to 84c ex-vessel for 15/20 count shrimp, heads-off.

Red snapper landings increased, Nickerson said, as many shrimpers handlined for them during daylight to supplement their lowered shrimp catches. Speckled sea trout, drum and redfish catches were lower than for January, he said, probably because of bad weather.

Oyster production dropped in the Galveston region, but was higher in the Coastal Bend. Opening of Corpus Christi and Nueces Bay to commercial oystering brought many oystermen into these bays with dredges.

Most of the catch was shipped elsewhere, by boat or by truck, he said, to certified houses, although some of it was finding a market locally through individual shuckers with benefit of certification by the Health Department. Prices to the oystermen were from \$3.50 to \$6 a barrel, he said, and the yield was from 1½ to 2 gallons a barrel.

Crab production was higher in Matagorda Bay than it had been, and lower in Galveston Bay, he continued.

Live bait landings in the Galveston Bay region, according to his report, and prices, due to scarcity, were up to \$3 a quart.

Approximately 300 boxes of heads-off shrimp, some of it being sent in by Texas vessels, were lost when the vessel Driftwood sank off Palmas Point, and several other vessels were lost or damaged during February, three being blown ashore near Tuxpan in one day, he said.

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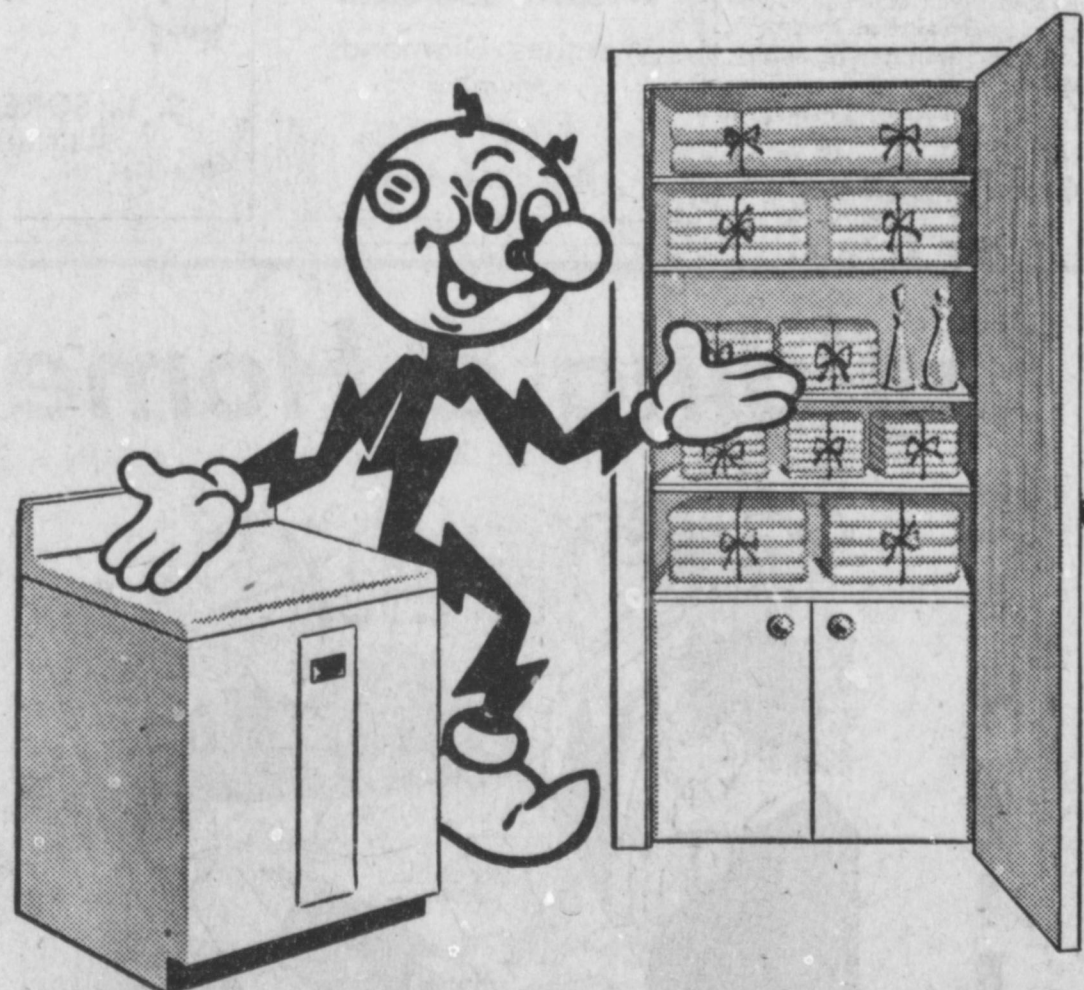
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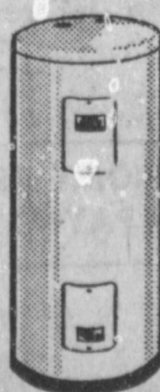
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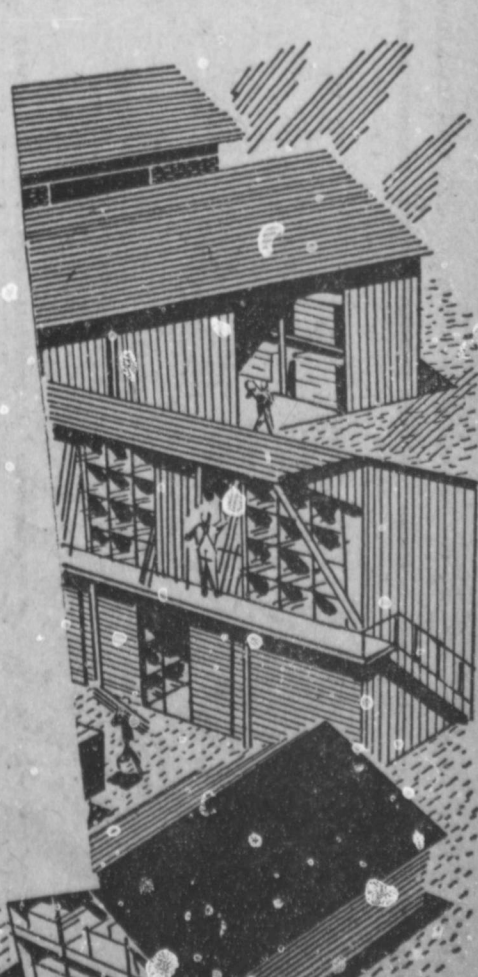

Carmen, Tampico Shrimp Catches Very Poor

According to late releases from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Mexican shrimpers in the Gulf of Mexico have been experiencing poor luck, although those on the Pacific side at Salina Cruz have been making excellent landings.

Reports indicate that Tampico trawlers are averaging less than a ton of tails per month, those at Carmen are bringing in about a ton each, and those at Salina Cruz from four to five tons.

Because of these conditions, many of the boats from the Gulf are transferring to the Pacific side.

Weather has been an important factor in this drop in the Gulf of Mexico catches, as a continual succession of northers have held the boats in for many days, a condition that extended along the Texas coast as well.

However, the "norther" season is about over, and catches in the Gulf are expected to improve.

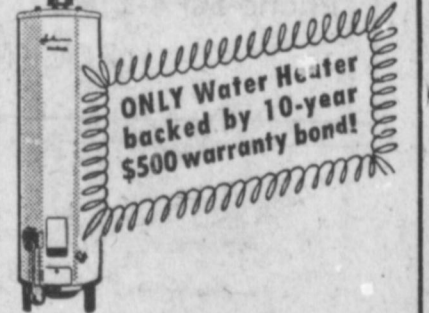

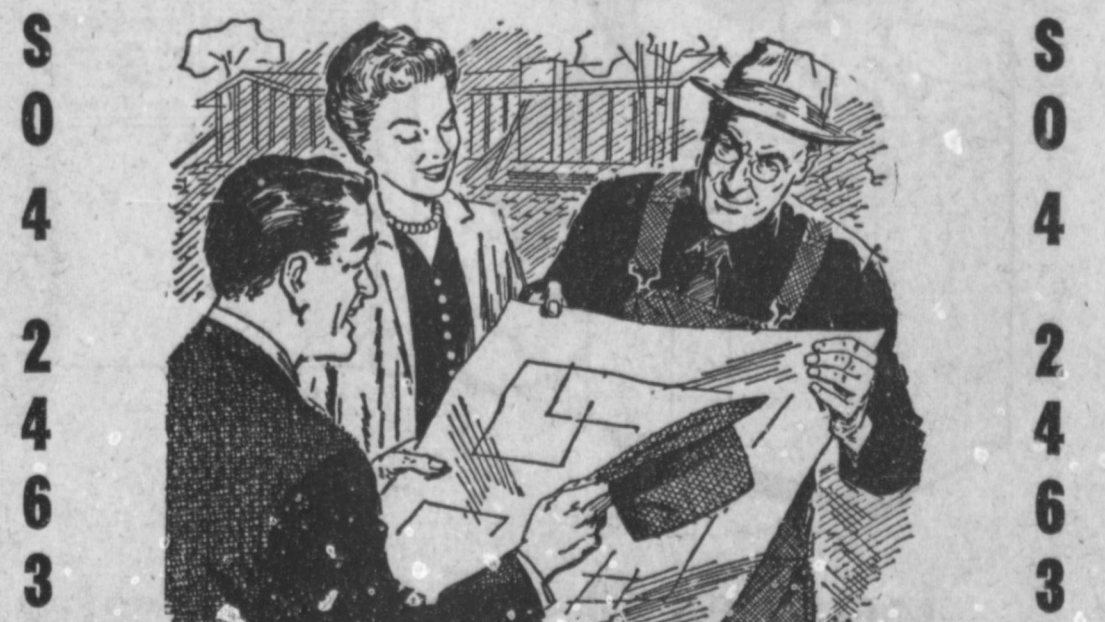

SOCIAL SECURITY TAXES DUE IN APRIL

Most of us pay taxes of some sort and usually there is a deadline date when that tax is due. Tom Wilson, Field Representative of the Social Security Administration says that employers of domestic workers are faced with such a deadline soon. He says that such employers are required by law to report the cash wages of their household workers if these payments amount to \$50.00 or more during a calendar quarter.

A calendar quarter is a three month period ending March 31st, June 30th, September 30th and December 31st, of each year. The social security tax returns are due by the end of the month following each calendar quarter. Therefore, the next payment for the quarter ending March 31st is due in April.

An equal amount of social security tax is paid by the employer and the employee—2½% each for wages paid in 1959. The reports, together with the taxes, should be sent to the Director of Internal Revenue, Austin, Texas. They must show the name, the Social Security number, and the amount of wages paid to each worker.

Information about reporting domestic workers may be obtained from the Social Security Administration or the Internal Revenue Service, according to Wilson.

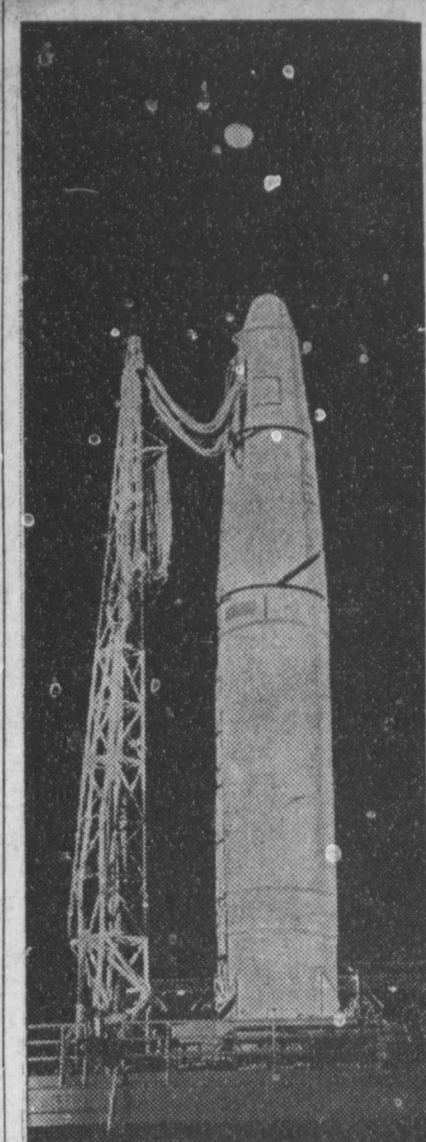

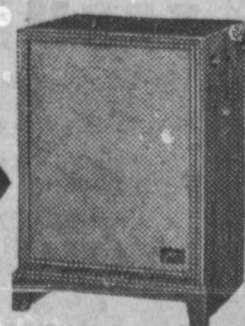

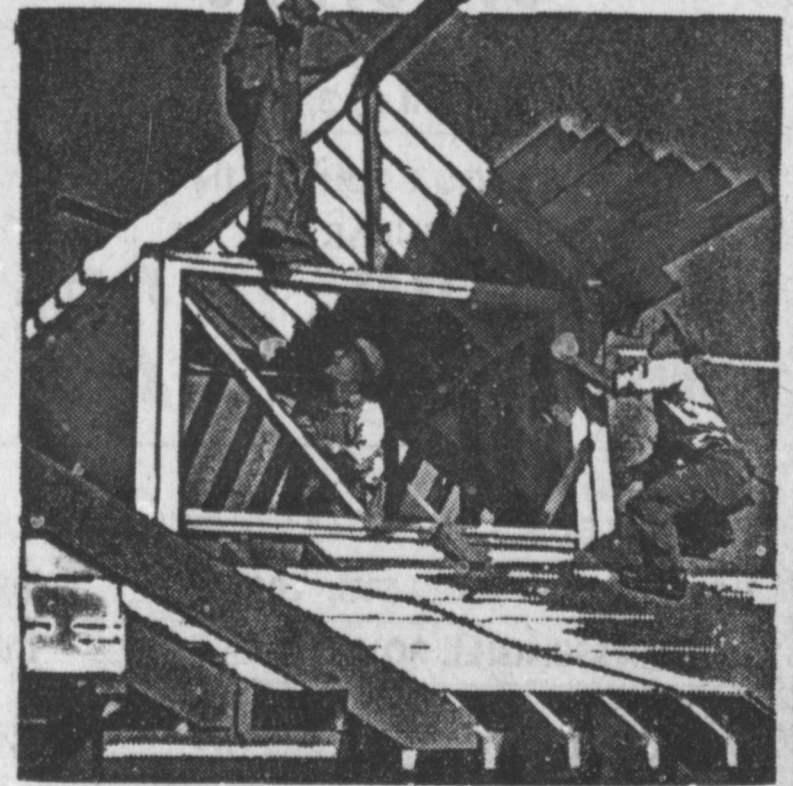

Mexican Shrimp Fleet Overbuilt

In 15 months, from March 1957 until June 1958, the Mexican shrimp fleet increased 40%, from 790 to 1107 vessels, according to a recent release by the Mexican Bureau of Fisheries. There were 663 of these in the Pacific, along with four freezer boats, and 440 in the Gulf of Mexico. There were 185 of these built for the Pacific fishery during the period, and 132 for use in the Gulf of Mexico.

Some of these were purchased in the U.S., but most of them were built in Mexico.

However, the boom has dropped off, the Bureau says, and only replacements are now on order in the Mexican shipyards, and the fact Mexican import duties have skyrocketed on boats 115 feet or less, has effectively stopped buying elsewhere than from local builders and yards.

More to blame, however, is that biologists believe that the biological potential of the fishery has been reached, a fact that purchasers of shrimp boats have failed to take into account. Hence, they say, although 1958 can be considered an average year in the Gulf of Mexico, the catch per boat in the Mexican fleet has dropped.

For this reason, a number of boats have been transferred to the Pacific where production was better than normal, but unless this keeps up in 1959, the Pacific may also run into trouble, fisheries men state.

A trend towards larger vessels is indicated by the type of construction. The number of boats in the 10 to 50 net ton group has increased about 18 per cent and vessels in the 50 to 100 net tons range have increased by 10%, statistics show.

Most of the vessels between 50 and 100 tons are shrimp trawlers, and the double-rig trawl, first used in the Rockport area of the Texas coast, is becoming more and more popular in Mexico.

HOUSEHOLD WORKERS MAY QUALIFY FOR RETIREMENT INSURANCE

Wages as low as \$4.00 a week paid to a household worker over an extended period can provide retirement insurance for the worker under the Social Security Act, according to L. H. Fuhrmann, Field Representative of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

Employers of domestic help are required to report the earnings of each employee who is paid wages of 50.00 or more in a calendar quarter. This applies to all persons hired to work in or around a private home including a gardener, laundress, cook or maid.

Social Security benefits are payable to the worker who has reached retirement age and who is insured by his work under the law. The retirement age is 62 for women and 65 for men, Fuhrmann says.

The reports which the employer makes show the name and social security number and the total amount of wages paid to each employee in each quarter of the year. The wage reports with the social security tax are sent to the Director of Internal Revenue, Austin, Texas.

Workers and their employers can get more information about their rights and duties under this law from the Social Security Administration, 530 South Water St., Corpus Christi.

They have been placed as a protection to the road where it is on a level with the bay, but the County Commissioners should have the debris picked up and carried off at the water line and out five to ten feet where the water is less than a foot deep.

Keep the grass, flowers and weeds trimmed in the place; where they are growing, so as to give out water front a more parklike appearance. This has reference to the land between the beach roads and the water line.

There are quite a few roads connecting from Highway 35 in the Rockport-Fulton area to the north and south beach roads that have no signs showing the name of the road. I've heard many tourists kick about the lack of these signs, several having said that because of no directional signs we passed up Rockport going on to the next town where it is easier to find a good tourist court; feeling too that a town without main road and street signs is a place where there will be no modern restaurants or other facilities.

There are other important improvements, Sutherland said, that will prove helpful in getting more people to come to this resort area but as the items mentioned are less costly I feel that they should be the ones considered first as a starter.

Frazier Cantrell accompanied Sutherland.

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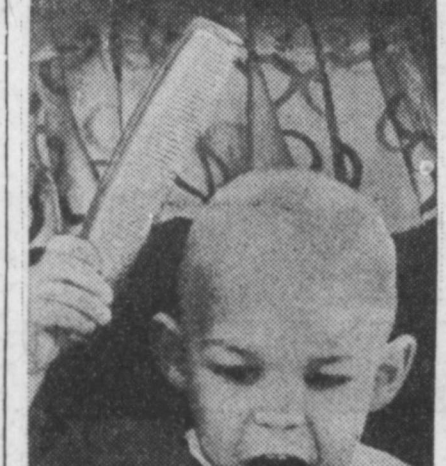
