

Along The Waterfront



The Cedar Bayou fish pass, between Matagorda and St. Joseph islands, designed by the consulting engineering firm of Lockwood, Andrews and Newman, Corpus Christi, and under construction by Kingfisher Dredging Company of Port Lavaca, is progressing according to schedule.

Since the work commenced in February, retaining levees have been thrown up along St. Joseph Island's side, and these are approximately three-quarters complete at this time, furnishing a place to deposit the spoil cast up by the dredge.

Dredging, which began approximately a week ago in Mesquite Bay, is well underway on the mouth of the pass, which is shallower than the channel to be dredged through the island. This design was used hoping to simulate the conditions of a natural pass, and to keep the channel from silting again after dredging.

Total cost of the work will be \$198,300, according to figures released at the time the bids for this work were taken, and 225 days were allowed for removal of the 1 million plus cubic yards of material to be dredged from the cut, which will eventually lead to the Gulf of Mexico, making a highway for fishermen and fish.

Many fine catches were made at Good Luck Pier in Fulton the past week—especially at night.

New Band Director Plans for Summer Classes at ACHS

Joe Randow, new director of the Aransas County High School Pirate Band, has planned an extensive summer program, scheduled to start shortly after he moves here from Comfort, where he has spent the last three years as director of music and leader of the Comfort High School band.

And this program is based on a wealth of experience, for he has been either a band member or a director ever since he went to San Marcos High.

For four years, while obtaining his Bachelor of Music degree at SWSTC at San Marcos, he played in the college band and orchestra, and he continued to do this for another year while he studied for his master's degree in education.

Graduating from SWSTC, he went to Prairie Lea High School, where he stayed for three years as director of music and band, before going to Comfort.

Randow, who will move here with his wife in the near future, is already laying plans for a marching and concert band, and is planning on classes for students who will be in the seventh grade or above next year.

A meeting will be held in the band hall at Aransas County High School on June 14, at 8 p. m., which students and their parents are urged to attend, as instrumental classes will be organized at this time.

All students who are members of the band now, and whose schedule will permit, are urged to attend these classes, which will include elementary school pupils, Randow said.

Full band rehearsals will begin late in July, he said, and marching will probably start in August, in order to prepare for football season, he stated.

On the same day, at 9 o'clock in the morning, candidates for drum majors and majorettes are asked to meet with the band director for interviews and for preliminary instruction. Tryouts will be held at a later date, Randow said, after he has had an opportunity to work with the contestants, and the girls will be chosen by judges from other area schools.

Miss Sorenson will also play the recessional at the end of the services.

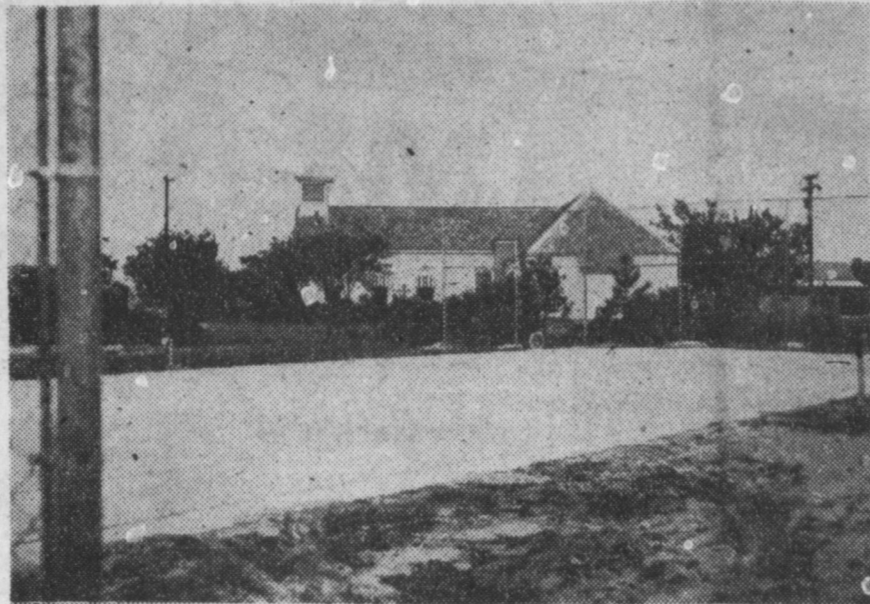
Girl Scouts Hold Court of Honor

COMMISSIONERS, SCHOOL BOARD, AGREE TO HIRE EXPERTS TO REVALUE PROPERTY IN ARANSAS COUNTY; CITY COUNCIL UNDECIDED

At a joint meeting Wednesday night, the Aransas County Independent School Board and the Commissioners' Court of the county passed resolutions to join in establishing 100% valuations on real estate in the county, to be made through an appraisal survey by a firm yet to be named. Officials of the city of Rockport,

offered a chance to participate, asked for more time to make up their minds, and promised to let County Judge John D. Wendell have an answer some time next week.

The meeting was called by Judge Wendell, who pointed out that oil companies operating in the county had objected to raised assessments on the grounds that much real property in the county was not properly valued and that they were bearing more than their fair share of taxation.

The situation was the same with regard to school taxes, members of the school board pointed out.

There was little argument about the need for outside revaluation of Aransas County property, the main question from most of those present being how quickly it could be done, and how much it would cost.

L. R. Vaughan, of Thomas Y. Pickett and Co., now utilized by both school and county for oil valuations, told those at the meeting that such a survey, if started in September, would take about six months and would be completed in time to be used in computing next year's taxes. Costs he said, could be prorated, and spread over two years.

If the city took part, various members of the commissioners' court pointed out, its cost would be one-third of the total cost of valuing city property, while the other two-thirds would be borne equally by the county and school tax units. Outside the city limits, costs would be split between the (Continued on page 8)

WORK ON LITTLE BAY PROGRESSING

According to Raymond Oliver, Lockwood, Andrews and Newman inspector on the Little Bay job, dredging should be completed within 18 to 20 days, if nothing happens to delay the work.

Lloyd W. Richardson Construction Co. crews have also swung into action on realignment of streets on the beach front, and are installing the necessary curbs, preparatory to building the street that will crown the new levee in front of Little Bay, making a mile and a half of new beach accessible to summer vacationers.

In addition to this, work on the new quadruple boat launching ramp is scheduled to start this week. Located about halfway between the mainland and Frandolig Island, on the inside of the levee, this will enable outboarders and light craft owners to launch their boats even when there is a heavy on shore wind.

The channel and basin behind the levee are also completely protected, even when there is a heavy wind from any direction.

Jack Horton Re-elected In City Council Race

Jack Horton was elected to the city council here Thursday, defeating Frazier Cantrell 97-75 in a special election.

Horton, a tourist court operator, and Cantrell, a charter boat owner, tied with 62 votes each in the April 7 regular election.

Horton will represent Precinct 1 on the council. He has been filling the unexpired term of Col. James W. Porter, who resigned last year.

COMMISSIONERS AUTHORIZE FUND INVESTMENT

The Aransas County Commissioners' Court, at their second regular meeting of the month, authorized auditor J. R. Millikin to invest \$111,000 of the county's money in short term government bonds. \$50,000 of this is from the road and bridge fund, \$40,000 from the general fund, \$10,000 from the mosquito fund, \$1,000 from the permanent improvement fund, and \$10,000 from the courthouse sinking fund.

In addition, \$2,288 was transferred from the airport fund to the Road and Bridge account, to pay for work done on the entrance road to the airport.

Other business included authorization for repainting of patrol cars in the sheriff's department, and setting of the rental rate for the county's new T-hangers at the airport. Each hangar will rent for \$35 per month and each storage room will rent for \$10 a month.

SMALL RUN OF WHITE SHRIMP OVER WEEKEND

C. E. Nickerson, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service statistician, says that during Friday, Saturday and Sunday over 60,000 pounds of shrimp tails, mostly from 15/20 white shrimp, were landed at Rockport and Aransas Pass.

Highway Engineer Reviews Projects

D. C. Greer, Head of Department, Reviews Work Underway and Programmed for Aransas County Including Widening of North and South 35

The Texas Highway Department has released a progress report on highway work in Aransas County. State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer stated that \$469,500 of work was under way on highways in the county.

Greer explained that new and improved highways are greatly needed due to the increase in the number of vehicles using the roadways in all parts of the state.

"Motor vehicle registrations in Aransas County have increased 99 per cent in the past decade. There

are now 2,821 vehicles registered as compared to 1,416 ten years ago," Greer said.

The Highway Department maintains 70 miles of highway in the county, and last year spent \$44,700 for the upkeep and repair of these miles.

Last year's completed construction total was 2.6 miles at a cost of \$167,408. Ten years ago the completed construction total for the year added up to \$21,100.

The highway work in the county is under the supervision of District Engineer T. O. Foster Jr. of Corpus Christi.

Three Aransas County projects are currently under construction: 1. On State Highway 35 from Lady Claire Street in Rockport to south end of Copano Bay Causeway, 5.9 miles of flexible base shoulder widening and rock asphaltic concrete pavement. J. Carroll Weaver is the contractor, and the contract is for \$81,940.

2. On State Highway 35 in Rockport between Lady Claire Street and Loop 70, 0.3 mile of grading, structures, flexible base and hot-mix asphaltic concrete pavement. Heldenfels Bros. is the contractor and the contract for \$108,413.

3. On Loop 70 in Rockport between State Highway 35 and Traylor Avenue, 2.3 miles of grading, structures, flexible base and hot-mix asphaltic concrete pavement. Heldenfels Brothers is the contractor and the contract for \$279,100.

Two future projects have been scheduled for the county involving 21.4 miles of highway work at an estimated contract cost of \$712,000. The state and the county will share equally the cost of the necessary right-of-way on project No. 1.

These future projects are as follows:

1. State 35, from the Refugio County line to the Copano Bay Causeway, 12.1 miles grading, additional base, and surfacing at an estimated cost of \$400,000.

2. State 35, from Aransas Pass to Rockport, 9.3 miles of widening grading, and surfacing. The estimated cost of the project is \$312,000.

The Commissioners Court authorized County Judge John D. Wendell some time ago to proceed with acquisition of right-of-way on Project 1, and State Highway Department crews have been widening culverts on the area embraced by Project 2, but the State Highway Engineer did not say when further construction on these sections might be expected.

Magees To Re-Open At Old Stand May 29

Emory M. Spencer announced today that he has sold the restaurant property formerly operated as Crawford's Shrimp Net to Mr. and Mrs. V. S. Magee and Ben Doyon, who will open for business as the Silver Derrick Restaurant on Friday, May 29.

Magee and his wife are well-known to people of Rockport and this area, having been the first tenants to occupy the site where the new restaurant and drive in will be opened. Doyon, who has been a salesman for Zero Food Company, of Houston, came there from Montreal, Canada.

He said that plans are to open a drive-in grocery and food market in the older portion of the building, formerly operated by the Magees, and to give 24-hour service.

In the other portion of the building, where there are modern dining rooms and kitchens capable of handling over a hundred people at one time, the firm will open a restaurant and catering service.

The dining rooms will cater to tourist and local trade, and are set up to handle clubs, weddings, and similar occasions. The catering service will make a specialty of picnics, banquets, civic clubs who wish to eat elsewhere than at the Silver Derrick, and out-of-town gatherings of various kinds.

MASS FOR CATHOLIC SENIORS TO BE HELD AT SEVEN O'CLOCK

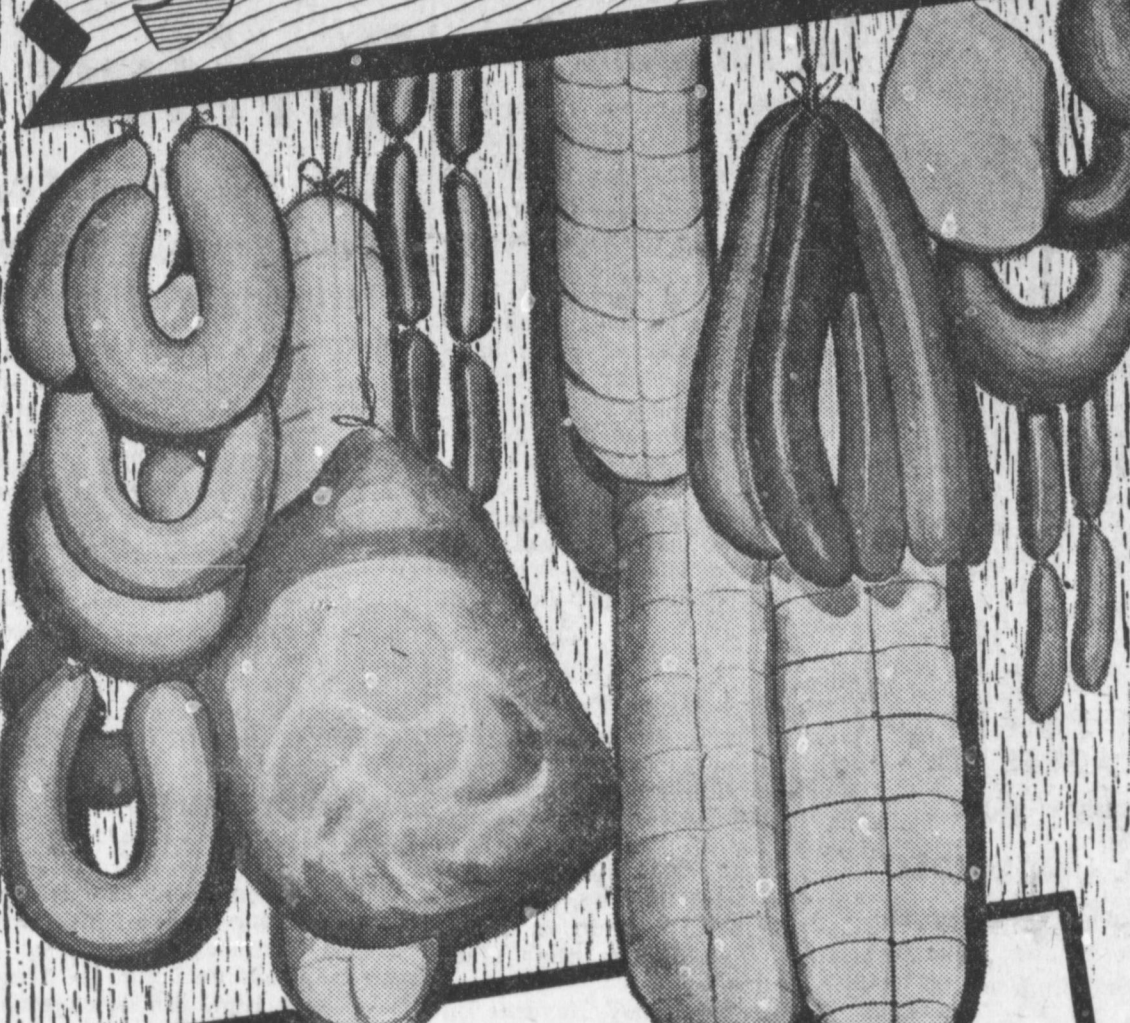
A special mass for Catholic members of the Aransas County High School senior class will be held at 7 a. m., Sunday, May 24, according to Father G. J. O'Doherty.
