Relic of Steamboat Days on the Guadalupe Still Stands in Victoria

Down on Juan Linn Street in Victoria, in front of where the old Roundhouse Saloon used to stand, is a shaft of solid iron protruding from the cement sidewalk, probably the last relic of steamboat days on the Guadalupe.
 Some six feet extends above the ground, apparently the end where the old paddle wheel fitted, and it has stood at its present location for three-quarters of a century, and is without doubt older than that.
 Back in the seventies, before the railroad right-of-way was laid out and the new roundhouse built, there was a blacksmith shop and general iron works across the street from the shaft's present location.
 Apparently the chunk of iron was brought there for repair or re-forging, although no one knows for certain.
 However, oldtimers around Victoria recall hearing Mrs. Sam Sitterle recount how her husband and one of his brothers took a team of mules, so heavy was the shaft, and dragged it across the way to make room for more improvements, as the railroad was building a new and larger roundhouse.
 Twelve feet or more long, it varied from twelve inches through at the butt to around six on the end that can still be seen, and it stands on a foundation or heavy timbers which gradually sank into the ground until almost half of the shaft was buried.
 But it was no whimsical vargory of the Sitterle boys that put it there, for it filled a very real need.
 In the old days cowhands loading stock and dry as a whistle, would sashay over to the Roundhouse Saloon, take a dally or two with their reins around the old hitchin' rack, and enter, leaving their cow ponies to stand hipshot in the sun, half asleep.
 It was an ideal arrangement, except for one thing. Equines used to nothing more exciting than a longhorn on the prod just couldn't take the noise and excitement of a big city like Victoria, with two or three thousand people, especially when one of the pot-bellied locomotives let out a soul-shaking blast. No well brought-up cow pony could stand such foolishness and as one horse they r'ared back and the hitchin' rack came up by the roots.
 In time, most of them became more or less used to the panther-like screams of the iron horses, but there were always some newcomers or oldtimers that wanted no part of the railroads, and for them Sam hit upon the idea of setting the old steamboat shaft in the ground, as something solid to tie to. And, until hard roads and the automobile took over, it nobly fulfilled the purpose.

CHANGES IN YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

By Thomas W. Wilson, Field Representative, Social Security Administration, Corpus Christi, Texas.

Some important changes have been made in the old-age and survivors insurance system as a result of the Social Security Amendments of 1958.

All of the changes, directly or indirectly, affect the American public as a whole. Working persons—employed and self-employed—need to know about them, and their families need to know about them too.

In this series of five articles, I shall describe the changes singly and in detail; this one will summarize the most important changes designed to strengthen this Federal system of retirement, disability, and family insurance which provides partial protection against loss of earned income upon the retirement, death, or total disability of the worker.

Most important, is the increase in benefit amounts. This applies to those now getting benefit payments and who will become beneficiaries in the future. Most monthly benefit checks will be about 7 percent higher this year, with a minimum increase of at least \$3.00 in the amount payable to a worker who retired at age 65 or later. The maximum monthly payment a family may receive will be increased from \$200.00 to \$254 a month. Families now receiving maximum monthly benefits under the law will receive increases from \$7.50 to \$54 depending upon the deceased worker's average monthly earnings.

Let me make it clear that people now on the beneficiary rolls do not have to get in touch with the social security office to obtain these increases. The larger amounts are effective with January and will show up on benefit checks for that month which will go in the mails early in February.

Social security taxes were increased beginning with 1959. An

employed person has 2 1/2 percent taken out of his pay instead of last year 2 3/4 percent; his employer contributes 2 1/2 percent also. The self-employment social security tax was increased to 3 1/4 percent of net earnings up to \$4,800 in the year, for the year 1959 with the tax return they make early in 1960.

Important changes have been made in the disability insurance provisions in the law. If a worker, age 50-64, is getting monthly disability benefits because he is too disabled for further substantial gainful work, payments can be made to his dependents just like the payments made to retired workers. Moreover, a person entitled to social security disability benefits no longer has the amount of his benefit payment reduced or withheld because he is receiving disability payments from other Federal or State source.

The amended law also makes it easier for people whose disabilities develop gradually to qualify for either cash disability benefits or the disability "freeze." This is brought about through a change in the work requirements. It is no longer necessary that the worker have at least 1 1/2 years of social security credit out of the 3 years before he became disabled, but he must have had 5 years of work out of the 10 years just before becoming disabled. The standards for determining disability remain the same.

ORDER FOR ELECTION PROCEDURE IN NAVIGATION AND CANAL COMMISSIONERS' ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF ARANSAS

On this the 12th day of May, 1959, the Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 convened in Special session with the following members present, to-wit:
