

The most glamorous of all the speculators gathered at Live Oak of Mier were Alvin E. White of Point was Colonel Henry L. Kinney | Aransas City. who came here in 1838. Although then about 25 years of age, he had left a trail of romance and almost courtship of Daniel Webster's daughter. The prospect of lucrative trade with Mexican Federalists attracted him to Live Oak Point, and shortly thereafter to Corpus Christi. While at Aransas City he was associated with Colonel Power in several ventures. After moving to Corpus Christi, he formed a partnership with William B. Aubrey, whose descendants have a prominent place in the

development of San Antonio. Shortly after the close of the revolution, Captain James W. Byrne located a survey of 1428 acres on Lookout Peninsula, on lands which had been granted by the Mexican government government to Powers and Hewetson. on this tract Byrne, Geo. Robert Hull and Geo. Armstrong laid out a townsite which they named Lamar. This is the only one of the coastal towns of this area, projected during the Republic, whch exists at the present time. In 1837 settlers began to move upon lands in the Black Point area. Black Point was a well known landing place from the days of the Spaniards. It is the site of the present day village of Bayside. Major Cyrus W. Egery, a Texan veteran who served under General Thomas H. Green, established a home on a island which is now known as Egery's Island, in 1838, squarely on Black Point itself. Peter Doran built a house and established a ranch about the same time.

The Welders moved to the Black Point area during the Republic. Henry Clark was in partnership with Welder in the cattle business. Clark traded horses on a large scale, and made frequent trips to Mexico on trading expeditions. Clark also did survey-

After the close of the revolution, to the close of the Republic, intermittent warfare was kept by the nationalists of both countries. A few of the raids were made by the Mexican military, but most were made by guerrilla parties. Within a short time the irregular warfare degenerated into raids by private individuals back and forth across the Nueces to recover and drive off cattle and livestock and to make reprisals for wrongs which nationals of one country sustained at the hands of nationals of the other. The term "Cowboy" did not originate in Texas. It was adopted as the designation of guerrilla partisans in the American Revolution. However, the term as used in connection with the cattle industry was originated in Texas, and in this very section. The Mexican equivalent of the Texas term in the word "Vaquero."

In March of 1838, Lt. Colonel Antonio de los Santos, with a detachment of about forty-five Mexican troops, came to Live Oak Point and arrested Colonel Power. Colonel Power was taken to Matamoros where he was thrown in prison. There he was kept for several days. Influential friends intervened in his behalf and he was released from confinement and given liberty of the city, on his parole that he would not leave without permission. He remaned in that status for about five months, when General Woll released him. and Power returned to Live Oak Point. These incidents led to the formation by Colonel Power and

South Texas Is **Dotted With Ports**

The South Texas coast, from the mouth of the Colorado to the Mexican border, is dotted with harbors centering around the various bays. These range from small basins capable of holding a few pleasure craft or shallow-draft shrimp boats to others large enough and deep enough to hold an ocean liner.

In the Calhoun-Matagorda-Jackson county region, around Matagorda Bay, there are eleven or twelve, starting with the little fishing and dredge boat port of Matagorda, near the mouth of the Colorado, and winding up at Long Mott on the Victoria-Guadalupe Canal now being dug.

Palacios, on the north shore of the bay, is the second harbor in this group, with two municipal boat basins and a privately owned slip for shrimpers. Chief tonnage here consists of seafood, quantities of mud shell, and some barge-borne pipe and other oil well supplies.

To the west, the two little communities of Port Alto and Olivia furnish some facilities for small boats, but it is not until Point Comfort is reached on Lavaca Bay that any sizable tonnage is handled.
