

At a meeting of some fifty officals from twenty towns and subdivisions of the Coastal Bend held in Alice Monday, it was agreed to appoint an interim committee for a water authority contemplating use of surface water and runoff now wasted in a fivecounty area.

Judges Wash Storm, Jr., of Jim Wells County, B. A. Brown, of Kleberg County, and William Nicholas, of San Patricio, agreed to appoint four men each within the next few days.

Judge Noah Kennedy, of Nueces County, sent a letter expressing his deep interest and Judge John D. Wendell of Aransas County on Tuesday appointed Harold Picton, James A. Jarboe, Jack McCready and J. L. Baughman as committeemen from Aransas County.

The City of Alice initiated the program, which, if put into effect, will cost between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000, and which is designed to meet the region's water needs until 1995.

The meeting was conducted by a panel consisting of Alice Mayor Cecil Carlile, chairman, Alice city attorney Davis Gross, Mason G. Lockwood, president of the Houston Chamber of Commerce and head of the firm of Lockwood, Anand Wallace Payne, of San Antonio, president of The First of Texas Company, financial advisers for the proposed water development program.

Sally Skull, born Sarah Newman, was good looking, a good cowhand, and she could shoot as straight with her left hand as her right. So she usually packed two six-shooters and sometimes used them. However, history records that all the men she killed really needed killing. In her prime during the Civil War, this remarkable Texan served her state and the Confederacy magnificently. She worked big crews of loyal cowboys, most of them of Mexican descent, on her ranches in Bee and Nueces counties. She had some big freight wagons. With these, Sally and her vaqueros hauled cotton to Mexico, where it brought high war-time prices. Then, she used her cotton money to buy munitions for the South and hauled them back to Texas. Danger and hardship that would have stopped most men couldn't even slow Sally down. And amazingly enough, with all her rough ways and rough tongue - her vocabu-

lary was pungently uninhibited, it's said - Sally Skull's essential femininity was never obscured. She was a frontier party girl — liked to dress up and take in the gayest Mexican fandangoes, and she outlived three sturdy Texas husbands. Living the life she loved, Sally made it a good one.






