## The World's Most Colorful Convention

News of the world's most colorful convention, the Annual Conclave of the Ancient Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, will be carried to the crowd of 200,000 people in Washington next week over the world's most modern public address and amplification system. This application system, furnished to the Shrine through the courtesy of General Motors, will be divided into thirteen segments so that any one or all of the segments may be pressed into use at the same time.

In addition to keeping up a continuous running comment on general events, the amplification system will be used to broadcast the divine services on the morning of Sunday, June 9, the Shrine Regatta on the Potomac that afternoon, using a "mike" on the Coast Guard Cutter Apache, the open ceremonial meeting on Tuesday through means of a wire into the National Theatre, and the Ceremonial Banquet Tuesday night through a microphone from the Willard Hotel.

There are three great parades scheduled. The escort parade of the uniformed bodies will be held Tuesday morning, June 11, the night parade of the uniformed bodies, always a fantastic and colorful event, on Wednesday night, June 12, and the Monster Night Pageant, staged on the largest portable stages ever assembled and which will be viewed by President Roosevelt from his seat in the "Pavilion of Omar," built in front of the White House. All these events will be described over the amplification system.

In addition to furnishing the amplification system, General Motors has generously furnished 350 new cars, including Chevrolets, Pontiacs, Oldsmobiles, Buicks, La Salles, Cadillacs, for the use of the officers and representatives, and their legions, and these will have a conspicuous part in the parades.

According to Director General R. P. Smith, it promises to be the greatest convention ever held in the Capital City.

## Business Out Look Improving

Production of Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks will continue at peak schedules throughout June, and probably considerably longer, W. E. Holler, vice-president and general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company, announced this week, following his return from a coast to coast trip through the territory, where he discussed with dealers and the wholesale organization in the field, the outlook for the next 90 days.

June output projections, Mr. Holler said, are higher than in June of last year, and full capacity of the manufacturing units and the company's 10 assembly plants will be required to carry out the program. This assures a wide spread of employment at a period when production normally begins to taper off. He added that it is the company's hope to maintain sales at such a level as to repeat the unprecedented achievement of last year, when Chevrolet sales in the second six months eclipsed those in the first.

"Several factors noted in the field justify optimistic predictions," said Mr. Holler. "In the first place, Chevrolet dealers have on hand a large bank of orders, which the plants are now working hard to fill. Deliveries are coming through much more promptly, and this fact is naturally having a favorable effect on the number of orders received.

"More than a dozen executives from Detroit are now out in the territory, addressing Chevrolet wholesale and retail personnel in all parts of the country. They are in constant touch with us, and the reports they have relayed in all point to continuation of business at or near its present peak.

"In the final analysis, the improvement can be traced clear back to the farm, which of course is fundamental in any picture of national prosperity. Farm income in most sections of the United States has shown a substantial gain over 1933 and 34. The outlook for business from farmers would be good even without the addition of government benefit moneys which have been pouring into rural sections.

## Jayton Invited To Send Sponsor

Jayton has been invited to send a sponsor to the Sixth Annual Texas Cowboy Reunion to be held in Stamford July 2, 3, and 4. One hundred towns and cities of West Texas are expected to send girl riders to represent them at the Reunion this year, according to a letter received here from H. G. Andrews, chairman of the committee in charge of that feature of the Reunion.

Miss Lucile Daniels represented this city at the Reunion last year, competing for prizes, riding in the parade and taking part in the various social activities with which the sponsors were honored. Sixty-five cities and towns sent sponsors last year.

A handsome, special made saddle, similar to the one awarded to Mrs. Ardeth Colman of Blackwell, Nolan county winner of first prize last year, will be presented to the girl taking first place in the judging this year. The saddle is being made by Frank Mills of Dallas, an artist in leather working. It has a padded seat, quilted with silk thread of different colors, and is hand stamped. The saddle will be contributed by the Salesmanship Club of Dallas. Second prize will be a pair of boots, given by Bryant Link Company of Stamford; third prize, pair of Spurs offered by Nocona Boot Company, Nocona, Texas; and fourth prize, a pair of bits, contributed by W. R. Boone, Lubbock.

In the awarding of prizes, the appearance, horsemanship, and riding apparel of the girl, and the appearance, performance and equipment of the mount will be considered by the judges. The judging will take place in the rodeo arena of the Reunion grounds on the morning of the first and second days of the celebration.

Winners of prizes in the past years will not be eligible for awards at the 1935 celebration.

Sponsors are required to furnish their own mounts and equipment, but grooming and forage will be provided at the Reunion.

Prizes will ride in the parade to be held during the Reunion, and will be presented at a round of social affairs, their honor, including dances, and receptions.

Mrs. M. Hardy of Stamford has been selected as hostess to the sponsors, and Clara Mae Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Jones of this city has been chosen as Stamford's sponsor.

## Radical Reduction In Relief Funds

Radically reduced allotments for the relief population of Texas are in prospect for the month of June, it has been announced by Adam R. Johnson, state relief administrator.

Federal authorities notified Johnson that the state will receive \$2,500,000 for general relief, although application was made for more than \$4,000,000. Budgets, therefore, were made on the basis of a state allotment of 210,000. Although the case load has dropped steadily since January 1, Washington officials have repeatedly expressed dissatisfaction with the number of families in relief in Texas.

"Accordingly, our per case grants will be reduced from \$17 in May to about \$10 in June," Johnson said, "and our total relief disbursement from \$5,612,000 in May to \$3,391,000 in June."

"Although at first sight this may appear to be dreadfully severe, we expect thousands of cases to quit the relief rolls in June for employment on farms where they can make more than the \$10 dollars we are able to give them. Farmers everywhere are calling for labor to help them cultivate their crops and we feel that in the case of the employable families there should not be any suffering because of this reduced grant."

June funds will be spent by the counties for the purpose described in the following budget: General relief, \$2,125,342; hospitalization, \$8,963; rural subsistence, \$725,063; capital goods, \$532,154. Texas Relief Commission will receive \$2,500,000 from the federal government and \$400,000 of state funds for general relief. Other grants for the special program of rural rehabilitation, student aid and emergency education are expected to during the month.

**Milk In Disguise**

"Doctor," began a worried mother, "Betty is complaining again about drinking milk. Does she really need so much?"

"Yes, she does," the doctor replied, "and that isn't just my opinion. We know that it is true from countless scientific experiments. The findings have been checked and tested over and over again. Betty is growing. She needs the vitamins and minerals in milk to keep her healthy and growing. And we know that most children need the full quart to get their share."

"I know you're right," the mother said. "I'll keep after her."

"No don't keep after her. That may give her a real ache for milk. Try some disguises instead. Let's see now. There is a cream and junket; custards and puddings; milk on berries; crackers and milk, cereals and egg-nogs. I'm sure you know of many other ways."

"How about cheese? Have you tried that? And perhaps Betty will not notice the change if you offer her a glass of cool milk in the middle of the morning and the afternoon, instead of at meals."

"I see what you mean, doctor. Thanks, I will try it."

**ALERTNESS IS THE CHIEF REQUIREMENT**

Alertness is the chief requirement for the driver on a vacation tour. He doesn't know the road and its hazards, he is unfamiliar with local traffic customs, and at any moment he may be called upon to cope with a situation that he is not accustomed to meeting in his ordinary driving. Therefore, if he does not concentrate on his job, he is much more likely to have a mishap than when he is traveling the old familiar roads around his home.

Most driving over accustomed routes is done sub-consciously; the driver slows down for curves and busy intersections, halts at stop streets, and observes the traffic lights, with-giving thought to them. This is the safest condition of driving, because it permits the man at the wheel to be on the alert for any unusual development. Since he does so many of the necessary things from force of habit, he is better able to act when the unexpected comes.

On the summer tour, over strange highways, the driver must consciously direct his mind to warning signs, crossings, curves, steep grades, etc. And it is on this kind of drive, when he needs all his attention on the road that he is most subjected to distraction. He has to observe the scenery, keep an eye on the youngsters, converse with his wife, see that the baggage remains in place, and look after a dozen things that in ordinary driving cause him no concern.

The first rule of safe touring for the driver, therefore, is to keep constantly on the alert. The rule for the passengers is to avoid distracting the driver from his main job.

Passengers could be a positive help if they tried. They can call out "Green" or "Red" as the car approaches a traffic signal, just as the locomotive fireman calls out the signals to the engineer; they can do the same thing for a road sign, and in many ways relieve the driver of some of his burden.

Inexperience is a frequent cause of trouble, but ignorance is excusable. The good driver will take the necessary precautions that may be needed, rather than to go ahead and trust that none will be necessary. For instance, if he is starting down a grade in a mountainous country, he will shift to low gear in advance. If he is entering a curve, he will slow down and be prepared if the road suddenly takes a sharp bend. If he parks his car on a stiff grade, he will leave it in low rather than trust to his hand brake.

"Take nothing for granted" is an excellent rule for the tourist driver.

He should not assume that all is clear around the bend of the road or just over the crest of the hill — he should not even count on what other drivers will do. The one safe assumption about drivers, in fact, is that they will do the wrong thing. If you anticipate that they will, you'll save a lot of trouble.

The typhoid vaccine is not a serum. This preventative treatment of typhoid fever consists of three small hypodermic 'shots' given every 5 to 7 days until three injections are given. Such a treatment protects you from taking the typhoid fever for two to three years.

Consult your family physician today in regards to typhoid protection against this often fatal disease. This form of protection insures you and your family against possible long confinement, great economic loss, and perhaps death.

You may be so unfortunate as to drink contaminated milk, water, or other food containing the typhoid bacilli and contract the disease this

year. In selecting a vacation spot, choose one where the water is pure. Be sure that the dining room are free from flies. The best to boil water. Be sure you know that the sparkling spring water is not contaminated by drainage.

CHANGES URGED
IN BANKING BILL

Business Men and Bankers Agree
in Objecting to Political Control
Over Banks.

AMENDMENTS ARE SUGGESTED

Political Domination of Federal Reserve
Board Declared to Be
Undesirable for Depositors
as Well as Their Banks.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Business
men and bankers alike who have
appeared before committees of Congress
to present views regarding the
Banking Act of 1935 have found common
cause for criticism in those provisions
which they agree would create
the means for undesirable political control
over the Federal Reserve System
and thereby over individual banks
throughout the United States.

This view has been stressed in criticisms
by the Chamber of Commerce of the
United States, and the question of
partisan control over banking was the
central theme of a statement presented
by R. S. Hecht, President of the American
Bankers Association, who appeared
before the Senate Sub-Committee
on Banking and Currency hearings
here. Mr. Hecht declared that his organization
is actuated by a desire to be
helpful to Congress "in enacting effective
and workable banking legislation
in the interests of all our people." He
said in part:

"If it is finally decided that it is necessary
to carry this legislation through
at this session, we are strongly of the
opinion that special care should be
taken to keep our credit control and
banking mechanism free from any sort
of political considerations.

"In making this statement I do not
wish to appear to question the
propriety of the Government's exerting a
certain amount of control over banking
operations so far as they affect the nation's
currency and general monetary
policy. Nor do we object to broad powers
of supervision over the operation of
our banking institutions because of the
semi-public responsibilities they carry.
But when it comes to such matters as
the granting of credit and the making
of investments by our banks, these are
questions of business policies that
should not be under the sole control
of a board so constituted as to be
dependent upon partisan or political
considerations under any administration.

The Basis of Sound Credit

"The real conditions that create the
necessity for the expansion or contraction
of credit arise from the needs of
agriculture, industry and trade themselves,
wholly independent of the administrative
policies of the party which happens
to be in power. We feel that the
financial requirements of the nation's
business constitute a continuing
economic process that is not related to
political changes. The fundamental
principles of sound credit do not vary
with variations in public thought. All
experience teaches that the quality of
credit is sound only so long as it is
based purely on the requirements of
sound business. It is not sound when
any other considerations or motives enter
into its composition.

The Banking Act would centralize
in the Federal Reserve Board at Washington
means aimed to control the supply
of money in the country, which
term includes the sum total of currency
in circulation and demand deposits in
the banks which become current
through checks. The powers which it
is proposed to give the Board are intended
to enable it to influence the quantity
of this deposit money through open
market operations, the discount rate and
reserve requirements.

The Need for Independence

"That is the reason why we are so
strongly in favor of making the Federal
Reserve Board a body of such independence
and prestige that it would
be definitely removed from all political
thought, influence and dictation. Its
members should be free to study and to
act in accordance with the needs and
conditions of agriculture, industry and
trade. The policies of the board should
have no reference to the politics or the
changes in politics of the national administration.

"In our studies of the bank bill, we
have been strongly impressed with the
fact that it would set up a situation
under which the Federal Reserve Board
and its policies might be subject to control
from the political administration
of the country. In saying this I do not
charge that it is the intention of the
present administration to bring about
any undue control over the nation's
banking mechanism. The point is that
if the bill passed as now proposed,
opportunity for control would be there
for the use of the present or whatever
future administration might be in
power.

"Our criticisms of the bill are not
aimed, therefore, at the motives of the
present administration, but they are
wholly impersonal and non-political
and are aimed entirely at the basic
principles involved."

Desirable Changes Proposed

Careful study by his organization,
Mr. Hecht said, had resulted in a number
of suggestions for constructive
revisions in the bill which he submitted
to Congress. On the other hand, he de-

clared that many of the changes
proposed by the committee in existing
laws "are of a constructive nature and
should have the support of bankers, if
the method of appointment and the
tenure of members of the Federal
Reserve Board in whose hands it is
planned to concentrate greater power
than ever before, could be so altered as
to insure, in so far as possible, the
absence of the Board from partisan
political considerations." He added:

Supreme Court of Banking

"Since the passage of the Federal Reserve
Act over 20 years ago, opinion in
Congress and among bankers has been
striving towards the ideal of making
the Federal Reserve Board a body of
such independence and prestige that it
might be described as the Supreme
Court of Finance and Banking. We
believe there is greater need now than
ever before for realizing this ideal."

Mr. Hecht emphasized that it is "the
genuine desire of the banking fraternity
to be helpful and constructive in
making suggestions in connection with
this pending legislation. The changes
we are urging are we believe essential
to the continued independence of the
Federal Reserve System."

"We have made it clear that we do
not object to a measure of public control
in the national interest for proper
coordination of our manifold credit
operations," he said, "and we do not
believe the sponsors of the legislation
desire any political domination over
these activities through our Federal
Reserve System.

"Under such circumstances we feel
that our recommendations should be
favorably acted upon because they
would enable the reconstructed Federal
Reserve Board to function freely as a
nonpolitical body actuated only by the
dictates of sound financial and economic
principles conceived in the interest
of all our people.

"The acceptance of our suggestions
would be a happy operation of the Federal
Reserve System wholly and
entirely independent of the vicissitudes
of political conditions and free
from undue influence by banking
opinion only. Such a solution would
thus have a stabilizing and confidence
inspiring effect on the entire business
situation."

Banks Rapidly Reduce Debt

Although the sum of \$1,860,000,000
has been advanced to banks and trust
companies by the Reconstruction
Finance Corporation since it began
operations in February, 1932, down to
April 30, 1935, these institutions have
repaid no less than \$1,340,000,000, or
more than 72%. This rate of repayment
is reported as being considerably in excess
of that made by any other type of
borrower.

Loans were authorized by the Reconstruction
Finance Corporation to 7,396
banks and trust companies in an aggregate
amount of \$2,350,000,000, but of
this sum \$345,000,000 was withdrawn or
cancelled and \$140,000,000 has not yet
been taken out by the borrowers.

Simplification of Bank Checks

New York.—In a bulletin issued by
the Bank Management Commission of
the American Bankers Association,
plans are described for carrying on the
simplification of bank checks, notes,
drafts and similar instruments in respect
to size and uniformity of arrangement
of subject matter.

Detailed recommendations for this
end were formulated by the association
about ten years ago, the bulletin
says, and promulgated by the United
States Department of Commerce among
banks, business houses using large
numbers of checks, commercial stationers
and lithographers. As a result about
35 per cent adherence to the recommendations
was brought about. The
present bulletin, which describes the
standard specifications in full, is issued
to maintain this high level of adherence
to the recommendations.

National Bank Notes

Changes in our money on the scale
of about \$800,000,000 are now going on
through the retirement of national
bank notes. This is reflected in increasing
deposits in the Treasury of lawful
tender notes which will require some
time for withdrawal from circulation.

The change in the currency will require
a considerable shift of bank funds
in many cases, but it is doubtful if so
large a volume of currency has ever
been retired and replaced in any country
with so little disturbance.

# Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On August 24,

S. J. R. NO. 24

## A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing to amend Sections 3 and 5 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 3. One Fourth of the Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One (\$1.00) on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-five cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the scholastic age attending any school in the State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by a appropriation from the General Funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by General Laws, and all such school districts may embrace part of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in a part of two or more counties, and the legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and repair of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law."

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund, to which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, of the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education until otherwise provided by law, and the available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

"Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the Fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas Permitting the furnishing of Free Text Books to every child of scholastic age attending any school within this State,"

And "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the furnishing of free text books to every child of scholastic age attending any school within this State,"

and every voter shall mark out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, or the word "FOR" or the word "AGAINST" at the beginning of such clause, so as to indicate his vote for or against each of said proposed amendments.

Sec. 4. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 5. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as shall be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Section 1, Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Constitutional Amendments may be submitted by the Legislature at Special Sessions under certain conditions; providing for an election on the question of the adoption of such Amendment and providing for the proclamation and the publication thereof; describing the form of ballot, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 1. That Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. How the Constitution is to be amended. The Legislature, at any biennial session, by a vote of two thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the Journals, may propose Amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed Amendments shall be duly published one week before the election, commencing at least three (3) months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly Newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said Amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any Amendment, the said Amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution and proclamation thereof; provided however, that in cases of extra ordinary emergency affecting the state as a whole, Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the manner hereinabove set out upon the submission of the proposed Amendment by the Governor at any Special Session."

"Section 2. That Section 5, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund, to which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, of the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education until otherwise provided by law, and the available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

"Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the Fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 1, Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed at Special Sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions. And those against the Amendment shall have printed the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 1, Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed at Special Sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions." Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which does not indicate his desire regarding the above proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed Amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The Sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 15, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section known as Section 51-b, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen (\$15) Dollars per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas over the age of sixty-five (65) years, who are not habitual criminals, nor habitual drunkards, nor inmates of any State supported institution; and providing that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance; providing for the necessary appropriation to defray expenses of proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 1. That Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power by general laws to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are over the age of Sixty-five (65) years; provided that no habitual criminal, and no habitual drunkard while such habitual drunkard, and no inmate of a state supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such old-age assistance; provided further that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for old-age assistance as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinbefore provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause: "The Legislature has the power to provide a System of old-age assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

AGAINST the Amendment giving the Legislature the Power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same printed as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

## A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article 16 by adding another section to be known as Section 61, providing for the abolishing all district officers of this State and county officers in counties of this state having a population of 20,000 or more, and providing that all such district and county officers be paid on a salary basis, and providing that the Legislature shall enact law putting this amendment into effect; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing that all precinct officers in all counties having a population of 20,000 or more may be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis and authorizing the Commissioner's Court to determine whether certain county and precinct officers shall be paid on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas Article 16 be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as "Section 61", which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of 20,000 or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall from the first day of January and thereafter, and subsequent to the first Regular Special Session of the Legislature after the adoption of this Resolution, be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this state, the Commissioners Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than 20,000, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis."

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and municipal, or in case where pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby directed, at the first Regular or Special Session after the adoption of this Resolution, to enact such Legislation as will be necessary to adequately compensate, on a salary basis, the officers herein referred to in all counties having a population of 20,000 or more according to the then last preceding Federal Census.

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a Special election to be held on the 24th day of August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution authorizing the Courts to place defendants on probation, and those voters opposed to said Amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution authorizing the Courts to place defendants on probation."

If it appears from the returns of votes cast at a majority of the Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution

and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The Sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a Special election to be held on the 24th day of August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers, and all county officers in counties having a population of 20,000 or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether county officers and precinct officers in counties containing less than 20,000 population may be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis."

D. 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article 1, Section 15, of the State Constitution by adding to said Section a provision to the effect that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas by striking out section 20a to Section 20e, both inclusive; prohibiting the open saloon and vesting in the Legislature the power to define and enact laws against such; vesting in the Legislature the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of intoxicating liquors, including the power to provide for a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered or exchanged in any county, justice's precinct or incorporated city or town wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option election held under the laws in force at the date of the taking effect of Section 20 Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing that such alcoholic beverages containing less than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight divisions in cities or political subdivisions have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such Amendment; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation and publication of such by the Governor and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20a to 20e, both inclusive, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"ARTICLE XVI Section 20. (a) The open saloon shall be and is hereby prohibited. The Legislature shall have the power, and it shall subject to enact laws against such; and the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of, and to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

(b) The Legislature shall enact

a law or laws which shall prohibit voters of any county, precinct or incorporated city, by a majority vote, determine whether the sale of liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within prescribed limits; and that such laws shall contain provisions for the sale of intoxicating liquors in types and various quantities.

(c) In all counties, cities or incorporated precincts wherein the sale of liquors had been prohibited at the time of the adoption of the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, it shall be unlawful to barter or exchange intoxicating liquors in any county, justice's precinct or incorporated city or town wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option election held under the laws in force at the date of the taking effect of that this subsection shall prohibit the sale of alcoholic containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight thereof in which the provisions of Chapter 116 of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution repealing the prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

AGAINST the amendment of the State Constitution repealing the prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

If it appears from the said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

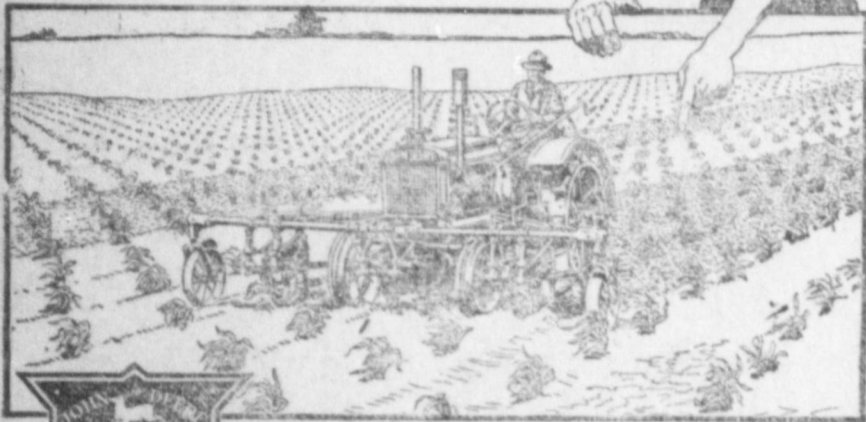
display at night. The picture will start about two o'clock in the afternoon and will continue until ten at night with the possibility of a short recess about six o'clock.

## City Water Well Completed

The big city well on the city lake west of Jayton has been completed in so far as the well is concerned. If the supply of water shows signs of being exhausted the pipe will be replaced and the pump put over the well the water driven directly into the water tower.

He has been working with the Committee Purchase Section of the Agriculture Adjustment Administration and the Interstate Commerce Commission regarding a 30 day extension of the reduced freight rates on hay and feed being shipped into the counties that have suffered most from drought. The agreement which was made possible the reduced rates during the last few months expired on May 31. The Commodities Purchase Section has included 131 Midwestern counties in the proposed area of which are in West Texas. He has also made an effort through the Farm Credit Administration and the Texas Relief Commission to secure an increase in the amount of money allowed farmers for feed for stock. Mr. Mahon said: "Now that rains have come over West Texas, our farmers have an opportunity to bring themselves back to a basis of prosperity if they can only be carried over a few more months until a new crop can be raised. I believe that some steps which the government has taken to help the farmers in the drought area should not be withdrawn at this crucial time, but should be continued until returns from a new crop can be realized."

## The World's Most Colorful Convention

There are three great parades scheduled. The escort parade of the uniformed bodies will be held Tuesday morning, June 11, the night parade of the uniformed bodies, always a fantastic and colorful event, on Wednesday night, June 12, and the Monster Night Pageant, staged on the largest portable stages ever assembled and which will be viewed by President Roosevelt from his seat in the "Pavilion of Omar," built in front of the White House. All these events will be described over the amplification system.

In addition to furnishing the amplification system, General Motors has generously furnished 350 new cars, including Chevrolets, Pontiacs, Oldsmobiles, Buicks, La Salles and Cadillacs, for the use of the officials and representatives, and their ladies, and these will have a conspicuous part in the parades.

According to Director General R. P. Smith, it promises to be the greatest convention ever held in the Capital City.

## RAILROAD WEEK JUNE 10-15

Railroad week has been dated as the week of June 10 to 15 by Gov. Allred.

The part the railroads have played in the development of Texas, their importance to the nation as a principal vital industry, and the need for a sympathetic understanding of their problems by the public will be stressed in hundreds of public addresses, radio talks and at specially arranged programs.

All the western carriers are cooperating in making Railroad week a success and it will be observed in all the western states, the governors of a majority of them having followed Allred's issuance of a proclamation.

In his proclamation, Governor Allred referred to the fact that the railroads were making a notable contribution to economic recovery as a result of their improvement and betterment programs and said that as a result of large expenditures, railway service in the state has been greatly improved.

## Business Out Look Improving

Production of Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks will continue at peak schedules throughout June, and probably considerably longer, W. E. Holler, vice-president and general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company, announced this week, following his return from a coast to coast trip through the territory, where he discussed with dealers and the wholesale organization in the field, the outlook for the next 90 days.

June output projections, Mr. Holler said, are higher than in June of last year, and full capacity of the manufacturing units and the company's 10 assembly plants will be required to carry out the program. This assures a wide spread of employment at a period when production normally begins to taper off. He added that it is the company's hope to maintain sales at such a level as to repeat the unprecedented achievement of last year, when Chevrolet sales in the second six months eclipsed those of the first.

"Several factors noted in the field justify optimistic predictions," said Mr. Holler. "In the first place, Chevrolet dealers have on hand a large bank of orders, which the plants are now working hard to fill. Deliveries are coming through much more promptly, and this fact is naturally having a favorable effect on the number of orders received.

"More than a dozen executives from Detroit are now out in the territory, addressing Chevrolet wholesale and retail personnel in all parts of the country. They are in constant touch with us, and the reports they have relayed in all point to continuation of business at or near its present peak.

"In the final analysis, the improvement can be traced clear back to the farm, which of course is fundamental in any picture of national prosperity. Farm income in most sections of the United States has shown a substantial gain over 1933 and 34. The outlook for business from farmers would be good even without the addition of government benefit money which has been pouring into rural sections.

## Radical Reduction In Relief Funds

Radically reduced allotments for the relief population of Texas are in prospect for the month of June, it has been announced by Adam R. Johnson, state relief administrator.

Federal authorities notified Johnson that the state will receive \$2,500,000 for general relief, although application was made for more than \$4,000,000. Budgets, therefore, were made on the basis of a state allotment of 210,000. Although the case load has dropped steadily since January 1, Washington officials have repeatedly expressed dissatisfaction with the number of families in relief in Texas.

"Accordingly, our per case grants will be reduced from \$17 in May to about \$10 in June," Johnson said, "and our total relief disbursement from \$5,612,000 in May to \$3,391,000 in June."

"Although at first sight this may appear to be dreadfully severe, we expect thousands of cases to quit the relief rolls in June for employment on farms where they can make more than the \$10 dollars we are able to give them. Farmers everywhere are calling for labor to help them cultivate their crops and we feel that in the case of the employable families there should not be any suffering because of this reduced grant."

June funds will be spent by the counties for the purpose described in the following budget:

General relief, \$2,125,342; hospitalization, \$8,963; rural subsistence, \$725,063; capital goods, \$582,154. Texas Relief Commission will receive \$2,500,000 from the federal government and \$400,000 of state funds for general relief. Other grants for the special program of rural rehabilitation, student aid and emergency education are expected to during the month.

**Milk In Disguise**

"Doctor," began a worried mother, "Betty is complaining again about drinking milk. Does she really need so much?"

"Yes, she does," the doctor replied, "and that isn't just my opinion. We know that it is true from countless scientific experiments. The findings have been checked and tested over and over again. Betty is growing. She needs the minerals of milk for her bones. She needs the vitamins to keep her healthy and growing. And we know that most children need the full quart to get their share."

"I know you're right," the moth-

er said, "I'll keep after her."

"No don't keep after her. That may give her a real dislike for milk. Try some disguises instead. Let's see now. There is ice cream and junket; custards and puddings; milk on berries; crackers and milk, cereals and egg-nogg. I'm sure you know of many other ways."

"How about chess? Have you tried that? And perhaps Betty will not notice the change if you offer her a glass of cool milk in the middle of the morning and the afternoon instead of at meals."

"I see what you mean, doctor. Thanks, I will try it."

**ALERTNESS IS THE CHIEF REQUIREMENT**

Alertness is the chief requirement for the driver on a vacation tour. He doesn't know the road and its hazards, he is unfamiliar with local traffic customs, and at any moment he may be called upon to cope with a situation that he is not accustomed to meeting in his ordinary driving. Therefore, if he does not concentrate on his job, he is much more likely to have a mishap than when he is traveling the old familiar roads around his home.

Most driving over accustomed routes is done sub-consciously; the driver slows down for curves and busy intersections, halts at stop streets, and observes the traffic lights, with-giving thought to them. This is the safest condition of driving, because it permits the man at the wheel to be on the alert for any unusual development. Since he does so many of the necessary things from force of habit, he is better able to act when the unexpected comes.

On the summer tour, over strange highways, the driver must consciously direct his mind to warning signs, crossings, curves, steep grades, etc. And it is on this kind of drive, when he needs all his attention on the road that he is most subjected to distraction. He has to observe the scenery, keep an eye on the youngsters, converse with his wife, see that the baggage remains in place, and look after a dozen things that in ordinary driving cause him no concern.

The first rule of safe touring for the driver, therefore, is to keep constantly on the alert. The rule for the passengers is to avoid distracting the driver from his main job.

Passengers could be a positive help if they tried. They can call out "Green" or "Red" as the car approaches a traffic signal, just as the locomotive fireman calls out the signals to the engineer; they can be watching for and reading the road signs, and in many ways relieve the driver of some of his burden.

Inexperience is a frequent source of trouble, but ignorance is no excuse. The good driver will take special precautions that may not be needed, rather than to go ahead and trust that none will be necessary. For instance, if he is starting down a grade in a mountainous country, he will shift to low gear in advance. If he is entering a curve, he will slow down and be prepared if the road suddenly takes a sharp bend. If he parks his car on a stiff grade, he will leave it in low rather than trust to his hand brake.

"Take nothing for granted" is an excellent rule for the tourist driver.

He should not assume that all is clear around the bend of the road or just over the crest of the hill — he should not even count on what other drivers will do. The one safe assumption about drivers, in fact, is that they will do the wrong thing. If you anticipate that they will, you'll save a lot of trouble.

Consult your family physician today in regards to typhoid prevention. Invest in typhoid protection against this often fatal disease. This form of protection insures you and your family against possible long confinement, great economic loss, and perhaps death.

You may be so unfortunate as to drink contaminated milk, water, or other food containing the typhoid bacilli and contract the disease this

year. In selecting a vacation spot choose one where the water and the dining room are screened for food from flies. What is best to boil water for less you know that it is sparkling spring water filtered by drainage.

### CHANGES URGED IN BANKING BILL

**Business Men and Bankers Agree in Objecting to Political Control Over Banks.**

#### AMENDMENTS ARE SUGGESTED

**Political Domination of Federal Reserve Board Declared to Be Undesirable for Depositors as Well as Their Banks.**

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Business men and bankers alike who have appeared before committees of Congress to present views regarding the Banking Act of 1935 have found common cause for criticism in those provisions which they agree would create the means for undesirable political control over the Federal Reserve System and thereby over individual banks throughout the United States. They have made the point that this undesirable condition would affect depositors in banks even more than the banks themselves.

ared that many of the changes proposed by the act in existing laws "are of a constructive nature and should have the support of bankers, if the method of appointment and the tenure (office of the members of the Federal Reserve Board, in whose hands it is planned to concentrate greater power than ever before, could be so altered as to insure, as far as possible, the absolute independence of the Board from partisan or political considerations." is added:

**Supreme Court of Banking**  
 "Since the passage of the Federal Reserve Act over 20 years ago, opinion in Congress and among bankers has been striving towards the ideal of making the Federal Reserve Board a body of such independence and prestige that it might be described as the Supreme Court of Finance and Banking. We believe there is greater need now than ever before for realizing this ideal."

Mr. Hecht emphasized that it is "the genuine desire of the banking fraternity to be helpful and constructive in making suggestions in connection with this pending legislation. The changes we are urging are we believe essential to the continued independence of the Federal Reserve System."

"We have made it clear that we do not object to a measure of public control in the national interest for proper coordination of our manifold credit operations," he said, "and we do not believe the sponsors of the legislation desire any political domination over these activities through our Federal Reserve System."

"Under such circumstances we feel that our recommendations should be favorably acted upon because they would enable the reconstructed Federal Reserve Board to function freely as a nonpolitical body actuated only by the dictates of sound financial and economic policies conceived in the interest of our people."

"The adoption of our suggestions would both place operation of the Federal Reserve System wholly and distinctly apart from the fluctuations and vicissitudes of political conditions and free from undue influence by banking opinion only. Such a solution would thus have a stabilizing and confidence inspiring effect on the entire business situation."

#### Banks Rapidly Reduce Debt

Although the sum of \$1,360,000,000 has been advanced to banks and trust companies by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation since it began operations in February, 1932, down to April 30, 1935, these institutions have repaid no less than \$1,340,000,000, or more than 72%. This rate of repayment is reported as being considerably in excess of that made by any other type of borrower.

Loans were authorized by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to 7,396 banks and trust companies in an aggregate amount of \$2,350,000,000, but of this sum \$245,000,000 was withdrawn or cancelled and \$140,000,000 has not yet been taken out by the borrowers.

#### Simplification of Bank Checks

New York.—In a bulletin issued by the Bank Management Commission of the American Bankers Association, plans are described for carrying on the simplification of bank checks, notes, drafts and similar instruments in respect to size and uniformity of arrangement of subject matter.

Detailed recommendations for this end were formulated by the association about ten years ago, the bulletin says, and promulgated by the United States Department of Commerce among banks, business houses using large numbers of checks, commercial stationers and lithographers. As a result about 35 per cent adherence to the recommendations was brought about. The present bulletin, which describes the standard specifications in full, is issued to maintain this high level of adherence to the recommendations.

#### National Bank Notes

Changes in our money on the scale of about \$800,000,000 are now going on through the retirement of national bank notes. This is reflected in increasing deposits in the Treasury of lawful money to replace bonds held against outstanding notes which will require some time for withdrawal from circulation.

The change in the currency will require a considerable shift of bank funds in many cases, but it is doubtful if so large a volume of currency has ever been retired and replaced in any country with so little disturbance.

#### The Basis of Sound Credit

"The real conditions that create the necessity for the expansion or contraction of credit arise from the needs of agriculture, industry and trade themselves, wholly independent of the administrative policies of the party which happens to be in power. We feel that the financial requirements of the nation's business constitute a continuing economic process that is not related to political changes. The fundamental principles of sound credit do not vary with variations in public thought. All experience teaches that the quality of credit is sound only so long as it is based purely on the requirements of sound business. It is not sound when any other considerations or motives enter into its composition.

The Banking Act would centralize in the Federal Reserve Board at Washington means aimed to control the supply of money in the country, which term includes the sum total of currency in circulation and demand deposits in the banks which become current through checks. The powers which it is proposed to give the Board are intended to enable it to influence the quantity of this deposit money through open market operations, the discount rate and reserve requirements.

#### The Need for Independence

"That is the reason why we are so strongly in favor of making the Federal Reserve Board a body of such independence and prestige that it would be definitely removed from all political thought, influence and dictation. Its members should be free to study and to act in accordance with the needs and conditions of agriculture, industry and trade. The policies of the board should have no reference to the politics or the changes in policies of the national administration.

"In our studies of the bank bill, we have been strongly impressed with the fact that it would set up a situation under which the Federal Reserve Board and its policies might be subject to control from the political administration of the country. In saying this I do not charge that it is the intention of the present administration to bring about any undue control over the nation's banking mechanism. The point is that if the bill passed as now proposed, opportunity for control would be there for the use of the present or whatever future administration might be in power.

"Our criticisms of the bill are not aimed, therefore, at the motives of the present administration, but they are wholly impersonal and non-political and are aimed entirely at the basic principles involved."

#### Desirable Changes Proposed

Careful study by his organization, Mr. Hecht said, had resulted in a number of suggestions for constructive revisions in the bill which he submitted to Congress. On the other hand, he de-

# Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On August 24,

S. J. R. NO. 24  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 proposing to amend Sections 3 and 5 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 "Section 3. One Fourth of the Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:  
 "Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One (\$1.00) on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-five cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the scholastic age attending any school in the State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by a appropriation from the General Funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by General Laws, and all such school districts may embrace part of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in a part of two or more counties, and the legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law."

Sec. 2. That Section 5, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:  
 "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund, to which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, of the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education until otherwise provided by law, and the available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the Fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the furnishing of Free Text Books to every child of scholastic age attending any school within this State."  
 And  
 "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the furnishing of free text books to every child of scholastic age attending any school within this State",  
 and every voter shall mark out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, or the word "FOR" or the word "AGAINST" at the beginning of such clause, so as to indicate his vote for or against each of said proposed amendments.

Sec. 4. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.  
 Sec. 5. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as shall be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section known as Section 51-b, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen (\$15) Dollars per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas over the age of sixty-five (65) years, who are not habitual criminals, nor habitual drunkards, nor inmates of any State supported institution; and providing that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such applications; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance; providing for the necessary proclamation and making an appropriation to defray expenses of proclamation, publication and election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 Section 1. That Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall read as follows:  
 "Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power by general laws to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are over the age of Sixty-five (65) years; provided that no habitual criminal, and no habitus drunkard and no inmate of an state supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such old-age assistance; provided further that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for old-age assistance as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinbefore provided."  
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday of August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:  
 "For the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old age assistance."  
 AGAINST the Amendment giving the Legislature the Power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same printed as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.  
 Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article 16 by adding another section to be known as Section 61, providing for the abolishing of the fee method of compensating all district officers of this State and county officers in counties of this state having a population of 20,000 or more, and providing that all such district and county officers be paid on a salary basis, and providing that the Legislature shall enact law putting this amendment into effect; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing that all precinct officers in all counties under 20,000 population may be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis and authorizing the Commissioner's Court to determine whether certain county and precinct officers shall be paid on a fee basis or a salary basis; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this Amendment.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas Article 16 be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as "Section 61", which shall read as follows:  
 "Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of 20,000 or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall from the first day of January and thereafter, and subsequent to the first Regular Special Session of the Legislature after the adoption of this Resolution, be compensated on a salary basis. In all Counties in this state, the Commissioners Court shall be authorized to determine whether district officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than 20,000, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioner's Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis.  
 "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and municipality, or in case where pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any fee basis is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees shall be retained by such officer or officers as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."  
 Sec. 2. The Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby directed, at the first Regular or Special Session after the adoption of this Resolution, to enact such Legislation as will be necessary to adequately compensate, on a salary basis, the officers herein referred to in all counties having a population of 20,000 or more according to the then last preceding Federal Census.  
 Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a Special election to be held on the 24th day of August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:  
 "FOR amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers, and all county officers in counties having a population of 20,000 or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether county officers and precinct officers in counties containing less than 20,000 population may be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis."  
 and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

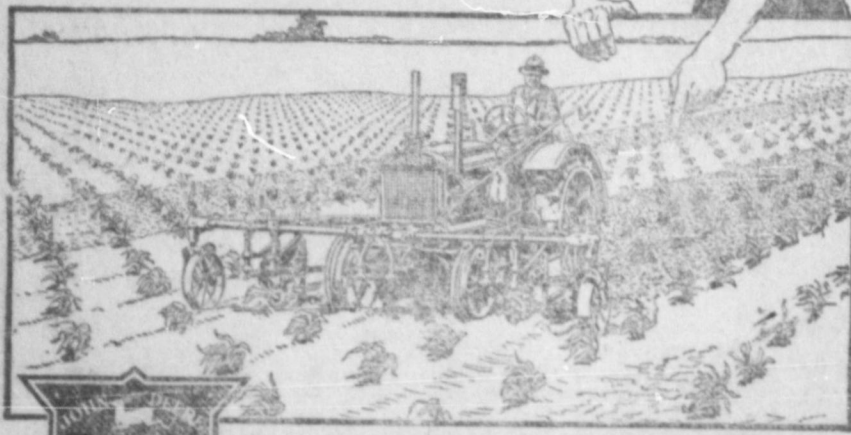
display at night. The picture will start about two o'clock in the afternoon and will continue until ten at night with the possibility of a short recess about six o'clock.
