#### **Big Business Pays Extra Dividends Raises Wages**

4 Not even in the boom days was there such a surge of extra diviflends, wage increases and employee bon'ises as this season. Corporate industry is plouring lout money to its stockholders and |workers in unprecedented amounts.

A list of extra dividends and bo nuses declared would take many pages to detail, but here are some outstanding items: Steel has announced ay 10 percent advance in wages. which will up paynolls \$70,000,000 in 1937. General Motors will pay its workers a Christmas bonus of \$10,-000,000 in addition to other benefits. Chrysler has voted an extra dividend of \$5.50 per share. Eastman Kodak declared a 75-cent extra, and Jewel Tea company \$2.00. Standard Oil of New Jersey will pay a \$4,500,000 bonus to workers, and Sears, Roebuck one of \$1,500,000.

Upshot of this is that dividends of various big industries will be as large in pre-depression days-while wages, in some cases, will even be higher. Steel's new wage rate is the highest in its history, General Motors is 10 per cent above the 1929 average. Business Week says that next year's industry labor costs will possibly be the highest in all U. S. industrial history.

#### Silver Anniversary Observed by The W. T. U. Company

ABILENE, December 10, --- The dends totaling over \$109,000, announced it (will observe its Silver Anniversary this week, choosing the Christmas season for the event.

This pioneer utility organization had its origin 25 years ago, 1911, at Abilene. It has since expanded to include 160 communities in 49 counties, stretching across Central West Texas from Kimble County on the South to Dallam County in the Panhandle. General offices are in Abilene; District offices are located in McCamey, San Angelo, Ballinger, Cisco, Stamford, Quanah, Childress and Dalhart, as well as in Abilene.

It has provided Jayton with electric power for many years.

Publication of an anniversary souvenir in the form of a newspaper magazine section is one of the main features planned by the company to celebrate the birthyear. Over 50,000 copies were sent out to customers and stockholders in the 45,000 square-mile territory.

#### THREE EKTENSION SERVICE DISTRICTS MET AT SWEET.

WATER THIS WEEK Dictricts No. 1, 2 and 6 of the Extension Service met in Sweetwater for a three-day short course this week. This preparation and do it in Jayton and save money consists of 8 pounds of salt, 4 lbs. time, gas and oil and you will feel of brown sugar and 2 ounces of salt better because you have done your petre for each 100 pounds of meat. trading at home. These ingredients may be well mixed in a tub and applied liberally to the meat. It is suggested that the bogs be killed the sticking method plan to see the football game Saturwhich sev ne artery near the heart and alows the heart to pump all the blood from the hogs veins. This will insure a better chance for the meat to keep and prevent blood shot shoulders. It has been found quite satisfactory to kill and dress hogs one day and hang them up and allow to cool through the night, then cut them up and trim the meat the following day, at which time the salt and sugar will be applied. A second application of the salt and sugar should be applied in approximately 10 days after the first application to the joints. The joints should stay in the preparation approximately 2 days per pound in weight after the second application. After the meat has stayed in the cure the required length of time, it should be washed off and smicked and peppered to taste: wraped in paper and ung up a cloth sacks, unless one wishes to put it down in refined cottor zeed pil.

The use of refined cotton seed oil retards the mole growth 100 per cent, reduces chrinkate, prevents hardening of meat and contamination by flies. It permits a large chunk being sliced off and the remainder of the piece being returned to the oil. In using this method pack the meat tightly in a container, such a crock, tin lard can, steel drun or a wooden barrell. Cover the meat about one inch with the oil. The container should be covered. It requires approximately four gallons of oil for 100 pounds of meat. A good grade of refined cotton seed will or peanut oil is quite satsfactory for this. It is presible to refine this oil at home. Your local County Agent can give you this method.






