1946 Cotton Better Quality

College Station. — Texas cotton ginned through November 30 was substantially higher in grade and longer in staple length than cotton ginned in the same period last year.

John L. McCollum, manager of the Southwest Cotton Branch office of the Production and Marketing Administration in Dallas released this information in a grade and staple report to the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. McCollum attributes the increase in grade to more favorable weather and a more plentiful labor supply, adding that about 45 percent of this year's ginnings have been Middling White and higher. Average staple length this season is 30.7 thirty-seconds of an inch, compared with 30.4 thirty-seconds a year ago.

Cotton ginned during the last half of November, as the season neared its close, fell below the quality of that ginned the first two weeks of the month, McCollum points out.

High Cost Of Low Milk Production

College Station. — Underfeeding a good cow is one of the most expensive mistakes that can be made in dairy management, say dairy husbandmen of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

From now until grass comes on again, most dairymen are faced with a real need for getting the greatest good out of each pound of feed, the dairymen say. This means that cows that do an unsatisfactory job of milk production when given an opportunity must be moved out, so that feed supplies can be best utilized to prevent the underfeeding of good cows. Then the remainder of the herd should be fed a balanced ration according to production.

An average sized milk cow, capable of producing three gallons of milk per day, needs about 18 pounds of good hay and nine pounds of a suitable grain mixture. This feed will meet her production and maintenance requirements. If the hay allowance is cut in half, fifty percent of the nutrients required to produce the three gallons of milk is lost. In a short time, her production will come down to a gallon and a half, as she cannot draw on her body reserves indefinitely to make up for the loss.

Plenty of good roughage is the basis of the ration. Feeding hay twice or even three times a day is preferable to putting out the entire amount at one time, he dairymen say. This will prevent waste and enable the cows to handle more efficiently the hay that they eat. The Extension dairymen emphasize that the cost of producing a pound of butterfat or a gallon of milk from a low producing cow is always greater than the cost of producing the same amount from a good cow.

Cold Wave Hits Jayton

Following an old fashion sandstorm which struck Saturday afternoon about 2:00 o'clock, Jayton is experiencing one of the worst cold waves in many years.

Temperature dropped from the high 70's Saturday noon to the low 20's before 7:00 A. M. Sunday morning, causing many water lines to freeze and burst, and a great number of cars to stall. By 3:00 P. M. Sunday the temperature rose to 34 but dropped back to the low 20's Sunday night and Monday. Monday afternoon about 5:00 o'clock snow began to fall, and as we go to press, (10:00 o'clock Monday night), it is already et'axzybgkqj vbgkaj vbgkaj still snowing, with several inches already on the ground. Jayton missed a White Christmas by only a few days.

WAA News Weekly Surplus

The McLean Prisoner of War Camp will be the scene of a "site sale" of surplus government property starting Monday January 6th with War Assets Administration offering to veterans of World War II, other priority claimants and commercial dealers the unsold remainder of the supplies of building materials.

In addition to lumber, plumbing, heating, pipe and fittings as well as electrical fixtures and wiring, there will be extensive offerings of personal property of war goods at McLean POW Camp. John McGee, field director of WAA in charge of the McLean "site-sale" announced that a separate section was also being set-up at McLean in which samples of surplus property now in storage at the Hereford POW Camp will be offered for sale.

Federal agencies will buy the opening day, January 6th, following which World War II veterans will have exclusive buying rights January 7th and 8th. Other priority claimants will have individual buying days the remainder of the week with commercial dealers to purchase January 14th.

Due to the discontinuing of certification of veterans for "set aside" items by WAA, Harold S. Gish, chief of Fort Worth WAA veterans division announced today that no further field visits to key cities throughout North and West Texas were planned by veteran representatives. Gish pointed out that any veteran seeking to obtain certification to buy surplus property for business professional or agricultural enterprises could obtain prompt certification by mail, by merely sending a photostatic copy of his discharge with his application to the Fort Worth WAA veterans division.
