After several days of extreme pi alized at the Hendricks Hospital cold weather in which the temperat Abilene, Texas Tuesday night ature dropped to record low of 6 for a check-up after being in a degrees below 0 last Friday night, Jayten began to thaw out this week when the temperature rose again to the high 30's by day but dropping below freezing at night.

Extersive damage was reported from many homes and churches where water lines froze and burst, flooding basements and bathrooms before the water could be cut off. Local plumbers have been in great demand the past three days.

In talking to a number of the old timers, it was learned that this was one of the coldest spells in the history of Jayton. The bad winters of 1917 and 1931 were compared to the cold wave of last week.

College Station - Texas farmers applied a record amount of 20,000,-000 pounds of poison to cotton fields during 1946 to control insects

This record figure was complied by Entomologist Charles A. King, Jr., of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, from reports of county agricultural agents. Approximately 160 counties in Texas reported the amounts of ten different insecticides used in cotton insect control. Those counties not covered by the figure are either classed as non-cotton counties or a report was not received from the

Sidelights From Washington

THURSDAY, JANUARY 9, 1947

This is being written on the opening day of the new Congress. Joe Martin, Republican from Massthis afternoon took .ne office as Speaker of he Cress, carrying this positich opewer and responsibility to the publican Party for the first time in 16 years and to New England for the first time in 21 years. Joe Martin is 62 years of age, a newspaper publisher and a bachelor. He is not a brilliant man, but he i an agreeable, friendly sort of person who is well-liked and respected by the House Member-

ship. While the Democrats realized they lacked the votes to re-elect a Democrat as Speaker, Sam Rayburn of Texas was nominated. The vote was 244 to 182 in favor of Mr. Martin. However, Mr. Rayburn was elected by the Democratic Caucus as the Democratic Leader in the House.

Mr. Rayburn had said that he would not accept the leadership and had promised his support to John McCormack of Boston, Massachusetts. Texas Members felt that it would be a severe loss to Texas and to the South if Mr. Rayburn should refuse the leadership, particularly if the job should go to someone who had no firsthand knowledge of Southern problems of agriculture and industry. Democratic Members from other states were unanimously for Mr. Rayburn but sharply divided as to anybody else. Mr. Rayburn finally consented to take the job end was elected without a dissen.-

It is generally agreed in Washington by both Republicans and Democrats that President Truman has taken on additional stature and prestige in recent weeks by reason of his refusal to accept dictation from John L. Lewis and by the issuance of directives designed to place the Country on a peace-time
