



#### Fewer Acres Higher Yields

College Station, - Secret to getting higher cotton yields in West Texas is "not so much acreage, and Of Interest more attention to production per acre", it is the belief of Husdpheth County Agricultural Agent C. M. Knight, of Sierra Blanca

"It's not the big farmers that always make the largest yields per profitable deal. acre on cotton", Knight reports. He points to the case of Marge Guiglardi the Infantile Paralysis Drive may Fort Handcock farmer, who ownes have the privilege to do so Sunday, a "dandy good small farm"; Marge February the 2nd at the Jayton Guiglardi produced 145 bales of

cotton on 50 acres last year. Knight says the high yield was the result of "rotation of cotton and alfalfa, and the use of barnyard manure". Guiglardi hauls to his farm all the manure his neighbors will let him have.

Another point in favor of high cotton production per acre in West Texas is the levil land, Knight believes. Levil land makes irrigation much cheaper and very easily done.

Guiglardi's high yields "prove that it is better to have fewer acres of land and increase the production per acre", says Knight. "It means less trouble, more pleasure and better profits".

While he won't find a bank around that will offer him a proposition like that, there is a deai that will bring him profits on the same bais, says Dr. Roy L. Donahue, Farm Unit Demonstration supervisor of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. And Dr. Donahue is talking about fertilization as a part of a soil building, crop rotation program.

A farmer can put into the soil five pounds of minerals-lime. phosphorus, potash-and take out 100 pounds of dry grass, explains Dr. Donahue. He can look at the 95 pounds as interest on the fertilizer investment. And where does the 95 pounds come from? From the air and water says Dr. Donahue, which the good Lord has provided free. In fact, 95 per cent of the dry weight of

plants comes from air and water. Applying fertilizer and growing soil building legumes is like reversing the process of investment-putting in the interest and drawing out The Camp Fire Girls met in the the principal. The interest, in this case, is lime, phosphrus and potash.

### PEOPLE ARE ASKING THESE QUESTIONS ABOUT ARMY ENLISTMENT



Q. What educational benefits do I get under the GI Bill of Rights? A. If you serve honorably on active duty for a period of 90 days,

one day of which is served between September 16, 1940, and the date of termination of the present war, or you are discharged because of an actual service-incurred injury or disability incurred within that first 90-day period of service, you are, upon discharge, entitled to one year of education in the college, trade or business school of your choice for which you can qualify. In addition, each month of active duty, including the first three, prior to the termination of the war, entitles you to another month of post-service education, up to 48 months

Your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year will be paid by the government. Also, you will receive \$65 a month living allowance; \$90 a month if you have

Q. What about family allowances?

A. For men enlisting or reenlisting now, family allowances will continue until six months after the war is officially ended.

Q. What are my chances of going overseas? A. If you enlist for 3 years, you may select to serve in any over-

seas theater which has openings, especially Japan or Korea.

Q. Can I still choose the branch of service I want to serve in?

A. Yes. You can pick any branch which has quotas to be filled, if you enlist for 3 years.

Q. Is there any way I can reenlist in my old grade?

A. Yes, you can, if you reenlist for a 3-year term within 20 days after your honorable discharge.

Q. le there any other way I can reenlist in grade? A. Yes, if you held one of certain military occupational specialties, and were discharged on or after May 12, 1945, you can reenlist in a grade depending on the length of time you held the desired M. O. S.

two sources for the public schools. The Available School Fund is distributed on a per capita apportionment basis and the Equalication Aid family, and Mr. and Mrs. W. J. appropriation from the General Revenue Fund of the State.

Equalization Aid is made to school districts with a scholastic population of 1250 or less that can show need for special state assistance. The annual appropriation is \$14,000,000 per year for the present biennium ending August 31, 1947. Schools receiving equalization assistance comprise roughly 475,000 scholastics and 16,000 teachers. 200,-000 children are transported daily from their homes to accredited

The Available School Fund provided a per capita apportionment this year of \$35.00 per child of school age.

What are local communities doing to help educate their own children is a question often asked? Local support has kept ahead of state support consistently although he constitution provides that the legislature shall provide funds for the operation of the public schools for a period of not less than six months. Local school districts last year collected for maintenance and bond purposes \$88,768,161 as compared to he state's contributions of \$71,049,-

The Legislature in 1945 provided that local school districts could levy an advalorem tax rate not to exceed \$1.50 on the \$100 of property valuation instead of the maximum of \$1.00. On September 1, 1946, sixtynine of 1,000 independent school districts were levying the maximum tax of \$1.50; 27 were levying between \$1.25 and \$1.50; 29 were levying \$1.25 and 34 were levying a rate between \$1.00 and \$1.25. This number does not include a very large number of common school districts that also levy a rate above \$1.00 nor the dozens of independent and common school districts that have increased their property valuations for the purpose paying better teachers' salaries.

Texas ranks sixth in population figures; yet thirty-third in per capita expenditures for the education of her children. What effect does such an inverse , atio have on qualifications and pay of teachers and the opportunities for the best schools possible for Texas boys and girls?
