Pneumonia Caused 2,460 Deaths During 1946

Austin, Texas. - According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, pneumonia caused approximately 2,460 deaths during the past year in Texas, a total which is entirely too high. This disease is most prevalent during the winter and spring months.

Another method of prevention in pneumonia is not to neglect a cold. for the common cold often results in pneumonia when neglected. A person with a severe cold should stay at home, and call his physician for advice if temperature presists or the cold lingers on. He should follow his physician's advice until the cold has disappeared.

The successful treatment of pneumonia case often depends upon is why a physician should be called at once when pneumonia is suspec:ed. A patient may really have beginning pneumonia when he thinks advice is sought, he will have an opportunity to start treatment early if pneumonia is present, or develops in such cases.

Swing Of Southwest Farm Markets

Leading farm commodities registered sharp gains last week, according to Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Cotton, grain, and hogs highlighted the advance, but most other products sold at steady to higher prices.

Wheat led the upward trend in cash grains with a dime advance per bushel. Corn was up a penny or two and sorghums held fully steady with late increases of the previous period. Oats closed at a net advance despite late-period weakness. Rice held firm, but buyers could obtain supplies with sightly less difficulty. Early planting was indicated with continued good weather. Feed marke's seemed little influenced by the upward trend in grain Most prices held relatively steady, but gluten of Abilene conducted the services Jayton Machine Shop, on highway keting slackened at unchanged feed dropped \$4 per ton. Hay mar-

prices. All classes of hogs went up sharply during the week, averaging a dollar or more higher at some markets. Butcher hogs topped at \$24.50 at San Antonio and \$26 at Fort Worth. Friday's bulk of Good and Choice grades went at \$26.50 to \$27 in Oklahoma City; \$26.75 to \$27 at

Wichita; and \$27 to \$27.50 at Denver. Steady prices were paid for most sheep, but lambs at Wichita lost 25 cents for the week. Medium and good fat lambs sold at San Antonio for \$15 to \$19.50; and at Fort Worth for \$18 to \$21.50. Friday's sales of good and choice lots at Oklahoma City netted \$21; and at Wichita \$21.50 to \$22.35.

Calves and Yearlings weakened at Texas markets, but mostly steady to higher prices were paid for other cattle at southwest terminals. Houston paid \$12 to \$17 for the week's bulk of common and medium slaughter steers and yearlings; while Fort Worth moved medium throats ready to start trouble, when at San Antonio brought \$17.25 to steers ranged from \$17.50 to to \$23 .ditions, when we go outside in cold at Oklahoma City good and choice vealers and calves realized \$18 to



All National Service Life Insurance policies provide for a waiver of prentiums for veterans who become totally disabled for six or more consecutive months.
