Van Buren, Ark., as everyone knows, is the old home town of Bob Burns.

There is a theatre named for him and arrows mark the way to his former residence. Though Bob lives in California, he still owns some land up in the Arkansas hills and recently he sent money to Hugh Park, editor of the Press-Argus, to keep the taxes up.

Park knows Burns well and says that Bob at first was with a carnival, then was in a blackface act and he and his partner went to Hollywood for a picture but the film was not made. Then the Arkansas lawyer began to deliver after-dinner speeches and was in considerable demand.

Bob met Will Rogers who took a liking to him—"Bob is the most likeable guy you ever saw," says Park. Burns, in his after-dinner speeches, had been telling stories about folks and Rogers suggested that he "tie them down" to some locality. Then it was that Bob decided to hang the stories on his old home town and on his kinfolks, imaginary or otherwise.

But so many yarns had been told through the years about Arkansas—notably through the book, "Slow Train Through Arkansas" and the song, "Arkansaw Traveler"—that many of the citizens of the State were sensitive, so that was where Hugh Park got busy, to do a public relations job. He saw the possibilities for great publicity for Van Buren through a nation-wide radio program provided the people of Arkansas didn't flood the sponsor with protests.

Many Diseases Carried By Common Housefly

Countless thousands of lives are lost annually throughout the nation, from diseases that are transmitted by the common housefly. Dysentery, diarrhea, typhoid fever, tuberculosis and many other disabling and even fatal diseases are spread by flies, and the control of houseflies becomes of great importance when considered in the light of public health.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that in order to protect our families we should make sure our homes are fly-proof through proper screening, and then concentrate on eliminating filth, garbage, and other breeding places for flies.

"See that your windows, doors, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor cannot molest your family", Dr. Cox said, "and make sure that your grocer observes proper sanitation standards and keeps your meat, food

and vegetable supplies screened from

"Then direct your efforts to eliminating all fly breeding places such as open garbage pails, open privies and other filth that offers the fly proper warmth, moisture and food. Flies thrive on filth, and inasmuch as one female housefly will lay from 600 to 1000 eggs per season, it can easily be seen that one breeding place left available in a community, can be responsible for a tremendous horde of flies."

Dr. Cox recommended organized efforts as being effective in ridding a community of flies and stated that no matter how clean one family's home and premises are, they are still not safe if another home down the street leaves exposed filth where flies can breed.

Economic Highlights

As the Wall Street Journal puts it, "Congressional and Treasury tax experts think the chances of some tax increase legislation in 1949 are good enough to justify painstaking work on new levies." But, it goes on, whether or not Congress will favor tax boosts won't be known until May, when the annual budget resolution is passed and the lawmakers have a better idea of future income and outgo.

So far, Congress has turned a frowning face on all pleas for higher taxes. The recent downturn in business, with its adverse effect on employment, has tended to strengthen this attitude. A few of the lawmakers have said hopefully that it might be even possible to put a modest tax reduction into effect. Senator George, the conservative chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee, is strongly opposed to digging deeper into the taxpayers' pockets. Representative Doughton, chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, also takes a dim view of higher taxes. But both these key figures, along with a majority of the members of the House and Senate, are convinced that balanced budget is necessary.

The hope is that Congress will trim its sales to the wind—that it will write a budget which can be met by the estimated revenues from present taxes. The voluminous reports of the Hoover Commission,

covering every phase and branch of the Federal government, are designed to show specifically how the administrative cost of government can be substantially reduced, without in any way imperiling policies and functions. If the reports were accepted in toto, and their recommendations adopted, the annual saving would be about \$3,000,000,000—more than enough to cover any conceivable present deficit. However, the reports have not been well received in all Congressional quarters. They would reduce patronage, log-rolling, and other popular practices. So it remains to be seen just how much action will result.

If taxes are increased, how will it be done? The ideas which are most in the limelight now include small increases in corporate profits, on individual incomes above the \$5,500 level, and on estates and gifts. But, in each case, there is a wealth of opposition. The mood of the country, as a whole, seems to be that we're paying plenty as it is.

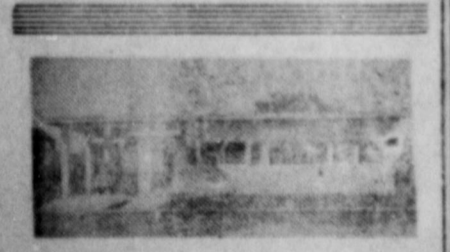

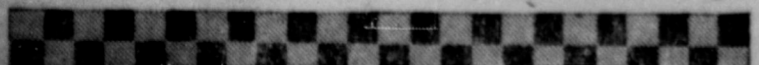

on cultivated strips of land. Soon after leaving their winter quarters, the worms migrate into cultivated crops and proceed to riddle the plants. The "salt-marsh" caterpillar is also known as the "wooly-bear" or "wooly worm". It is a very hairy, yellowish and brown caterpillar which is up to two inches in length. When migrating, the worms appear to move over the ground in great haste.

As soon as the caterpillars appear in the strips of uncultivated land around the fields, it's time to use control measures. Dust the margins of the fields and the uncultivated strips with either 20 per cent toxaphene or a 15 per cent toxaphene and 5 per cent D. D. T. mixture. Dust should be applied at the rate of 20 pounds per acre. Immediate treatment is recommended if damage is to be prevented.
