Sleep Necessary For Good Health

Sleep is a necessity of life and health, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and habitual loss of sleep will tend to retard the body's recovery from fatigue of the day's activities.

"We may be able to go without sleep for a night or two, but too little sleep for a prolonged period will undermine the health of a rugged person and turn a cheerful individual into a cross, irritable one," Dr. Cox said. "When good health can be protected to a large extent merely by sleeping, and thus allow over-taxed bodies and minds to secure the proper rest, it is hard to understand why so many persons are heedless of this important health measure."

Some individuals require more sleep than others. How well we sleep is as important as how long we sleep. A good night's rest means a sufficient number of hours spent in sleep to enable each person to feel well, do efficient work, and to keep in a cheerful humor the next day.

"Some outdoor exercise each day, a comfortable bed, and fresh air in our sleeping quarters," Dr. Cox said, "will help us to sleep soundly at night. Do not mull over your problems and ideas after you have gone to bed. Make your plans early in the evening for a good night's rest by slowing down from the physical and mental work of your daily life. When you arise each morning, rested and with a feeling of general well being, you will be amply repaid for your thought in planning a good night's sleep."

Weekly Swing Of Southwest Markets

Southwest farm markets paid some higher and some lower prices this week compared to a week ago, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Hogs advanced mostly around 50 cents for the week at Texas markets, although sows failed to share the strength at San Antonio, and feeder pigs at Fort Worth. Stocker pigs gained 50 cents at Oklahoma City, but other swine classes declined around 50 cents at Oklahoma City and Denver. Texas butcher top was \$20.25.

Sheep and lamb prices rose about 50 cents during the week. Cull and common ewes cleared from \$7.50 to \$8 at San Antonio, and \$8 to \$9 at Fort Worth. Ewes sold up to \$8 at Denver and \$8.50 at Oklahoma City. Mature goats gained 25 cents to \$1 to bring \$7 to \$8.25. Kids held steady

at mainly \$4 to \$4.50.

Slaughter cattle and calves moved to southwest markets at mostly 50 cents to \$1 lower prices than a week earlier. Stockers and feeders showed little change. Common and low-medium slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$15 to \$18 at San Antonio. Medium and good grades made \$18 to \$23.50 at Fort Worth. Common and medium steers brought \$16 to \$20 at Oklahoma City. Denver paid up to \$28 for high-good.

Livestock marketings last week were about in line with the week before.

Ample supplies of wholesale dressed meats met narrow demands at eastern markets. Prices were steady to \$3 higher, with spring lambs and cow beef up most.

Southwest egg and poultry prices held about unchanged from a week ago Monday with only slight declines here and there. Spring chickens sold 1 to 2 cents lower at Dallas and in Northwest Arkansas, and hens eased at Dallas. Fair to good de-

mand continued to absorb moderate supplies of poultry and light egg receipts.

Slow demand and increased supplies have lowered prices of many fall fruits and vegetables. The down trend is widespread at both terminal and shipping point markets. Higher prices are confined mainly to products going out of season.

Wool trade was at a standstill in Texas and the territory states. Mohair sold actively at strong prices of 42 to 43 cents a pound for adult and 62 to 63 for kid.

Rice markets held about steady during the past week at or near the support price. Prices of many feed-stuffs moved to higher levels, but wheat millfeed and soybean meal declined. Hay markets showed little change. Peanuts held steady.

Most grains sold slightly higher for the week, although barley and white corn showed small declines. No. 2 white corn closed Monday at \$1.50 1-2 to \$1.54 1-2 per bushel in bulk carlots at Texas common points. Yellow corn brought \$1.46 1-2 to \$1.52 1-2, No. 2 yellow milo sold

from \$2.05 to \$2.12 per hundred pounds.

Cotton sold 50 cents to \$2 lower for the week. Spot middling 15-16 inch closed Monday at 28.85 cents a pound at Dallas, 29.05 at Houston, and 29.35 at New Orleans.

RED CROSS RECREATION PROGRAM HELPS HOSPITALIZED SERVICEMEN



Providing recreation and entertainment for hospitalized and convalescent servicemen is an important Red Cross job at military hospitals. These Red Cross hospital recreation workers take a group of patients for a tour of Mammoth Cave, Ky., during an outing sponsored by a community service organization.

Any woman will tell you she'd rather nurse five sick children than one sick man. Doctors and nurses are inclined to agree with her. A man resents being helpless and is often beset by fears for himself and his family.

The sick soldier is little different from the civilian, except that treating the sick serviceman presents additional problems.

Unlike the patient in the civilian hospital, who undergoes his convalescence at home, the soldier remains in the hospital until he is completely fit for duty. After the acute phase of the serviceman's illness is past, he is sent to a "reconditioning ward," where he remains until he is able to take up his regular military job. Sometimes he remains there for weeks. And usually he is far from home.

For recreation and simple, pleasurable activities to fill those long hours of convalescence, military physicians in post hospitals look to the American Red Cross and its corps of specially

trained recreation workers.

Recreational programs are adapted to the needs of both the man confined to his ward and the convalescent. They range from teaching a bodridden man to play solitaire to dances and bingo games for the man on the road to recovery.

There are motion pictures for both ward patients and the convalescent, and for the ambulatory patients there are tickets and transportation to nearby ball parks and theaters.

There are also the special services provided by volunteer workers. Gray Ladies run errands and write letters, Motor Service provides transportation. Volunteer Services, working with other community agencies, help bring into the hospitals boys and girls of the same age group as the hospitalized serviceman.

Red Cross provides the "home touch" which, added to medical and nursing care, helps restore the sick man to good health.

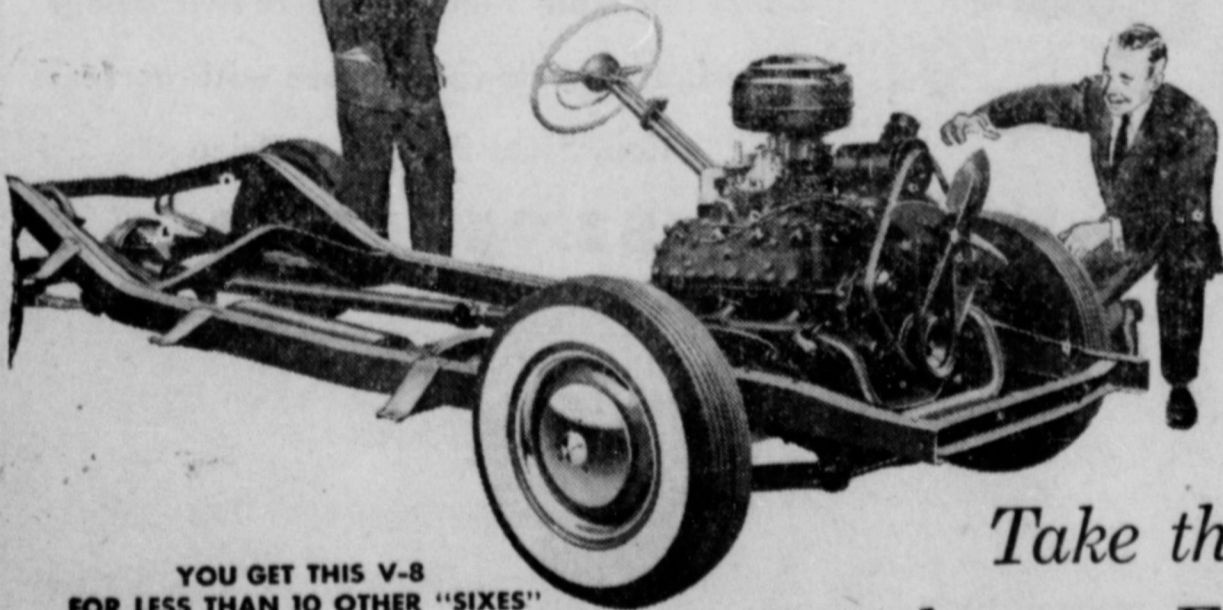
