

Plans Made For Kent County Bank

Just about anytime, any day, that two Jayton merchants get together, before they separate one of them more than likely will make the remark "I wish we had a bank in Jayton."

You could ask any citizen of Jayton or Kent County to outline a list of the needs of the immediate area, and the most of them would place a bank at the head of the list.

Citizens of the county talk about trying to get new business, industry, or companies with payrolls here, and each time the subject is mentioned it always settles down to the matter, that if we had a bank it would help a lot.

The oft asked question is "Why won't someone, just any one, come here and put us in a bank?"

If you engage a citizen of Jayton in conversation about the matter, he can give you a good sales talk on the need for

a bank in Jayton, and he can also tell you how it would be profitable, and pay good dividends.

Well, we have reached a new point. We have passed the wishing stage, and have reached the time for action.

Robert Lewis, who began his banking life right here in Jayton, met Tuesday night with a group of Kent County people and told them he is ready to help them get a bank.

He said he had money at his disposal to put into a bank, as much as is needed, for a bank here.

But in order to get a charter for a bank, it is required that a certain part of the capital stock must be "local money." The local people must prove to the banking commission that they want a bank and are willing to invest their money in it.

Mr. Lewis told the group he

felt sure if local people could raise \$50,000.00 in capital stock for the bank, it could be matched with at least \$100,000.00 of out of town money, which would be sufficient money to get the charter.

Stock in the proposed bank will sell for \$200 per share. He hopes that as many of the people in the community as possible will take at least one share.

At the meeting Tuesday night quite a bit of the necessary stock was subscribed. Also a number of people not at the meeting have indicated they will take stock.

An unofficial report late Wednesday had the total amount of local money available at above \$30,000.00. There is no doubt that the \$50 thousand can be raised, but the important thing is that as many people share in the deal as possible, it needs to be as much a

local bank as it can be made.

For those who are interested the old bank building is not being considered as a house for the proposed bank. Tom Fowler says the ir agency prefers to continue to operate in the building. Either a new building will be built or some other building remodelled to house the bank for awhile.

It must be pointed out, in all honesty that there are some in the community who would prefer that a bank here be sponsored by other financial interests -- that is true.

Each person in the county has his own personal choice as to where he banks, and we are surrounded by good banks in every direction, and these banks have been good to our people -- as good as they could be, and as far removed as they are.

We appreciate these good banks, and we enjoy the

friendship of their fine personnel. They have been wonderful to our people, sometimes going perhaps beyond the bounds of sound banking to take care of the financial needs of our people.

All this being true, this does not lessen the fact that our town and county needs a bank of its own. We need one and we want one.

And all these things being true, do not change the fact that Robert Lewis and his son Charles and their associates are willing to invest their cold cash, and a lot of it, in an effort to establish a bank here; and this is something that no one else has done, or has indicated that it will be done.

Mr. Lewis and his associates have indicated they are willing to invest up to a hundred thousand dollars in our community. And you may be sure that they have only one

real, deep down motive for this and that is they think this will be a profitable investment, and will pay them good dividends on the investment -- maybe not in one year, or two, but in ten years definitely yes.

To pay dividends, or to pay returns on the investment, a bank in Kent County would certainly have to take care of the financial needs of our people, and prove itself to be trustworthy. To not do so would invite disaster in the very beginning.

People of Kent County who have commitments at other banks would not be expected to break these commitments or to sever relations with these other banks. It would be up to the Jayton bank, once it is established, to prove its self, as to its value to the individual and their desire to trade with them, it would have to compete with the nearby banks

in the same way that other local businesses have to compete.

Mr. Lewis has proven his ability as a financier. He is not a man of unknown ability.

Some fifteen years ago he left a clerical job at the Spur bank and established a new bank in a small West Texas town where the previous bank had folded. Not even a county seat town, it was in 25 miles of Lubbock, and had two strong banks within 12 miles. That bank did well and today if you could buy any of the stock at all, it would take many times the original value of the stock to get it.

A few years ago Mr. Lewis had an opportunity to come back to Spur and buy a large part of the bank stock and become its president, which he did.

The financial statement of the bank issued June 30, 1954

soon after Lewis took over, shows a capital structure of \$250 thousand, and \$45 thousand in undivided profits, with total assets of a little over three million, the files of the Chronicle show.

Under Lewis' guidance, not counting any dividends that may have been declared in the intervening years, the bank has increased the surplus capital by \$50,000; last year a new banking house and parking lot was built at a cost of \$125,000.00; last January the stock holders were paid \$22,500.00 in dividends. The most recent statement of the bank shows a sum of \$165,108.12 in profits on hand, and total assets well over six million.

So, we see the man who is offering to bring a hundred thousand dollars in money to invest in Kent County is not a novice in the financial world but a man of proven ability.

The people of our community have been crying for a long time for some one with money to help them get a bank.

Now is the time to act. Can they afford to pass up this golden opportunity.

If you want to invest \$200 or more, in a bank, in the future of Kent County, see Tom Fowler, or Mr. Lewis.

If you don't have any money to invest, but you would like to see a bank in Kent County, and appreciate this effort to help get a bank here, contact Mr. Lewis and tell him so.

A bank here would mean at least three new families in the community; it would be the first move to give much added growth to our community.

If the merchants of Jayton and the people of Kent County turn thumbs down on these new families, and refuse to avail them selves of this added capital to be invested in our community we might as well go to the city limits and erect a large monument, and put on it a large inscription: HERE YOU WILL FIND THE FEW REMAINS OF A DEAD COMMUNITY.

State Senator David Rattliff Asks Relection

State Senator David Rattliff of Stamford this week announced for reelection as Senator for the 13 County 24th Senatorial District which includes Kent County.

Before his election to the Texas Senate, Rattliff was elected three times to the House of Representatives. He was elected to the Senate in 1954 and reelected in 1958.

It is generally recognized that a Senator's usefulness to his State and district is immeasurably increased by seniority. With several members of the Senate retiring this year Rattliff's eight years of seniority will be invaluable to the people of this district.

Senator Rattliff is highly regarded by his fellow Senators.

Last year as a token of respect and esteem they elected his President protempore of the Senate, the highest honor the Senate can confer on one of its members.

Rattliff now serves on 12 of the Senate's standing committees including some of the most powerful. In addition, because of his steady influence and demonstrated interest in sound government, he has been appointed to such key interim study groups as the Tax Study Commission, the Cost of Government Study Committee, the Legislative Budget Board, and a special committee to study the problems of the aging.

Based on the broad knowledge of state fiscal affairs, gained from his wide experience as a member of these several committees and agencies, Senator Rattliff says that he sees "no need what ever for further state tax increases anytime in the foreseeable future." He does insist, however that amendments are definitely required to remove inequities and to simplify collection of the sales tax adopted last year.

"Recent experience has proved that the sales tax law should be corrected to prevent certain injustices and to eliminate unnecessary complications," Rattliff said.

Senator Rattliff's primary legislative interest through the years has been the major problem of West Texas -- Water.

He has co-authored legislation making water available to the cities of Abilene, Arson, Alburn, Breckenridge, Hamlin, and Stamford. He also co-sponsored legislation creating the White River Authority which

Beginning with the 1962 cotton, the acreage of cotton will be that acreage devoted to the crop, Joe Favor announced here Thursday.

This means simply that any "out" rows, will not be applied to the quota, even when these "out" rows are only one row wide.

The requirement of at least 4 rows not devoted to cotton in skip row and intertilled planting has been eliminated from the determination of cotton acreage. For 1962 in skip-row plantings of 2 cotton and 2 idle, or 2 cotton and 1 idle, only the 2 rows planted to cotton will be counted cotton, Favor told the Chronicle.

To be eligible for deduction areas will not be devoted to cotton must be one normal row in width instead of four rows wide and must contain at least one tenth of an acre.

These provisions apply only to cotton and the method of determining acreage for other crops and land uses is not changed, Favor said.

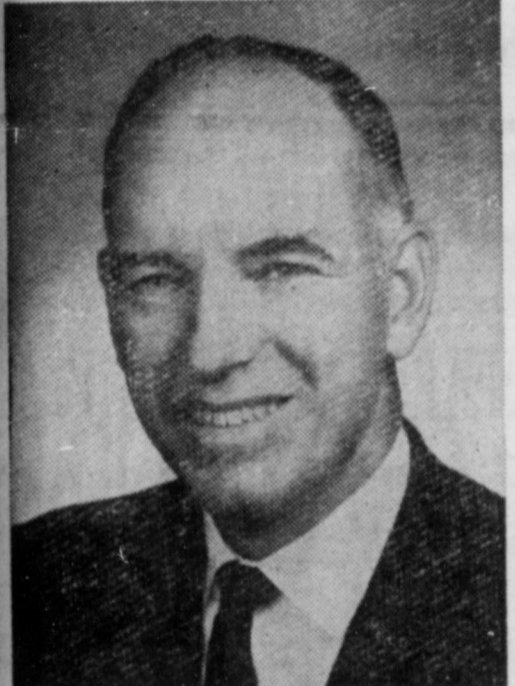
