One thing the people of Jayton and Kent County have proved is that they can work together on a good cause.

In the drive recently waged here to get money together for bank stock, it turned out to be a concerted community effort with more than 70 people involved, and no one really working against it.

What made those feel good who were spearheading the drive was the fact that there was good interest in every community of the county, with a number of people in each community wanting stock. And at Jayton almost every business house in town subscribed to the program, joined by farmers and ranchers and professional people, along with just plain citizens who had savings they wanted to invest.

If the charter is granted, and it is named the Kent County State Bank, as we have heard suggested, it will have a good name.

With the business community solid behind the move; with almost every person in the area that has any savings wanting to take some stock, and with people from all over West Texas calling in by telephone saying "I want some stock in your bank" it should not be difficult to convince the State Banking Commission that the people want and will support a bank, and that it will be a profitable venture.

We thought Judge Roy Bean and his Law West of the Pecos era and passed from the Texas scene, but it appears that we have a new version.

In our neighboring city to the northwest, the city government last week, in the newspaper, came out with a detailed report, telling in advance what they planned to do with law violators. Among the list of violations which they were going to crack down on were the drunk drivers. And in several of the penalties prescribed by the city court were jail sentences.

Unless the present session of the legislature has changed the law, DWT's (drunk drivers) must be filed in county court, and neither city courts or justice courts have jurisdiction. Neither do either of these courts have the vested power to assess jail sentences.

Perhaps they plan to set up a "Law North of the Brazos" court and make their own laws.

Also it has never been considered to be ethical for a judge to say what the fire will be before the person has entered a plea of guilty. There is something in the law about this which might possibly be used to induce a person to enter a plea of guilty.

Maybe they will convince some of the good people that go to their town to trade that they don't want them, and they will come down to Jayton and spend their money.

We guarantee them they will get fair treatment from the law and the courts -- unless of course there happens to be an out-of-town law in town at the time.

Sweet corn and Sweet Sorghum, cane, Altus Sargo and the other varieties of sweet sorghum used for insilage in 1962 will be considered as grain sorghum, states Joe Favor of the Kent County ASCS office.

January 31 is the final date to have your grain loans made up on your 1961 crop. Applicable documents must be signed by the producer and delivered to the office no later than that date. All loans must be disbursed no later than Feb. 15, this year.

Any change in farm ownership, or operators for the new year should be reported to the office as soon as possible, Favor said.

The purpose of this meeting, the paper is informed, is to see about getting a test made to determine whether or not such a program would be feasible or workable here.

Saturday night at seven in the district court room is the time set for the meeting.

Plans to Move in By July First

Plans for the new post office in Jayton were further advanced Thursday when Postmaster Rex Alexander was informed by Postmaster General J. Edward Day that a contract has been awarded to J. B. and John H. Montgomery of Jayton to build and lease the building to the Post Office Department.

The building will be on Texas Highway 79 one block north of the Kent County Courthouse at the corner of Third and Main Streets. This location is across the Street south of the barber shop.

The new post office building will be constructed on a site containing approximately 5400 square feet and is expected to be completed by July 1 of this year.

The building will contain about 1200 square feet of floor space and 4160 square feet for parking and maneuvering.

"We are continuing to build new post offices where they are needed," Mr. Day said "but we are constantly re-assessing our lease construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodelled to take care of our expanding volume of mail."

The Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment while the building remains under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

Postmaster Alexander says he has authority from the Department to be prepared to occupy the new building by July 1 this year.

Industry Group Goes to Dallas

A group of Kent County men were in Dallas Wednesday discussing Kent County with business and industrial leaders.

In this group were County Judge D. J. Young, County Commissioner Gordon Hamilton, Robert Hall and J. I. M. Wyatt.

Their main contact was with a consultant engineer firm known as Ernst and Ernst.

They discussed, among other things the potential of landing a copper tubing plant in this county. While there is still much work to be done, they held some hopes for it.

A meeting has been called to be held at the court house in Jayton for Monday night at seven o'clock. Every person in the county is invited to attend this meeting and especially the members of the industrial development committee.

They have plans to get a representative of Ernst and Ernst to come here and hold a meeting. Also they have discussed the matter of having a survey made of the county, as to its potentials and how it could serve industry.

The purpose of this meeting Monday night is to discuss all of these things and to give a report of the trip to Dallas. You are invited.

Trip Planned to Austin to Apply For Bank Charter

About four o'clock Monday afternoon was an important time to a group of hard working people in Jayton -- at that time the pledge came in that put them over the top in their efforts to subscribe \$50,000.00 of bank stock -- the amount necessary to begin making application for a charter for a bank in Jayton.

And strangely enough, after working so hard and never slacking down in a four-day effort to subscribe the necessary stock, once the amount had been reached, the commitments continued to come in, and by the end of another day they had the amount over subscribed by several thousand dollars and had to tell people who had decided to buy some stock: "Sorry, but we can only put you on the waiting list, just in case some one wants to let you have some of theirs."

At the last count the list contained about 77 names of persons who wanted stock, and all of these were counted as Kent County people.

Plans are now being made for a group representing the new proposed bank to go to Austin and make application for a charter to open the bank.

Short of some sort of political opposition before the banking Commission, it is felt that there will be no hitches in the efforts to secure the charter.

This call will be filled by men who are at least 22 years old on Feb. 1 with the exception of volunteers or delinquent who may be younger he said.



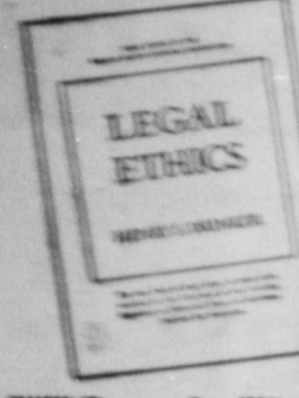

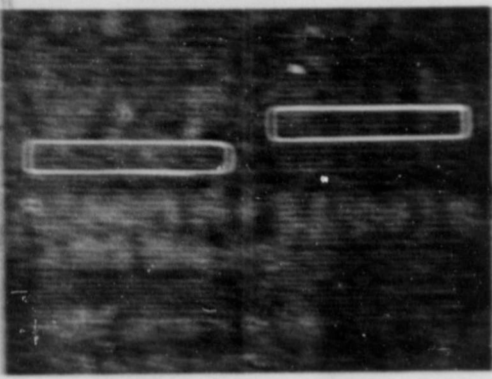

Painters Given On Use of Surplus Food Products

The educational responsibility of a County Home Demonstration Agent is to give help and assistance in every phase of food, clothing and shelter. The need for help in making the best use of surplus commodities or "donated foods" has been recognized and Mrs. Warm is planning for training meetings...

The first of these demonstrations was given to the Commissioners Court at Monday. They had an opportunity to see and taste food prepared by recipes developed by the Extension Service Foods Specialist and the HD Agent. The items for the meal were obtained from a new city, butational green beans, but chowchow, oatmeal muffins, persimmon pie and cake with frozen peaches and whipped topping. The green beans and frozen peaches were not among the donated foods but the other foods were prepared by recipes using these foods.

made from the dry milk solids and the powdered eggs. Precautions were used to follow the directions for using the two products, especially. For instance, the dried eggs should be added before measuring, they should be kept tightly covered and stored under refrigeration. They should be mixed with the flour or other dry ingredients in many recipes. Some of the precautions for feeding the dry milk solids in best conditions and flavor are the same for the dried eggs. These foods provide much of the daily food requirement and should be prepared so that they will be attractive and delicious.

Many recipes have been developed for this purpose and will be given at the training meetings for leaders and for those who wish to learn more about the preparation of these foods.
