Hartense North In the Race For County Clerk

Hartense North Thursday authorized the Chronicle to announce that she is a candidate to the office of County and district clerk of this county. Her late husband, Van North served the county in this capacity back in the late '30's. She said she planned to conduct an active campaign for the office, and would appreciate your giving her your consideration. Her formal announcement is to appear later, she said.

A committee of four men, representing the proposed new Kent County State Bank, were in Austin Monday to formally file the application for a charter to operate.

On this committee were Herbert Lewis, who will be the bank's president, and two of the proposed directors, Bill Jones and Tom Fowler, along with A. E. Richards, editor of the Jayton Chronicle.

At 8 A. M. the application was filed with the State Banking Commission, at the office of Commissioner Faulkner on the ground floor of the Capitol National Bank Building in downtown Austin.

Also an application has been filed with the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation at its office in Dallas.

Both of these agencies will make a check of the area and report their findings and make recommendations. After that is done, which will probably be in late February, then a hearing will be held, and any interested person, pro or con will be allowed to present his case.

And then the banking Commission will vote on the application. On the Commission are three men, Commissioner of Banking, Mr. Faulkner, Texas Attorney General Will Wilson, and Texas State Treasurer, Jesse James.

The group was unable to get an appointment to see Mr. James, but did meet and discuss the application with Judge Wilson at his office in the new Supreme Court building.

It will probably be in March or April before the matter will come up for vote before the Commission. If the charter is granted, then it will take from 60 to 90 days to get the bank open for business, it has been estimated.

'Conservative' For Congress Visits In Jayton Wednesday

COUNTRY BOYS TAKE TRIP DOWN TO STATE CAPITAL

When a carload of country boys go to town, they stand out like a sore toe.

This week end three country boys from Kent, and a former Kent Countian who wants to renew his ties, went down to the State Capitol to see about opening a bank in Jayton.

We left here in the mid afternoon, and arrived at the capitol about 10 p. m. Sunday.

We put up at the swank Commodore Perry Hotel, just off 3 blocks from the Capitol.

We were up at 6 and getting ready to fill our 8 o'clock appointment with the Commissioner of banking.

It's a small world. At 7:20 we were standing at the corner of Congress Avenue and about Sixth Street waiting for the light to turn, and who pulled up at the light but Ronnie Brantner, late of Kent County. He yelled out "what are you guys doing down here" as the light changed and he took off.

We arrived at the Commissioner's office at 7:45, sure not to be late, and just about that time he walked up and we all went into his office, and the application was filed.

Commissioner Faulkner is a man of mature years, who has spent his lifetime in the banking business. Someone commented about his willingness to make an appointment at such an early hour, and the fact he did not keep "regular banking hours." He said he enjoyed getting to work early, and said back when he was a bank examiner many times he would get up at an early hour, drive 150 miles and be ready to begin examining a bank at 8:00 o'clock.

The bank application contained quite a number of pages, and he thumbed through them rather quickly, but you could tell that he had seen on each page the thing we was looking for, before he turned on to the

next one. Then he matter of factly explained the details of completing the processing of the charter.

He seemed not to be in a hurry to shoo us out of his office, so we visited with him for almost an hour, discussing the potentials of a bank in Kent County. And he told us, in a friendly manner, some of his experiences in the banking world: some with banks that did well and made money and others that he had to "close out."

As we left his office at 8:45 we all felt sure of one of two things. That after he makes a complete check into the Kent County picture, if he thinks a bank in Jayton will do well and make the stock holders some money, operated on sound banking principles, he will vote for the charter. And on the other hand, if he does not think so, he will vote against it.

From there we went to the office of Attorney General Will Wilson at the Supreme Court building. We were greeted by his receptionist Mrs. Dougherty and we told her our mission. Judge Wilson was in court representing the University of Texas in an integration suit. We were referred to his personal secretary Miss Hudson, who said she would do her best to contact Judge Wilson and see if he could work us in to his busy schedule somewhere.

We went over to the State capitol building, which is a huge thing within itself. While the others in the group were checking on getting an appointment with the Treasurer, I went to the second floor to check up on the Legislature. There was no doorman at the entrance to the Senate Chamber so I walked on to the floor where the Committee on Water was holding a hearing, on

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PIONEER KENT SHERIFF IS BURIED HERE THURSDAY

R. I. (Bob) Goodall, an early day Kent County Sheriff was buried in Jayton Thursday.

He died in Pecan Grove Rest Home in Sweetwater at 11:55 p. m. Tuesday.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 2 in the Jayton Methodist Church, with Waldo Proffitt, Church of Christ minister in charge.

Burial was in the Jayton cemetery. Pall bearers were Odell Harrison, Wayne Stansland, Robert Koonce, Gordon Hamilton, Euell Harrison, and J. B. Montgomery.

Mr. Goodall had been bedfast for 11 years after having a stroke.

He served as Sheriff of this County for 8 years from 1914 until 1922.

And then he served again from 1927 to 1934 a total of 16 years in all.

His wife died in 1959.

He was 87 years of age having been born in Arkansas in 1874.

Surviving are a sister Mrs. Frank Holden of San Saba, two half sisters Mrs. John Hunter of Kingsman, Ariz. and Mrs. Olive Rackley of Big Lake and a number of other relatives.

Thursday afternoon just before sunset, we were standing at our east window looking out at the beautiful rainbow in the sky. At that time the phone rang, and it was Claud Senn, who had also been watching it and suggested that we take a look.

We have never seen a more beautiful sunset. The sun had suddenly come out from under the overcast sky, and was shining in the rain.

Actually, there were two rain bows, and the colors were wide and distinctly separated. A camera could not capture such beautiful color.

One or two of our coffee drinking buddies around town seem to think we were a bit rough last week, in commenting on the City of Spur's recently published plans to crack down on the traffic situation.

It was a more or less "tongue-in-cheek" remark, intended as a matter of jesting, yet we also hoped it might cause them to take second thought about the matter.

We like the people of Spur, and think it is a nice little town. And we like to go up there and get the things we can't buy in Jayton. We sure would hate to see it become a ghost town.

We appreciate good law enforcement as much as any one. But we know, too that the quickest way to kill a town is to have over enforcement, or to set up any system that takes on the form of a "trap."

About a year ago we ran the records in Kent County, and it appeared to us that we had one of these "traps" operating right here in our city limits. In the year 1960 the people who travel through our fair community had left more than \$1500.00 at the court house, the most of it resulting from tickets given them by Texas Highway Patrolmen who had been "lying in waiting" for them, half hidden under some trees near a busy intersection.

It is not a pleasant matter to do, but we gave this situation some publicity, and as a result the Texas Highway Department decided to take down the stop signs and put up yield signs in their place.

In the year 1961 the fines in Kent County went down more than 100 percent from the previous year. Also people were not bothered with the necessity of having to stop even if there was not another car in a mile of them, and the cause of safety was not hindered one single bit.

Sometimes people get so interested in trying to do a good job at whatever they are doing like slowing traffic down or stopping the boys from "dragging" down main street, that they do a community an injustice. And sometimes it takes a smart-alex reporter to point out the other side of the issue.

Course, like we said last week, if any of these neighboring towns want to deliberately drive off their trade we'll sure try to get the merchants of Jayton to welcome it. Confidentially, we have some people here, too, who it seems also enjoy slapping people in the face who would like to trade with us now and then.

I've done said too much, as usual, so with this I will walk right off this page but will be back next week. I hope.

GEESLIN REPORTS ON TRIP TO WESTERN FEEDING LOTS

Approximately 200 men attended the Western States Live Stock Feeding and Grain Marketing tour Jan. 14-20.

Representatives from 40 counties made the seven day tour through three major feeding areas in Arizona and California on feed, the tour was ornate and saw about 185000 sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, A&M College of Texas and Texas Technological College. Points visited included the Phoenix, Arizona area, El Centro, Calif. and Bakersfield, ara.

High points of the trip included seeing Texas milo being fed to Texas cattle. Arizona feeds out about 470000 cattle annually. Of this amount about 135000 come from Texas.

California ships in about a million and a half cattle per year with about a half million coming from Texas as feeders.

Sun Oil Gets New Production In North Clairemont Field

Sun Oil Co. No. 2 G. W. odgers was completed as a producer in the North Clairemont (Strawn Sand) Field.

Daily potential was 121.75 barrels of 38.6 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 6,57486 feet.

Formation was treated with 500 gallons of acid. Casing was set at 6626 feet and the total depth was 6636 feet.

School Census Is Now Being Taken

The Jayton school is now in the process of taking the census of the children in the district.

Of special concern is the matter of getting all the children who will be going to school for the first time next year.

California has increased cattle feeding by about 500 percent in the last 15 years.

Population in the state has also increased 300 percent in the last two decades. Other reasons for increasing the feeding in the Western area include improved markets for better grade beef and more irrigated land being made available for the production of feed stuffs.

Arizona and California feeders buy Texas cattle for 24.5 to 26¢ delivered. Shipping cost is about 1.35 to 1.80 per hundred weight.

Rations in the two states vary from high roughage to high concentrate rations. The cattle usually start on a low concentrate ration and increase to high ration.

Percentages of concentrates begin at about 30 gain and increase to 75 to 80 percent with a few high energy rations of 92 percent grain during the final finishing period.

Cattle fed for the Los Angeles market are fed to about 1050 lbs liveweight. The Phoenix market used a little finished weight. On rare cases finished cattle are shipped to Denver, Chicago and Boston and in some cases cattle are returned to Texas for market.

Kent County was represented on the tour by Billy Wallace and the county agent.

Dudley and V. J. Coleman of Ackerly also attended. They are Kent county ranch owners.

The county agent will report on his Western States Feeder and Grain Marketing tour next Thursday afternoon, Feb. 1.

The meeting will be held in the District Court room at 3:30 and all livestock producers are invited to attend the meeting.

Colored slides will illustrate the scenes in the feed lots of the Western States.

Byron J. Greiman, Livestock Specialist for the Agricultural Extension Service from Lubbock will attend the meeting and discuss the possibilities of livestock feeding in the South Plains area.

Mr. Greiman serves the county agents of about 60 counties of the Panhandle South Plains area. He is a former outstanding 4-H club member and has done extensive graduate work in livestock investigations.

All interested persons are invited to attend the meeting on Thursday afternoon.

\$8,000 Survey Of County Is Ordered

Approximately 75 people attended a meeting of the Kent County Industrial Development group at the court house Thursday night.

Herb Jack, representing the copper mining industry outlined the prospects of locating a plant in this area.

H. E. House, representing the Ernst and Ernst, a Certified Public Accounting firm in Dallas, outlined the steps in incorporating an industrial corporation or a local development company. This would be necessary to bring essential industry to the area.

The Ernst and Ernst firm will conduct a survey of Kent Co. to determine the possibilities of the county. This will include sales projections, taxes, utilities, freight, labor, raw materials, insurance, costs, and statistics and other information on possibilities in developing the potential of the county.

The fee for this survey will be approximately \$8,000 to \$10,000. Mr. Jack pointed out that the amount and approximately \$100,000 was needed by the county to be paid by the state.

Another meeting has been called for Monday night Jan. 29 at 7 in the courtroom. Everyone is invited to attend and judge their financial assistance and moral support to help better the conditions in Kent Co.

Robert Hall is secretary and treasurer of the Industrial sub-committee. Gordon Hamilton is chairman. The meeting was conducted by Elbert Walker the chairman of the Kent County Extension Service Program Building Committee.

The HD Council met on Friday the 17th in the Extension office. Mrs. J. A. Kidd presided at the meeting and called the roll.

Mrs. C. C. Kimmel gave reports from the last meeting. Reports from the standing committees were voted on and accepted.

Mrs. Bill Myers read two letters from Mrs. Wesley Trautman concerning the THDA training program which will be Jan. 31 at the court house. At that meeting lunch will be served at 12 by the club members for 1.25 per plate.

The THDA training meeting is to be held April 16 at Wichita Falls.
