## Jaybirds Take the Big One from McAdoo

### Less Than 30% Of Vehicles Have Been Inspected

Less than thirty percent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safety inspected for 1962 according to Patrolman J. R. Whitmire Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

With the April 15 deadline for having the vehicle checked rapidly approaching, this means there are approximately 900 vehicles in Kent County remaining to be inspected by the two approved stations available.

Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers, while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law, Whitmire said.

Official stations in Kent Co. are Goodall Ford Sales and Hall Wild Chevrolet Co.

### Film Shown of Feed Lot Tour The 4H Girls

Twenty five attended a beet cattle feeder meeting in the district courtroom Thursday afternoon and heard the county agents report of the Western States Livestock Feeder and Grain Marketing tour. Colored slides and detailed information made Jan. 14 to 20.

Dr. Byron Greiman discussed cattle feeding operations with the group. During the day Dr. and Mrs. Greiman discussed cattle management and the county agent visited several ranches, feedlot operations, and club calf feeding projects.

### Two New Kent Wells Completed

Sun Oil Co. has completed No. 1 Johnson Oil Unit as the third well in the North Clairmont (Strawn Sand) field four miles north of Clairmont in Kent county. It is in Section 50 Block L H&TC survey.

Daily potential was 93 barrels of 41.1 gravity oil with a trace of water, pumping from perforations at 6511-30 feet. casing was set at 6663 with hole bottomed at 6664. Pay was treated with 1000 gallons of acid.

Sun No. 7-J Bilby Wallace North was completed in the Clairmont (Lower Perm) field. It was Section y2, Block 89 H & TC survey.

Daily potential was 426.89 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, flowing through a 16-64 inch choke and open hole at 6661-6673 feet. Pay was topped at 6663 feet. Packer was set on casing and tubing pressure was 245 pounds. The pay zone was treated with 300 gallons of acid.

Sun Oil Co. No. 8J Bilby Wallace North will be a 6800 foot rotary project one mile north of Clairmont in the Clairmont Lower Pennsylvanian Field.

Location is 1216 feet from the west and 698 feet from the north lines of Sec. 12, Block 88 H&TC survey.

Don't forget this date. If you do not file your application this coming Monday you cannot get your name on the ballot.

### District Home Dem. Meeting Held Here Wednesday

A 14-county Home Demonstration planning meeting was held in Jayton Wednesday.

The district court room was almost full as the ladies gathered from all over the area to plan their future programs.

Mrs. Agnes M. Marrs and Kent County HD women were hostesses to the group, serving lunch in the extension office and adjacent parts of the court house, at the noon hour, a t which the editor and his wife, among others were invited guests.

It was an all day meeting, that recessed about 3 in the afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Thomas of Fort Worth and Mrs. Purdy of Weatherford were guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Taylor and Henry D. Saturday and Sunday. They are relatives of the Taylors.

The Jayton basketball team overcame a very poor first quarter with a strong second period and outlasted a stubborn McAdoo bunch here Tuesday night 60-51.

Big Harold Murrell fouled out with 5 minutes and 49 seconds left of the game and the Jaybirds trying to defend a 47-44 lead. But the McAdoo boys were pretty well tired out and could not capitalize on this apparent gain.

Jayton broke the ice with only 13 seconds gone in the game, as Royce Stalaland piled in 1 point while toeing the free line, but with the game only 45 seconds old McAdoo hit a long shot to take a lead that grew to 18-9 at the end of the quarter.

At the end of two minutes Judy made a baseline shot that closed the gap up to 4-3.

From there on to the end of the quarter McAdoo continued spread the gap. The Jaybirds were nervous and had difficulty in setting down.

Jayton came out after the quarter and started hitting. Smith made two from the free line only 3 seconds after play began. Murrell made a field goal, Hallum piled one in and then made two from the free line all in the first minute to move the score up to 18-15 and get the Birds back in the game.

With the time down to 2 minutes and 46 seconds McAdoo had moved up to take a 25-17 lead and then Hallum made three field goals as the clock showed 3:13. 2:40 and 1:49 minutes to play and then Virgil Judy put two free shots in the basket at 1:24 to tie the game 25-25.

With 22 seconds left Merle Smith piled a field goal in the basket to give the Jaybirds the lead and with only 8 seconds to play Virgil Judy sank another one to give the Jaybirds a 29-26 half-time lead and the fans were happy.

### The Draft Board Issues A New 1-Y Classification

A new major amendment to draft regulations which will affect thousands of draft age Texans was explained this week by ol. Morris S. Schwartz state selective Service director. The new amendment is by presidential order.

The new classification is 1-Y. Men found not qualified by trained forces for military service under current, physical, mental and moral standards but who are considered to be qualified to serve in time of war or national emergency declared by Congress will be placed in the new class.

The new classification permits ready identification, day by day of men who are considered to be qualified and available in an emergency and thus facilitates more rapid mobilization of manpower in case of need, the director said.

### 645 Pay Poll Taxes At Deadline

A total of 645 Kent County residents paid their poll taxes and will be eligible to vote this year, a check in the office of Tax Collector Robert Koonce shows.

This compares with a total of 489 last year and of 678 two years ago.

Including the overs this means there will be more than 900 eligible voters in Kent County this year.

Office deputies have not had time as yet to break these polls down into precincts and voting boxes.

### A New Corporation Is Being Chartered In Kent County

A new corporation is being formed here, to be known as the Kent County Development Corporation.

Application was sent to Austin the first of the week to get a charter for this new corporation. A non-profit organization its chief function will be to promote industrial development in Kent County.

The main program to be handled by the group at present is to get an economic survey made of the county and to make an effort to get industrial leaders interested in investing their money here.

The group expresses much optimism as to the progress of the current program.

This program was begun as a project of the Extension service and sponsored by the local extension agents.

## "It's Not So" Declares Texas Spur Editor Harrison

A special runner brought us down the current issue of the Texas Spur Thursday morning, before its usual arrival time on Friday morning, and it seems that Editor Grady Joe Harrison has reared up in righteous indignation regarding comments in the Chronicle the past two weeks. On his editorial page, with a 3-column 30 point bold face heading he writes: "Jayton Editor Blasts Fines Set by Spur City Council."

Then he begins his editorial with "We would like to preface the following editorial with some comments taken from the Jayton Chronicle the issue of Jan. 19 under the front page column 'This Week in Jayton' written by Afton Richards editor and publisher of the Kent County paper."

(Here he quotes two paragraphs from the Jan. 19 issue of the Chronicle and then he continues.)

Now just to set the record straight, there was absolutely nothing in the story referred to by the Jayton editor that mentioned jail sentences. How he read this into the story is beyond me.

In his last week's edition of the paper the Jayton editor decided he might have been a little too rough on Spur and the people in general and commented that he had written the article more or less "with tongue-in-cheek."

We are glad that he saw fit to clarify his statement, although I have the feeling that at least a few persons, one or two

are disappointed because the Jayton editor and the Spur editor didn't kill each other off in an old fashioned shoot-out. Performed in Kent County of course 'cause its' against the law in Spur).

The disappointed parties would be the rumor-mongers who delight in stirring up trouble among friends.

At any rate the Jayton editor was correct to point out that DWI does not come under either JP or city court -- it is a county court offense. He could have pointed out this error, apparently an honest one made by the city council of Spur, and let it go at that.

The fact that the city council had the foresight to publish the fines, in my opinion showed a sign of good faith. They were saying to the people of Spur, 'we have appointed a new city judge and we expect him to enforce the law.' The fact that the fines were made public should in itself, make the individual more traffic-conscious make him want to obey the traffic laws.

If the city council had been intending to establish a "Law North of the Brazos" as charged by the Jayton editor, I doubt seriously that they would have given public notice of their intent, but would have followed Judge Roy Bean's formula closer by hanging the first person caught jaywalking.

I do not think it was the intent of the city council to create a "strong-arm" type law enforcement program that would

trap any imprison all the inhabitants of Spur. On the other hand, I do think they expect the law to be obeyed and will not stand idly by and see it broken flagrantly.

We are of the opinion that there would be less crime and good law enforcement helps, rather than hinders a town.

I think the Jayton editor believes this also; otherwise why would he spend so much time in Spur?

It is the duty of the people to see that all laws are just and are for the whole instead of a select few. If the people of Spur feel that the fines scheduled by the city aldermen are too steep, or unjust it is the right of the people to see the laws changed.

Some of the finest people in the world reside in Kent county and we have no beef with them and I'm sure they do not expect special treatment.

We recognize the Jayton editors right to criticize, but feel he would be more justified if his criticism was directed closer to home. end of Texas Spur editorial.

Editor Harrison, we appreciate your nice and noble effort to defend the Spur city council of our "Judge Roy Bean" charge, but if you have correctly stated their cause, then you have convinced us that we were right in our conclusion. But first, I am sure your readers would have appreciated you quoting our editorial in full rather than pulling out a few

special paragraphs. If you had quoted all of it, it would have provided the answer to most of your questions. Like when I said "We like the people of Spur and think it is a nice little town. And we like to go up there and get the things we can't get in Jayton." Or where we said "we appreciate good law enforcement as much as anyone, but we know too that the quickest way to kill a town is to have over enforcement or set up any system that takes on the form of a trap."

You say "We have appointed a new city judge and we expect him to enforce the law."

Well, Brother Harrison, we say this in a good humor, but in our opinion, this is not the American way. Where in all the law, except as we pointed out in a "Judge Roy Bean Court" is any kind of a judge, municipal, justice or county judge, empowered with enforcing the law?

And also, where in all the law, is any city council vested with the authority to say how much a fine will be? You folks in Spur need to read up on the American way, of life, the three departments of government, the legislative, the executive and the judicial. When I was going to school we learned about this in our seventh grade government class. So these are things that any one with a grade school education should know.

I am sure you already know this, since you are certainly a smart man, but let me refresh

you on it. If I am wrong then sue me.

The city council, in part, is a legislative body. They can pass certain laws, including traffic laws. They can prescribe the penalty for violation within certain limitations. But they certainly don't have the authority to say what any fine in any particular case shall be. That is the prerogative of the jury, or in case of a guilty plea, of the judge.

You don't need a judge if the city council is going to dictate to him how he shall decide cases that come before him.

It is the duty of any judge (not to enforce the law) but to see that any person charged before him gets a fair trial, and to see that a complaint filed by an enforcement officer gets properly executed.

Do the people of Spur actually expect the city judge to enforce the law? I think you misstated your issue here. The city marshal or other officers should provide the enforcement and let the judge see that every person coming before him gets equity and justice in the sight of the law.

How in the world could a magistrate hear the facts and assess the penalty, as the American way dictates, when the city council has already told what the fine shall be?

(Where is your city attorney whit all these Roy Bean rulings are being handed out?)

guilty are punished? I am sure you agree with this.

Yes, I go to Spur quite often. And every time I go I leave some good Kent County money up there, and so far none of the Spur merchants have objected to taking it.

In case you are wondering about it, Brother Harrison, when I am in Spur I am not out soliciting advertising in the Chronicle. I do accept it when they volunteer. Quite often a Spur merchant will call up on the phone and order advertising in the Chronicle. And some times when you get real busy and can't take care of them they will come down here and have us turn out a job of printing for them. We try to take all the Spur money down here we can get.

Also we try to spice up our paper where people will be anxious to get it. Wouldn't you hate to edit a paper that no one was anxious to read?

And, incidently, our subscription list in Dickens County has grown considerably in the past few weeks. Spur merchants have called us on the phone just recently and said "We want to start getting your paper." And this includes members of the Spur city council.

One or two more things. You suggest that we might direct criticism more closer home. well, we can't ride the local people every week. We have to try to live with them.

And about your suggestion that some people might expect we two editors to shoot it out

I am sure that there are some Kent County people who would be glad to furnish the ammunition any time you decide to try it. That seems to be the accepted practice, that anybody that will kill off a nosey editor, that he should be provided with a blue ribbon and a new round of ammunition.

I'll tell you how we can settle this whole controversy. You see me in Spur quite often, but I never have seen you in Jayton. Some time just slip off and come down. I know a little place that really serves delicious coffee and I will see that you get a free cup. And while you are enjoying the coffee, then I want to tell you about our new post office, our new convalescent home, our new bank we are getting, and about the new copper tubing plant we are trying to get here. And then if you still haven't finished drinking your coffee, I could tell you about the State and national highways that run in and out of Jayton from five different directions. And when we finished our coffee, I could take you and show you our beautiful school plant and our swanky court house, and then I might even brag a bit about our low state, county and school taxes here in Kent County.

And then after we have done this I will let you brag on what good law enforcement you have in Spur and I won't say a single word against it.

Is that fair enough?

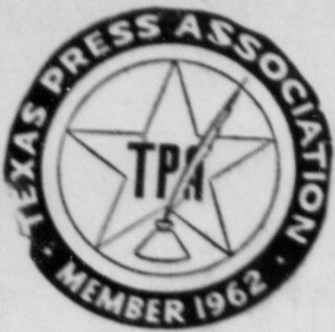

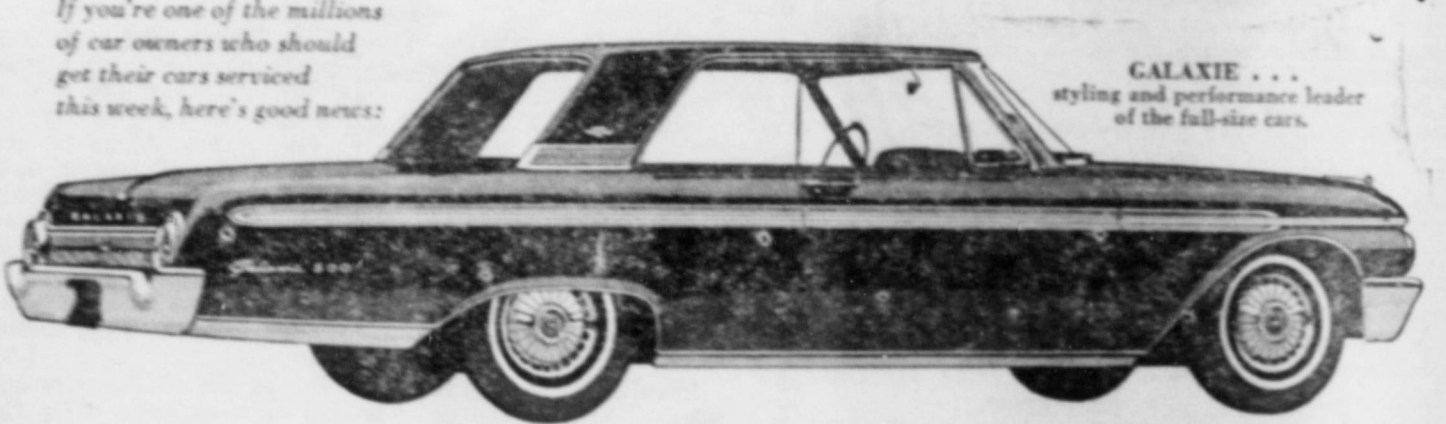

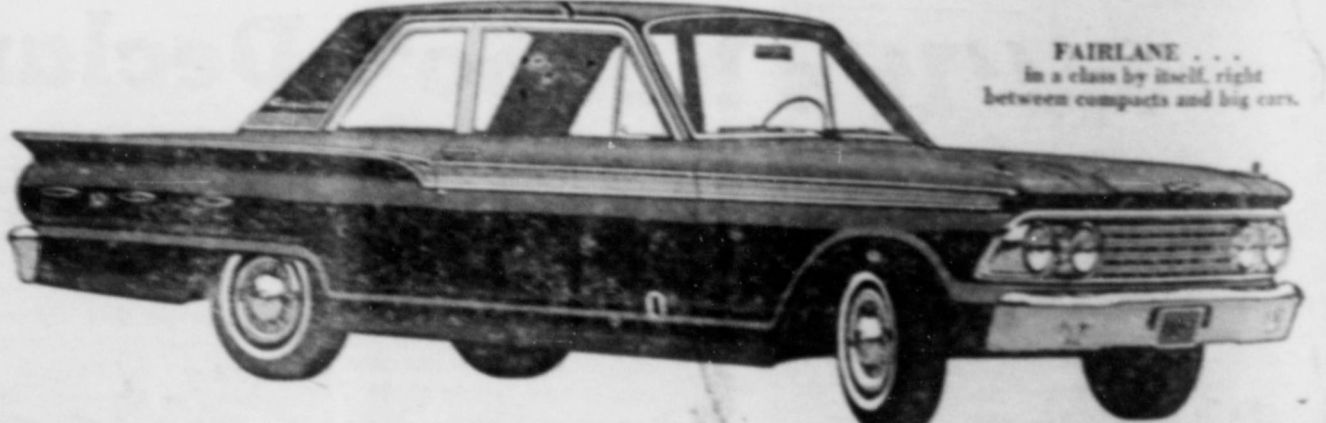
were with him all the way. Bob had a big heart and a great courage which have been an inspiration to me. You just cannot ever let a fellow like that down.

## You May Now Buy Your New 1962 Car Tags

Kent County persons who wish may now buy their 1962 license tags and put them on their vehicles, deputies in the office of Tax Collector Robert Koonce said here Thursday.

It was also pointed out at the tax office that the Texas Highway Department in Austin advises them that in no case is motor vehicle license plates the latest title and registration receipt presented to the tax for 1962 to be issued unless collector at the time of the purchase.

Two main reasons for this is that it is necessary to record the title number on the license receipt and also to assure that the vehicle not be registered incorrectly as to ownership, make model etc. If this information is recorded incorrectly then difficulty would occur when attempting to transfer the vehicle or obtain lost papers to vehicles. Also the law enforcement agencies would be hampered.
